Two Olton farmers—A. J. Givens and Paul Hammer—are in Washington, DC, this week.

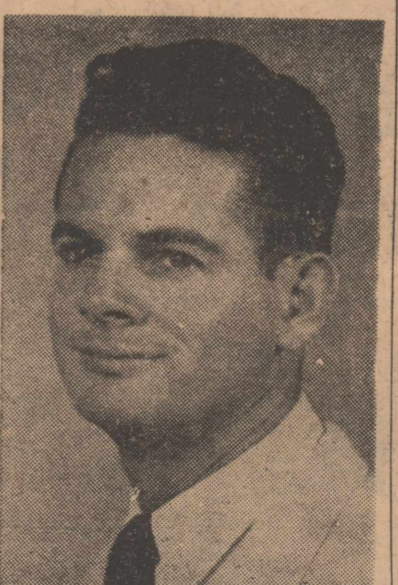

## Plan Includes Center Islands, Curb & Gutter

Work will begin immediately on the long-awaited project to install curb and gutter and to widen Main Street paving to 80 feet along an eight-block stretch from Highway 70 to Ninth Street (south end of the hospital grounds).

That good news was the substance of a letter received this week by Mayor G. H. Bley from Rhea E. Bradley, Texas Highway Department resident engineer at Littlefield.

### Center Medians

The Main Street modernization blueprints also call for center medians, or islands, along the eight-block route to provide for protected turns and safer driving.

Completion of the project will mean 80-foot paving to accommodate four-lane traffic along Main Street, curb and gutter on both sides of Main Street along the entire eight-block route, and will necessitate parallel parking, in compliance with state regulations.

### Contract Let

The state has let contract on the job to Kerr and Middleton, a Lubbock firm, according to Mayor Bley.

Property owners along the route put up the necessary money for the curb and gutter portion of the project late last summer. The money was held in escrow here through fall and winter, and \$10,400 (total estimated cost of the curb and gutter) was forwarded Feb. 9 to Texas Highway Department officials at Austin.

### State Help

The state will pay for excavation, median curb, and the new pavement between curb lines. The state will also pay for maintenance of the project, according to previous agreement.

Right-of-way along Main Street is 100 feet, city officials have explained. Paving will be 80 feet in width to provide for four-lane traffic (strip paving on Main Street now is approximately 36 feet wide), with 10 feet on each side to be reserved for sidewalks.

An estimated completion date on the project has not been announced.

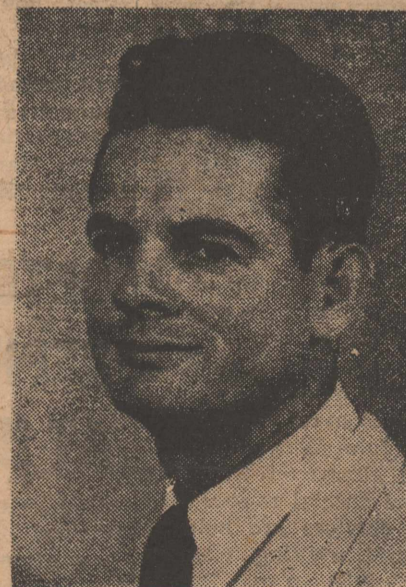

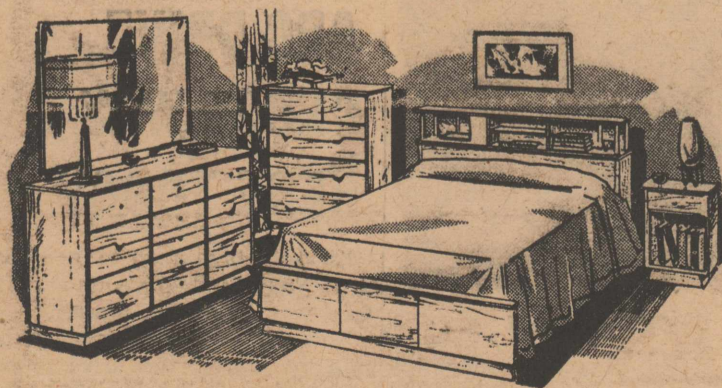

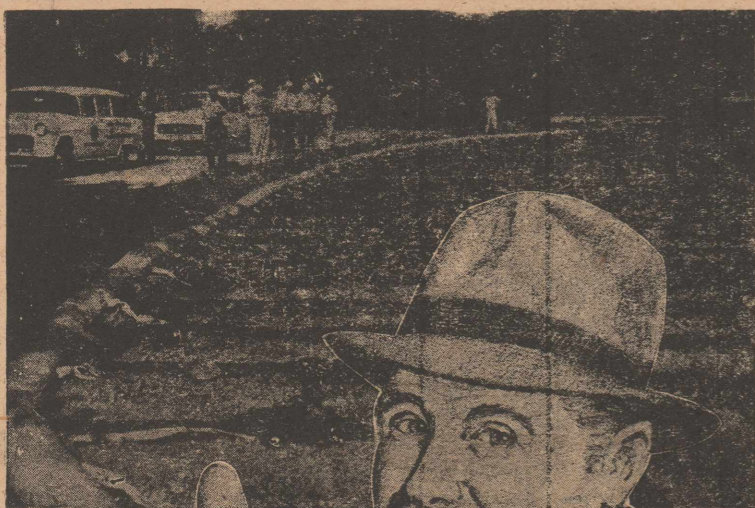

## Census Survey Reveals Lack Of X's and Q's

In re-checking Olton's school district census for accuracy, school business manager R. E. Porter broke down the list of 1,094 white students according to the beginning initial of their last names.

Most plentiful last name initial, he found, was S—there are 116. Not far behind are H (109), and M (107).

There are no white students in Olton Independent School District, Mr. Porter found, whose last names begin with either X or Q. Others low on the list were I (4), Z (6) and E (8).
