# Lain, Bryant In Runoff

## WE MUST GO YARBOROUGH

With the full realization that we are backing an underdog, we find that our conscience will let us do nothing less than rally to the support of Judge Ralph Yarborough in this run-off campaign for the highest elective office in this state.

Most of the daily press has backed Price Daniel in his bid for governor. In doing so they have left the impression that all the newspapers of the state are backing the same candidate. IT IS NOT SO.

Judge Yarborough has been accused of mud slinging. Yet, in his previous campaigns he has refused to make political hay out of Catholic ties of one of his opponents here in predominantly Protestant Texas.

Judge Yarborough has been accused of soliciting the aid of labor racketeers. Yet, we have only insinuated statements to support these accusations.

Judge Yarborough's opponents by insinuation and innuendo have made it appear that a candidate who gets the support of the common man is somehow unclean. If this be true, we submit that support of big business and oil interests is equally tainting.

We have never heard Ralph Yarborough level a personal attack at ANYONE. We have heard him attack the record of various opponents. AND WE SUBMIT THAT THE RECORD OF ANY CANDIDATE IS FAIR GAME FOR SUCH AN ATTACK IF IT BE JUSTIFIED.

Big daily newspapers beat the drums for Alan Shivers in 1954 while at least a few weeklies cried graft. During the past two years we saw scandal bared that left a nation's finger pointing to the shame of the Lone Star state.

We take it as significant that those same dailies are again taking the same stand against Ralph Yarborough... and the same weeklies—such as the Tulsa Herald—who cried out before, are again backing Judge Ralph Yarborough.

## LYGUS BUG DAMAGE REPORTED

An infestation of lygus bugs has hit an estimated 70,000 acres of cotton in Lamb County and isolated areas of other South Plains counties, W. L. Owen, Jr., entomologist at the Texas Experiment Station in Lubbock said Tuesday.

Lamb County Agent W. R. Kimbrough made the estimate of a number of acres hit by the troublesome insects, which suck cotton squares and bolls up to half-grown in size, and cause spotty cotton.

Owen said there was considerable shedding of small bolls with high populations of insects still present in the Lamb County fields. "These insects can destroy a large portion of a crop within a week if something is not done," Owen said.

The entomologist stressed that immediate control is advisable, and said that many farmers have had good luck with such organic insecticides as DDT, toxaphene, dieldrin and heptachlor. The insects are easily controlled when the right counter-measures are used, he said.

Reports of isolated damage from the lygus bugs have come from Lubbock and Crosby counties, according to Owen.

The insects have come from tumbleweeds and other weeds in dry lakes about the South Plains, he declared.

## Farm Bureau Queen Contest Set August 24

Entry deadline is August 20. Contestants should apply at the Farm Bureau office in Littlefield or through their community director. Two pictures of the contestant should accompany the application.

To be eligible the contestant must be a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member actively engaged in agricultural production. She must be single and between the age of 16 and 22.

Daughters of state directors, employees, county presidents and secretaries and previous state winners are not eligible to compete in this contest.

## ALFREDO GARZA KILLED IN CRASH SATURDAY; MISHAP ALSO INJURES HALE COUNTY DEPUTY

Alfredo Garza, 61-year-old Olton farm worker, was killed last Saturday morning when his car was involved in a collision with an automobile operated by a Hale County deputy sheriff.

Mr. Garza, employed by O. E. Patterson, is believed to have died instantly. The accident occurred about 4 miles east of Olton on Highway 70.

The deputy, Doyle Ferrell, had

just left Olton, where he had been attending to official business. He suffered lacerations and bruises. He was hospitalized at Plainview.

Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Parrish of Earth were driving behind the deputy and saw the tragedy. They said Mr. Garza was traveling north onto the highway from a side road.

Mr. Ferrell was en route to Plainview driving east. Mr. Parrish said he believes the Hale County deputy sheriff was driving about 50 miles per hour at the time of the mishap.

Final rites for Mr. Garza were held Monday in Olton First Baptist Church. Rev. Glen E. Godsey, pastor of the Mexican Baptist Mission, was in charge of services. He was assisted by Rev. John Lewis, pastor of Olton First Baptist Church.

Mr. Garza had lived at Olton for the past four years.

Mr. Garza was born Jan. 12, 1895 in Stark County, Tex. He married Elvira Cardenas Sept. 27, 1922 at Runge. The Garza family moved to Olton in 1952 where he worked for O. E. Patterson, Wallace Hackler and C. F. Golden. At the time of his death he was working for Mr. Patterson.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Elvira C. Garza; two sons, Alfredo, Jr., and Vicente, both of the Olton community; and four daughters, Mrs. Ernestina G. Gallegos of Moline, Ill., Mrs. Santos G. Aleman of Olton, Mrs. Juanita C. Mendoza of Runge, and Mrs. Elvira G. Fonseca of Olton. He is also survived by a brother, Demasio Garza of Runge and a sister, Mrs. Jesusa Erevia of Nordheim. He had 8 grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Jimmy Uranga, Paul Gonzales, Ebdio Perez, Santana Mendoza, Abundio Almanza, Tomas Marroquin, Silverio Salas and Francisco Martinez.

Those attending the funeral from out-of-town were David Garza, Trinidad Garza and Lino Garza, nephews, all of Hungry Ford; Francisca Ochova, a niece from Runge; Emilio Mendoza, a son-in-law, Runge; Jose Gallegos, son-in-law of Moline, Ill.; Eluterio and Pablo Garza, both grand nephews. Friends from out-of-town were Francisco Valdez and wife of Big Spring.

Burial was in Olton Cemetery. Wood-Mitchell Funeral Home of Plainview was in charge.

Rev. Godsey is accepting donations for the Garza family.

## Rev. Lewis' Uncle Taken By Death

C. H. Graham, 63, uncle of Rev. John E. Lewis, died Wednesday in Gatesville from a blood clot. Funeral services were held Friday and burial was in Oglesby.

Survivors include his wife and a daughter, Mrs. Clyde Baker of Fort Worth.

One of the hottest races in the entire county was Precinct One's photo finish commissioner's race. The final count left only four votes difference between the second place man and the third place man.

Don Bryant received 361 votes to lead the first primary. Ford Lain came in second with 317 votes and C. M. Moss was breathing hot on his neck with 313 votes. R. A. Green received 192 votes.

Bryant also led the Olton box polling 313 votes here. Ford Lain received 209 votes, C. M. Moss 261 votes and R. A. Green 77 votes from the Olton box.

Returns at 6 p. m. Tuesday from all 254 Texas counties. 237 of them complete, show these totals for candidates in Saturday's Democratic primary election:

Total vote for governor: 1,567,471.  
Gubernatorial vote for individuals: Price Daniel, 622,321; Halsey 90,577; Holmes, 10,647; Lee O'Daniel, 345,842; Senterfitt, 37,950; and Yarborough, 460,134.

Olton voters balloted 481 to exempt for specific legislation to 202 children from compulsory attendance of schools attended by both white and Negro children.

Olton voters favored 542 to 146 legislation to prevent intermarriages of whites and Negroes. They also voted 503 to 102 in favor of state officials doing all in their power to prevent federal encroachment. On all three issues Olton's vote followed the pattern of the state and county.

Truitt Sides lacked only one vote receiving a plurality in the write-in vote for precinct chairman. Sides received 103 votes. Bodkin received 39. Some 20 persons received write-in votes.

Potter said the names of Sides and Bodkin will appear on the ballot in the run-off.

Dick Dyer was re-elected sheriff by a handy margin. He polled 3,514 votes as compared to 904 received by his opponent, Lester Hollobaugh.

In the only other contested county race Herbert Dunn received 2,717 votes as compared to 1,673 polled by F. H. "Muggs" Glazener in the race for Lamb County tax assessor-collector.

Lamb County cast a total of 4,518 votes in the race for governor. Here's how they went. Price Daniel led the pack with 1,608 votes and Ralph Yarborough was second with 1,388. J. Evetts Haley got 467; W. Lee O'Daniel, 911; Reuben Senterfitt, 130; and J. J. Holmes, 14.

Here's how Olton voted in that same race. J. Evetts Haley got 112; Reuben Senterfitt, 14; W. Lee O'Daniel, 128; J. J. Holmes, 5; Price Daniel, 340; and Ralph Yarborough, 243.

The county gave Ben Ramsey 1,209 votes; C. T. Johnson, 124; John Lee Smith, 2,009; and A. M. Akin, 834.

Olton gave Ben Ramsey 211 votes; C. T. Johnson, 25; John Lee Smith, 402; and A. M. Akin, 124.

# Main Street Church Of Christ Will Dedicate Beautiful New Auditorium

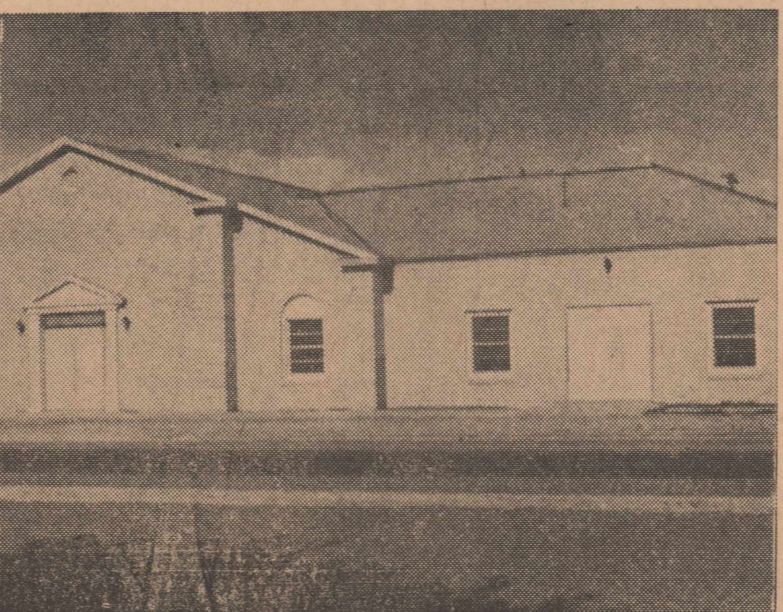
Dedication services for the lovely modern auditorium at the Main Street Church of Christ will be held Sunday at 3 p. m. for the public. F. W. Maddox, president of Lubbock Christian College, will be the speaker.

Estimated contractor's price was \$85,000 for the building program.

Pink, beige and light oak complement the new auditorium of the Main Street Church. The lovely auditorium which has indirect lighting and central heating and air-conditioning has a seating capacity of 660.

Thick Carpet Thick pink and beige ripple-tone carpet atop foam rubber padding runs down the aisles and covers the area around the pulpit. Cushioned seats in a rich tan and brown with light oak backs and arms fill the auditorium.

The floor under the seats is vinyl asbestos in a mixture of cream and brown. Lovely light oak arches of illuminated wood decorate the ceiling at even intervals. Two light oak planter boxes



filled with a variety of greenery decorate the space behind the preacher's stand. A large baptistry lies behind the pulpit. Cry rooms, one on either side of the auditorium, should appeal to young mothers. One has a baby bed and comfortable padded chairs; the other has chairs and a bathroom adjoining it. Both are equipped with loud speakers.

Other than the beautiful auditorium, the church is in the process of building 13 new classrooms, a minister's study, storage closets, restrooms, and a hall. The hall has cool water drinking fountains.

Established in 1922 The Church of Christ was established in 1922 with 23 members. The congregation worshipping in what was known as the Union church house.

Later the congregation bought

a church building from the Baptist congregation. During this time, several evangelists held meetings here and the church's membership grew rapidly.

Former elders are G. W. Locke, Lee Potet, George Brown, T. Combest and W. R. Rose. W. A. Kerckville was the first minister. Other former preachers are S. A. Freeman, John Fulmer, M. F. Manchester, Lyle Bonner, Taylor, Stanfill, Jim Standridge, Harold Collard, and evangelists J. D. Harvery and Cleo Wallace.

In 1949 the membership outgrew their building and the church erected a \$75,000 building on Main Street. The church also built a home for the preacher.

At the present time, Main Street Church has added a lovely new auditorium and they have completed, in the past year, a magnificent home for their minister. S. A. Freeman, who preached here for five years, helped build the new structures.

Membership at the present time is about 250. E. R. Higgins is minister.

Sunday also marks the beginning of a revival for the church with Dean Brookshire of Richardson preaching.

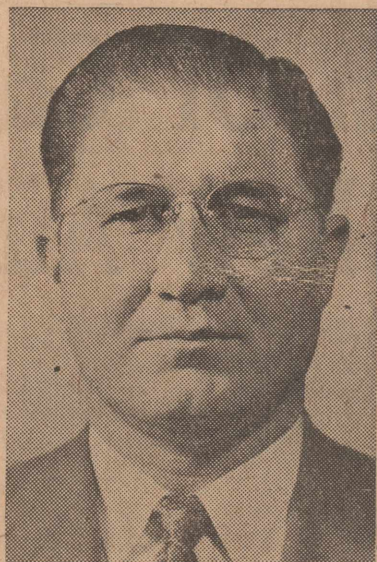
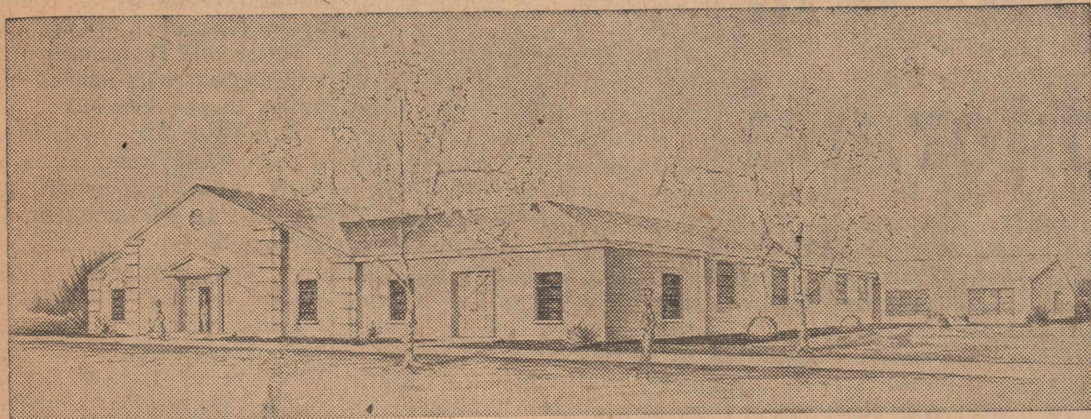

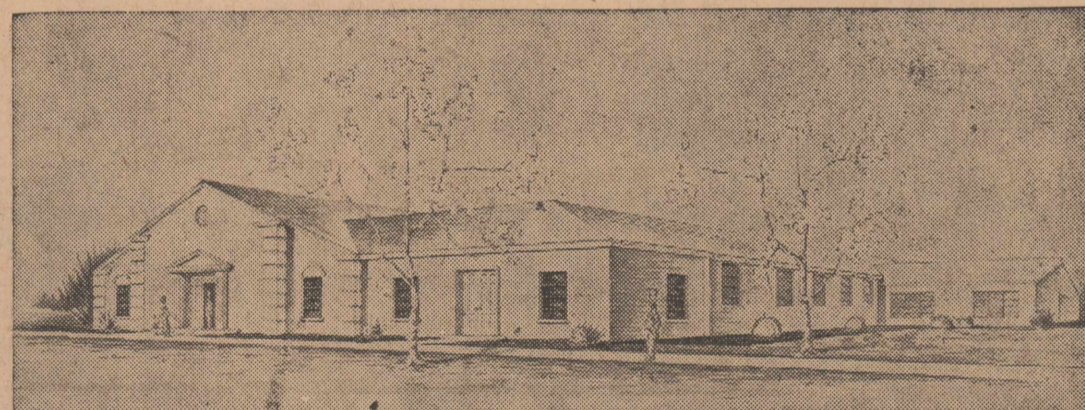

too," he smiled. "I pick out the hottest, the most uncomfortable-looking spot to stand, then folks take pity on me and stop sooner."

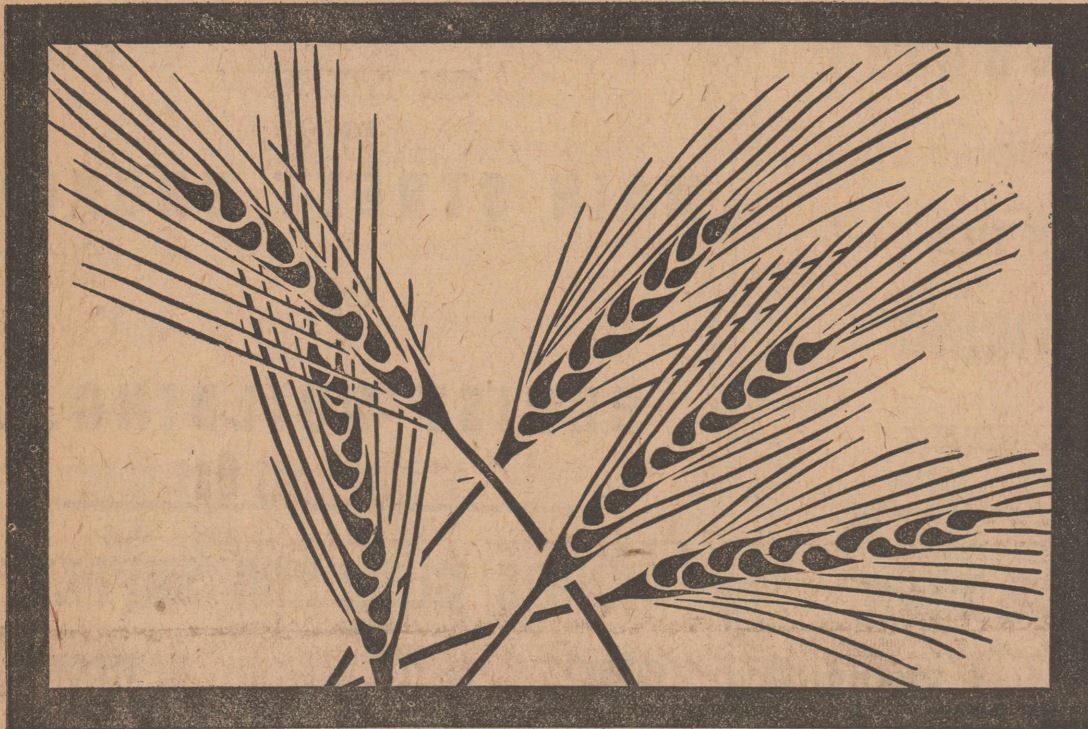
