## Plan Laid To Retain Lamb Water

### PAPER KEEPS PACE WITH GROWING OLTON

## New Press Installed By Enterprise; First Eight-Column Paper This Week

An era ended at The Olton Enterprise this week.

The old seven column newspaper press that had served the newspaper so well for so long was scrapped. It was replaced by an eight column press. You will notice this week that your newspaper pages are much larger than before.

The old press turned out a 7-column 20 inch page, whereas the press upon which this paper was printed turns out an eight-column, 21-inch page.

The old press has been sold for scrap to Jesse Wallace and will be cut to pieces with a torch. However, its printing days are not entirely ended.

Tom Rambo of The Hale Center American went over the old veteran with a fine tooth comb salvaging parts which are interchangeable with his newspaper press.

So at least a part of the press will live on to print another day. Replacement of the old press is only a part of the improvement campaign which has been shaping up at The Enterprise for the past few years.

The program was initiated by Royce L. Vernon back in 1952 when he installed a new casting box. The casting box is used to remelt lead used in production of printing slugs.

This was quickly followed by replacement of the old Linotype machine here by a new C-4

Inter-type setting machine. Then came the installation of a new metal saw.

In 1954, The Enterprise installed a new Universal Broaching Machine. This machine is used in making intricate cross-ruled forms which are in daily use in conducting Olton's commerce.

Last summer, the newspaper installed a new Omaha folding machine. This machine will neatly fold up to eight pages.

Just before Christmas, The Enterprise installed a new Universal Stripcasting machine. It is used in casting lead material that is employed in spacing out news stories and advertising. This machine also casts column rules which separate the columns of this newspaper.

The Olton Enterprise was established in the late 1920s by the late L. L. Kyle.

Royce L. Vernon and F. L. Burrow assumed ownership of the paper in early 1952. Troy Martin bought out Mr. Burrow June 1, 1952 and then purchased Mr. Vernon's interests in June 1954. The Enterprise is still in under that management.

As recently as June, 1952 The Enterprise was a man and wife affair. Since that time the staff has been increased to five full-time workers. Commercial printing and office supplies have become a major part of the business.

Last summer the front office was remodeled and a more complete line of office supplies and social stationery was added. The Enterprise is equipped with one automatic job press and one hand fed press.

Troy Martin is editor and publisher of the paper. Mrs. Troy Martin is employed as part-time feature writer and columnist. Mrs. Sue May is society editor and feature writer. She recently was acclaimed one of the area's top writers in a newspaper contest conducted by the Texas Tech journalism department.

### Daugherty Anchors Team; Smash Record

Olton's Olympic hope—J. Frank Daugherty—blazed down the home stretch to help his University of Texas 440-yard relay team set a new world record at the Kansas Relays at Lawrence Saturday.

Daugherty strained to the tape inches ahead of Baylor's entry. The fleet of foot athlete was anchor man on the Longhorn team. His team ran the 440 in 40.1 seconds. The time was official and a new world record.

Records are nothing new to J. Frank. His win and loss record is nothing short of sensational. He ran 40 races during his high school career and all went into the win column.

J. Frank holds both the state and national 220-yard dash record. He won the state meet his high school senior year with a 9.6 time on the 100-yard dash.

He made the All-American track team his senior year and was awarded a certificate of honor. His track trophies almost fill a room by themselves at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Curley Daugherty.

J. Frank is attending the University of Texas on a track scholarship. This is his junior year. He is a physical education major.

His wife, Barbara, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cornelius.

### Gordon P. Tompkins Resigns Job To Accept Position In Denver

Gordon P. Tompkins has resigned as advertising manager of The Olton Enterprise, effective this week, and has accepted a position as copywriter for a public relations firm in Denver, Colo.

Mr. Tompkins is a veteran newspaperman. He started as a small lad on The Globe-News in Amarillo serving as a copy boy for Sports Editor Jerry Malin.

Mr. Tompkins received his degree in journalism after a stint with the US Air Force as a weatherman during World War

II. He went to work for The Avalanche-Journal in Lubbock, and then went back to The Globe-News where he covered the difficult and exacting court house beat for the afternoon paper.

As courthouse reporter, Mr. Tompkins covered some of the most sensational crime trials in the annals of Potter County. Upon leaving The Globe-News, Mr. Tompkins was employed for a time by the US government. He then went to work for The Slaton Slatonite, where he worked until coming here in the fall of 1934.

Mr. Tompkins' column—a homey bit of writing which dealt with everything from the best way to make salad dressing to how to tie trout flies—was widely quoted by other newspapers across the area. The column—entitled "Short Grass"—won The Enterprise a second place award in a recent Texas Tech-sponsored contest.

"He will be a hard man for the newspaper and community to replace," declared Troy Martin, Enterprise publisher.

Mrs. Tompkins, who teaches second grade, also has resigned. However, she will remain to finish out the school term here. Mr. Tompkins is scheduled to assume his new duties May 1.

The organization is seeking to purchase water rights on some 40,000 Sandhill acres. Chairman of the group is V. T. Tanner, Springlake mayor. Truitt Sides of Olton is secretary-treasurer. Ray Keeling of Littlefield is vice-chairman.

### Farm Bureau President Speaks Tonite

State Farm Bureau President J. Walter Hammond was to speak in the Lamb County District Court Room at 8 o'clock tonight (Thursday) in Littlefield.

The public was invited to attend the meeting. Mr. Hammond was to be accompanied by District Two President Dub King of Brownfield.

Mr. Hammond was expected to touch on his current feud with Ernest Joiner, Publisher of The Ralls Banner. Mr. Hammond contends he was misquoted by the Ralls publisher. The state president's address was to be followed by a question and answer period.

A meeting of interest to every farmer and businessman in the Olton area will be held in the Olton high school auditorium next Monday at 8 p. m., it was announced this week.

The meeting will be for the purpose of informing local citizens of the problem created by the City of Lubbock's plan to develop underground water rights in the sandhills of Bailey and Lamb County.

Developments and information obtained in the fight to prevent the depletion of area water will be explained at this meeting.

Plans for organizing a group of citizens in Olton to lead the fight to preserve water rights will be told also.

The meeting is free, and should be of vital importance to every farmer and businessman in the Olton area.

The city of Lubbock is rumored to be dickering for water rights under land in the Olton community.

V. T. Tanner, Springlake mayor, said a delegation from his town will attend the meeting in Olton Monday night. Delegations also are expected from Littlefield and other towns in Lamb County.

### Hollingsworth Now Operates Hi-Way Service

Lefty Hollingsworth and H. G. Walker have purchased the Mobil Station at the corner of Highway 70 and Main Street from the Dennis Brothers—Bill, Lindsey and Dewey.

Mr. Hollingsworth said he and Mr. Walker bought both the property and business. The firm will be operated by Mr. Hollingsworth as the Hi-Way Service Station and will handle a complete line of Mobil products.

Mr. Hollingsworth operated a station on the same site before the Hi-Way Service Station was built there. It also was known as Hi-Way Service Station.

Mr. Walker is a prominent Olton farmer. Both he and Mr. Hollingsworth have been well known in community affairs here for a number of years.

### SORRY FOLKS

The association has employed two attorneys. They are Sam Aldrich of Farwell and Arthur Duggan of Littlefield.

Duggan explained that a Lamb County water control and improvement district can be formed which would make it possible to purchase water rights in the Sandhills through bond issue.

He said such a district may be created by the county commissioners after a petition for it has been filed.

When the details are worked out—providing the district gets approval—the district could call a bond election to purchase the water rights. Aldrich and Duggan are to begin preparation of a bond petition as soon as boundaries of the district are set.

All irrigated property in the county probably will be included in the water district. Dry land farms probably will not be included.

Paul Lewis, county farm bureau president; Jess Everett, manager of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce; and W. H. Cunningham, representing dry land farmers in the southwest part of the county, were appointed as a committee to work out boundaries for the district.

Only about 40,000 acres of the Sandhills water rights remain unsold. Water rights on an undisclosed number of acres in northwest Lamb County are reported to have been sold to Lubbock. Littlefield owns rights on 7,300 acres and Southwestern Public Service Company controls about 17,000 acres.

Estimates set the cost of water rights on the remaining 40,000 acres at about \$1,200,000.

Officers of the association, other than Mr. Sides, Mr. Tanner and Mr. Keeling, are the directors, Edgar Broiles of Pleasant Valley, H. V. Lynch of Hart Camp, A. B. Brown of Spade, C. C. Toms of Amherst, R. J. Sanderson of Earth, Drek Watkins of Sudan, R. A. Peed of Fieldton and Paul Lewis, representing the southwest part of the county.

### FACE RAISE IN OLTON WATER RATE

A public meeting to discuss the possibility of an increase in city water rates has been called for next Thursday night at the city fire station.

The meeting will be held at 8 o'clock.

City officials said more revenue is needed to raise water bonds. This may make an increase in water rates mandatory. "We're going into the red every month now," one city official pointed out.

City dads also hope that an increase in rates will discourage waste.

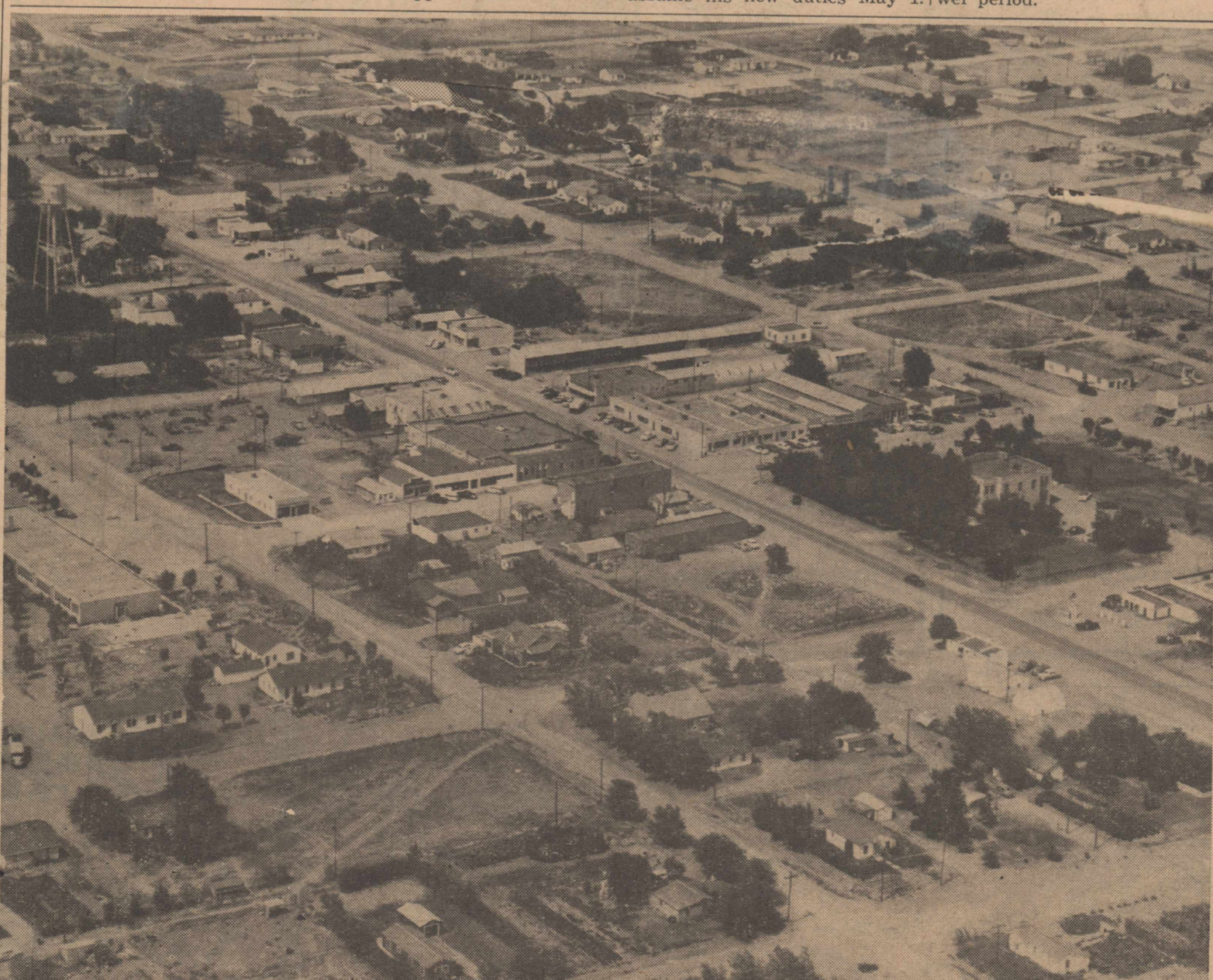
As a gauge to extent of water consumption here is the fact that the March electricity bill for city pumps in March was double that of February. It is expected to double again in mid-summer.
