Doniece Silcott Will Represent Lamb County Littlefield Gets Tough At National Girl Scout Roundup In Michigan

Doniece Silcott will represent Lamb County at the first National Girl Scout Roundup in Michigan this summer.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Silcott, Doniece was also selected patrol leader of Lamb and Lubock counties.

The National Roundup will be held at Highland State Recreation Area, Michigan. Located about forty miles northwest of Detroit and eleven miles west of Pontiac, this area has woodland, rolling hills and open fields to make it the ideal spot for the roundup.

Live In Tent City The girls will live in a tent city for twelve days and all cooking will be done over charcoal. The great roundup encampment in Michigan will be gay and colorful, everywhere reflecting the theme of Americana. Decorations on tents, patrol flags, personal equipment, and even the boxes containing patrol equipment will add gaiety and interest.

The goals of the roundup are to develop an awareness of the cultural heritage we all share, to develop an understanding of United States citizenship, and to develop a greater consideration and respect for other people and a realization of the part, each must play in achieving truly democratic human relations.
