## Moore Resigns Shamrock Post; Plans Return To Olton Soon

Elmer Moore, former principal here, was honored recently as he announced his resignation as superintendent of the Shamrock School System.

The Moores will return to Olton.

Presidents of former boards of trustees joined Roy Schrvner, incumbent president of the Shamrock board, in praising Mr. Moore for his contributions to the Shamrock School System.

Sol Blonstein, who was president of the board when Mr. Moore went to Shamrock, declared, "I received the news of Mr. Moore's resignation with deepest regret. I have known him to be a man of tireless effort, very efficient and capable and one who places the welfare of children first. The departure of Mr. Moore and his family will mean the loss of a valuable asset to Shamrock."

Expressions of praise came from other school board members and school patrons.

Mr. Moore was reared at Lubbock and attended Texas Tech, West Texas State and the University of Texas. He began his teaching career at Olton and during his 10 years here he served as teacher, coach and

principal. He was serving as high school principal at Littlefield when he entered the Corps of Engineers. He returned to teaching in 1944 and was superintendent of schools at Levelland when he was named to the Shamrock post.

He was very active in community affairs at Shamrock. He was a member of Shamrock First Baptist Church, Rotary, Booster Club, Chamber of Commerce and Country Club. He is a life member of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, a member of the American Association of School Administrators, National Education Association, Texas Association of School Administrators, Texas State Teachers Association and the Panhandle Association of School Administrators of which he is a past president.

Mrs. Moore will be remembered as Miss Pearl Brigrance. She was reared in Olton. The Moores have two children, Jerry, a high school sophomore and Judy a freshman.

The Moores are scheduled to move back to Olton next week-end.

## G. A. BODKIN RETIRES FROM OLIVER FIRM

George A. Bodkin is retiring from business and his partner, Vernon Nixon, is to be sole owner of Bodkin and Nixon, Oliver farm equipment in Olton.

Mr. Bodkin's retirement brings to a close a score of years in the Oliver business here in Olton.

Mr. Bodkin came to Olton in 1928 from Oklahoma. He began farming five miles northwest of town and the same farm still is the old Bodkin home place. His son, Leroy, is working the land now.

Mr. Bodkin went into the tractor business in 1935. Vernon started working part time at the implement house while he still was in high school. That was in 1936. He bought an interest in the business in 1940 and then sold to Mr. Bodkin when he entered the service.

Mr. Bodkin operated the firm while Vernon was in the service as an Air Force pilot. When Vernon returned in 1946, he purchased half interest in the implement house.

He became sole owner of the firm when Mr. Bodkin decided to retire.

## SURVIVAL OF THE PLAINS...

The Olton farmer is figuratively dancing on a hot bed of coals. Everywhere he stops he finds it uncomfortable to stay.

Vast cartels have conspired to keep American cotton off the foreign market while they saturate that market with cotton produced on huge plantations in Mexico, South America, and the Near East with cheap peon labor.

It is a well known fact that sectional groups are plotting to raise the government loan staple requirement to such an extent that little Plains cotton may be able to come up to the standard.

We are up against a blank wall in our plea for a fair price on grain sorghum. Corn interests are too powerful to permit grain sorghums to be produced profitably in the irrigation belt—this in spite of tests having proved that Olton milo is often 105 per cent of corn in feeding efficiency.

Potatoes? Lettuce? Cabbage?

California, the Rio Grande Valley, Florida and Idaho will not permit such a formidable competitor in the field of perishable vegetables. Most of the time we're going to find the market gutted just before our crop comes off.

What is the answer?

This country can produce, in abundance, vegetables of high quality and suitable for canning. Olton needs pay roll. The logical answer is a canning factory.

Such a factory would assure us an equal chance to market with the rest of the country.

We believe the first step would be to send a delegation to visit some name brand processing firm. If we do not meet with success in this effort, an Olton Canning and Processing Corporation should be formed.

Not only would such a move be profitable, but it would serve notice upon our economic competitors everywhere that Olton is not going to sit with its economic throat bared, ready for the cutting.

### Former Olton Man Pioneers New Subsoiling Method At Purdue

Jim Spain is pioneering a new subsoiling method at Purdue University, where he is a professor on the agronomy staff. Purdue agronomists say that blowing crop residue into the subsoil was tried successfully last summer by Purdue agronomists. They say the new development promises to keep a channel open deep into the soil for a long enough time to make subsoiling practical for farm use.

Mr. Spain, who originated the idea, sees evidence from these early experiments that less water and less soil will be lost from runoff when subsoil channels are filled with crop residue. He and his co-workers believe it will increase the amount of water available to plants because more water is funneled into the soil and a deeper root zone is created. An added bene-

fit may be that the channels will supplement drainage tile on soils that are difficult and expensive to drain by tile alone. Such an idea may have far-reaching effects in all parts of the country, not only in humid areas but also in sub-humid and semi-arid regions where rains are fewer in number but often much more intense.

The Purdue agronomists and agricultural engineers synchronized movement of a subsoiler with that of a field chopper. In this way, various crop residues were picked up, chopped, and blown into a fast-closing channel immediately behind the subsoiler. Two tons of oat straw and two tons of corn cobs per acre were blown into subsoil channels spaced 80 inches apart. Mature alfalfa hay and corn cobs were also successfully put into the soil.

Observations in October show-

ed the research men that their "vertical placement of organic material" did hold the subsoil channel open. Runoff was insignificant on a sloping soil near Lafayette, Ind., even after 5 1/2 inches of rain fell within a three-day period. Where subsoiling alone was tried on the same experiment, the subsoil furrows were standing full and water was running off after only two inches of rain. During the rain, a channel containing organic material was opened into a dead furrow and a constant stream of clear water was discharged, indicating possibilities for use in supplemental drainage.

Further experimental work must be done to see how long the subsoil channel stays open and what the long-range effects may be on soils and crop production. Agricultural engineers at Purdue are working on a design that will combine the subsoiler and field chopper into one machine for further research use.
