Funeral services were held Saturday for Clyde Wesley Gilbert, 27, former teacher at Olton, in the First Baptist Church of Sudan.

Gilbert, who moved to Sudan from Pecos where he was teaching, had been under treatment at West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe for seven weeks for a heart ailment.

Gilbert, who was senior sponsor of the 1953 OHS class, was honored by the 1953 Mustang high school yearbook, being dedicated to him. He taught science here.

The Rev. Wayne Perry, pastor, officiated at the services. Burial was in the Sudan Cemetery with Masonic graveside rites. Hammons Funeral Home in Littlefield directed the services. Survivors include his wife, Willie Mae; two sons, Mickey Dale and Ronnie Lee; a daughter, Charlene; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. N. Gilbert, Sudan; a brother, Allen H., Levelland; two sisters, Mrs. Audrey Powell, Hereford, and Miss Pat Gilbert, Sudan.

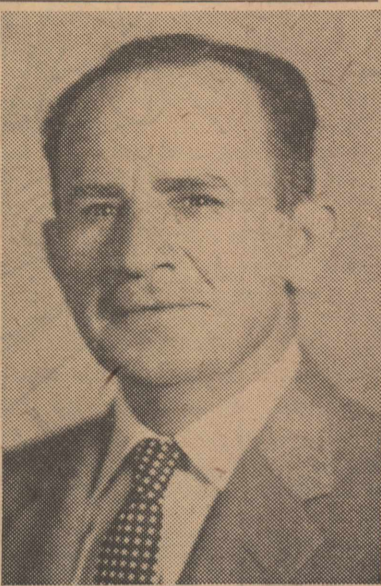
Olton Man's Brother-In-Law Dies

Masons Will Install Next Monday Nite

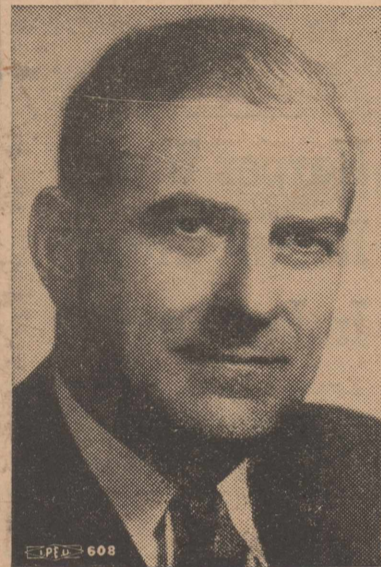
Olton Masonic Lodge will install officers at 8 o'clock the evening of July 9 at Masonic Hall.

Don Spain suffered minor chemical burns about the face Tuesday in an accident at his Olton Farm Supply.

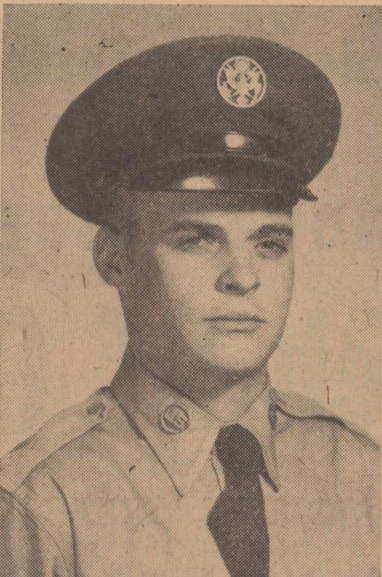
Mr. Spain was changing the clamps on an ammonia tank when he was hit in the face by a cloud of the chemical. He was treated by Dr. B. J. Souders.

The Olton Enterprise will observe an early deadline next week in order to be able to close July 4th for Independence Day.

Lloyd Graham, manager for the gin, said the co-op handed out some \$23,000 in dividend checks in February.

Approximately 1,000 persons attended the annual stockholders meeting and were served barbecue and baked ham.

At the business meeting which followed the barbecue, stockholders heard a talk by their auditor, Edwin E. Merriman of Lubbock, and then elected three farmers to the board of directors.

Named to the board were Fred Hicks, J. B. Kemp and H. A. Hysinger. They were elected to succeed D. L. Givens, W. T. Hall, Jr. and E. D. Harper.

C. W. Phillips, president of the board, presided over the business meeting.

Mr. Graham said the board of directors will elect officers at a later date.

Olton Co-Op Gin paid \$188,000 in dividends in 1955 and Saturday night's checks brought to \$420,000 the amount of dividends paid by the co-op in the past three years.

The gin processed 15,420 bales of cotton during the 1955 season. During the season of 1954 the company processed 20,190 bales of cotton—more than any other gin in the world that year.

"We were proud to have such a fine crowd for the meeting," declared Manager Graham.

Following the business meeting Jack Creel, television man from Lubbock, entertained with a film on eastern cotton mills.

Olton High School Band, under the direction of Ted James, performed for the crowd.

Potato Crop Very Good This Year

Olton's potato crop is exceptionally good this year, according to reports from those who are gathering.

This year's crop is producing up to 145 sacks of number 1 potatoes to the acre.

White number 1 potatoes are bringing \$6.00 a sack while number 1 reds are bringing \$6.40 a sack.

Formal opening will be held Saturday. There will be free coffee and doughnuts from 10 o'clock Saturday morning until 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

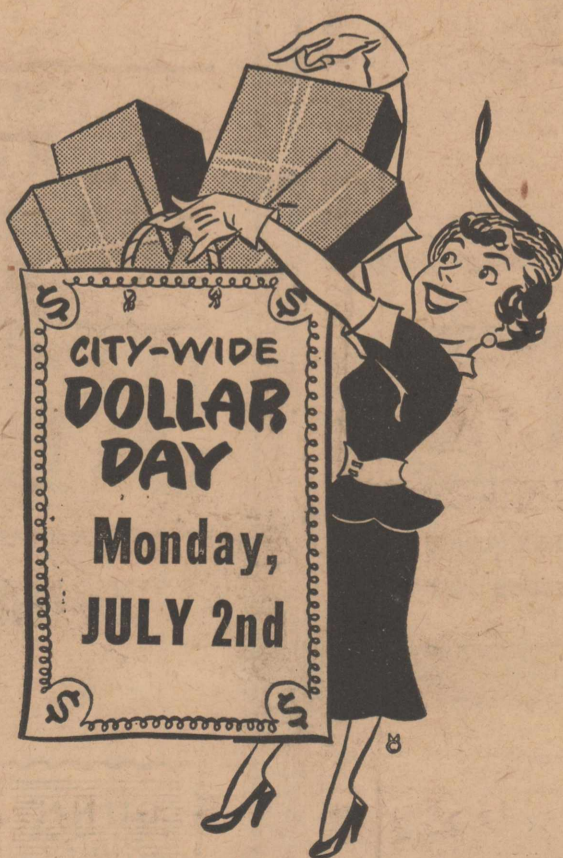
The cafe will be open for business at 6 o'clock Monday morning.

Mrs. Farris has lived in the Olton area since 1928. She formerly was employed at the Ideal Cafe.

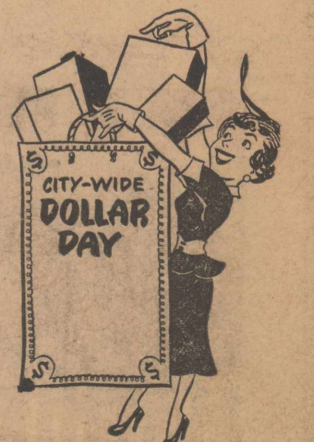
Mrs. Sykes moved here three years ago from Plainview—where she was engaged in the cafe business.

ORGANIZE NEW GS COUNCIL

Organization of a new Girl Scout Council which will serve nine South Plains counties got underway last week with the first meetings of the eight committees which will work out the plans for the operation of the council. In sessions which began Tuesday morning and continued through Wednesday, there were approximately sixty representatives from eighteen towns in the area in which girls now

have the privilege of participating in Girl Scouting through organized troops.

With the organization of the proposed council, more and better scouting will be made available over these nine counties. In towns where the activities have been carried on through lone troops with willing, but sometimes inexperienced and untrained leaders, there will be available professional help and a training program which will enrich the lives and experiences of all of those participating in the activities, from Brownies to

leaders. There will be an expanded program of recruiting and training adult personnel which will, in turn, allow more girls to participate in the program. In the towns where councils have been operating, the scouts and adults will profit from working with the other council towns and will have access to the additional training and facilities provided by the council.

Expanded facilities will include camps, which will be for the use of the entire council area. Both troop and day camps

will be provided for the girls, thereby widening the scope of activities for many girls on the South Plains. All committees which participated in this meeting were well into their plan of work by the end of their meeting and all were looking forward to January 1, 1957, as a goal for chartering this new council. Attending from Olton were Mrs. Marshall Stone and Mrs. Bill Yates.

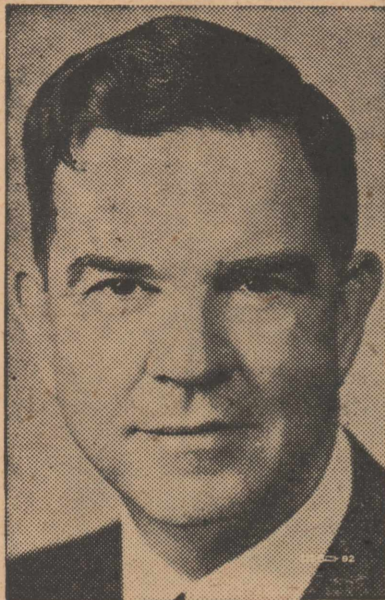

Mahon Announces For Re-Election



REP. GEORGE MAHON

Rep. George Mahon has asked The Olton Enterprise to carry an announcement of his candidacy for re-election to Congress from the 19th Texas District. His statement follows:

"I am sending this message from Washington where Congress is in session to announce my candidacy for re-election to Congress. I am grateful for the fact that I have no opponent. If I am honored with re-election, I shall continue to seek to be of every possible service in matters big and small to the people of our District. My principal responsibility is to the people of West Texas. If I serve the District well, I feel that I have served the Nation well.

"We continue to be confronted with many problems, local, national and international. Of principal interest this session was the farm legislation which we passed. It is far from adequate, but it was the best we could get this year in view of a Presidential veto and other difficulties. I think we did a pretty good job with the military appropriation bill which I handle in the House and which has recently passed the Senate. In spite of new tactics and smiles from Moscow, I do not think there has yet been a fundamental change in the objectives of the Communists and we must continue to keep our guard up despite the resultant burdensome costs.

"My objective in making this announcement is to ask you for your vote and continued support. The people of our District have been wonderfully generous to me through the years. I am very grateful for the opportunities for service which you have given

me. I hope you will not hesitate to call upon me at any time. The problems are at times difficult, and I may make mistakes, but I shall continue to do my best in an effort to do a good job for our people and to merit insofar as possible, your good will. Thanks very, very much."
