Olton Building Still Booming

Olton Nine Places Second In Lubbock Baseball Tilts

The Olton American Legion junior baseball team, playing their best baseball of the season, won second place in the District Tournament held at Lubbock on July 3, 5 and 6th; and, but for a tired and over-worked pitching staff, might have had better luck and won the district championship.

Teams in the tournament were Olton, Levelland, Lubbock Monterey and Tom S. Lubbock of Lubbock; they finished with Lubbock Monterey the champion with a record of three wins and no losses, Olton was second with two wins and two losses. Tom S. Lubbock, third, with one win and two losses, with Levelland last with no wins and two losses.

Olton's first game was Tuesday night with Lubbock Monterey and this game proved to be one of the best, if not the best game of the tournament. Claud Davis pitched the best game of his career and deserved to win. Olton was in the lead 2 to 1 in the last of the 6th inning when an Olton error allowed two runs for Lubbock and that was the difference in the ball game. Jimmie Bevers also pitched a fine game for Lubbock and also deserved to win. There were no hitting stars in this game as it was a pitchers battle all the way.

Olton's next game was Thursday night with the Levelland team. Bobby Johnson was on the mound for Olton and was complete master of the Levelland boys. Olton started early and built up a big lead. Levelland did not score until the last inning when they pushed two runs across. . . the final score was Olton 10, Levelland 2. This game was featured by the heavy Olton hitting, with Jimmie Stone, Max Goforth and Kirk McAdams swinging the big bats for Olton.

At seven o'clock Friday night Olton met the Tom S. Lubbock team in a crucial game, with the loser being eliminated from the tournament. Davis again pitched a fine game for Olton against the Lubbock boys but weakened in the last inning and had to have help from Johnson in putting down a serious Lubbock rally. With the help of Goforth's big bat, Olton went ahead 3 to 1, with Goforth batting all three runs until the fifth inning when, with two mates on base, Teddy Estes hit the longest ball of the tournament over the right field fence which made the score 6 to 1 in Olton's

favor, and was the deciding offensive factor of the game. Lubbock made a threat in the last inning when Davis tired and scored one run before Johnson came in and put out the fire. The final score was Olton 6, Lubbock 2.

At nine o'clock Friday night Olton had to take on the Lubbock Monterey team again in the championship game. Johnson, who had pitched only the night before started on the hill for Olton and did a fine job for four innings before he tired and lost his control. Olton was in front by 2 to 1 when Johnson completely gave out and was

relieved by Davis who had just finished pitching the first game only about an hour before, also was tired. Olton had done a fine job but the roof fell in and we lost this final game to Monterey by a 9 to 2 count. Monterey had a good team and a fine group of boys—they proved themselves the best team.

The Olton team produced some of the finest players in the tournament. Jimmie Stone, with his heavy hitting and fine all-round job behind the plate, caught all the games for Olton. Claud Davis, with his brilliant pitching; Max Goforth, who was the leading hitter of the entire tournament, and who did a bang-up good job at third base, were outstanding. Bobby Johnson showed up well and pitched good ball.

The entire team made all Olton proud of them and had the respect of their opponents. There were four fine teams in the tournament, all of them were fine boys. . . all of them did not win all their games, however, they were all winners in the sportsmanship game.

DEATH TAKES MRS. WALKER AGED 95

An era ended in Olton last week with the death of Mrs. Frances Cornelia Pearson Walker.

Mrs. Walker was 95 years old and had made her home at Olton for the past 38 years. Mrs. Walker was born in Claiborne County, Tenn., Sept. 9, 1860 about the time Civil War flames crossed the United States. She grew up in Tennessee and was married in December of 1885 to Albert Walker.

The couple moved to Cook County, Tex., in 1897 and then to Lamb County in 1918. Mr. Walker preceded his wife in death in 1934. Mrs. Walker was a member of the Baptist Church and was interested in the welfare of the Olton church until the end. Members of the First Baptist Church will remember that one of the last times Mrs. Walker attended services was the time of the dedication of the new church building in December of 1952. At that time Mrs. Walker—then 92 and just before she became bedfast—arose from her pew and made an inspirational talk to the congregation.

Funeral services for Mrs. Walker were held Saturday afternoon in Olton First Baptist Church. Officiating were Rev. John Lewis, pastor, and Rev. Fitzgerald of Thalia, Tex. Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Massie Bridges of Gainesville and Mrs. May Robertson of Plainview; four sons, White Walker of Houston, John of Shamrock, Horace of Olton and Ike of Gainesville; 19 grandchildren; 39 great grandchildren and a great great grandchild.

Construction Expected To Continue With Residential Area Development

Stimulated by some of the best crops in the area's history, Olton building activity had soared almost to the quarter million dollar mark at mid-year.

Exact dollar figure on building permits issued at city hall since the first of the year is \$227,875. This figure does not include a modern masonry building now under construction by Lindsey Dennis next door to the post office.

The Dennis building will house Clara's Cafe and Southwestern Public Service Company's offices. Business and public building comes to \$129,125.00. The Church of Christ addition accounts for \$50,000 of this figure while the Thompson Chevrolet building on Highway 70 accounts for another \$65,000.

Here's the breakdown on the remainder: Northside Gift Shop (enlarging), \$1,500; Olton Red-mix, \$400; Hi-Way Service Station, \$2,000; Tommy's Drive-in, \$1,425; and two school class rooms, \$8,800.

Residential building totals \$98,750 and again one of the churches takes the lead. Largest single building permit issued was to First Baptist Church for a new \$20,000 parsonage.

Here's the remainder of the building permits issued so far this year: J. W. Hackler, \$1,000; J. T. Whisenhunt, \$8,000; Pan-Ama Homes, \$8,250; Pan-Ama, \$8,250; Pan-Ama, \$8,250; Pan-Ama, \$12,250; L. R. Goyno, \$3,500; Raymond Motley, \$5,300; J. W. In the meantime, residential building prospects are bright for the remainder of the year. Hillcrest Addition is an accomplished fact. Several homes there already are contemplated.

Jeffrey Lumber Company has announced plans to build homes there. The lumber company will give customers a chance to look at the house actually completed before buying.

Olton only recently completed a vast street and water improvement. One of the most important street projects was the widening and curbing of Main Street which literally took the town out of the mud.

Although bank deposits are down about three quarters of a million dollars when compared to the deposits at Olton State Bank this time last year, rosy crop prospects have given the area an all-round better feeling of well being.

Bank deposits at the close of business June 30 were \$2,986,436.95 this year. Bank deposits were \$3,647,247.20 at the same time last June.

Referendum To Decide On Wheat Quotas For 1957 Set For July 20

(Editor's note: Following is a report from the Lamb County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Littlefield dated July 2. It was compiled and written by ASC staff members.)

Marketing quotas for the 1957 wheat crop have been proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson and July 20 set as the date for the referendum when wheat growers will decide by ballot whether the quotas will be put in operation or not. A two-thirds vote favoring the quotas makes them effective.

Growers who are affected by the marketing quotas, and eligible to vote in the referendum,

are those farmers who will harvest more than 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1957.

In his proclamation, Secretary Benson said, "This marks the fourth successive year that abnormally large wheat supplies have required the proclamation of marketing quotas for the next wheat crop. It is the third successive year for which the national acreage allotment has had to be set at 55 million acres, the minimum specified by law. All of the wheat we are likely to need from 1957 production, determined according to the formula in the legislation, could be produced on an acreage of about 12.4 million acres. If it were not for the legal minimum, the national allotment could have

dropped to that level.

"The plain fact is that, in spite of valiant attempts to channel more wheat into exports, we still have enough wheat for the marketing year beginning July 1, 1956 to take care of all our domestic and export needs for more than two years. The carry-over will again exceed a billion bushels. . . . While we are hopeful about holding down the carry-over into 1957-58, wheat continues as one of the most serious problems in the whole farm economy."

Any wheat producer who will have as much as 15 acres of wheat in 1957 will be eligible to vote in the July 20th Wheat Marketing Quota Referendum, at one of the following places in

Lamb County: Lamb County ASC Office at Littlefield.

Springlake Elevator at Springlake.

Sudan Elevator at Sudan.

Both husbands and wives are eligible to vote. Polling places will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

LOANS ON 1955-CROP COTTON TO BE CARRIED THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 1956

The US Department of Agriculture announced June 19 that Commodity Credit Corporation loans on 1955-crop upland and extra long staple cotton which have a maturity date of July 31, 1956, will be carried in a past-due status through December 31, 1956. This will give producers an additional five months in which to redeem their loan cotton. Through June 8, 1956, a total of 7,256,510 bales of 1955-crop cotton are reported as having been pledged for loans. As of the same date, 1,116,528 bales had been redeemed, leaving loans outstanding on 6,139,982 bales.

The 1955-crop loan cotton not redeemed by December 31, 1956, will be purchased on that date by Commodity Credit Corporation. Until the close of business on that date, producers may either sell their "equity" in the loan cotton or redeem the cotton from the loan and then sell it in the open market. The market price of the various qualities of cotton has strengthened in recent months and at present prices farmers should be able to dispose of some quantities of cotton at prices that will give them some net profits above the loan and charges against the cotton.

Loans on 1955-crop cotton were available to producers through April 30, 1956. The average loan rates were 31.70 cents per pound, basis middling 3/8-inch, for upland cotton, and 55.20 cents per pound for extra long staple cotton.

On April 17, 1956 the Department announced that the average loan rate for 1956-crop upland cotton would be not less than 28.85 cents per pound, basis middling 3/8-inch cotton, or 82 1/2 percent of parity at the beginning of the marketing year (August 1, 1956), whichever is higher.
