Half-Million Highway Improvement Project Announced By Commission

Three Road Projects Slated For Olton Trade Territory

More than a half million dollars will be spent on improvement of state highways and farm-to-market roads in Lamb County during 1957.

A lions share of this improvement will be in the Olton area. This information came this week from D. C. Greer, state highway engineer.

Five projects are contemplated in the county during 1957. Mr. Greer said. Three of these improvement projects will be undertaken on roads serving Olton and its trade territory.

First project listed is for Highway 51 south from Springlake to Littlefield. This will include reconstruction, base and surface on 10 miles and resurface and construction shoulders on 10 miles for a total of 20 miles of road improvement.

Work on Highway 51 will begin 1.5 miles south of Springlake and continue thence to Littlefield.

Seal coat will be put on 7.4 miles of US Highway 70 from Springlake to a point three west of Olton.

Highway 304 will get seal coat on 24 miles and reconstruction of grade and surface on one mile for a total distance of 25 miles. Improvement will be from Olton south to the Hockley County line.

Highway 304 runs north and south through Olton and serves as the city's Main Street.

Two other highway improvement projects are contemplated for the west part of the county.

Mr. Greer said total expenditures for improvements on Lamb County highways during 1957 will come to \$572,800. He said that this figure will be spent in addition to the regular state construction and maintenance program.

He said there will be little or no right-of-way requirements involved in the program.

The Lamb County expenditure will come from \$30 million allotted to 196 Texas counties for road improvement.

The allotment was made at the December meeting of the state highway commission in Austin.

Mr. Greer said Lamb County improvements will be under supervision of local highway district personnel.

He said the improvement program should get underway some time next spring.

A large attendance is expected at the annual band concert to be presented by the Mustang and Cadet Bands at 7:30 p. m. on Thursday, December 20, in the high school auditorium.

The concert is free to the public and Fred Stockdale, band director, stressed that everyone in Olton is invited to attend.

Numbers on the high school band program, which follows a short performance by the Cadet Band, will include "March of the Meteorite," "Panic Angelicus," "Das Pensionat," "A Trumpet Lullaby" played as a cornet solo by Jerry Meyer, "Storm King March," "Hall of Fame March," "Blue Tango," and "Thou Swell" by a girls quartet.

Following the band performance, a box supper will be held in the school cafeteria by the senior class.

Funeral services for Charles Richard Melton, 57, brother of A. D. Melton of this city, were conducted in Newberry Chapel at Childress Saturday afternoon, December 15, with Harrell Colard, Church of Christ minister, officiating.

Melton, a resident of Childress for most of his life, had died of a heart attack in Mojave, Calif., on December 8, where he had been employed since August. Born August 7, 1899, in Bowie, he had moved to Childress as a boy and had engaged in farming in that community.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Charlene Decker of Childress; five sisters, Mrs. Clarence Burton and Mrs. A. Brune of Childress, Mrs. W. C. Carter and Miss Ada Melton of Wichita Falls, and Mrs. G. Hildreth of Lubbock; two brothers, A. D. of Olton and W. S. of Cee Vee; and three grandchildren.

Home Decorations Will Be Judged Before December 25

Time is running out for Olton townspeople to put the finishing touches on their exterior home decorations as the Yuletide season is near at hand and the Lions Club judging committee will be choosing the winner of this year's Home Decorating contest between now and December 25.

Members of the judging committee have been announced as Mrs. Bill Slaton of Springlake, Mrs. Tom Whitaker and Mrs. Charlie Jones.

First place winner in the contest will be awarded \$15 with second and third place winners receiving \$10 and \$5, respectively. This annual Lions Club undertaking, headed this year by Eldon Franks is to help create interest in exterior Christmas decorating of homes.

The Olton school athletic fund netted a total of \$4,803.82 from the ten football games played by the Mustangs this fall, according to figures from the office of E. R. Porter, school business manager.

This 1956 total fell short of the \$6,178.57 gate receipts for the 1955 season and of the last 5-year average of approximately \$5,600.00. Especially noticeable along this line is that the Dimmitt-Olton game last year netted each team \$468.05 as compared to \$176.20 this season.

Receipts from home games accounted for \$2,035.86 of this total, a record low for home game receipts.

As recommended by the Interscholastic League, all contracts are on a 50-50 basis with each team receiving 50 per cent of the receipts after expenses for officials have been deducted.

Reports indicate that between \$5,000 and \$6,000 is required to finance the athletic program in the Olton school system. This athletic program, in addition to the Mustangs, consists of basketball, track, "B" squad and junior high football. Records show that basketball receipts do no more than cover the cost of referees and the Mustang gate receipts carries the other activities.

L. C. SCHREIER SUFFERS INJURY

Louis Schreier, local Justice of Peace and owner of Schreier's Machine Shop, suffered a serious hand injury in an accident while operating a power hammer at his shop last Thursday morning.

Working alone at 6 a. m. on Thursday, Schreier got his hand caught in a double drive V-belt. Before he could get the power cut off his thumb was almost completely severed in three places and his hand considerably mangled. He drove to Olton Memorial Hospital where his thumb was amputated just above the second joint.

Returning home after two days in the hospital, Schreier is getting along fine, according to his son, Wilbur, but will not return to work for awhile.

Olton Man Is Jailed After Armed Robbery Charges Are Filed Here

Man Charged In Forged Check Cases

Two counts of forgery and passing forged checks have been brought against a man identified by Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith as Ray Hillard Tarpley.

The Justice of the Peace docket of Judge Louis Schreier shows that the man thus identified is charged with passing two \$35.00 checks here December 10 and using the name of Herman Smith.

One is alleged to have been passed to Sherman Food Store and the other to Dr. B. J. Souders.

Deputy Smith described the man sought as 36 or 37 years of age, about 5 feet 8 inches tall with black hair, brown eyes and dark complexion. The officer warned merchants to be on the lookout for bad check passers.

Circumstances surrounding the case as related by Deputy Smith are as follows:

Roy is alleged to have gone to Slatten's farm Saturday morning with a .22 rifle and forced Slatten to accompany him to Olton State Bank. Slatten is alleged to have withdrawn the amount of money in question and handed it over to Roy.

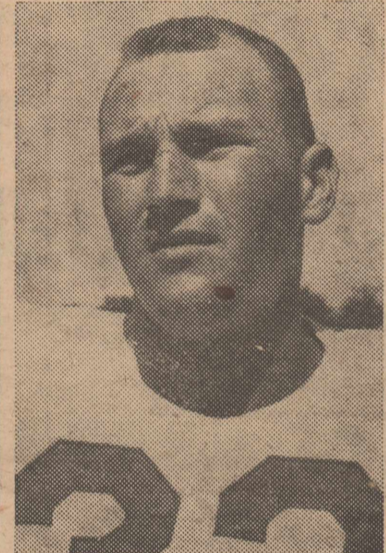
Deputy Sheriff Smith said the accused man did not accompany the alleged victim into the bank but waited outside for Slatten to return.



Variety Of Holiday Food Is Part And Parcel Of Christmas And The New Year

As much a part of the holiday season as carol singing, Christmas trees, greeting cards, glowing candles, and other traditions that make this the most joyful time of the year, is the holiday food—batches of creamy candies, rich cakes and pies, Christmas breads, candied fruits, and cookies chock-full of fruits and nuts.

Without a variety of holiday goodies, Christmas would fall short of the American tradition. And since a good cook's repertoire of recipes is never complete, the favorite holiday recipes of a few of Olton's outstanding cooks have been obtained for our readers' benefit. Try them and your holiday season will be even merrier!

CARAMEL FUDGE

This has been the favorite candy of the Elmer Moore family ever since Mrs. Moore clipped it out of a McCall's magazine eight or nine years ago. She stated that the main success factor in this recipe is the brown-

ing of the sugar—use a heavy utensil and don't get in a hurry!

Ingredients: 3 cups white sugar, 1 cup cream or top milk, 1/8 tsp. baking soda, 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract, 1/2 lb. pecans.

Method: Put 1 cup sugar into small saucepan, remaining sugar with cream in a large kettle. Put both on, at the same time over very low heat. Stir the sugar constantly with a wooden spoon until it is a light golden syrup. Give the other mixture a stir occasionally. (Do not let this boil until sugar is completely dissolved). When syrup is right, add to boiling cream and sugar very slowly, stirring vigorously to keep it from curdling. Continue cooking without stirring until mixture forms a firm ball in cold water. Take off heat, mix in the soda. Add butter, allowing it to melt into candy. Let candy cool for 20 to 30 minutes. Add vanilla and beat until mixture is thick, heavy, and shines like satin. Add pecans. Pour into a 8-inch buttered pan and mark off into squares. Cut when absolutely cold.

GOLDEN FRUIT CAKE

Mrs. Robert Edwards was stirring up this cake for holiday serving at the time she gave us the recipe. She says it is a delicious fruit cake and is neither dark or white.

Ingredients: 6 eggs, beaten separately; 2 cups sugar; 1 1/2 cups wesson oil; 4 cups flour; 1

cup candied cherries; 1 pound candied pineapple; 1 cup mixed candied fruit; 1 cup white raisins; 2 tps. baking powder; 2 tps. salt; 1 tsp. cinnamon; 1 tsp. allspice; 1/2 tsp. cloves; 2 tps. vanilla; 6 cups pecans; 1 cup fruit juice.

Method: Mix 1 cup flour with cut-up fruits, raisins and nuts. Combine oil, sugar, vanilla, and egg yolks and beat in mixer for two minutes. Sift remaining flour with other dry ingredients and stir into oil mixture alternately with fruit juice. Add fruit and nut mixture to the batter and stir well. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into foil-lined tube pan or loaf pans and bake at 275 for four hours. After one hour, place pan of water in bottom of oven.

PEANUT BRITTLE

Mrs. J. T. Gibson is renowned among her friends and family for this delicious candy—one piece always calls for more.

Ingredients: Measure 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/2 tsp. soda and set it handy to the stove. Put 2 cups sugar in a thick iron skillet and melt slowly to keep from scorching. As soon as sugar melts, add 2 cups parched peanuts and the salt and soda. Pour quickly into buttered dish and cool. (To parch peanuts, place shelled peanuts in a skillet on top of stove and stir until parched.)

CRANBERRY SALAD

Mrs. Roye Aikman has the reputation for serving food that is "different"—seems that she never gets "in a rut" with her cooking.

Ingredients: 1 cup ground raw cranberries, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup salad marshmallows, 1/2 cup crushed pineapple, 1 cup whipping cream.

Method: Pour sugar over cranberries and let stand from 2 to 4 hours until sugar is dissolved. Mix remaining ingredients and fold in whipped cream. Place in refrigerator until set.

ORANGE BREAD

This delicious bread, also from Mrs. Aikman, is similar to cake, and she says that it is especially good served warm with coffee. Note: Before starting cake, mix glaze of 1 tsp. orange rind, 1 cup orange juice, and 2 cups sugar.

Ingredients: 2 cups sugar, 1 cup shortening, 4 eggs, 1 tsp. soda, 4 cups flour, 1 1/2 cups buttermilk, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 2 tps. grated rind of orange.

Method: Cream the sugar and shortening. Add eggs one at a time and beat well after each addition. Add orange rind and sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Bake in 2 loaf pans at 325 for 1 hour. Immediately after removing from oven, punch holes in cake and pour the glaze over the top.

CHRISTMAS SALAD

From one of Olton's talented young homemakers, Mrs. Cleo Smith, comes this festive holiday salad, as attractive as it is good.

Ingredients: 2 cups white cherries, 2 cups chunk pineapple, 2 cups cubed oranges, 2 cups salad marshmallows. For dressing, 2 eggs, beaten, 4 tps. vinegar, 4 tps. sugar, 1 tsp. butter, 1 cup whipping cream.

Method: Beat eggs in double

boiler and add sugar and vinegar. Cook until thick. Remove from fire and add butter. When cool fold in whipped cream and mix well with fruits. Let stand 24 hours in refrigerator.

ARABY SPICE CAKE

This recipe has been a prized one with Mrs. Smith and was obtained during the Smiths' residence in California several years ago from a neighbor who was a home economics major from the University of Southern California.

Ingredients: 1/2 cup shortening, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 3 eggs, separated, 1/2 cup sour milk, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 2 cups flour, 1/4 tsp. soda, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1/4 tsp. nutmeg, 3 tps. cocoa, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1 tsp. lemon extract, 1 cup chopped nuts.

Method: Cream shortening, add sugar and cream thoroughly. Add beaten egg yolks. Sift dry ingredients together, adding the mixture alternately with sour milk. Add flavoring and nutmeats. Fold in beaten egg whites. Bake at 375 for 30 min in two 9-inch greased pans. Ice with 7-minute frosting made with brown sugar.

DATE-NUT CAKE

This simple and foolproof cake is a favorite in the Marshall Stone family. It is a very moist cake, keeps well, and may be served plain or with whipped cream.

Ingredients: 1 cup butter, 2 cups sugar, 3 eggs, beaten separately, 3 cups flour, 2 cups boiling water, 1 cup nuts, 1 small pkg. dates, 1 tsp. soda, 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 pinch salt.

Method: Pour boiling water over chopped dates and let stand while creaming butter and sugar together thoroughly. Add egg yolks. Then add alternately the date mixture and the flour which has been sifted with the other dry ingredients. Fold in beaten egg whites and bake at 350. Use either a greased loaf or layer pan.

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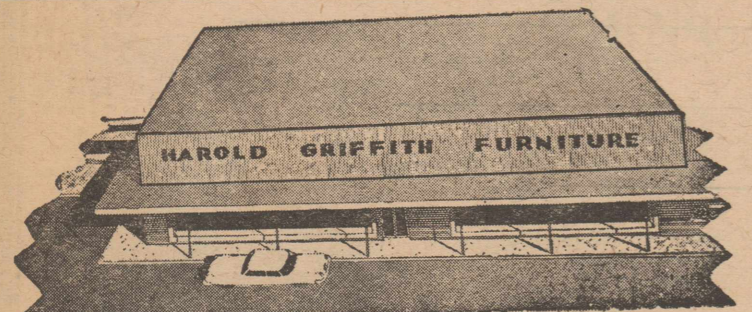
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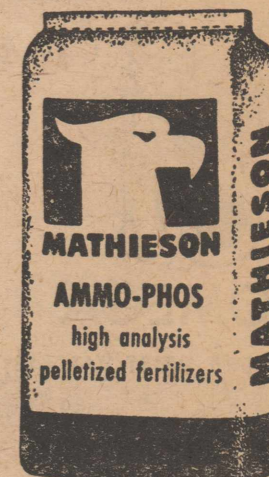

County President Herman Neuenchwander for the purpose of studying the Bracero program as administered in Lamb County.


