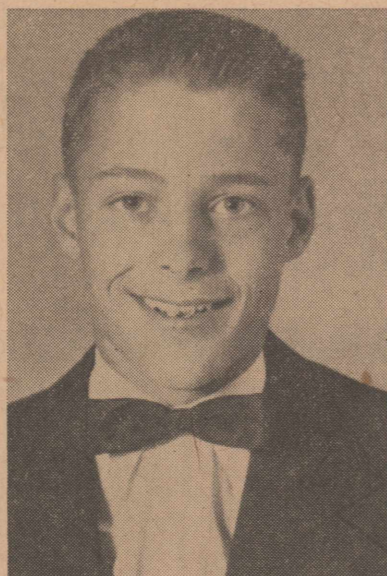
Revival Series Set For Aug. 5

Four Olton Future Farmers Will Get Lone Star Degrees This Week



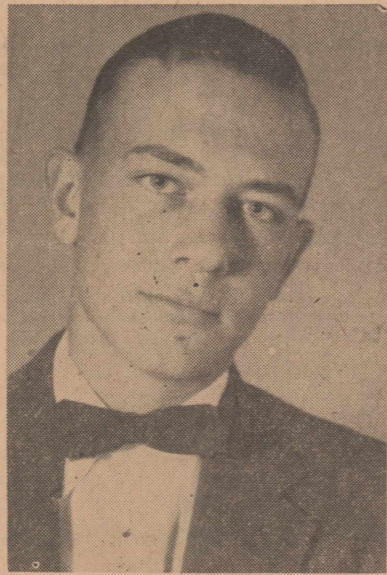

Four Olton boys will be honored this week with the state's highest FFA degree—the Lone Star Farmer Degree. They are Sammy Thomas, Jerry Edmonson, Douglas Smith and Bobby Johnson. All four are in Dallas for the occasion. The degrees will be awarded at the FFA state convention in Dallas. The degrees were awarded for outstanding work in the Future Farmers of America. To earn the degree the boys had to keep accurate records on their projects. Ironically, neither J. C. Lane nor J. W. 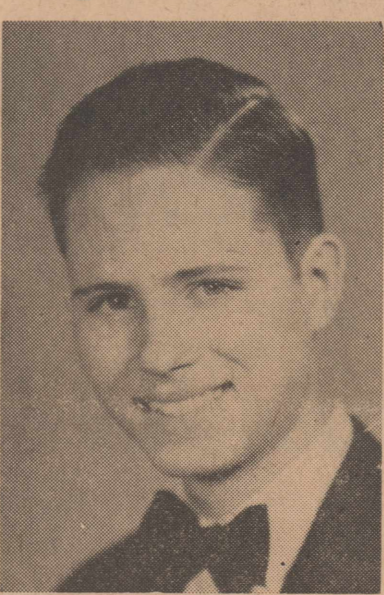
Don Declares Dog Dunking Day Saturday

JIM SPEER, JR.

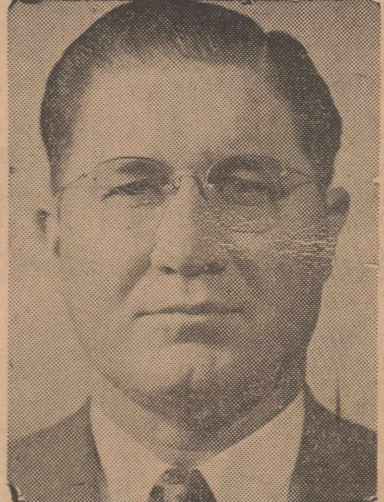

Accident Fatal To Father Of Olton Resident

William L. Overstreet, 59 years old, Portales, N.M., father of Orville Overstreet of Olton, was killed about 1:30 o'clock last Friday afternoon when his tractor overturned on him. The accident occurred about 14 miles south of Portales. Mr. Overstreet is believed to have been killed instantly. He had just fueled his tractor and was driving away. The machine started up a turnrow sand dune and flipped over backward. Neighbors witnessed the mishap from a distance of about a half mile. They reached the scene within 10 minutes but Mr. Overstreet was dead by the time they arrived. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in Portales First Baptist Church. Burial was in Mt. Zion, N.M. cemetery. Mr. Overstreet was born in Jones County in 1896. He and Mrs. Overstreet were married in 1915 in Clovis, N.M. Mr. Overstreet was a Portales farmer. Community Meetings Planned To Explain Need For TRF Field Station

Olton folks some time next month will have an opportunity to learn more about Texas Research Foundation and its plan to establish an agricultural research field station near here. This information came last Friday from Dr. C. L. Lundell, head of Texas Research Foundation, who was here with a group of his associates to confer with Olton farmers and businessmen. A meeting of Lamb County farmers will be held at 8 o'clock next Tuesday night at the court house in Littlefield for the purpose of discussing the proposed Texas Research Foundation Field Station.

Dr. Lundell has pointed out that about \$150,000 will be required for the field station's five year program. The foundation is supported by private funds and does not receive any help from the government. Some \$55,000 already has been offered for establishment of a field station in this area. Harvest Queen Mills has offered to contribute \$30,000 or provide the land for the research station. Anderson Clayton Co. has agreed to give \$15,000 and Southwestern Public Service Company has offered \$10,000. Dr. Lundell said these offers have almost assured establishment of the agricultural research field station in this vicinity.

Glazener Seeks Tax Office

Besides my experience on a farm I have worked for the following business firms, which are all located in Littlefield, Texas, mostly in the sales departments: Hill Rogers Appliance Co.; Tom Hewitt Chevrolet Co.; Garland Motor Co. and Batson Motor Co., any or all of these firms I give as a reference. My only source of income to support my family and educate my children is from my personal earnings.

I spent 3½ years in the service during World War II, part of which was spent overseas.

In asking the voters and people of Lamb County to elect me as their Tax-Assessor Collector I do so with the full knowledge that this office belongs to the people of Lamb County and not to the person elected to serve them. I am fully aware of the important duties of the office; the responsibilities it has, the salary it pays. My every act and decision will have to be with the full consent and approval of the voters (the people who hired me) and no action of mine shall be based on a selfish desire that is not for the good of the County and Tax payers. 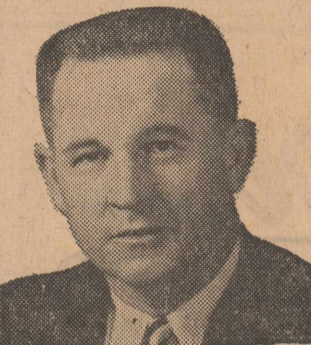

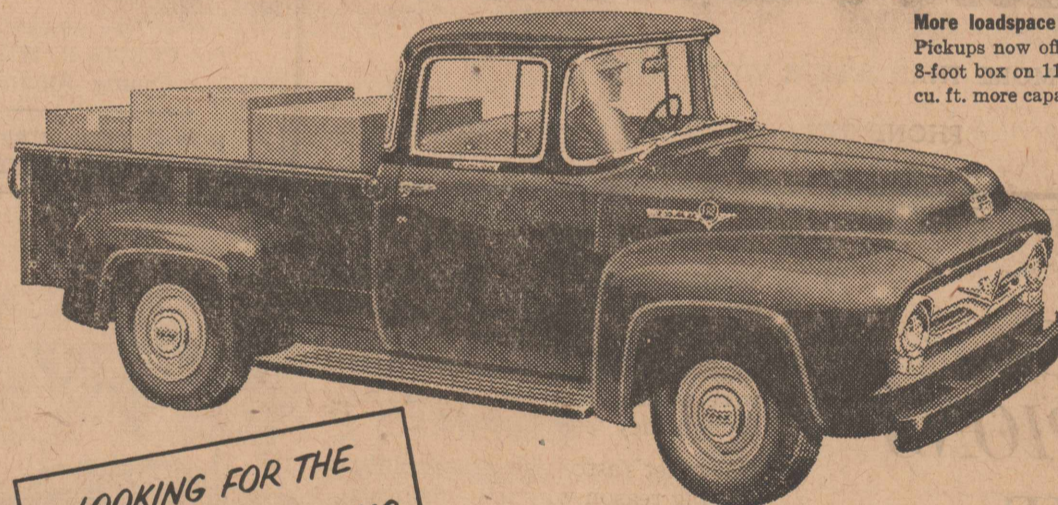

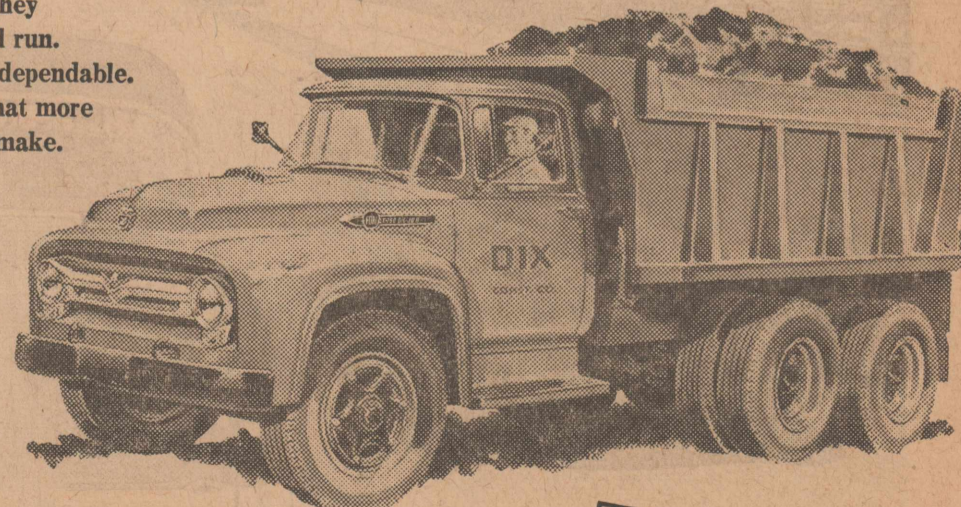

Spray Stops Corn Worms Spain Says

Spray with dust or a solution of DDT to keep worms from bothering your sweet corn, advises Don Spain of Olton Farm Supply.

Don says spraying time is silking time. He said the corn should be treated at five day intervals during silking.

He reports that boll worm millers lay eggs on the silk. About four or five days are required for hatching and then the worm goes to work on the tender, sweet corn if he is not prevented.

MORE RICH COLORS WILL HIGHLIGHT FUTURE FURNITURE SAYS MRS. ROSCOE THOMAS AFTER VIEWING MARKET

More colors and more color harmony will highlight homes in the future.

The above was emphasized at the 1956 Furniture Market in Dallas last week which was attended by Mrs. Roscoe Thomas.

"This year," Mrs. Thomas explained, "we were introduced to new ideas and new materials, both interior and exterior, designed to make the home more attractive and home living more convenient and comfortable."

Mrs. Thomas said that more and more colors are bringing amazing changes in the home. "New bright fabrics with a metallic touch brighten up the up-

holstered furniture", she pointed out.

"Another nice feature in living room furniture is the arms", Mrs. Thomas declared. She said that the arms are not wide and bulky but that they are made of foam rubber. This makes each piece lighter in weight and easier to handle, Mrs. Thomas stressed.

One designer, she said, introduced a new line of upholstered furniture with the entire frame made of steel and mesh construction. "This new technique allows the designer and manufacturer a new freedom from the usual bulkiness", Mrs. Thomas ex-

plained. "In scaling down the bulkiness, this designer was able to give the pieces a slender silhouette with an almost indestructible frame."

There was a showing of Italian provincial, French provincial, and American provincial furniture, Mrs. Thomas declared. "The fluted posts and antique features of the Italian, the soft curved lines of the French, and the exotic woods of the Far East added spice to the beautiful bedroom groups," she pointed out.

MAPLE STILL POPULAR "Durable, beautiful finished maple is gaining in popularity", Mrs. Thomas said. "We noticed this year that the color of maple is more standardized in a rich soft tone with less of a red cast."

The finishes in general are lighter with warmer tones in the modern furniture, she explained. Brass pewter and copper were used in slender knobs and varied-sized rings were used to decorate the modern line of furniture, Mrs. Thomas added.

"Color harmony again plays an important role in floor coverings," she stated. The predominant colors, Mrs. Thomas explained, used with beige, brown and other wood colors with bright highlights of color scattered on informal patterns made the hard surface coverings.

Mrs. Thomas declared that lamps were taller, more slender and elegant. Black and neutral were very popular for lamp colors as well as turquoise, pink, gold, green, and gray, she added.

"The material in the shades are easier to clean and much more durable", Mrs. Thomas stressed.

"Words just fail me when I try to describe the dinettes!" Mrs. Thomas explained. New and interesting colors with beautiful new trims caught Mrs. Thomas' eye.
