### CHAMBER WILL HEAR REPORTS

Olton Chamber of Commerce board of directors will report to the membership next Monday night at a meeting to be held in city fire station.

Members of the board visited several neighboring towns to check on Chamber of Commerce methods during the past week. Don Williams is temporary president of the board.

Several school patrons Monday night heard School Supt. Noel Johnson present a \$370,793 school budget at a called meeting of the school board.

This exceeds the old budget which was \$304,518. The hike of a little more than \$65,000 can be accounted for in main by reckoning teacher pay raises.

Superintendent Johnson went through the budget item by item explaining each entry. Mimeographed copies of the neatly prepared budget were handed out to those who attended the meeting.

About the only comment from those who attended the hearing was a suggestion that an appraiser from outside the community be hired to survey the community for tax purposes. It was also suggested that the appraiser be instructed to put all personal property on the tax roll.

There was an expressed feeling that some owners of personal property are failing to render such property for taxation.

## Olton High School Students Urged To Register On Assigned Dates

Registration for the 1957-58 school term will begin at 8:30 o'clock the morning of Thursday, August 29.

This announcement came this week from High School Principal J. A. Williams.

Eighth grade students will report to the study hall in the junior high school building at 8:30 o'clock.

Seniors are to report to the new study hall at 8:30 o'clock.

Juniors will report to the new study hall at 10 o'clock. Sophomores will report to the new study hall at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. Freshmen will report to the new study hall at 8:30 o'clock the morning of Friday, August 30.

Mr. Williams urged all students to register on the assigned dates.

Students who have not previously been enrolled in Olton High School should be prepared to present a transcript of their credits to the high school principal.

Mr. Williams said drivers training will be classed as an activity subject this year. First year vocational agriculture will meet one period only and will be rated as a one-credit subject.

Texas history, economics, band, choral, driver training, business law and business arithmetic are one-half credit courses.

Students and parents have been invited to call at the school office to discuss school problems. "But please do not ask to register ahead of the regular date," Mr. Williams urged.

"If you (the student) owe any text book fees or fines, please call at the office of the principal and make proper settlement," the principal requested. "The law will not permit issuance of text books until all previous text book records are clear."

Fred Gordon, elementary school principal, said all school age children in grades one through seven who have moved into the community since last school year should register Friday, August 30. Registration will be done in the primary and elementary buildings from 9 o'clock in the morning until 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Classes will begin in Olton schools at 8:45 o'clock, September 2.

Children of the grades one through three should report to the primary building, and grades four through seven to the elementary building at 8:45 o'clock. Teachers will be on hand to direct students to their class rooms.

Eighth grade students and all high school students will report to the auditorium at 8:45 o'clock.

School will dismiss and the buses will run at 2 o'clock the afternoon of September 2.

"Parents of children entering school for the first time are reminded that all children must be vaccinated for smallpox and proof of age must be established for six-year-olds," school authorities said.

Birth certificates and other proofs of age will be returned as soon as the teacher has recorded birth dates.

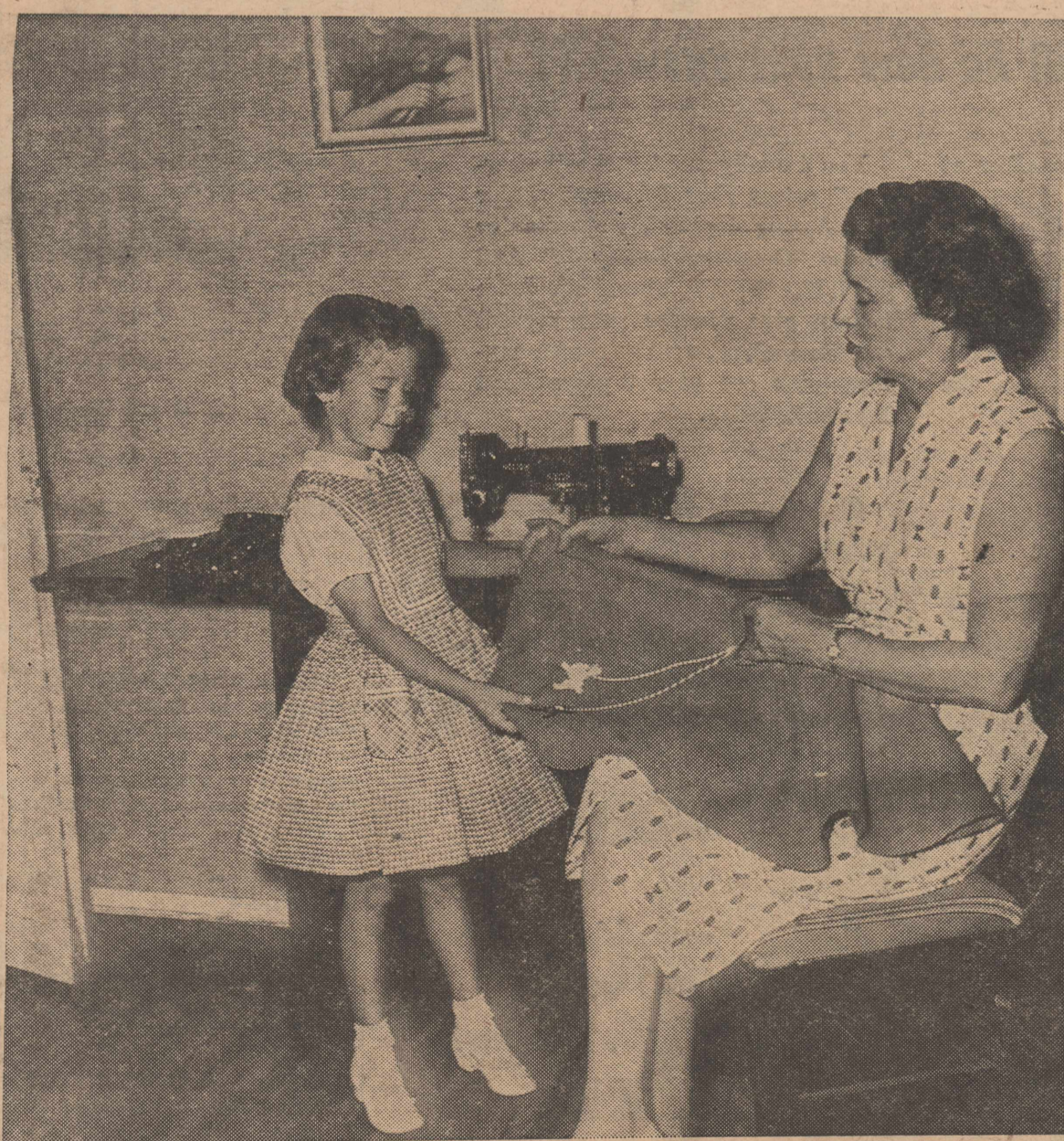

**School Lunch Tickets Available During Registration Of Students**

Lunch tickets will be available in the Olton School Lunchroom during registration for the fall school term.

Early purchase of lunch tickets will help us to serve you better and avoid students waiting in line to get tickets during the September 2 rush. First, second, third and fourth grade students will pay 30 cents for lunch, which will include one-half pint milk. Five-day lunch tickets are \$1.50; 20-day tickets, \$6.00.

All other students and adults will pay 35 cents per lunch with one-half pint milk. Five-day lunch tickets will be \$1.75; 20-day tickets, \$7.00.

Students may purchase 20-day milk tickets, which may be used during the serving period or in the afternoons, for 60 cents, or three cents per carton. Adults may purchase milk tickets for \$1.40, or seven cents per carton. The first four grades may come to the lunchroom for extra milk

in the afternoons, on regular school days.

Olton School Lunchroom served an average of 862 meals daily for 1956-57 term, with 80 percent of the students participating in the program. The largest number served was 1,010 in November, 1956, with participation dropping to around 750 daily in April, 1957.

Most of the staff of the school lunch program has been in the work some time. The youngest employe in years of service, will be starting her third year, and the oldest in service, her 16th year. From this record, one could assume that we like the work—the administration, the students and teachers most of all.

**Recovery Of Civil Damages Due To Destruction Of Property By Minors**

Section 1. Any property owner, including any municipal corporation, county school district, or other political sub-division of the State of Texas, or any department or agency of the State of Texas, or any person, partnership, corporation or association, or any religious organization whether incorporated or unincorporated, shall be entitled to recover damages in an amount not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) from the parents of any minor under the age of eighteen (18) years and over the age of ten (10), who maliciously and wilfully damages or destroys property, real, personal or mixed, belonging to such owner. However, this Act shall not apply to parents whose parental custody and control of such child has been removed by court order, decree, or judgment.

Section 2. The suit may be brought in any court of competent jurisdiction, and venue thereof shall be governed by the

statutes regulating venue in actions based upon trespass. The recovery shall be limited to the actual damages in an amount not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300), in addition to taxable court costs.

Section 3. The action authorized in this Act shall be in addition to all other actions which the owner is entitled to maintain and nothing in this Act shall preclude recovery in a greater amount from the minor or from any other person, including the parents, for damages to which such minor or other person would otherwise be liable, it being the purpose of the Act to authorize recovery from parents, and to limit the amount of the recovery, in situations where they would not otherwise be liable.

Effective Date: August 22, 1957.

**TRF Station Sets Field Day September 18**

Wednesday, September 18, is the date set for the first Field Day at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, according to Harold Hinn, chairman of the regional council and Dr. T. C. Longnecker, head of the station. Tours will start at 2:00 p. m. and continue through the afternoon. Wagons drawn by tractors will transport the guests down the road through the center of the station past the new recharge well and back to the starting point.


Descriptions of the crop and fertilizer research on both irrigated and dryland portions of the station will be given at various stops on the tour by scientists familiar with the plans and purposes.

Each wagon load will be accompanied by a guide who will point out the various items of interest enroute and answer questions raised by their group. It is estimated the tour will be of one hour duration.

September 18 was selected as the date most convenient to the largest number in the High Plains area, and after inquiry disclosed it would not conflict with other planned agricultural events. Many inquiries have been made at the station and to the members of the regional council concerning a "Field Day," therefore, a good attendance is anticipated.
