

**Cecile Roebuck, Yankee Turned Texan,
Is Olton's First Public School Nurse**

Skinned knees, splinters, impetigo, ringworms, turned ankles, infected wounds, upset stomachs, headaches, colds, fever, bruises—even lice—these are just a few of the ailments and complaints that Mrs. Cecile Roebuck, public school nurse, has coped with since classes got underway this fall. To date she has tended to the needs of approximately 300 children, thereby affording much relief and comfort to teachers and parents alike.

Employed on a half-day basis, she is the first school nurse in Olton school history. So her task has not been easy. As her initial endeavor she has started permanent health records on first through seventh grade students.

Setting up these records consists of compiling a complete

medical history on each child, weighing and measuring twice yearly, and recording hearing and vision tests each year. Vision testing equipment is expected to be acquired by the school in the near future as part of its effort to build up the school health program.

A self-termed "Connecticut Yankee," Mrs. Roebuck has been accepted by the children as a friend, even though on a first visit they are likely to remark, "You talk funny."

A native of Hartford, Conn., Mrs. Roebuck graduated in 1943 from the Flower-Fifth Avenue Hospital which is associated with the New York Medical College. Her experience has been in the field of general nursing, obstetrics, pediatrics, and special work with polio patients giving the Sister Kenny treatment.

Serving with the USAF one and a half years as an air force

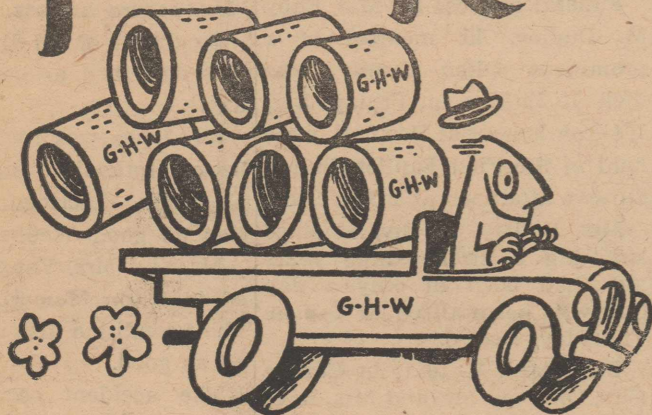
nurse with the rank of second lieutenant, she met her future husband, James Owen Roebuck of Olton, at Coffeyville Army Air Base in Kansas. Both stationed there in 1944 and 1945, they were married in May of 1945 at Independence, Kan.

After returning to civilian life the Roebucks lived in Texas California, Massachusetts, and Connecticut, with Roebuck working with Pratt and Whitney Aircraft in Hartford before moving back to Olton in 1955 to farm. Their three children—each a native of a different state—are Bill 10, Carol 8, and Peggy 6.

Son of the W. O. Roebucks James was graduated from OHS and attended Texas Tech a short time before serving as an air force pilot from October of 1941 to January of 1946. Returning to Tech, he earned his degree in electrical engineering in 1947 and worked in that field until the past year.

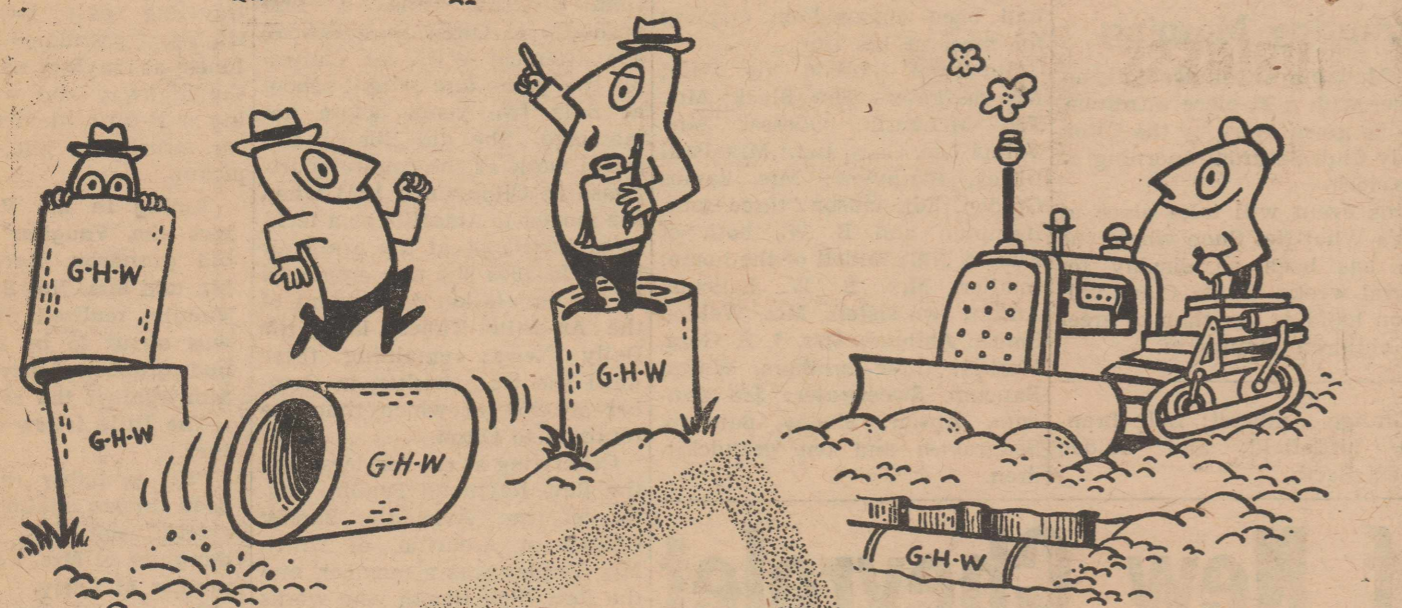
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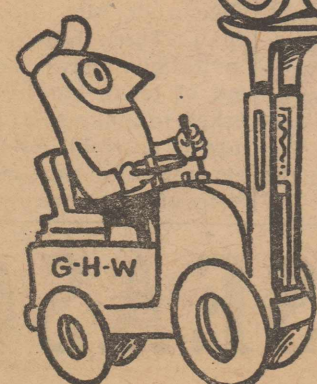

R. Loveless Family Leaves For Labrador

Leaving on the first leg of their journey to Labrador—a land where the snowfall was 224 inches last year and the tops of barracks used as ski runs—will be Capt. and Mrs. Ralph Loveless and their three children, Donald 9, Sharon 8, and Nancy 3.

Loveless has been in Labrador since January of 1956 but returned to Olton last month to take his family to Labrador for the next two and one-half years. After driving to Trenton, N.J. for processing at McGuire Base, they will fly to their destination. Awaiting them at Goose Base will be a royal reception and a six-room, furnished home—complete with carpet, washer and dryer. Mrs. Loveless said they would be met at the plane, taken to the commanding general for introduction and honored at a newcomer's coffee.

There will be little change in the children's schooling as American teachers are employed on the base and a base bus will deliver them to their school.

In the spring, the Loveless automobile, which will be stored in New Jersey, will be taken by ship to Labrador.

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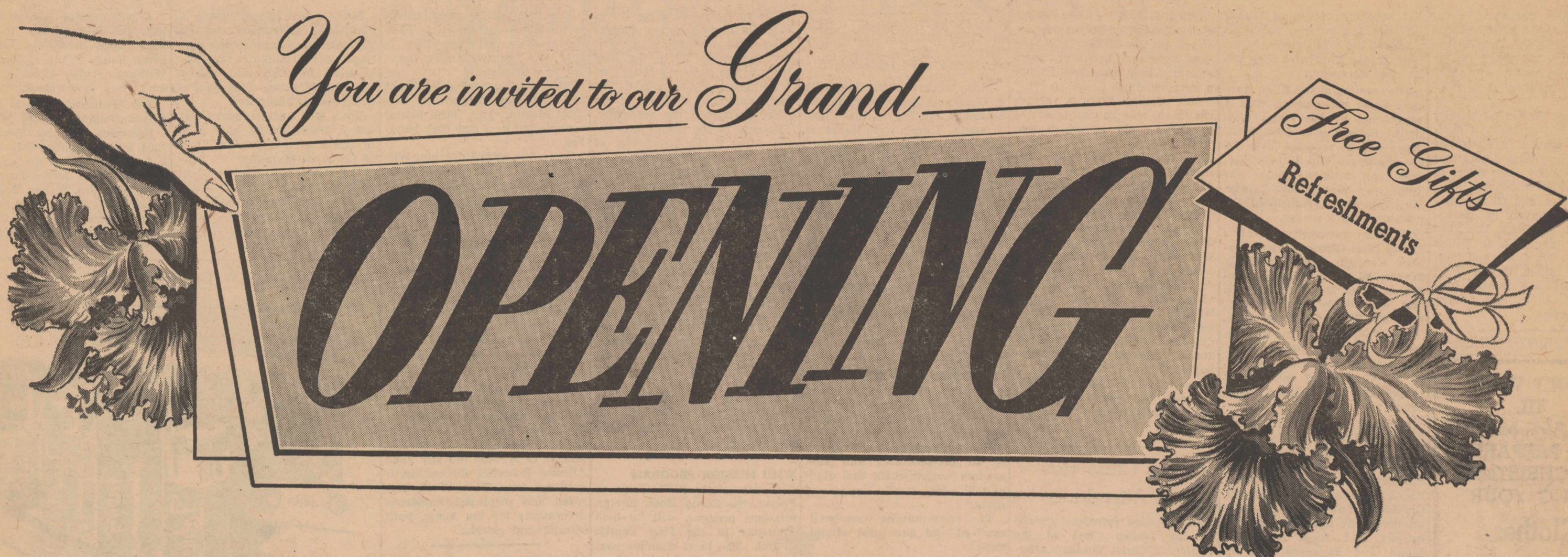

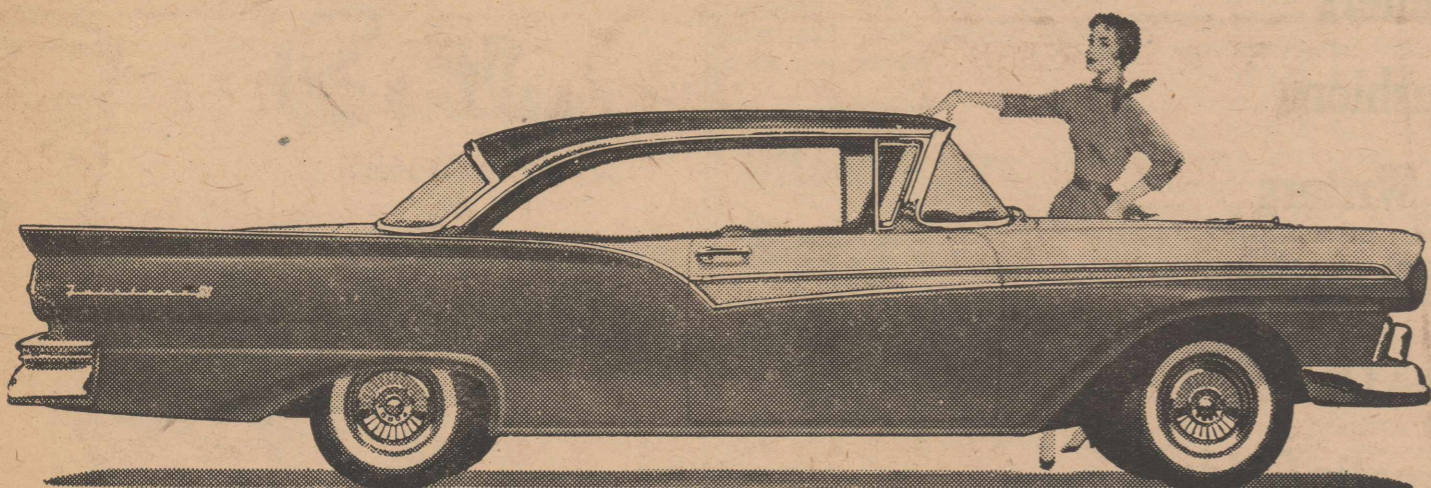

FOUR SENIOR GIRLS PARTICIPATE IN THE BETTY CROCKER SEARCH FOR THE AMERICAN HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

So you are a housewife of long years' standing—you've turned out thousands of edible, even delicious meals, washed a myriad of dishes, changed many a diaper—both birdseye and gauze, dried up oceans of tears with a dab of merthiolate, a band-aid and a kiss, draped many a window, given Junior volumes of parental advice, managed household expenses without jeopardizing the family financial status—in other words you know your job.

Or do you? We'd warrant that you'd suffer a few qualms of self-doubt if you took a special test in the field of homemaking offered OHS senior homemaking girls Tuesday, Dec. 4.

Four local students—Brookie Johnson, Charlotte Porter, Mary Jane Adams and Leah Eby—joined 300,000 others throughout the United States in taking a 45-minute examination testing their homemaking knowledge and attitude, a test made up of 150 multiple-choice questions and an essay question.

A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded by General Mills in this third annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The girl with the highest test score in each school will be named Homemaker of Tomorrow for her school and will receive an award pin designed by Tri-fari of New York. Her test will be entered in competition for \$1,500 and \$500 scholarships which will be awarded each

state Homemaker of Tomorrow and the runner-up, respectively. The school of each state winner will receive a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The 48 state winners and the representative from the District of Columbia will receive an expense-paid educational tour to Washington, DC, colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York, where on May 2 at a Waldorf-Astoria hotel banquet one of them will be announced as the 1957 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. This year for the first time girls who rank second, third and fourth in the national finals will receive \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

Prepared and judged by the Science Research Associates of Chicago and administered by the schools, the test will be the basis for awards until the national selections when personal observation and personal interviews will be included.
