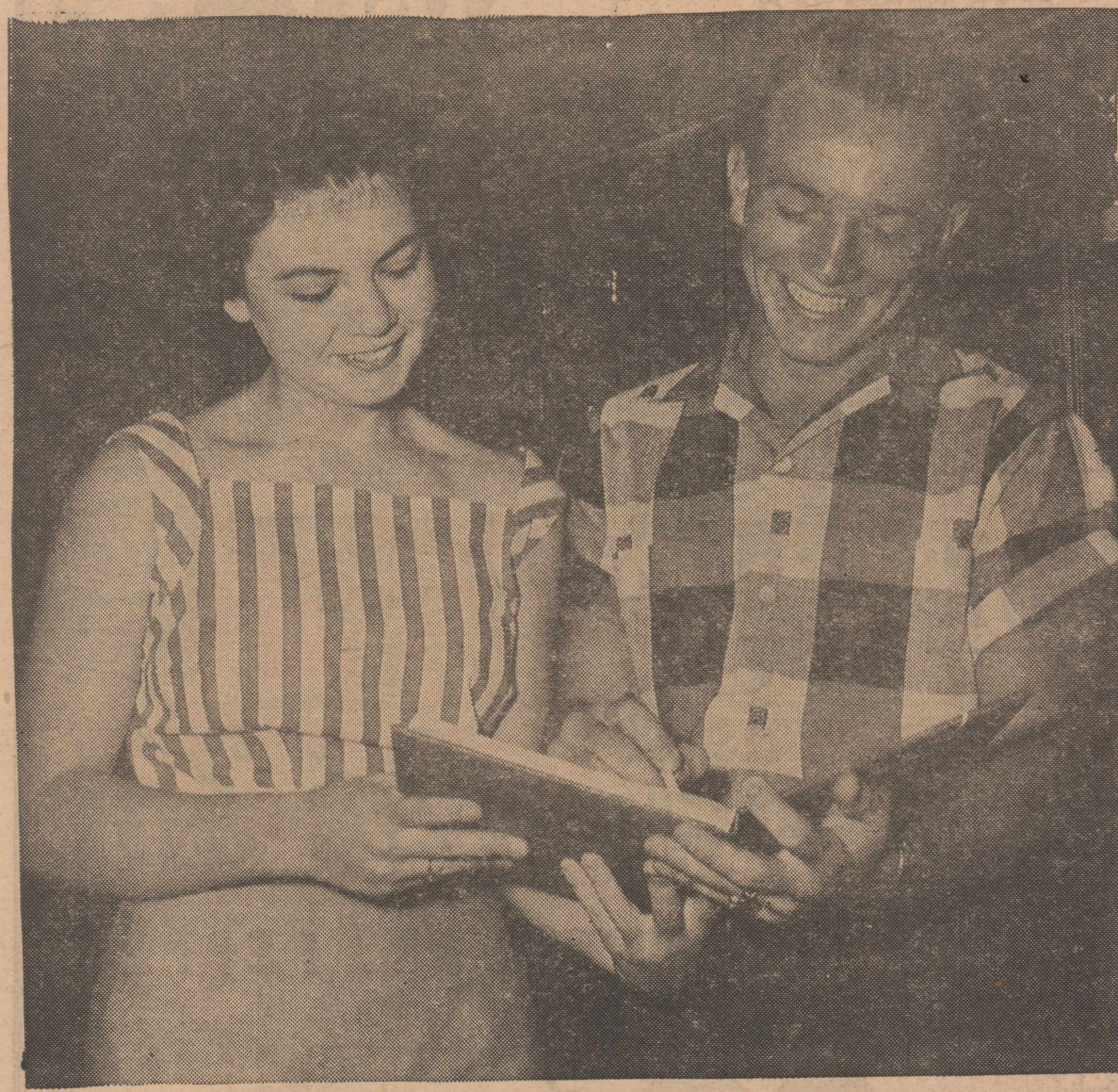

Olton Mustangs Open Grid Season In Clash With Abernathy Friday

Olton's Mustangs will invade Antelope Stadium at Abernathy Friday night in the opening of the 1957 football season.

Kickoff time is 8 o'clock. Coach Turner this week said he already is plagued by sickness and injuries. Billy King is expected to see limited service in the clash and James Carson may not even play.

King, big 185 pound right tackle, suffered minor back injuries in the Springlake scrimmage last Friday night and Coach Turner may not feel up to aggravating the injuries by using him a great deal in the Abernathy tilt.

Carson, 185 pounds, right guard, has been ill this week. He may or may not play against Abernathy.

Nubbin Moore will stand in for King and John Adams or Charlie Giles will play for Carson. Moore weighs 150 pounds and Giles and Adams weigh 120 pounds wringing wet.

At right end will be Don Edwards at 190 pounds; Hysinger will be in the center slot at 190 pounds; Kent Wozencraft, 155, at left guard; Clinton Billingsley, 185, left tackle; and John Paul Jones, 165, left end.

In the backfield will be 130-

pound Ronnie Dennis at right halfback; Jack Roye Straw, 150 pounds, fullback; Arno Hall, 160 pounds, left halfback; and James Ray Hyatt, 160 pounds, quarterback.

Coach Turner again this year will run the multiple offense. Abernathy is rated a strong contender in a district loaded with power.

A caravan to Abernathy is being sponsored by the Olton Quarterback Club. It will form at 4:30 o'clock at the south side of the high school building and leave Olton at 6:30 o'clock. Bobby Straw, caravan marshal, has requested that everyone decorate their cars.

Construction Of New Building Now Under Way

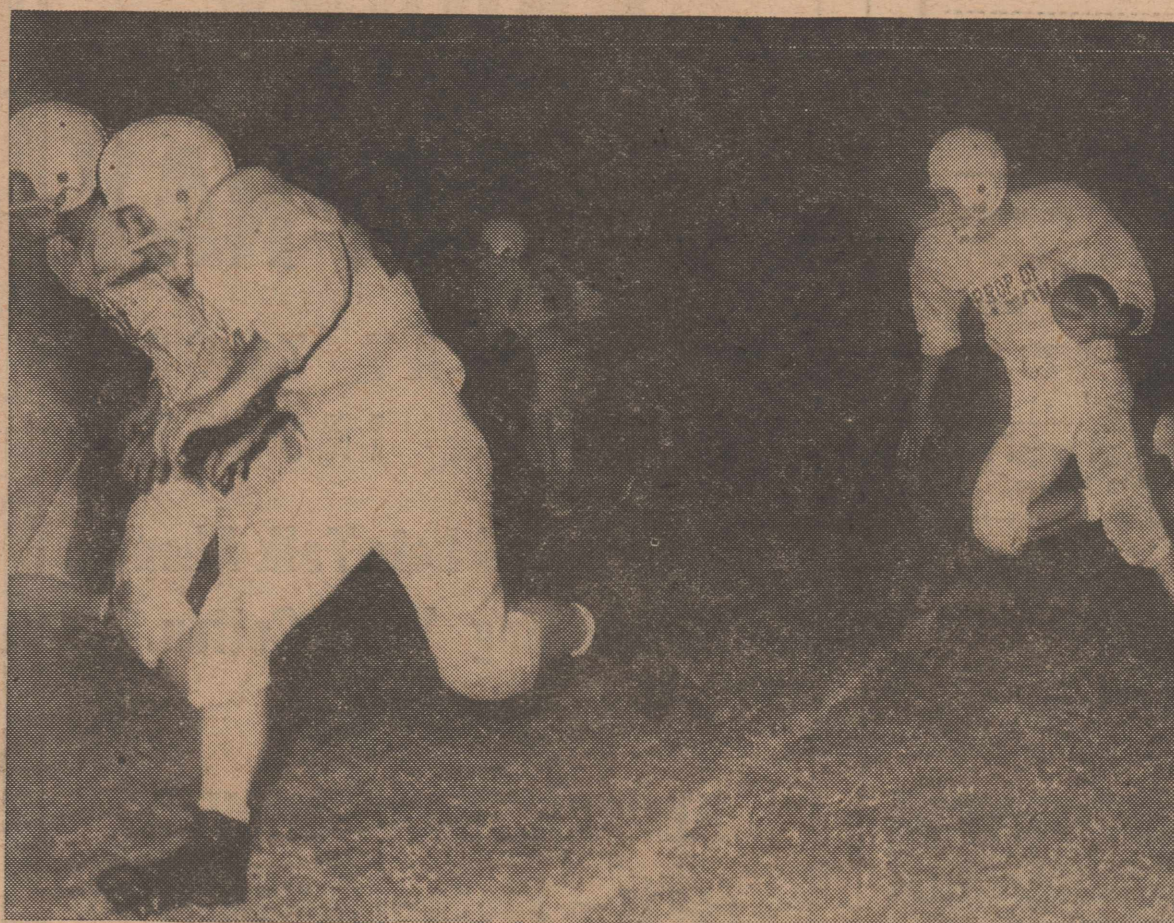
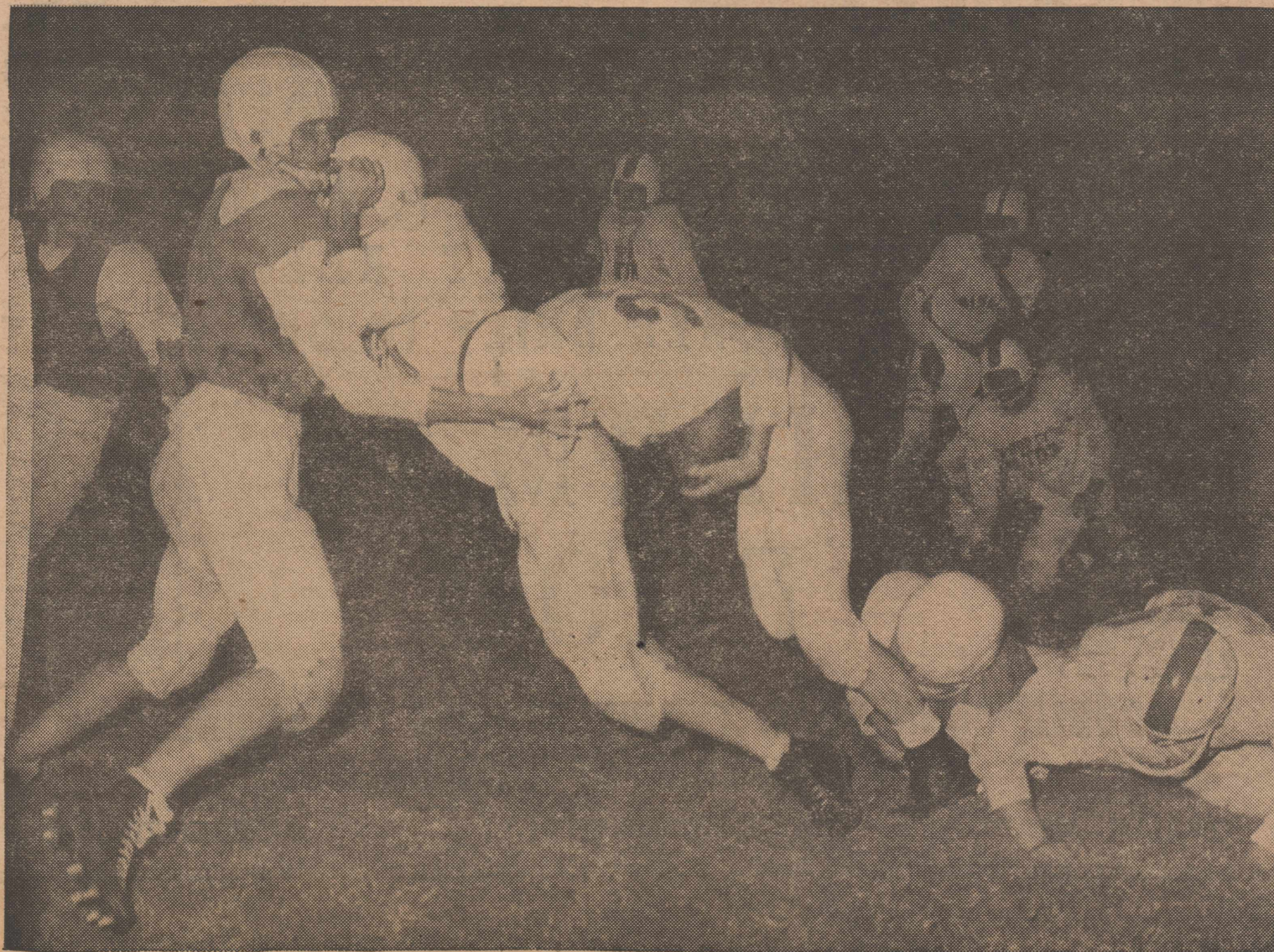
Construction is well under way here on a new building which will house a jewelry store.

Springlake Garden Club Will Sponsor Flower Show For Public September 14

SPRINGLAKE—"Country Life," a flower show, will be presented by the Springlake Garden Club Saturday, September 14.

Scene for the show will be the Community Building. The flower show will be the first flower show to be sponsored by the Springlake Garden Club. It is free to the public.

A general invitation has been extended to those wishing to enter flower arrangements according to the schedule. Entries will be taken between 8:30 a. m. and 12 noon.

Arrangement classes are:

Class 1. Cream of the crop, pitcher arrangements; Class 2. Bean Pot, using bean pot as container; Class 3. Country Cousins, container and flowers green; Class 4. Sunbonnet Sue, bonnet or hat arrangements.

Class 5. Land of Opportunity, novel arrangements; Class 6. Home On The Range, kitchen arrangements with fruit or vegetables; Class 7. Chuck Wagon, figurine arrangements suitable for barbecue table.

Class 8. The High and Dry, dried materials; Class 9. The Early Light of Dawn, little and delicate; Class 10. Morning After the Rain, suggested brilliancy of sunlight on wet leaves, etc.; Class 11. Little Brown Thrush, arrangements in a basket or nest; and Class 12. Old MacDonald, Everything Goes.

General rules are:

Only one arrangement in each class may be made by exhibitor; late entries will be displayed but not judged; judging from 1:00 to 2:00 p. m., open to public from 2:00 to 6:00 p. m.; arrangements must be made by exhibitors.

Flowers, fruits and vegetables used in the arrangements classes need not be grown by exhibitor; cultural specimens exhibited in Coke bottles, name specimen if possible; potted plants must be in exhibitors possession at least three months; exhibitors must conform to schedule and rules; all entries will be judged by scale of points in National Judging Book.
