Olton cotton growers will join farmers of the cotton belt Tuesday in a referendum vote on marketing quotas.

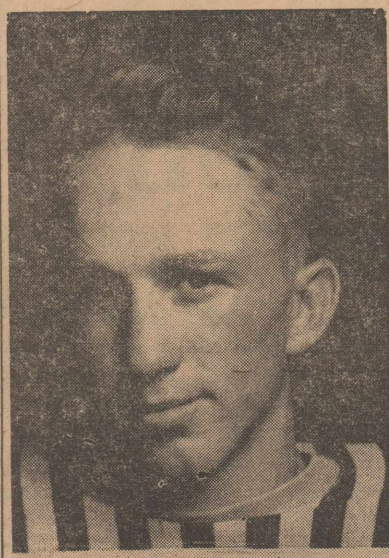
There will be five voting places in the county.

City Hall has been designated as the voting place for the Olton area.

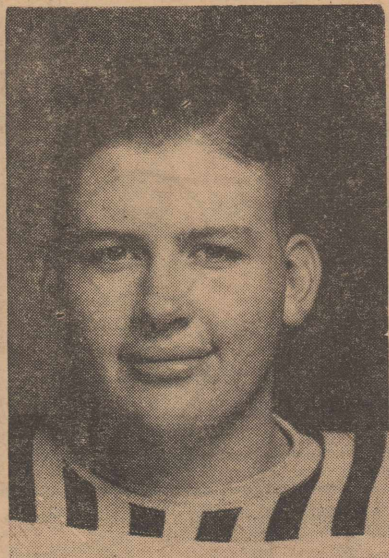

C. V. Gowin, 86, father of Mrs. Duward Price of this city, died in Shamrock General Hospital Saturday, Dec. 1, at 2:30 p. m. A former cotton ginner, Mr. Gowin retired in 1934 because of failing health and has been in serious condition during the past year.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the Advent Christian Church at Lela with the Rev. Harvey Davis of Grapevine, former Lela pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Shamrock Cemetery.

Other local relatives of Mr. Gowin are Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Jefferies and Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Young, cousins of the deceased. They attended the funeral services along with Bro. John E. Lewis, Mr. and Mrs. William DeBerry and Marshall Tabor.

Born in Mississippi on Dec. 11, 1869, Mr. Gowin moved with his family to Texas when a small boy. He married Miss Wilda Ann Rutledge on Dec. 21, 1893, in McLennan County; the couple would have celebrated their 63rd anniversary this month. In 1910 they moved to Wheeler County where they had lived for the past 46 years except for a brief move many years ago.

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Mrs. Price; Mrs. Dora Jones of the Gowin home in Shamrock; Mrs. W. H. Murray, Amarillo; Mrs. Harry Jones, Samnorwood; three sons, Art, Mineral Wells; Frank, Corona, Calif.; Willis, Shamrock; 19 grandchildren and several great grandchildren.

It is ideal for hauling farm products.

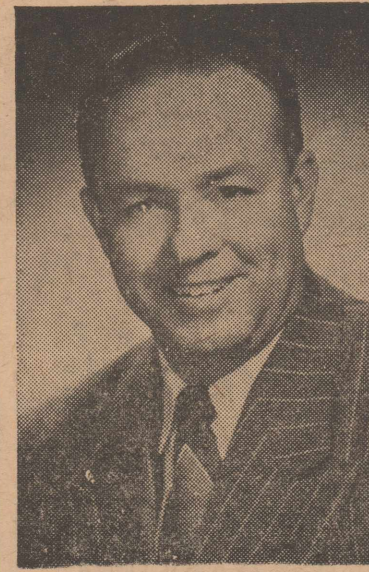
Trophies will be given for the first, second and consolation in both boy and girl brackets. Also individual miniature cups will be given to 12 all-stars in each bracket.

Olton Farmers Union Is Reaching For No. 1 Position In The State

With its membership attaining the 300 mark, the Olton Farmers Union is well on the way to establishing itself as one of the strongest community local units in the State of Texas, according to an announcement by Wilton Bodkin, president of the Olton organization.

SOUTHERN METHODIST MENTOR WOODY WOODARD WILL SPEAK

Olton football fans and school patrons will honor their 1956 grid team at the annual high school football banquet at 7 o'clock next Tuesday night at the school luncheon. Principal speaker will be Coach Woody Woodard of Southern Methodist University.

Chalmer E. (Woody) Woodard on December 1 wound up his fourth and final season as head coach of the SMU Mustangs. He recently asked university officials not to extend his contract when it expires on June 30, 1957.

During his period with the Mustangs, the outstanding victories probably were those won over the 1953 Rice team that went to the Cotton Bowl, the 1954 Arkansas team that represented the Southwest Conference in the Cotton Bowl, and the 1956 Notre Dame team. For the triumph over Notre Dame, Woody was named Coach of the Week by the United Press.

Woodard was born at Wichita, Kan., on April 1, 1917, but spent most of his childhood in the Valley Center Community about 10 miles from Wichita. He attended Valley Center High School

where he played on the football, basketball, and track teams.

After graduating from Valley Center High, Woodard enrolled at Southwestern College at Winfield, Kan. He had already decided upon a teaching and coaching career and thought that a player of his weight and height—155 pounds 5 feet 8½ inches—would have an opportunity to play more at a small college like Southwestern than at a large university. His sister, Martha, was already enrolled at Southwestern, and that fact also influenced him in his choice of a college.

At Southwestern, Woodard lettered in football all four years, playing quarterback on modified single-wing teams and captaining the team in 1938, his senior year. In the spring of 1939 he received his A. B. degree, with majors in mathematics and physics.

At Southwestern he had a scholarship that took care of half his tuition, but he worked for the remainder of his expenses, serving as janitor at the Chamber of Commerce, driving the city bus, and aiding in the recreation department both at Winfield and at Wichita.

Following his graduation from college, Woodard became head track and assistant football and basketball coach at Kingman, Kan. A year later, he became head football coach also, and experimented with the T formation, from which the team shifted into the single-wing and box. He soon found that the team was gaining more effectively from the T than from the others, and he became one of the earliest exponents of the T. Kingman won five and lost four in 1940, but in 1941 it triumphed in nine games without losing any, and Woodard moved to Dodge City, Kan., as head coach.

When his 1942 team was also undefeated, he was offered the head coaching job at Lawrence, Kan., and accepted.

At Lawrence, Woodard made one of the best records ever amassed by a high school coach in Kansas, and at one period during the seven years he was at Lawrence his teams were undefeated in 39 consecutive games.

In the spring of 1950 he became associated with McPherson College, taking his record of six undefeated seasons in the 10 he had coached in high school with him. As head coach at McPherson, which had won only one game during the two previous years, he brought that school out of the football wilderness. His first year's team managed to win three of its eight games, and in 1951 he gave the college its first victorious season in several years, his team winning seven games and losing only two. In 1952 McPherson won its first Kansas Conference championship in several decades, being undefeated in the conference and tying one and winning two of its non-conference contests.

Woodard is married, and he and Mrs. Woodard have three daughters. He is active in the work of the Methodist Church.

PATTERSON CARPET CONTEST FEATURES DAUGHERTY BALE

Frank "Curly" Daugherty may not know it, but he's having a "bale" of a lot to do with the guessing contest underway at Patterson Carpet Company in

Plainview. It's much ado about cotton. Patterson's is staging, for the first time ever in Texas, a contest for guessing how many miles, yards, feet or inches of cotton yarn were used in the carpeting installed on the floor of their store.

By mid-morning Monday—the first two hours of contesting—more than 100 guesses had been registered in the store. Grand prize for the contest is \$400 worth of cotton carpet.

Glen Hesler, representative of Wunda Weve, Greenville, SC, initiated the contest. A brand new carpet, Lusta Loom, is being featured.

Mr. Hesler explains: "One thing that makes it such a puzzle to guess how much cotton yarn is used in this carpet is the fact that there is about three times as much yarn in the backing as in the face of the carpet. Most cotton carpet has other materials for the backing."

He goes on, "Wunda Weve is especially proud of the broadloom cotton carpet. We are anxious for people to examine it as they register their guesses. They can see for themselves how strong it is and how few seams there are."

County Library Board Holds Meet
A meeting of the advisory board for the newly established Lamb County Library was attended Monday morning in Littlefield by Mrs. C. S. Silcott. The board consists of one representative from each town in the county, and Mrs. Silcott had been appointed to serve from Olton.

Aside from the purchase of new books, the leading point of discussion at the meeting was the importance of stimulating reading habits in the younger generation. Miss Lula Hubbard, county librarian, had recently returned from a statewide librarian convention and stressed that of primary concern was how to cope with the reading vs. television problem.

To serve Olton and other area towns, a traveling library is hoped to be maintained, whereby as many as 100 books may be placed in a town for a maximum three-months' period. Final plans as to this setup in Olton have not been completed.

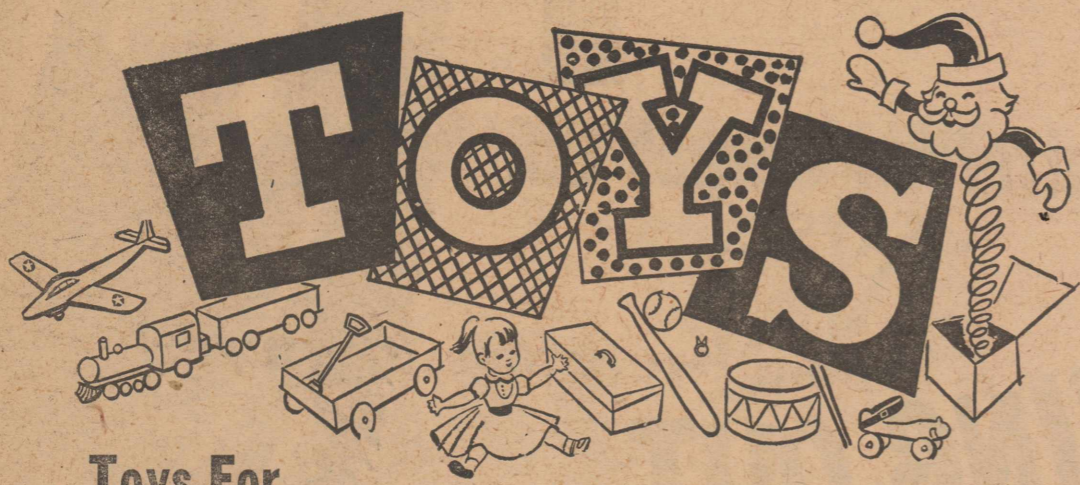
General library policies allow two books per person to be checked out of the county library with opportunity for one renewal. The library, which is located in the courthouse basement, remains open from 12:30 to 3 o'clock Monday through Friday.

Mrs. Silcott reported that in addition to excellent reference books the library maintains a memorial shelf. The library will accept books as a memorial, in appreciation, or books pertaining to this area for use on this particular shelf.

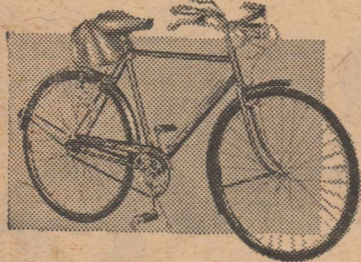

Extra Care Required For Holiday Mail

Postmaster I. B. Holt said today that while the Post Office still has a tremendous job ahead of it, efforts are being redoubled to deliver all mail on time and in good condition by Christmas Eve. He points out that by taking a little extra care with your Christmas mailings now, you'll avoid disappointing your friends and loved ones at Christmas time.

He asks for your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipient's address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers, and it's a good idea to include an extra label INSIDE your package. Parcel Post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the Post Office to buy stamps.

Speaking about stamps, the Postmaster said, "Use three cent postage on all your Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelopes." First-class postage on your Christmas cards enables you to include handwritten messages, thus making your Christmas greetings more personal. By including your name and address on each Christmas card envelope, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up-to-date.

The Postmaster urges that you mail all of your out-of-town Christmas cards and packages immediately, and certainly not later than December 10. Christmas mail for local addresses should be started on its way at least a week before Christmas.
