

> **Accident Fatal To Father Of Olton Resident**

William L. Overstreet, 59 years old, Portales, NM, father of Orvile Overstreet of Olton, was killed about 1:30 o'clock last Friday afternoon when his tractor overturned on him.

The accident occurred about 14 miles south of Portales. Mr Overstreet is believed to have been killed instantly.

He had just fueled his tractor and was driving away. The machine started up a turnrow sand dune and flipped over backward. Neighbors witnessed the mishap from a distance of about a half mile. They reached the scene within 10 minutes but Mr. Overstreet was dead by the time they arrived.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in Portales First Baptist Church. Burial was in Mt. Zoin, NM, cemetery.
