





County Library Board Holds Meet A meeting of the advisory

Aside from the purchase of new books, the leading point of discussion at the meeting was the importance of stimulating reading habits in the younger generation. Miss Lula Hubbard, county librarian, had recently returned from a statewide librarian convention and stressed that of primary concern was how to cope with the reading vs. television problem.

To serve Olton and other area owns, a traveling library is hoped to be maintained, whereby as many as 100 books may be placed in a town for a maximum three-months' period. Final plans as to this setup in Olton have not been completed.

General library policies allow two books per person to be checked out of the county library with opportunity for one renewal. The library, which is located in the courthouse basement, remains open from 12:30 to 5 o'clock Monday through

Mrs. Silcott reported that in addition to excellent reference books the library maintains a memorial shelf. The library will accept books as a memorial, in appreciation, or books pertainng to this area for use on this particular shelf.

She stated that of special interest is a book, "Thirty-one Years on the Mountains and Plains," written by a chief scout friend of Kit Carson. Published in 1900, there were only 100 copies published. Only two copies are in Texas libraries—one in the Austin city library and the other, through arrangements made by the librarian, is in the Lamb County library. The book is not permitted out but may be read there.
