

Lamb County farmers endorsed the national cotton marketing quota program Tuesday by a vote of 362 to 10 with Olton cotton growers going 53 for and 1 against.

According to Lamar Aten of the Agricultural Stabilization Office in Littlefield, the vote was as follows in the five boxes of Lamb County:

Olton 53 to 1, Littlefield 199 to 4, Earth 41 to 4, Sudan 43 to Truitt Sides, county Red Cross 0, and Springlake 26 to 1. Percentagewise, this was 97.3 in favor, which compares with

90.5 per cent reported in favor over the state. In the cotton referendum, a

two-thirds majority vote in favor of tight controls over acreage means that price supports for 1957 upland cotton will be avail able at a level between 75 and 90 per cent of parity. Growers will be liable for the penalties on cotton planted in excess of their 'individual acreage allotments.
