Crop Prospects Best In History

Bumper Wheat Crop Already In; Potato Harvest Now Under Way

Crop prospects here were bright at the beginning of July. A bumper wheat crop already is in the elevator. A big potato crop is being harvested and sold at record prices. Cotton is the earliest in history. The milo crop is early and excellent.

Louie Mack Hardy of Ben F. Smith Grain Company said a good wheat crop has been harvested. He said Ben F. Smith Grain Company handled some 45,000 bushels of wheat from which farmers realized about \$85,000. The number one wheat brought \$1.88 a bushel and the yields averaged about 30 bushels to the acre.

Some yields ran as high as 60 bushels to the acre. He described the quality of the wheat as excellent.

Mr. Hardy said the barley crop is beginning to come in. The barley for the most part was planted late. It is bringing about \$1.75 a hundred.

Potatoes are the bonanza this year. Cliff Peterson, broker at the Hart Potato Shed, said potato growers are clearing between \$300 and \$500 an acre on potatoes this year.

He said the Hart shed has processed some 17,000 bags of potatoes at the time he talked to The Enterprise by telephone Tuesday.

He expects the crop to run between 75,000 and 96,000 bags.

In the meantime, the cotton crop, with the exception of some damaged by hail, was doing nicely this week. Cotton is fruiting up very well.

L. G. Elkins found a boll and bloom in his field June 28, indicating that the first blossoms probably appeared there about the middle of June.

WATER USE DOUBLES IN JUNE

Rising temperatures and growing lawns almost doubled Olton's daily water consumption the latter part of June as compared to the first portion, according to figures compiled by Water Supt. D. Y. Ray.

Olton used about 600,000 gallons the first day of the month and more than a million gallons the last day, the figures show.

BUILDING FUND DRIVE LAGGING

Progress on the Community Building fund is lagging, according to C. W. Grant, Scoutmaster, who is heading the drive.

Mr. Grant pointed out that the building will be known as the Scout Building but will belong to the community and may be used as a community building.

He said the structure can be built for \$7,000 and that the site already is available.

Proponents of the building have asked that 70 Olton citizens sign notes for \$100 each to secure a \$7,000 loan at Olton State Bank. The plan is to get enough interested persons to sign bank drafts for a dollar each to repay the loan.

Signers of the \$100 notes will not have to pay them off, Mr. Grant pointed out.

Mr. Grant said only about half the desired number of notes have been signed and only 55 bank drafts have been signed to date.

DALLAS, June 30—Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Olton, will help nominate new members for the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas when the BGCT holds its annual sessions in Corpus Christi this fall, leaders said here Friday.
