Lamb County voters will go to the polls Saturday to decide the fate of a proposed \$800,000 bond issue-purportedly for the widening of Highways 84 and 70.

Actually, the only roadway in the county that CAN be widened into four lanes in the foreseeable future is some 13 miles of Highway 84 east from Littlefield to the Hockley County line.

State funds already are available for widening of this section of highway. No state funds have yet been set
