BE NOT DECEIVED

A group of Littlefield folks are promoting an \$800,000 bond issue for the announced purpose of making four-lane highways out of Highway 84 in the south part of the county and Highway 70 which cuts across north Lamb County.

State money for widening of Highway 84 has already been anted up. No money has been put up by the state for widening of Highway 70.

Under questioning by an Enterprise reporter, Highway Commissioner Marshall Formby admitted that Highway 70 may NEVER be widened even if the bond issue were approved.

In order to be eligible for state funds for widening, a highway has to have a certain amount of traffic over a given period of time. Highway 70 has not yet reached that point.

If we vote that bond issue, it will be like buying a football suit for a boy on the installment plan before the lad is even born.

And another point—land in north Lamb County is evaluated for taxation at about twice the figure set for south Lamb County dry land. That means that-whether our road is widened or not-we'll pick up almost twice our share of the tab.

This does not mean you should have a full, half, or even a quarter page advertisement in each issue of the paper but your name and address should be mentioned if you do not use more than a two-line space.

"A stranger picking up a newspaper should be able to tell what business is represented in a town ... it's the best possible town advertiser. The man or woman who does not advertise does an injustice to himself or herself and definitely to the town."




