Building Tops \$300 Thousand

Residential Construction Leads; Prospects Are Good For Next Year

Olton has done \$318,755 worth of building since the first of the year. This information came Wednesday from Mrs. Berneice Smith, city secretary. Lions share of the dollar volume went into residential building. One of the biggest permits issued was a \$20,000 permit issued to Olton First Baptist Church for construction of a new church parsonage.

One other \$20,000 residence permit was issued during the year.

Total of permits issued for residential building was \$159,130.

Business building was a strong contender for the dollar volume. City officials said permits totaling \$100,825 were issued for business construction.

A single permit for construction of Thompson Chevrolet Company's building at the intersection of Highway 70 and Main Street accounted for \$65,000 of the quoted dollar volume.

The beautiful new Chevrolet building is scheduled for completion in the near future.

Main Street Church of Christ did the only appreciable amount of church building this year. City officials said a \$50,000 permit was issued for that church's building program.

The school did \$3,800 worth of building to round out the city's construction for the year.

Residential construction here was somewhat a disappointment to most observers after the fine start at the beginning of the year at Hillcrest addition.

Some builders blame the tightening of money and the rise in interest rates for the noticeable slump in residential building. Whatever the reason, the slump has been noticeable here and across the nation.

A relatively poor crop in 1955, no doubt, had its effect on the building here during this year. Good crops here this year point to an acceleration in construction here during the next few months.

Dimmitt's Bobcats came roaring from behind in the second half last Friday night at Dimmitt to dump the Olton Mustangs 25 to 14 and tie their visitors for second place in District 1-AA.

Powerful Canyon trounced Daltart and emerged champions of the district. The Eagles will play Spur at Plainview this Friday night.

Picked as underdogs for the ball game, the Bobcats simply would not be denied. They trailed the visiting Mustangs 14 to 12 at half time and then came back to score two touchdowns and convert once while holding the Mustangs scoreless during the last two periods of play.

Dimmitt's Kenneth Lowe smashed over from the two-yard line early in the second period for the first score of the ball game. The Bobcat try for extra point was no good and they led the Mustangs 6 to 0.

The Mustangs retaliated quickly. It was David Price who carried for Olton's first touchdown. Teddy Jack Estes crashed over for the extra point and Olton led 7 to 6.

Olton's next touchdown was set up when lineman Billy King pounced on a Bobcat fumble on the Dimmitt 31.

James Ray Hyatt pegged Estes for a first down on the 19. Price went through the middle for another first on the Dimmitt 2. A series of penalties left Olton with a fourth down on the eight yard line and then Hyatt tossed to Alvin Wallace in the end zone.

Try for extra point was good and Olton led 14 to 6.

The Bobcats scored again early in the third period and converted to take the lead in the ball game. Never again was that lead threatened.

Cotton Harvest Continues Fast Pace This Week

With Olton's cotton harvest entering its last stage, the number of bales weighed in at area gins by Wednesday afternoon indicated an increase of almost 4,000 bales during the past week.

Total bales weighed in as of Wednesday hit 36,453, according to local ginmen.

The majority of cotton now coming in is stripper cotton, as with few exceptions stripping machines are taking over the harvest.

Ginmen estimate that the harvest is now at least 90 per cent complete. The grain season has virtually come to a close.

Methodist Congregation Gives Green Light To New Church Building Plan

The Olton Methodist Church has voted officially to proceed with plans for a new church building.

This decision was reached by the membership of the church at a called session of the quarterly conference Wednesday evening, Nov. 14. Presiding over the meeting was Dr. Luther Kirk, superintendent of the Plainview district.

With Bill Yates as chairman, the building committee has completed arrangements for purchase of a new building site.

A finance committee, headed by Gene Trotter, has already launched a money-raising cam-

aign, with expectations of securing sufficient funds to start the actual construction in the early spring of 1957.

The site for the new building will be in the east section of town, two blocks south of the Plainview highway and approximately two blocks east of Main Street, directly to the east of the Baptist Mexican Mission.

"The members of the Olton Methodist Church feel that a new church is necessary if they are to continue to serve the Olton community as they have in the past," stated Bro. Russell McAnally, pastor.

"We want to build a church that all of Olton may be proud, as we feel about all the churches in our fine city," he continued. The present church structure was built in 1934. Two ready-built houses are being utilized for Sunday School classrooms, these units being located in back of the church building.

Participating in the contest will be bands in Classes B through AAAA, the contest theme being "Gridiron Jubilee—The Finest in Marching Bands."

Spectators will be seated on the west side of the stadium and there will be no reserved seats. Bands will enter from the south end of the field to present their marching shows. Following the exit of the last performing band, there will be a mass twirling exhibition by all twirlers from each band. First and second division bands will be awarded trophies immediately following the closing ceremony. At the regional contest last year in Levelland, the Mustang Band won second division but only first division bands were presented trophies.

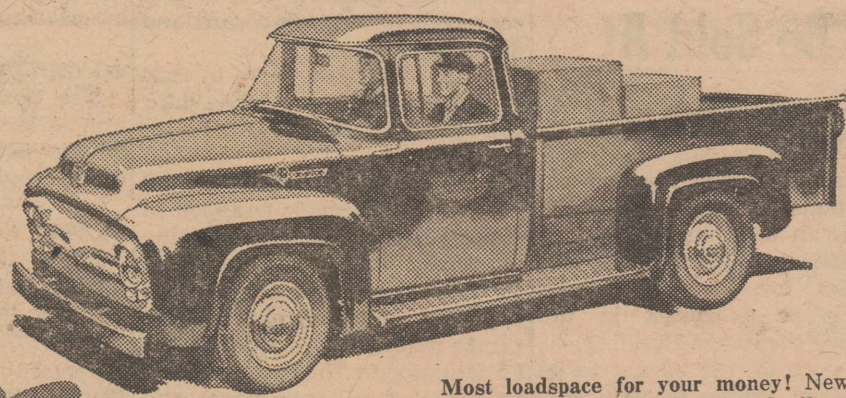

**Seniors To Choose
Girl For DAR Good
Citizens Contest**

Plans are being laid for the June graduating class of OHS to participate in the Good Citizens Contest, an annual project sponsored by the Daughters of the American Revolution for the purpose of stimulating in young people an appreciation of character building as a basis of good citizenship.

The State Award, a \$100 Series E US Bond, will be given to one Good Citizen in Texas and each Good Citizen selected will receive a certificate of award.

As the recommended procedure for the selection of a Good Citizen, the senior class shall in the near future select by vote three senior girls who possess to an outstanding degree the qualities of dependability, service, leadership, patriotism, and scholarship.

By February 15, 1957, the faculty shall select from these three girls one who shall be named to represent the school as a Good Citizen.

This girl's name will be grouped with others in her Congressional District and selection of one Good Citizen from each district will be made on Feb. 22, 1957.
