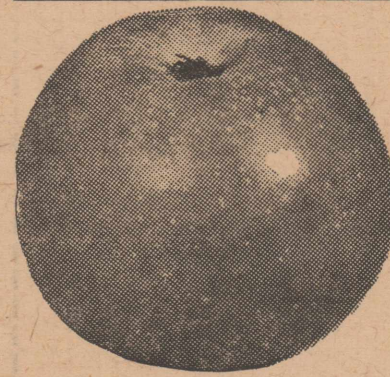

A voice from the congregation (which sounded like Mrs. William DeBerry's) responded with, "Amen."

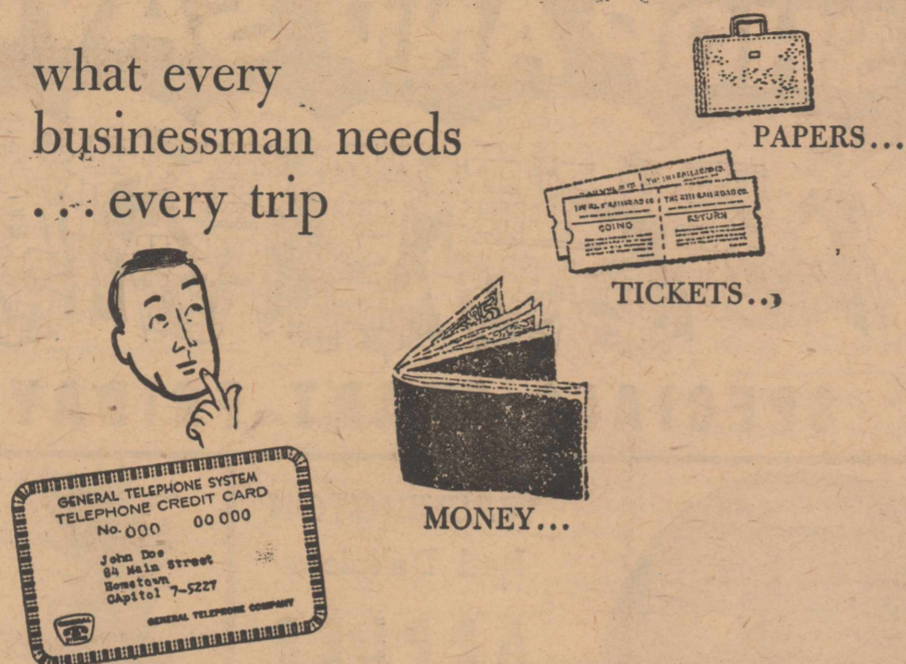
