## Sesame Growers Hear Talks By Experts Friday

More than 30 persons attended the Sesame growers meeting at Olton High School auditorium Friday night and heard talks by experts in the field.

Most of those present were growers who have had experience with Sesame and will be growing it again this year.

The group saw a color film on growing and harvesting Sesame. Much of the film was actually filmed in this neighborhood. It was telecast on the Dave Sherrill program Sunday afternoon.

Don Spain of Olton Farm Supply—Mr. Spain is a Sesame grower himself—said the price paid for last year's crop was \$10.04. He said the price is expected to be about 8 to 10 cents a pound this year.

However, he pointed out that Sesame is not a supported crop and the price is not guaranteed.

Mr. Spain said about a pound and a half of seed is required to seed an acre and the seed runs about 60 cents a pound.

Some of the special guests present for the Friday night meeting were Robert Parker, executive secretary of the Texas Sesame Growers; Bill Kimbrough, Lamb County agent; Bob Haney, assistant Lamb County agent; and Ray Abbott, district soil conservationist.

## Dog Vaccination Program Slated Here April 20

City officials plan a crack-down on dogs which are untagged and unvaccinated.

Numerous incidents have been reported to City Hall recently, City Secretary C. M. Moss said yesterday, concerning dogs killing sheep, chickens and other stock.

"Worse than the loss of stock, however," Mr. Moss said, "would be an outbreak of rabies."

Dr. Charles G. Nace, Littlefield veterinarian, will be at Olton fire station on Friday afternoon, April 20, to vaccinate dogs for rabies.

"The city council urges all dog owners to bring their pets in for this vaccine," Mr. Moss said.

Vaccinated dogs will be given tags to be placed on the collar. "After a reasonable period of time, all dogs without collars and tags will be disposed of," Mr. Moss said.

Total cost of vaccination, tags and certificates will be \$2, Mr. Moss explained.

The vaccination program is being sponsored by the City of Olton, Olton public school system, and Olton Lions Club.

Louis Hair and G. T. Sides were re-elected as local school board members and George Bohner was re-named to the county school board in balloting here Saturday.

Election results were officially canvassed by school board members on Tuesday. Results were announced as follows: Hair 95; Sides 89; J. C. Hamby 6; Ed Thompson 2. The names of Mr. Hamby and Mr. Thompson were not on the ballot.

Supt. Carl Macon announced results of balloting in the county trustee race as follows: Bohner 83; Glen Exter 19.

Following canvassing of the votes and official declaration of Mr. Hair and Mr. Sides as winners, the local school board was reorganized as follows: I. V. Fent, president; Mr. Sides, vice-president; Mr. Hair, secretary.

Board members unanimously approved a motion commending the outgoing officers of the local board for having done an outstanding job. Outgoing officers are V. Y. Jefferies, president; Mr. Fent, vice-president; E. C. Jones, secretary.

## P-TA Speaker Emphasizes Mental Illness

Until all Americans consider mental illness and broken legs in exactly the same light, the problem of mental illness will not be licked.

This statement was made Thursday to the Olton P-TA by Miss Louise Evans, Amarillo journalist. Miss Evans, with Mrs. Mary Tom Rasco, has completed a series of extensive articles on mental health for the Amarillo Globe-Times. The background material for the series included more than a year's research on the mental health program in Texas, and interviews and studies on the program in the state of Kansas.

"The first requisite for mental health," Miss Evans declared, "... is a humility that seems to be the solid rock on which you can build the self-confidence necessary to preserve your identity in this complex world."

She pointed out that about 53 per cent of the number of patients hospitalized in the entire nation are the mentally ill—one in every 16 Americans suffering from some form of mental illness.

"Certainly, without this humility," Miss Evans concluded, "this ability to seek aid, knowledge, philosophy to armor yourself against the mental illnesses of our time, you yourself can easily become that one in 16 Americans who has a serious mental illness."

Immediately following Miss Evans' address, the Life Membership Award was presented to Mrs. Merrill Brigrance, president Mrs. Frank Struve made the presentation.

Preceding the regular P-TA session, a film on mental health was shown, and the hospitality committee entertained with a tea in the auditorium foyer.

Secret meetings and executive sessions and councils attending to the people's business were blasted Tuesday

night by City Attorney Frank Day. Mr. Day's admonition to conduct the people's business

openly and in the public eye came in answer to a question from one of the new city aldermen sworn in Tuesday night at the regular session of the city council.

The question was: "What are the duties of an alderman?" and was asked by Alderman Ed Thompson.

City Attorney Day said one of the principal things for an alderman to remember was that he should make no promises outside the council room.

Mr. Day warned the aldermen against making commitments as individuals. "When someone asks you for a favor, just tell them that you will be glad to present their request to the city council but that you are unable to make any promises on your own," Mr. Day said.

Then the city attorney warned against secret meetings and executive sessions.

"When boards and councils begin holding executive sessions and secret meetings, people begin to smell something and generally there's something to smell," Mr. Day declared.

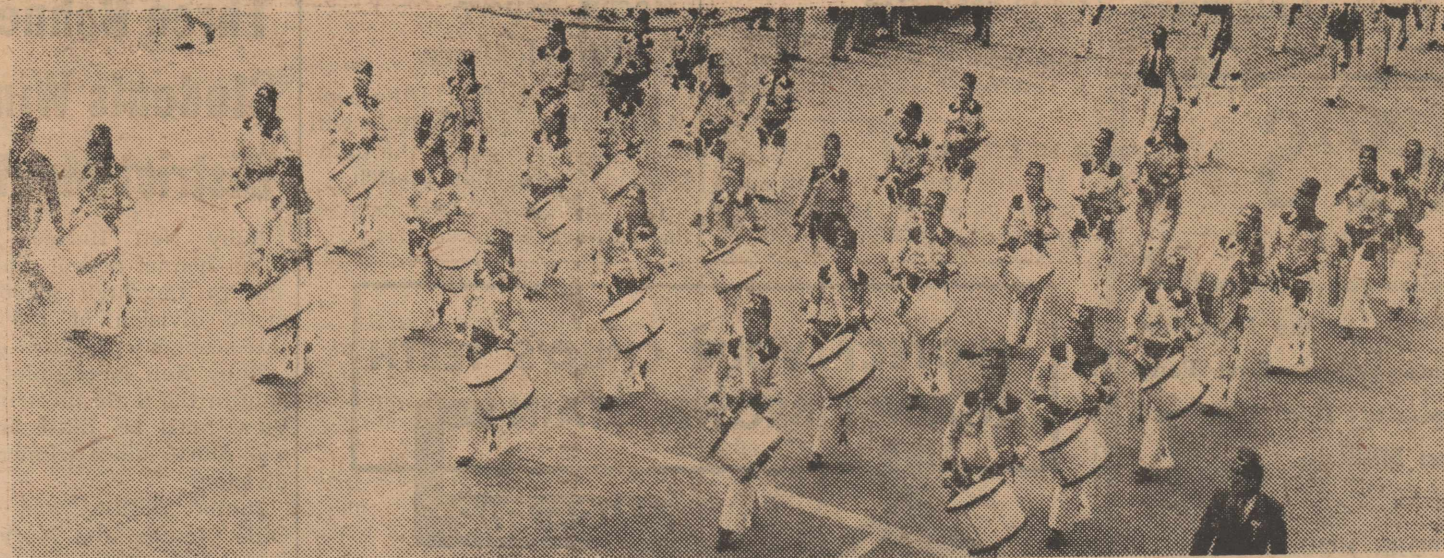
### Attendance Good At Safety Club

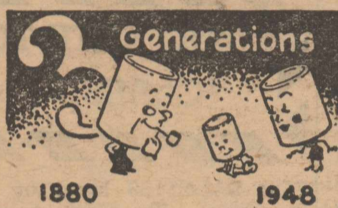

W. B. "Bill" Smith still is undergoing checks at McKinney Veterans Hospital. Friends here reported Wednesday his condition remained about unchanged.

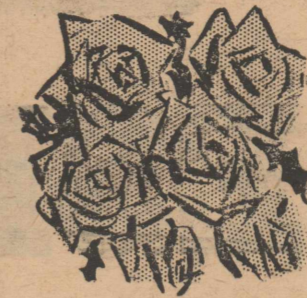
