Begin Work On Chevrolet Bldg.

MOORE TALKS ON DRIVING PROBLEMS

Education is the only answer to the safety problem.

This declaration came Tuesday from Elmer Moore, former Olton school superintendent, and more recently superintendent of Shamrock Schools. Mr. Moore now is a farmer in this community.

Mr. Moore pointed out that engineering has failed to solve the safety problem. "We have better cars, better roads and more traffic deaths than ever before," Mr. Moore declared.

He said that legislation likewise has failed as a solution and then suggested that Olton Lions Club and other civic organizations encourage safer driving among youngsters by offering awards for good driving.

MUSTANG THINCLADS TO SEEK TEAM HONORS IN DISTRICT MEET ON TECH TRACK SATURDAY

Olton Mustang thinclads go for all the blue chips this Saturday when they'll journey to Lubbock for the long-awaited District 2-AA track and field meet.

At stake is a highly-coveted

first place in the big meet. Too, winners of first three places in each event (except in relays, where only two teams will qualify) at the district meet will qualify for the regional meet at Lubbock on Saturday, April 21.

Competing in this Saturday's big meet will be teams from Littlefield, Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Lockney, Tulla and Olton. On the basis of early season meets, the Littlefield Wildcats perhaps hold a slight edge to nab team honors. The Wildcats boast superior strength in field events, led by big Max Morris. Coach Jeff Smart's Mustang's appear to have an edge in the dashes and relay events. Most observers predict it will be nip-and-tuck between the Wildcats and the Mustangs for team honors.

Preliminaries will begin at 9 a.m. on Texas Tech's new track. Finals in most events will be held during the afternoon.

Balloting will be done in the school lunchroom from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

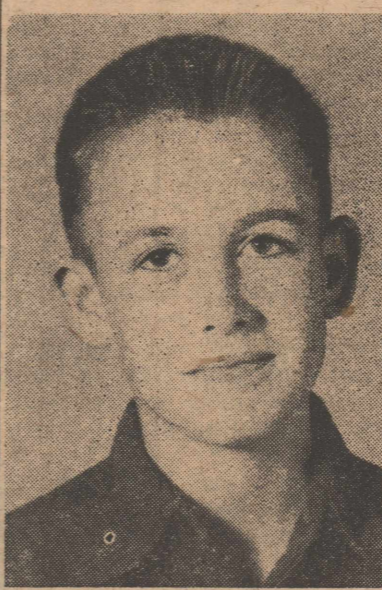
Petitions have been filed for the candidacy of Luis Hair and G. T. Sides to succeed themselves on the local school board. There are no other candidates.

Lamb County 6th In Cotton Production

Lamb County ranked sixth among all Texas counties in cotton production for the 1955 season, according to figures just released by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce.

Lamb County farmers grew and ginned a total of 135,474 bales of cotton in 1955. It was a considerable comedown from 1954, when the produced 185,723 bales to rank third in the state.

For 1955, Texas is credited with production of 3,955,283 bales. Of that total, about 22% (or 871,967 bales) was accounted for by nine area counties: Lubbock, Hale, Lamb, Hockley, Crosby, Floyd, Castro, Swisher and Briscoe.
