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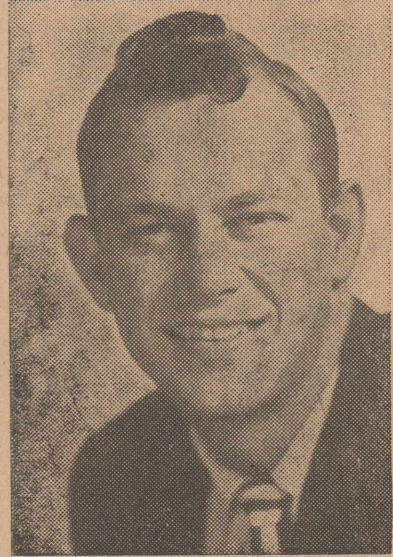

Four Young Men Will Direct Youth-Led Revival At First Baptist Church, Beginning Sunday



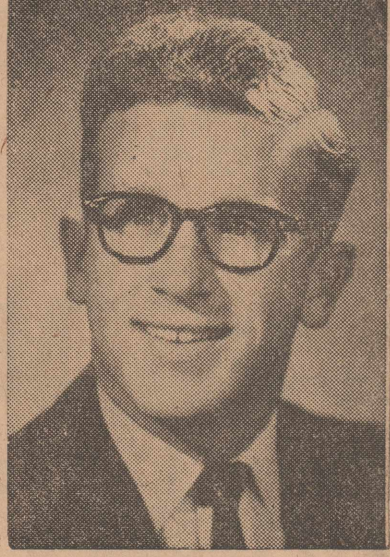

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Friday Last Day Farmers Can Sign For Soil Bank Program

Friday is the deadline for signing up for the 1956 soil bank program. Following is the latest report by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office at Littlefield on the soil bank program:

Lamb County ASC has received the following information concerning the 1956 Soil Bank Program:

1. The 1956 Soil Bank Program is applicable to cotton and wheat in Lamb County. Up to 50% of the allotment of each may be put into the program.
2. Wheat farmers can be paid for underplanting their 1956 acreage at a rate of \$4.00 per acre, or \$6.00 per acre if he planted and the crop failed due to natural causes. Any land that has been grazed since June 22, 1956, will not qualify. All plots of land put into the Soil Bank must be designated at the ASC Office and no crops can be planted on said land for harvest or grazing for the calendar year 1956.
3. Cotton growers may put a maximum of 50% or 10 acres, whichever is larger of their allotment or a minimum of 10% or 2 acres, whichever is larger into the Soil Bank.
4. All land must be designated and no crops may be planted

for harvest or grazing in the 1956 calendar year.

5. New Growers Farms will not be eligible for the 1956 Soil Bank Program.

6. Farmers who released their acreages are not eligible.

7. The final date to sign up for the Soil Bank Program will be July 20, 1956.

Payments may be earned as follows:

1. If the cotton was underplanted, a payment of the average yield for the farm times 15c per pound will be made. The average yield for Lamb County is 272 lent pounds.
2. If the cotton was planted, but failed to come up, a payment of \$6.00 an acre can be made.
3. If cotton was planted and only a partial stand is up, a payment will be made on an appraised yield times 15c per pound.

Cotton Measurements

We now have about 24 men measuring cotton in the field. They are working in all sections of the county and will get to all farms as soon as possible. After the cotton is measured

in the field the acreage will be computed in the office and you will be notified of your acreage. If you should have more cotton acreage than the allotment, you will have 20 days to plow up the excess acreage. Please be sure to notify the county office as soon as the excess has been destroyed and pay the necessary fee so the farm can be re-visited and the plowed-up part checked.

When the reporter comes to your farm you should:

1. Go to the field and show him each plot of cotton growing and each other plot that was planted and destroyed before he came to the farm.
2. Assist in measuring each plot. The reporter has been instructed in measurement and knows the necessary lines to measure to get the correct acreage. He can explain any unusual lines he must measure.
3. Be sure to check the work before signing the report to see that all deductions—turnrows, roads, etc., are taken out. Also remember that turnrows, ditches, borders, or anything else in the cotton plot must be 200 inches wide to be taken out. If you plan to deduct ditches be sure they are this wide before the reporter comes to the farm.

Entomologist Believes Pests Are Under Control At Present Time

Insects are largely under control in the area, according to Dub Jones, entomologist with Chipman Chemical Company.

Mr. Jones made this statement after inspecting cotton in the Plainview and Halfway areas.

However, he said he did note a build up of Lygus bugs and fleahoppers in that area. Mr. Jones also said he noted a few boll worm eggs and warned that boll worms should be observed closely.

He said boll worms could pose a threat to the cotton crop should they be allowed to get out of hand. Mr. Jones said he saw some fresh laid boll worm eggs.

He said the boll worms are nothing to be alarmed about as yet. The entomologist said that when the build up reaches four or five eggs and a few worms to each 100 plants, then something should be done.

Mr. Jones said timing is of the utmost importance in the control of boll worms. He suggested that farmers seek competent advice on when to poison for boll worms.

Dr. Lundell spoke last Thursday night at a meeting in Plainview. Also on the speaking program that evening were Dr. Tom Longnecker, head of agricultural research at TRF, and Huey Whitehurst, agronomist with the foundation.

Harvest Queen Mills has offered to contribute \$30,000 or provide the land for the research station. Anderson Clayton Co., agreed to give \$15,000 and Southwestern Public Service Co. offered \$10,000.

Dr. Lundell said the foundation will seek a soil and water combination which is more nearly representative of the entire High Plains area.

The foundation proposes to do research on both irrigation and dry land farming.

In a letter to Jim Speer, Dr. Lundell said that establishment of a research farm somewhere in the area has been assured.

"With the leadership given to this through his magnificent gift, Mr. Harold Hinn (Harvest Queen Mill) has assured the establishment of the High Plains Field Station," Dr. Lundell declared.

In a telephone conversation with D. M. Granbery, president of Olton State Bank, Dr. Lundell Tuesday said he and his group would be back in the area some time in the near future to study possible locations with local committees.

A group of Olton folks met Monday at Olton State Bank to make plans on how best to promote the research station.

The overall attitude of that meeting was, "Get the research station as near to Olton as possible, but support it regardless of where it is placed."

Death Claims Olton Educator Monday; Was Olton Superintendent 22 Years

H. P. Webb is dead.

Olton's beloved educator, scientist and friend of the younger generation died at 9:55 o'clock Monday morning at his home in Brownwood. He was 75 years old. Mr. Webb had been in failing health for a number of years.

As a country school teacher and then as a recognized scientist, Mr. Webb saw the Plains country and the nation develop from horse and buggy days to nuclear fission.

Henry Pearson Webb was born Dec. 23, 1880 in Denton, Ark. Son of a Denton farmer, Mr. Webb decided early in life to devote himself to education.

He was a graduate of Valparaiso, Ind., State University and then studied at the University of Texas, Texas Tech, and West Texas State Teachers College at Canyon. He received his masters degree at Texas Tech.

Mr. Webb started his teaching

career at the tender age of 17 in Arkansas.

He was married May 26, 1907 to Miss Ada S. Barnett. They would have observed their Golden Wedding anniversary next year.

Mr. Webb taught at Evening Shade, Ark., the year following his marriage. The couple moved to Lubbock in 1908.

At the time, Lubbock was a village much smaller than Olton is today. The town did not even have train service; Plainview then being the terminal point of the railroad.

Lubbock had only board sidewalks when the Webbs moved there.

Mr. Webb was superintendent of Lubbock Schools until he moved to Plainview to accept a similar position there in 1916. He moved back to Lubbock for a year and then came to Olton as school superintendent in 1921.

Olton school system had five

teachers when Mr. Webb took over. He served as school superintendent here until 1943 when he was called to the University of Texas to do work in physics in connection with the atomic bomb.

He moved to Brownwood in 1947, bought a home and planned to retire. Howard Payne learned that Mr. Webb was making his home there and drafted him to teach mathematics-science at that school.

He taught at Howard Payne until 1952 when ill health forced his retirement.

"He is still an influence on our lives," said one of his students, Mrs. Charlie Fay Granbery. "He will influence Olton through the lives of our children for years to come."

Mr. Webb was active in work of the Baptist Church. He became a church member when he was only 13 years old. He served as Sunday School Super-

intendent, teacher and as a deacon. He was ordained a deacon in the Olton church.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon in Olton First Baptist Church with Rev. John Lewis, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Davis-Morris Funeral Home of Brownwood.

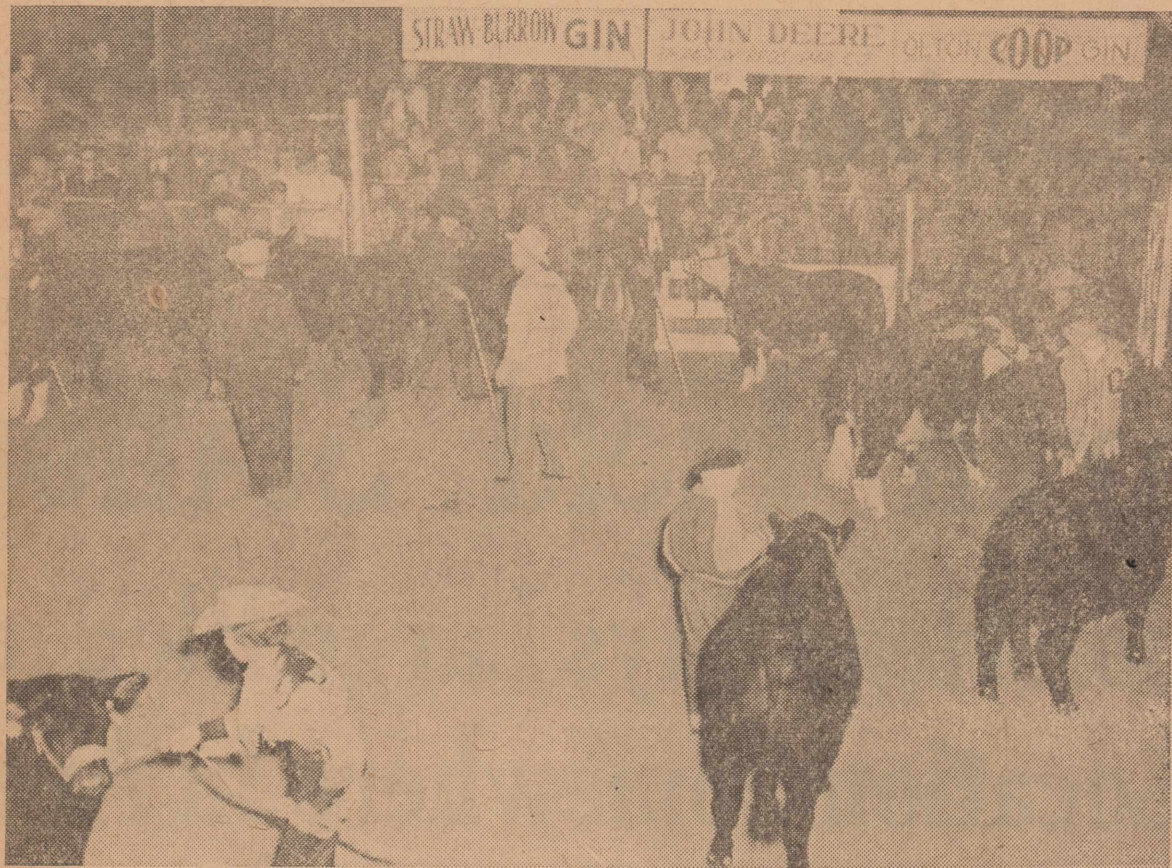
Survivors include the wife; a son, H. P. Webb, Jr., of Pasadena, Tex.; three grandsons, Roy Henry Webb and Earl and Keith Patterson. Mr. and Mrs. Webb reared Earl and Keith Patterson.

Also surviving are two great granddaughters, Peggy Sue and Terry Lynn Patterson; a sister, Mrs. J. F. Wiles of Brownwood and a half brother, Chelsey Webb of St. Louis, Mo.

A daughter, Mrs. Una Webb Patterson, died in 1926.

Mr. Webb will be mourned by a number of other children who were reared in his home as his own.

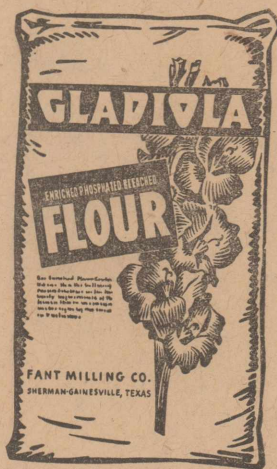

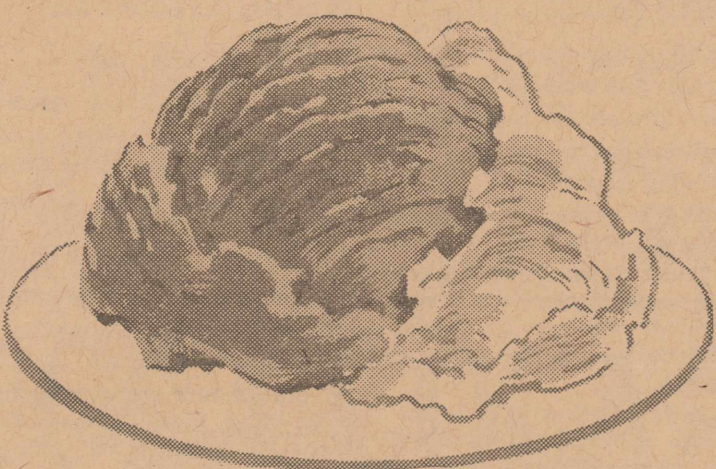

Now is the time! Ah, friend, no longer wait!

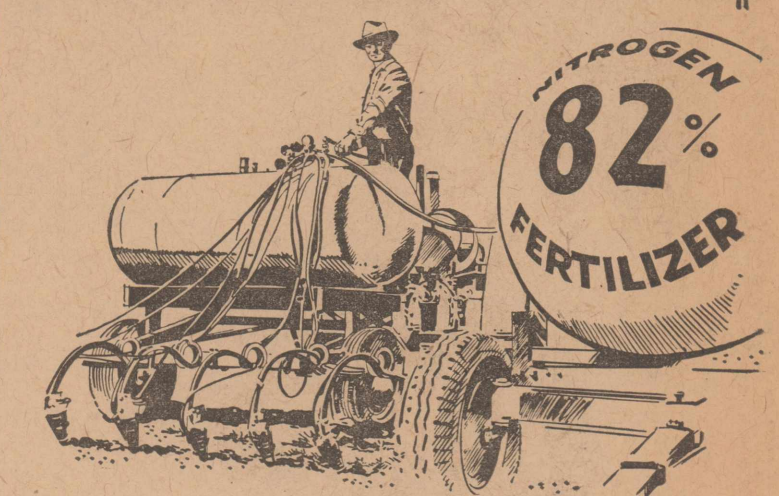
