Annual Home And Business Yule Decoration Contest Set Up By Lions

To encourage Olton citizens and businessmen to cooperate in making the city attractive during the holiday season, the Lions Club is sponsoring a dual contest—a home decorations and a business decorations contest.

Townspeople and businessmen

are requested to have their exterior Christmas decorations completed by Dec. 20 and to leave them intact until Jan. 1. They will be judged during that period by out-of-town judges on the basis of beauty and originality. Only homes within the city limits will be eligible.

In both the home and business category there will be three prizes awarded, consisting of \$15 for first prize, \$10 for second prize, and \$5 for third prize.

The annual contest, receiving its start last year, is held by the Lions Club with anticipation that by several years' effort Olton can be renowned throughout the area as a town of beauty during the Christmas season, a town which area people will make special effort to visit.

"A goodly number of people spend only an hour or so decorating, we could make Olton one of the prettiest little towns around during the Christmas season," stated Eldon Franks, chairman of the Lions contest committee.

Campaign Starts On Toys For Tots

Offering their services in a Toys for Tots campaign in order that all the children of Olton might have a merry Christmas, V. L. Smith, Louis Schreier, and Bill Dickenson have asked that any broken toys or wheel toys be brought to them for repair.

Any toys, in need of repair or not, may be taken to Schreier's Shop, to V. L. Smith at the City Hall, or to Bill Dickenson's home. They will put the toys in usable condition and will distribute them to needy children at Christmas.

Lamb County's cotton acreage was cut seven percent in 1956 as compared to the 1955 allotment. The county's total allotment for 1956 was about 190,000 acres.

Lamb County growers will receive official notice of the 1957 farm acreage allotments for cotton in the next few days. The notices are now being mailed by the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee office.

Cotton acreage allotments for Lamb County farms have been determined by the County ASC Committee in accordance with the law and the regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. They are based upon the national total of 17,585,463 acres available for establishing upland cotton farm allotments for 1957.

The national total is first apportioned among States and the State allotments among counties. The county allotments are then distributed among farms on which cotton was planted in any one of the past three years, with a small acreage reserved for specified uses.

Farmers who do not intend to operate a farm for which a 1957 allotment is established should immediately return the official notice to the County ASC office so that it can be sent to the person who will operate the farm next year.

Cotton allotments are established for specific farms and may not be transferred by the operator or other producer from one farm to another.

Any changes in the land to be included in the farm for which the allotment is made should be reported to the County ASC Committee. Farm operators likewise have been asked to check with the County ASC Committee regarding any other question about the farm on which the allotment is established.

In the meantime, cotton growers will vote on marketing quotas in a referendum election Dec. 11, Mr. Aten reported.

"It's simply a matter of whether the farmer wants a high price or a low price for his cotton," Mr. Aten said.

There will be five voting places in the county. City Hall has been designated as the voting place for the Olton area.

Dan Puckett and Blanton Martin, both of Fieldton, and J. L. Carson of Olton will be election judges here.

Doyle Pinson, Jim Gregory and Henry Lewis will preside over the election at Springlake. Voting will be at Byars Elevator at Springlake.

Other voting places include Littlefield, Sudan and Earth.

**GIRL FROM MEXICO IS IMPRESSED WITH
AMERICAN EASY WAY OF MAKING A LIVING**

"You can make a living better over here!" Seventeen-year-old Corina Rodriguez of Mexico made the above statement when asked what impressed her most about living in the United States.

Corina, who has been in Texas and the U.S. for a month, could not speak a word of English when she came here. She says a few English words now but doesn't make sentences. Her sister, Olida, does Corina's interpretations.

Couldn't Leave Mexico

Corina had a hard time leaving Mexico. Mr. and Mrs. Lupe Rodriguez, Corina's parents, came to America several years ago, leaving Corina with her grandmother in Mexico. The Rodriguezes brought the rest of their family with them. Mr. Rodriguez works on a dairy farm seven miles north of Olton.

Corina lived with her grandmother for 14 years. During that time, she began wanting to join her family in Texas, but for some reason unknown to Corina she couldn't get naturalization papers.

The girl's family had to work from this side of the border to get Corina over here last month. They are still having to go through lots of red tape to get the papers completed. Corina's sister explained.

"But what's important to Corina is that she is at last in the United States with her family," Olida said.

Classified as a seventh grader in Mexico, Corina was placed in the seventh grade with her sister here in Olton. She has completed reading the first grade reader and is in her second grade reader.

Olida explained that Corina has learned to say, "thank you, good morning, good-bye, hello, pencil, paper, fork, spoon, play, what's this?", and the song, "She's My Baby."

Class Gives Party

Mrs. Carl Macon, Corina's home-room teacher, said that the seventh graders had accepted Corina as one of them. Recently, on her 17th birthday, Nov. 9, the class gave a birthday party in her honor. Cake and soft drinks were served and the class members gave Corina individual gifts.

Another thing that impresses Corina about living in Texas is that it's "easier to go places over here." She says that the climate is much colder here than in Mexico and that Texas has more wind.

The houses in Mexico are made of adobe as a rule, however, Corina pointed out, there are a few made of brick.

One of the main differences in Mexico and Texas is the size of the farms in Mexico. Mexican farms have only about 15 or 20 acres. Cotton, corn, wheat, sugar cane, beans, alfalfa, hay, chili pepper, tomatoes and onions are raised on the farms, she remarked. The farms also have chickens, goats, sheep, cows, hogs and horses, Corina's sister declared.

Irrigation Used

Irrigation is used in Mexico,

Corina said. The Mexicans have wells connected to the various rivers, that run through Mexico, which pumps the water from the river to their fields. If they are close to the river, she said, they may cut ditches from the river to their land.

Some of the farmers there, Corina pointed out, use tractors and modern farm equipment but there are several who use the horse and plow.

Corina said that the teenager's life here is much like that of Mexico. They have parties, dances, movies, and dates there. "If anything, the Mexican young people marry much older than the American young people," she pointed out. She said that the girls marry at the ages of 18, 19, and 20 and the boys there marry about the ages of 23, 24, and 25.

More than anything else, Corina wants to be an American citizen. As Corina's sister explained it, "she likes America better than over there."

Patrol 3, composed of Sue Mitchell, Linda Ray, and leader Ilona Tanner, taught a game to the rest of the troop.

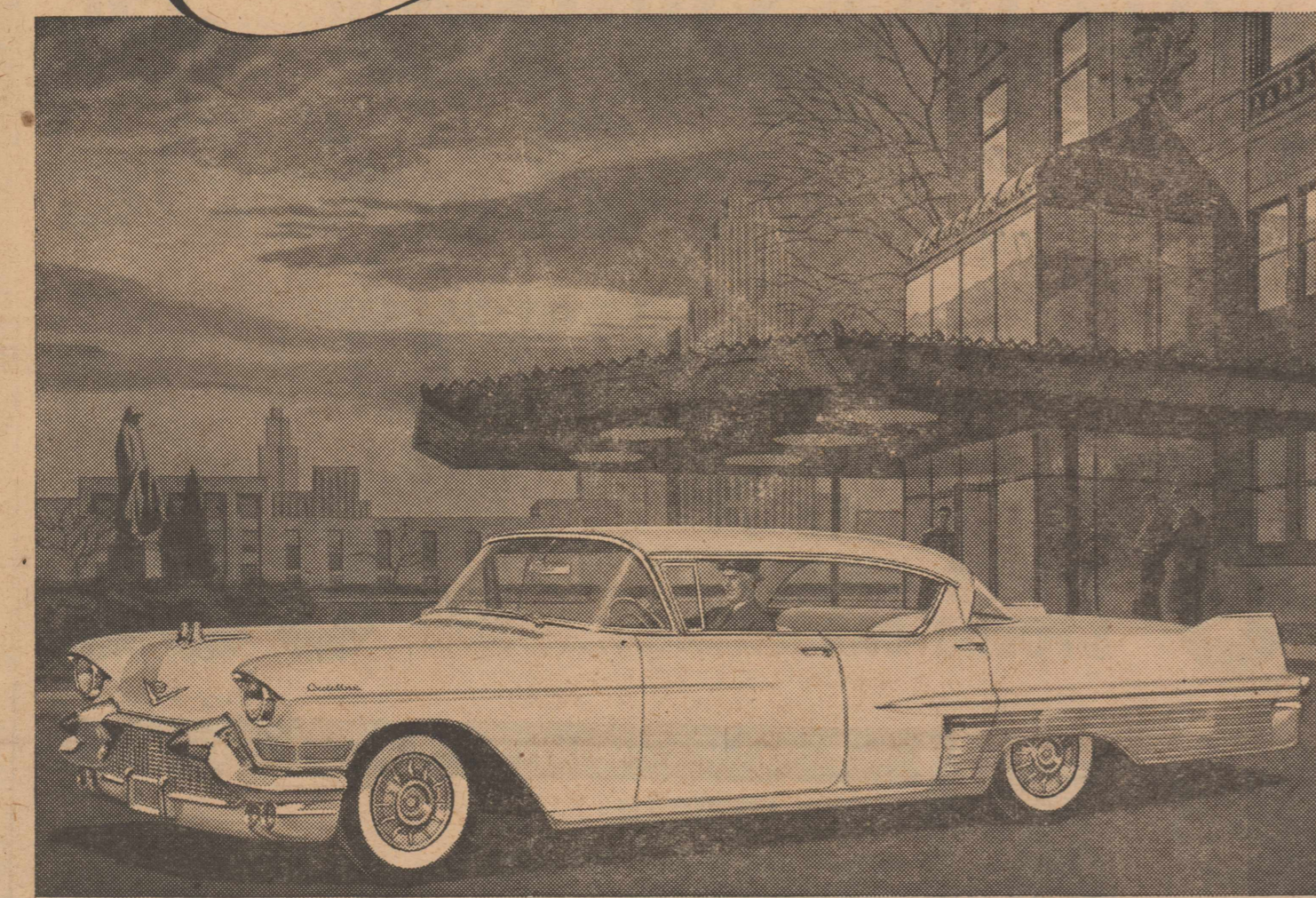
