"Papa Was A Preacher" is the title of the play to be staged Saturday night in the high school auditorium at 8 p.m.

The three-act comedy is being sponsored by the Olton Parent-Teacher Association. Setting and costumes will portray the 1920s.

### Truitt Sides Is "Papa"

"Papa" (Truitt Sides) is a preacher and has some trouble with an old maid, Miss Jonas (Mrs. Dub Hall), in raising his children the way she thinks he should raise them and the way he thinks he should. However it takes a big "blow" to Miss Jonas to make her see her mistake.

Papa's children are the typical teenagers—falling in love with love, roller skating, fighting, etc.—but they are preacher's children!

The humorous side of a preacher's life and his family is brought out in the three-acts with such witty lines and actions and it's a "hilarious bundle of laughs," said Mrs. Gordon Tompkins, one of the directors. The play alone is funny, but the costumes, hair-dos and make-up from the "roaring '20s" should make it one of the most talked about comedies in Olton.

# Delegates Urge Solons To Support Firm 90 Percent Parity Farm Prices

## CHURCH OF CHRIST COLLEGE BEING SOUGHT FOR OLTON

Olton community leaders voted Monday an all-out effort to locate here a proposed Church of Christ junior college which church officials have indicated will be built somewhere in West Texas.

Definite plans for attempting to get the two-year proposed college located in Olton will be

formulated immediately and followed through, the group agreed.

Throughout Olton this week, the possibility of locating the junior college here was being discussed enthusiastically, and widespread cooperation has been unofficially pledged.

Represented at the Monday afternoon meeting were the

Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Olton Independent School District and City Commission.

Several other Plains towns and cities are known to want the college, too.

Present at the initial meeting were Basil Sherman, G. H. Bley, Carl Macon, Bill Kelley, D. M. Granbery, R. E. Porter, Carroll Cox, D. Y. Ray, Jim Speer, H. G. Walker and Troy Martin.

Three members of the Olton Farmers Union have returned from Washington, DC, where they joined other Farmers Union men from various states in an effort to obtain at least 90 percent of parity on all basic farm products.

The three are Fred Hicks, Morris G. Brown and James Cowart.

The Olton men were members of a 30-man Texas delegation. They not only visited with top congressional brass but also swapped ideas with northern farmers.

"We sat up and talked until 1 or 2 o'clock every night," declared James Cowart.

The group is asking 90 percent of parity on all farm products such as poultry, hogs, cattle, cotton and small grains—including grain sorghum.

The three Olton delegates took the National Cotton Council to task. They said the cotton council is working for long staple interests. Cotton farmers of this area pay 10 cents a bale to finance the Cotton Council.

Mr. Brown said the surplus as depicted by Secretary Benson is not a true picture. He said this country has on hand less than a two-year supply of cotton. He said this surplus would be consumed almost immediately should a national emergency arise.

Mr. Brown also complained that Benson has used surplus cotton in swaps for strategic defense material. Instead of charging this off as a defense expenditure, it is charged off as a farm program expense.

"In fact the government has been making money out of cotton," Brown asserted.

Mr. Hicks said Benson has been picking agriculture against labor. Labor has now joined forces with the farmer in a demand for rigid farm price supports.

Mr. Cowart said his group is against so called "modern parity." That is parity based on prices for the past 10 years. He said the Farmers Union also is against any change in the cotton loan staple basis from 7/8 of an inch and against Benson's soil bank plan.

"We are not against the Plainview grain sorghum plan as was erroneously reported in some newspapers," Cowart declared.

"It has been reported that our trip to the capitol was a waste of time but that is not true," Brown declared.

"Each and every congressman and Senator that we called on welcomed us and talked freely without evading the issue and we were asked to come back and to send more men to Washington. They are there to represent us and would like to get the farmer and small businessmen's ideas on all matters."

The three delegates will report to the Olton chapter in a meeting to be held at 7:30 o'clock the night of March 1 at the vocational agriculture department at Olton High School.

Breeding sheep include a Shropshire breeding flock to be shown by Doug Smith, a Hampshire breeding flock to be shown by Royce McFadden and a Southdown breeding flock to be shown by John Adams.

In fat barrow judging, Jack Hysinger will show two Poland Chinas, T. J. Smith will show a Chester White, and Carl Nafzger will show a Hampshire.

## Enumerate 1,176 Scholastics In Olton School District Census

The recently completed census of Olton Independent School district shows a total of 1,176 eligible scholastics. It was announced this week by R. E. Porter, school business manager.

The total includes 1,094 white students and 82 Negro students.

The school census determines the amount of per-capita state aid which this school district will receive for the 1956-57 school year, Mr. Porter said.

Olton Independent School District this year will receive a total of \$84,306 in per capita state aid, Mr. Porter explained. That's an average of slightly more than \$71.00 per student. The money is used for teacher salaries.

Other state aid being received this year by the school district includes \$80,096 for salary operation, and \$30,874 for transportation. The state also pays for textbooks.

The 1,176 scholastics enumerated in this year's school census

compares with 1,167 enumerated in last year's census, according to Mr. Porter. Last year's census included 1,064 white students and 103 Negro students.

## School Closing Set May 25

Olton public schools will dismiss this year on Friday, May 25, it was announced yesterday by Supt. Carl Macon.

May 18 had originally been set as the closing date, but another week of school will be necessary to make up for the six school days lost during early February's severe snow storm, Supt. Macon explained.

One of the six days will be made up on Friday, March 9. That day had originally been scheduled as a school holiday so that faculty members could attend a West Texas Teachers Association meeting at Midland.

# Wayne Bodkin Exhibits Grand Champion Steer To Climax Eleventh Annual Olton Stock Show

Wayne Bodkin climaxed his FFA career in a fitting manner Saturday as he exhibited the grand champion steer in the Olton Fat Stock Show.

Wayne's heavyweight short-horn weighed in at 1070 pounds and was bought for 75 cents a pound by G. H. Bley, Phillips 66 jobber here. The calf was bred by B. C. Cooner, leading Olton short-horn breeder.

Young Bodkin is in his senior year this year and had previously exhibited a reserve champion. He is president of the local FFA chapter and is also serving as district president.

Wayne holds the Lone Star Farmer degree.

The reserve champion steer was shown by Sherrill Alexander. It was a lightweight Hereford weighing 850 pounds and brought 55 cents a pound. It was bought by Harvest Queen Ele-

ator of Plainview. Sherrill is a new student here. He moved to Olton from the Shallowater community. The calf was procured from a Big Spring breeder.

T. J. Smith showed the grand champion barrow. It was purchased at 74 cents a pound by Investors Security of Lubbock. The pig was a Chester White. It weighed 180 pounds.

This is young Smith's first year as an FFA student and his first year to participate in the Show. He is a freshman.

The reserve champion barrow was shown by Gayle Machen. It also was a Chester White and weighed 194 pounds. The reserve champion was purchased by Roxy Theater at 56 cents a pound.

Gayle is an eighth grade 4-H Club girl. She has been exhibiting in the Olton show since she

was 9 years old.

The Grand Champion lamb was shown by Houston Hamby. It was a Southdown which sold for \$1.20 to Olton State Bank. The grand champion weighed 115 pounds.

Houston is a sophomore and is in his second year of FFA work.

Ronnie Dennis exhibited the reserve champion Lamb. It brought \$1.02 per pound and was bought by Higginbotham Bartlett.

Ronnie also is a sophomore and in his second year of FFA. Bidding was good in a spirited sale Saturday. Auctioneers were Raymond Aiken and Gene Harris, both of Plainview. Calves averaged about 32 cents, Hogs about 34 and Lambs about 37 cents a pound.

In spite of the bad weather which preceded the show, the

barn and surrounding area was in fair shape for foot traffic and for parking.

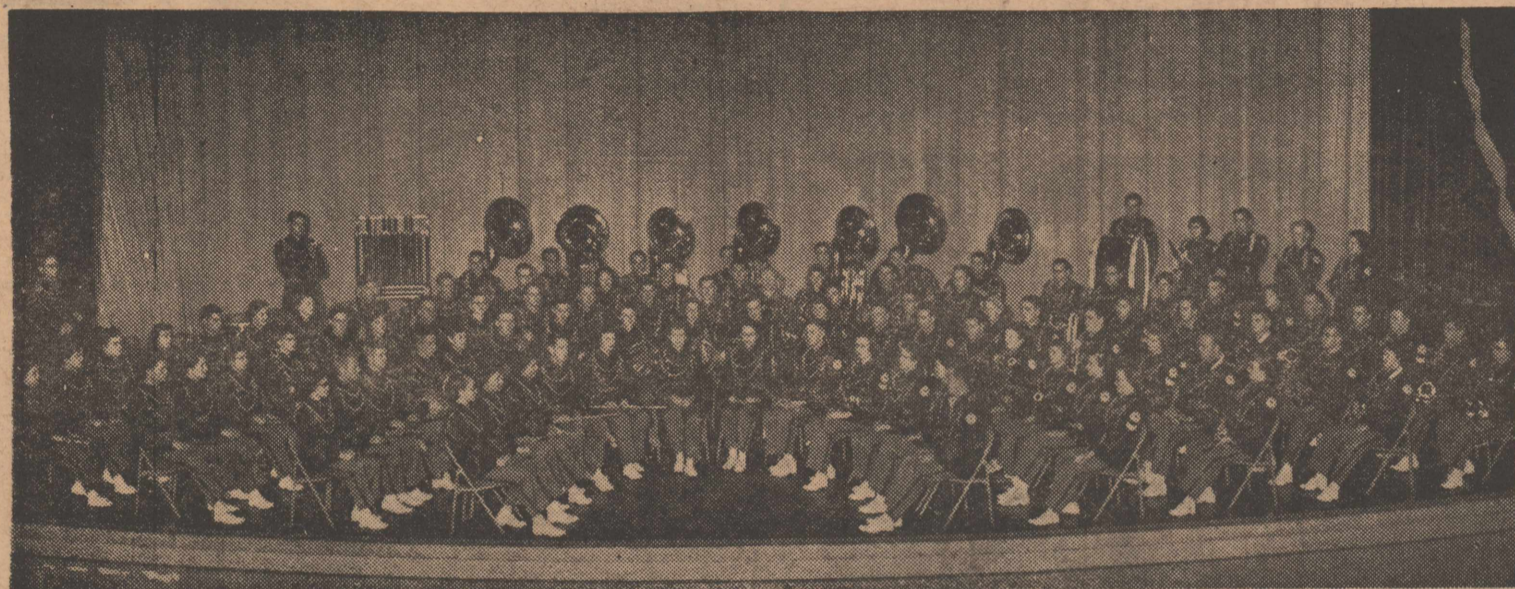
Crowds were good throughout the show and exceptionally good during the sale. Out of town papers hailed the Olton show as the best of its kind in the state.

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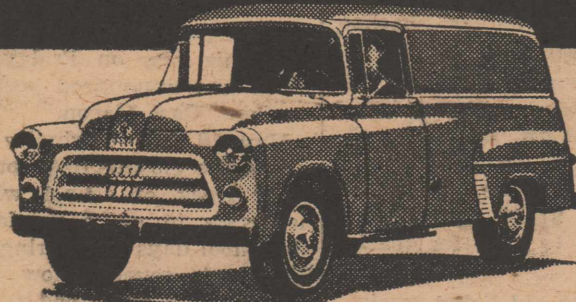
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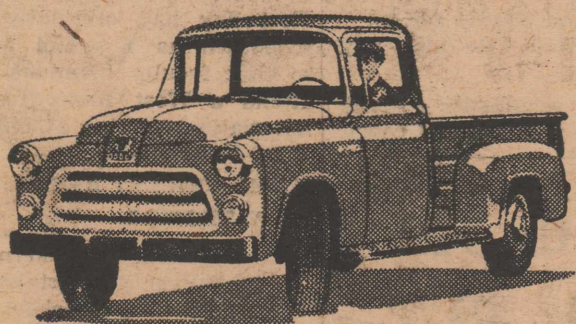
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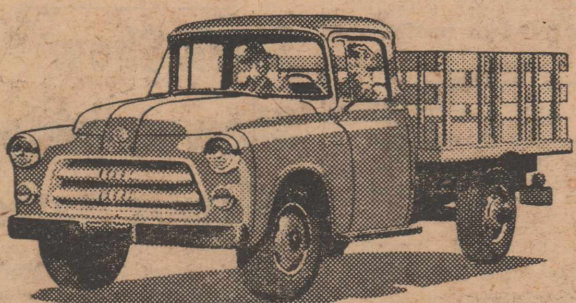
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**WT Band To Appear Here Soon**

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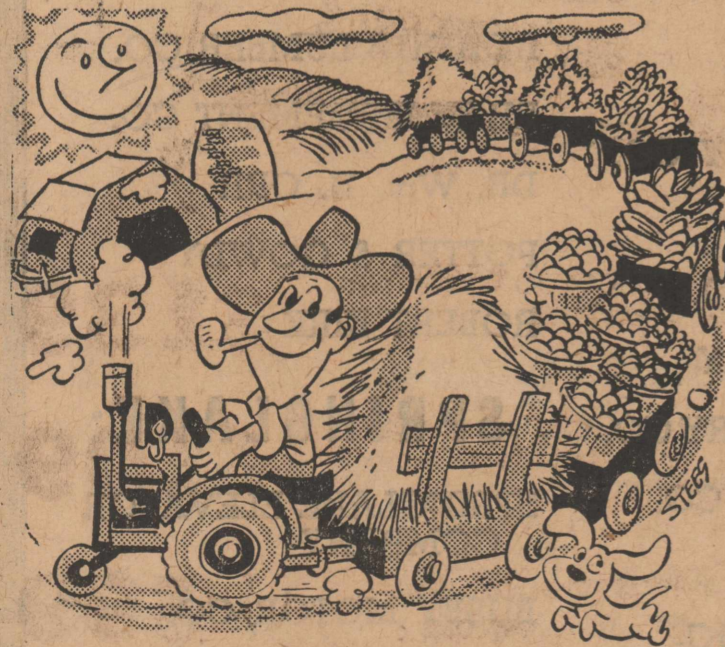
**No Diamond Competition This Season**

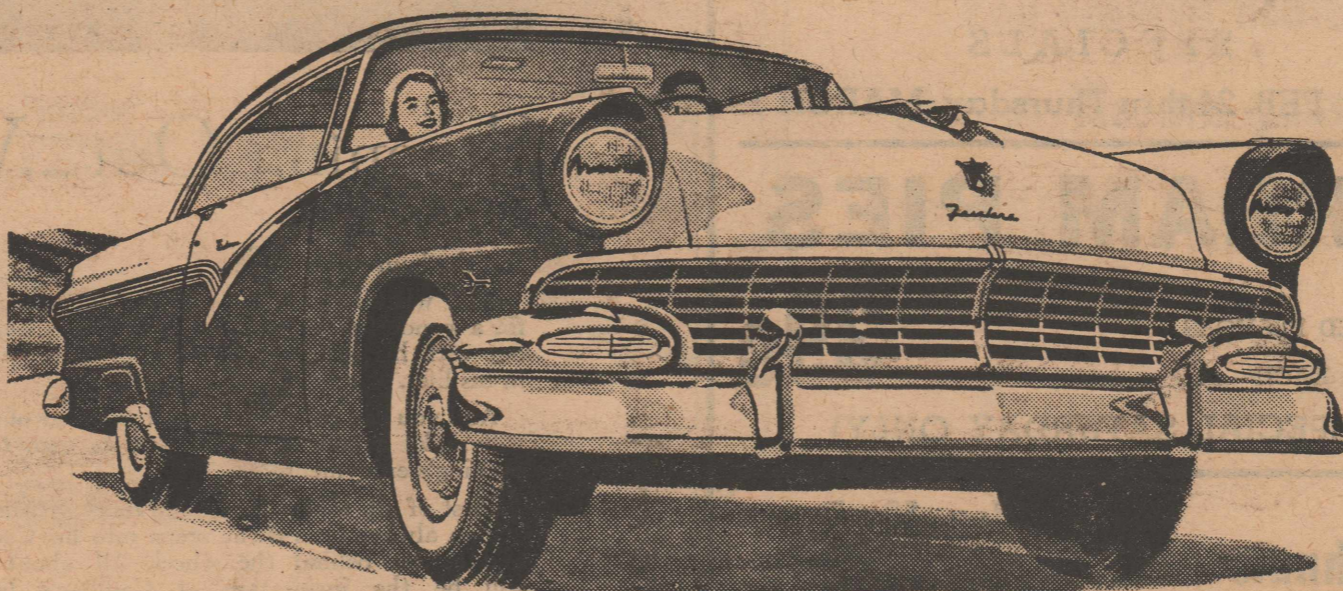

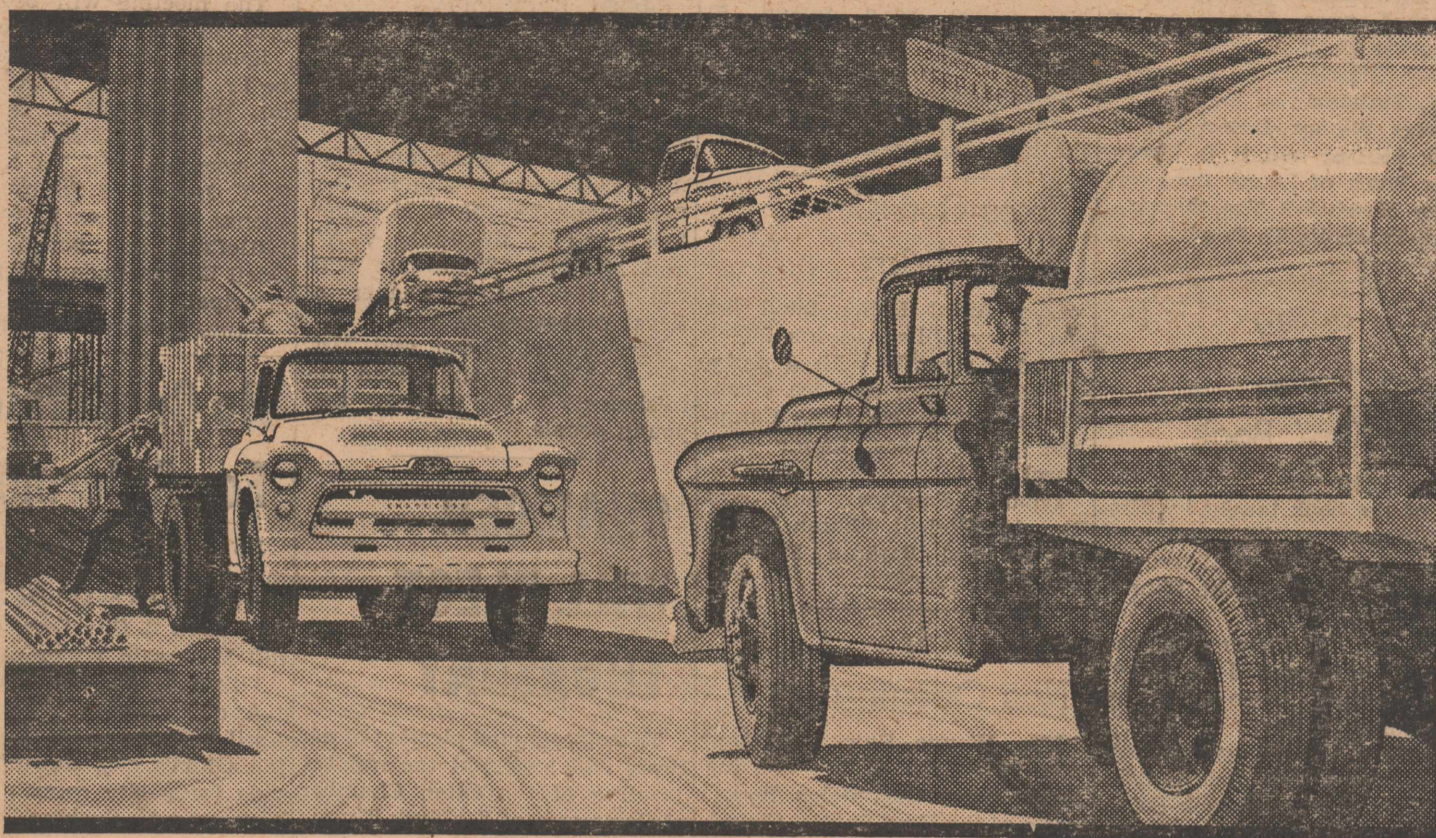

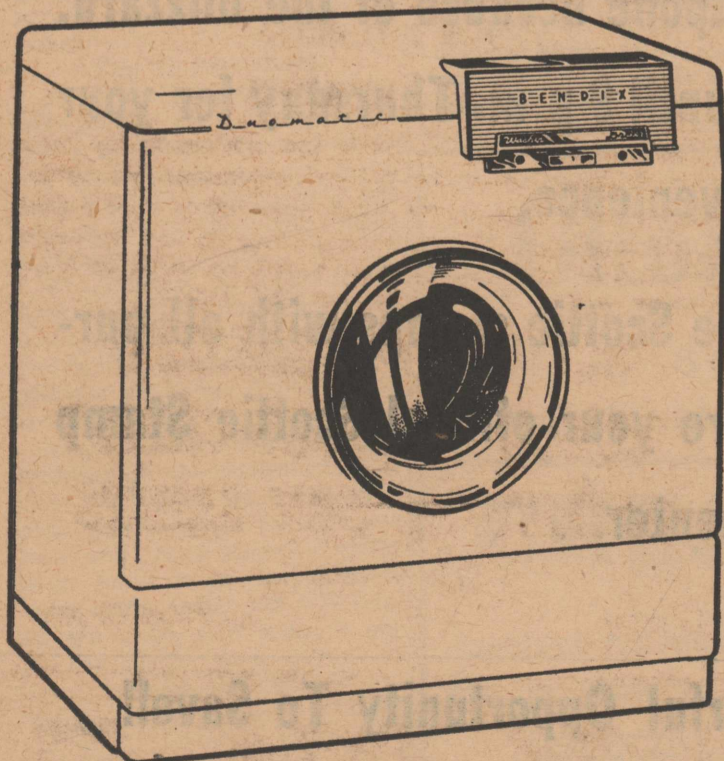

the following proposition:  
FOR: A City Council form of government.

AGAINST: A City Council form of government.

Said election shall be held in the Town of Olton at the Fire Station and Howard Hall is appointed Presiding Judge of said election and Bill Thomas is appointed as Assistant Judge and Jack Silcott is appointed Clerk of said election. The polls of said election shall be open at 8:00 o'clock a. m. and shall be closed at 6:00 o'clock p. m. and said election shall be held in the manner and under the provisions as now provided by law in primary elections.
