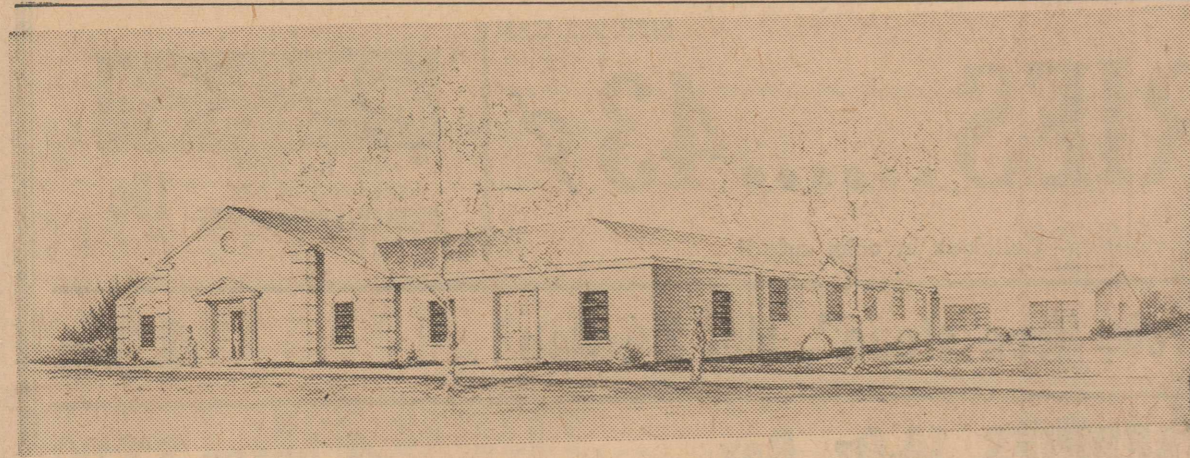

D. Y. Ray Resigns From Council; Is Appointed Water Supervisor

D. Y. Ray has resigned his post as a member of the city council, effective June 1. The council simultaneously appointed him to the office of city water superintendent to become effective on the same date. Mr. Ray entered the city government as a member of the G. H. Bley write-in slate last

year and held the post until he became an alderman with the change in the form of city government here this year. Mr. Ray will succeed C. M. Moss who resigned to make a campaign for county commissioner of precinct 1. No plans have been announced for replacement of Mr. Ray on the city council.

Scoutmaster C. W. Grant and several other Olton folks interested in the youth of the community are working on a project to build a community building just west of the Olton ball park. Olton State Bank has agreed to a \$7,000 construction loan secured by notes of individuals. Mr. Grant said the notes for \$100 each will be signed by 70 persons. Olton people are being asked to contribute \$1.00 each month to the building fund. This will be facilitated by bank drafts.

Those who wish to help may sign drafts authorizing Gene Trotter to take a dollar each month from their bank account. Money raised in this manner will be used to retire the notes. Mr. Grant said the program is designed in such a manner that there will be no expense to those who have signed the notes.

Former Olton Man Promoted At Artesia

John A. Daugherty, assistant principal of Artesia Junior High school for the past school term, has been selected by the board of education there to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Junior High Principal Don Riddle. Riddle submitted his resignation from the office as principal last week, but he plans to stay in the school system as an instructor either in Junior High or High school. Daugherty, 32, has had seven and one-half years experience as a teacher—five and one-half in Artesia and two in Plainview, Tex.—and also served six months as graduate assistant at Eastern New Mexico University. He taught math at Artesia High during his first year in the school system there and has been on the Junior High faculty since. He plans to complete work on his Masters degree at Eastern New Mexico university this summer, with a major in math and a minor in physical education and social science. During the past year, Daugherty has been secretary of the Teachers Credit Union there, and he has managed the municipal swimming pool for the past few years.

Mrs. Norfleet and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Richards of Springlake are in California now. They are expected to return home the latter part of this week. Funeral services were held Wednesday of last week. Mr. Forbis had been ill about a month.

AT SUPERETTE

Vernon Brockman has been employed as butcher at the Superette Grocery. Mr. Brockman formerly was employed at another Olton grocery store. He has had some 20 years of experience in the business.

Others got in their cars and cruised, hoping to get out of the path of any twister that might lower its funnel in their vicinity.

Howard Hall, Olton insurance man, said hail damage to date has been scant. However, rains which deluged the community Saturday night brought some hail to the area.

Hall said cotton is at least three weeks early. Crops are looking good.

Hall said most of Olton's 1955 cotton was planted after May 26. Here are some reports from over the community:

CHARLES McCLAIN: about 2 1/2 inches of rain Saturday night. **TRUITT SIDES:** a mile east and four north; about 1.80 inches rain. No hail.

QUENTIN REDINGER: 3 east and 4 1/2 north. Little hail Monday night. About 2 1/2 inches of rain Saturday night.

JACK ALLCORN: 1 mile south, 3 east of town; got little over 2 inches—don't know how much we got Sunday morning, Mrs. Allcorn said. Little hail—not enough to damage cotton. "We just stayed here and didn't think about it being bad—stayed home and watched the clouds," she reported.

ARCHIE SORLEY: 1 1/2 inches rain Saturday night and last week. No hail. "We were visiting Monday night for awhile and got the lantern out, but didn't make it to the cellar," she said. The Sorley farm is six miles southwest of Olton.

W. W. BEARDEN: 1 1/2 miles west of town and about 3/4-mile north: "Not quite an inch Monday night—had at least 1 1/2 or 2 inches so far—no hail. "We watched the cloud," Mrs. Bearden said about Monday night's warning.

GEORGE BOHNER: west of town: 1 1/2 inches Saturday night, they got some hail—there was some cotton damage. They were gone on a trip Monday night, so didn't have any comments on the storm.

NORMAN SMITH, farm is five miles east of town: about 1 1/2 or 2 inches of rain—both times. No hail. "We went to the cellar Monday and the Frank Farrars and Charles Goldens came to our cellar, also," Mrs. Smith said.

M. E. Taylor, 1 1/2 southwest of town: about 1 1/2 inches of rain—very little hail Saturday night... not enough to hurt. "We just watched the cloud Monday night," Mrs. Taylor said.

FARM SUPPLY CONDUCTING EXPERIMENT

Olton Farm Supply is conducting a test on two pigs. The pigs at seven weeks old have been placed on Purina Pig Startina and are penned on display at the farm supply store. One of the pigs belongs to G. R. Smith and the other belongs to Gene Loman of Hart Camp. Jack Bristol, who works at the store, said the object of the test is to determine how much weight can be put on the pigs in a four-week period and at what expense.

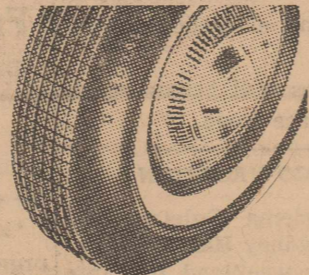

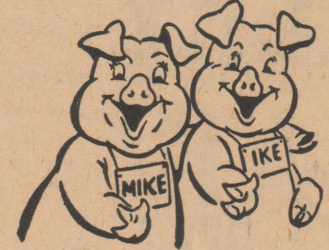

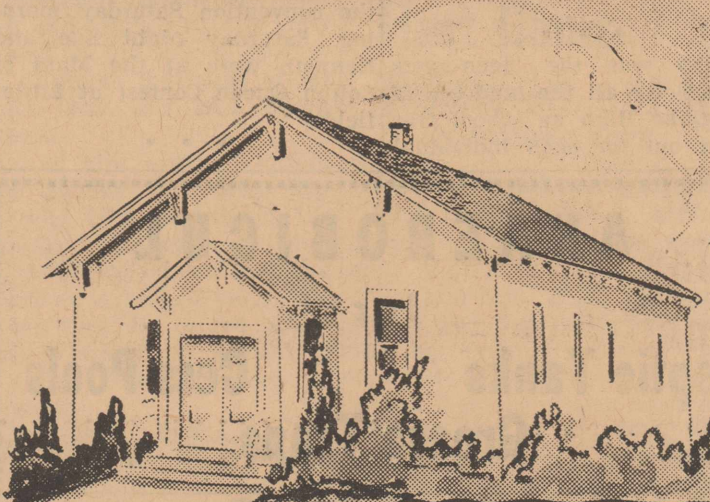
