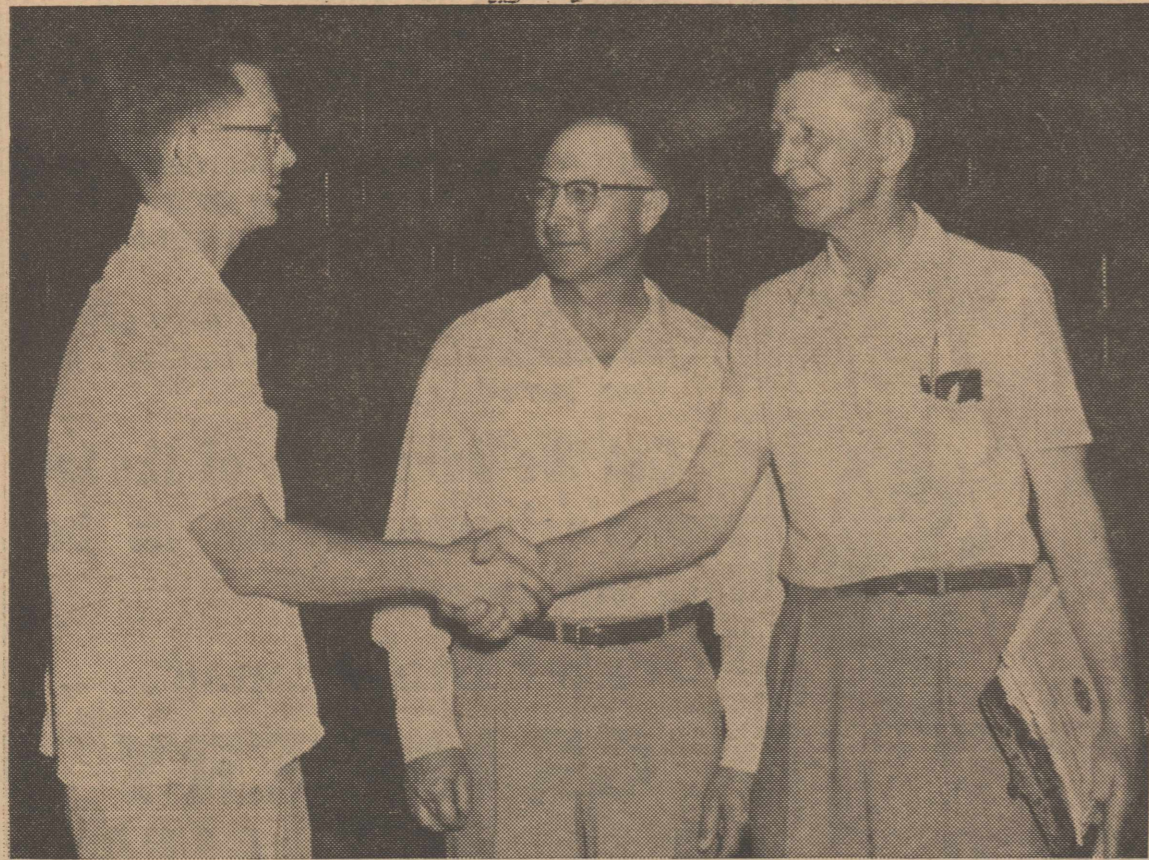

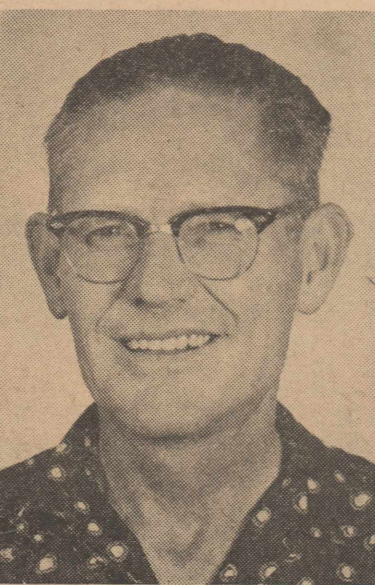

PURSUIT OF HAPPINESS . . .

The Supreme Court of the United States this week handed down a decision which blasts the Texas Right to Work law and strikes a body blow at individual freedom everywhere.

The high court's decision was in a Nebraska case but a similar case to which we were very close was filed in Amarillo a little more than four years ago.

A group of Santa Fe employees were served notice that they must join the union or lose their jobs. The Supreme Court has upheld this union ultimatum.

We are not against unions. We believe in the right of collective bargaining. As we believe in the right to select the church of our choice, so do we believe in the right of the individual worker to select his bargaining unit or go it without a bargaining unit at all.

Just as Protestant, Catholic or Jew should be equal under the law, so should union and non-union workers. "But the non-union workers reap the benefits of the dues-paying union members," cries our critic. True in some cases.

So does the non-church member reap the benefits of a Christian civilization but should he and his family starve just because he will not join a church? Indeed not!

A non-Catholic would not expect to receive the sacrament from the hands of the priest. A non-union member should not expect the union to intercede for him as it would for a dues-paying union member.

We do not see the supreme court's decision as a mere labor-management decision.

We see it as an ever more powerful federal system stretching forth its giant tentacles like an octopus and sucking up more and more of your individual freedom.

OUR LIFE, LIBERTY AND PURSUIT OF HAPPINESS IS THREATENED by a national government ever more prone to deal with statistics rather than with people.

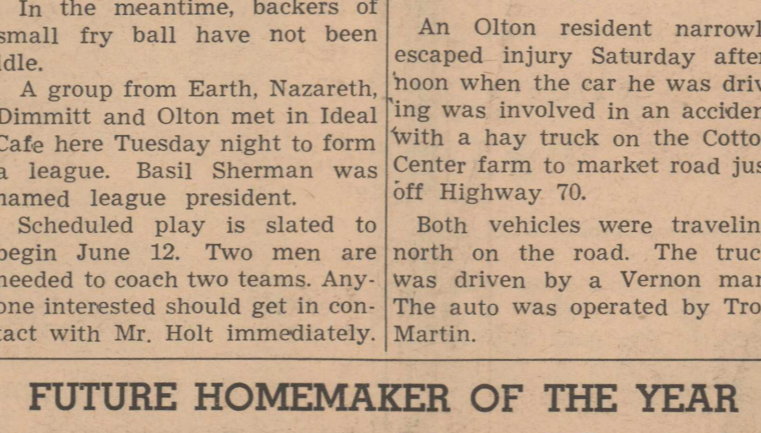
