He said one of the biggest problems facing such an organization is explaining what it is. "I can describe it no better than to say that it is nothing more than group action in a community to bring about development and opportunity in that community."

He stressed the need for a definite program of work for the local group.

## GRAIN HARVEST GETS ROLLING; COTTON IS GAINING MOMENTUM

Grain and cotton rolled in Wednesday amid speculation as to damage done by the freeze that hit the South Plains like a whiplash Saturday night.

Some estimates placed cotton damage at as much as 50 percent while optimistic circles placed it between 20 and 25 percent.

## Mrs. Clyde Ray Receives Suit

Mrs. Clyde Ray is the recipient of a \$49.75 tailor-made suit from Olton Cleaners.

The announcement was made this morning by Horace Cates, owner. He adds that registration will begin immediately for another tailor-made suit to be given away November 30.

Grainmen said there has been little apparent damage to feed stuff to date but they fervently hoped for fine weather.

Up to 6 o'clock Wednesday night only 2, 773 bales had been weighed in this season at local gins. This compares very unfavorably to some 23,395 bales weighed in at this time last season.

Harvest Just Begun  
Grain harvest also has just begun this year. At this date last year, elevator men estimated the grain crop to be at least 80 percent complete.

Combines rolled across the area Wednesday. Grain was beginning to dry out after the long wet spell.

But it was the cotton crop, rather than the grain crop, which suffered most damage by the freeze.

Some estimates ran as high as 50 percent. "I can tell you the story of that young cotton," one farmer declared. "It was planted late, watered twice, the bolls looked good but they weren't mature. It froze early and the cotton is heavily damaged."

Drying Out  
Cotton also was beginning to dry out Wednesday. One gin operator said it was getting into much better shape. He said grades were running strict low middling, light spot and a few middling bales.

Effect of the freeze on the micronaire was not yet known.

One man said he does not believe that the quantity of cotton harvested will be greatly affected by the freeze. He was optimistic even on the dollars and cents aspect. He said he believes that the damage will run not more than 20 to 25 percent in that category.

He conceded that some estimates place it as high as 50 percent.

Plenty Of Hands  
There appeared to be plenty of hands for the amount of cotton open. The cotton is not yet opened up good in some places.

However, it is expected to be white down the rows by the middle of next week. There could be a scarcity of hands then.

A bigger percentage of the crop probably will be gathered by machines this year.

Freezing weather was predicted for last Friday night. Some Olton folks reported frost and ice Saturday morning and then Saturday night there was no doubt that Jack Frost had visited the South Plains.

Full extent of damage to crops probably cannot be determined for several days.

James Gallegher, who keeps weather records for Pioneer Gas Company, said no measurable amount of moisture had fallen here during the past week.

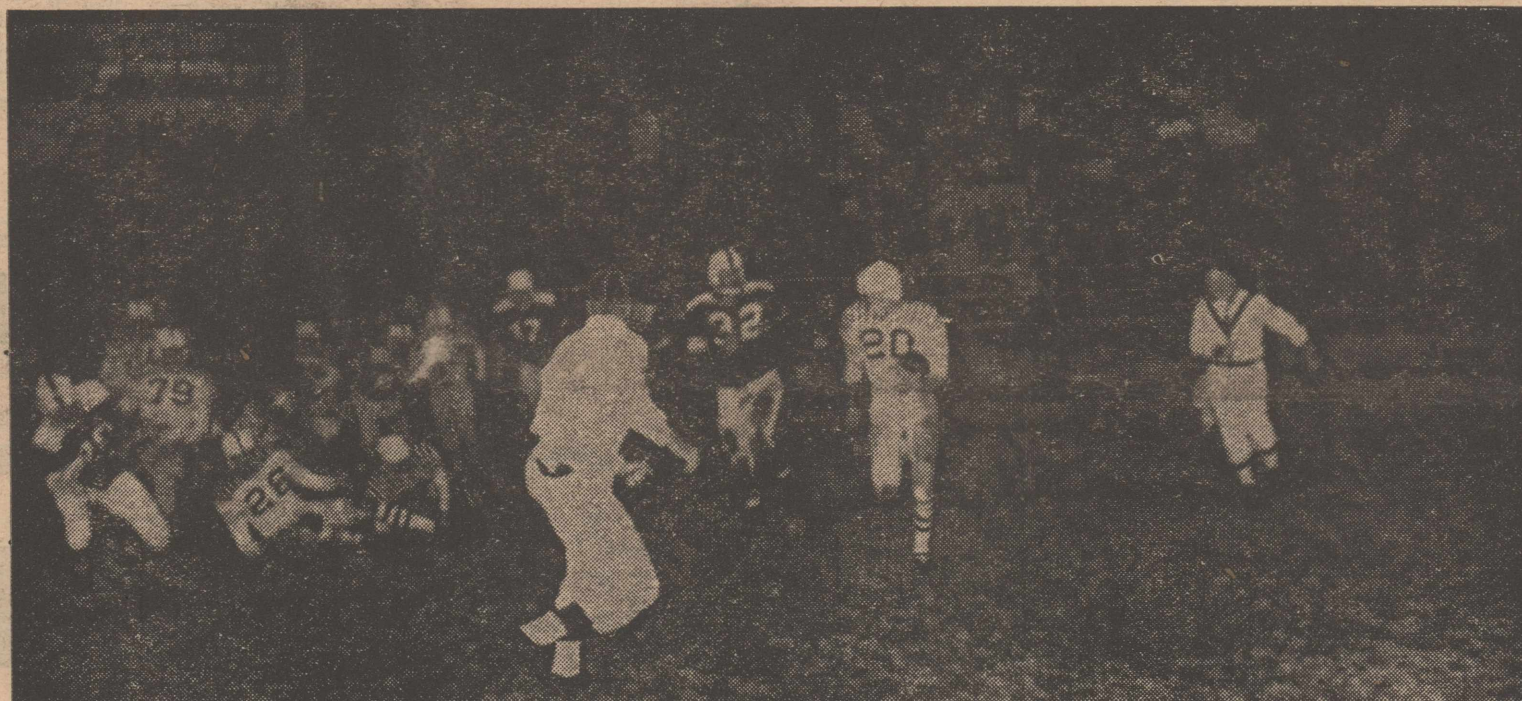
## Homemade Pie, Chili Will Be Served Nov. 8

## MUSTANGS STILL IN RUNNING

# Hosses Slosh To 13-7 Victory Over Hornets

Olton's surprising Mustangs slipped and skidded in the gooey muck of Tulia's Younger field to an upset 13-7 victory over the Hornets last Friday night.

A small, damp crowd sat un-

der gray dripping skies and saw the defensive battle of the mud which was played on a field transformed into a virtual quagmire by a week-long deluge of rain and light snow.

The slow moving contest was still scoreless at halftime after neither team could muster a serious scoring drive.

The offensive display began rolling immediately after intermission when a Tulia lineman, unidentifiable because of mud, fumbled Royce Bodkin's low bounding kickoff and Carson recovered for the locals at mid-field. Bodkin raced 35 yards to the 15, and on the third play, Fullback Jack Straw muddled over from the three to give the locals a 6-0 lead.

The hard charging "hosses" scored again after Tulia punted when James Hyatt passed to Don Edwards for 30 yards down to the Hornet 5. John Paul Jones rammed over on a fullback wedge play, and Arno Hall converted to give the Mustangs a comfortable 13-0 lead.

The Hornets registered their lone marker midway in the fourth period when they blocked a punt and Fullback Chris Ward powered over from the 5. Poage converted, and the remaining few minutes was a defensive stalmate. Final score: Olton 13, Tulia 7.

The Olton Mustangs journey to Dalhart this Friday to tangle with the speedy Dalhart Wolves. Dalhart boasts one of the fastest backfields in the state, and have lost two close district contests to powerful Muleshoe and Dimmitt.

Olton bested Tulia 13-7 last week, and the Mustangs are still very much in contention for the 1-AA crown.

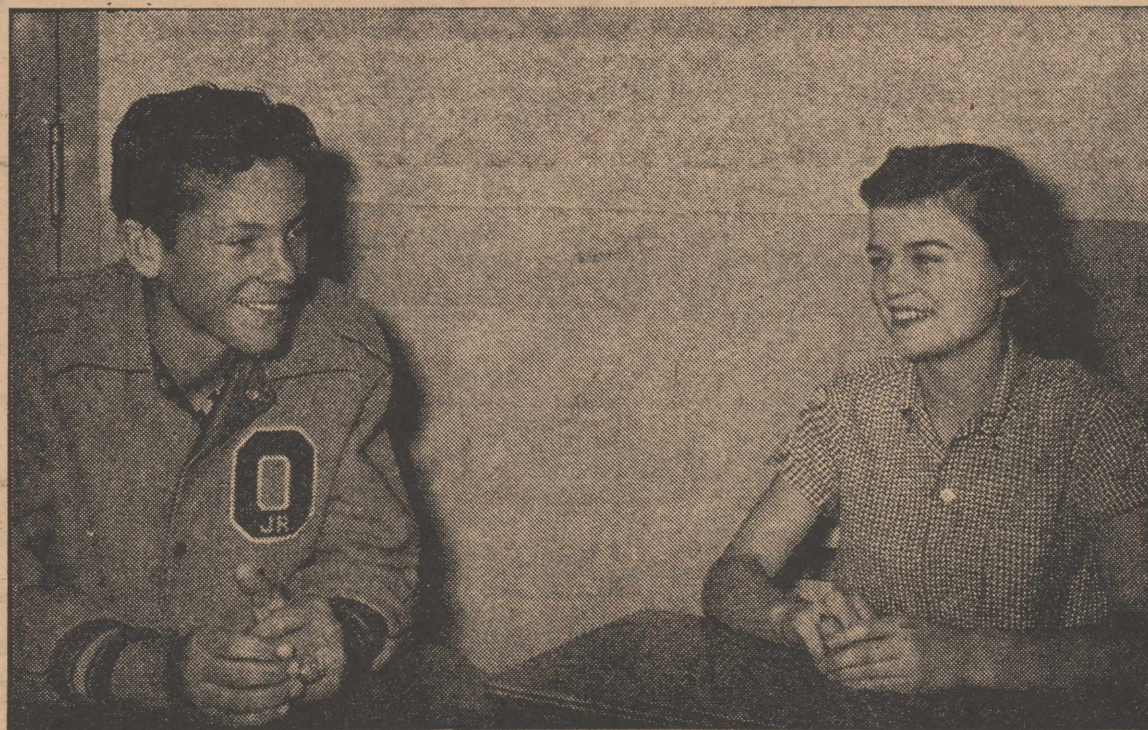

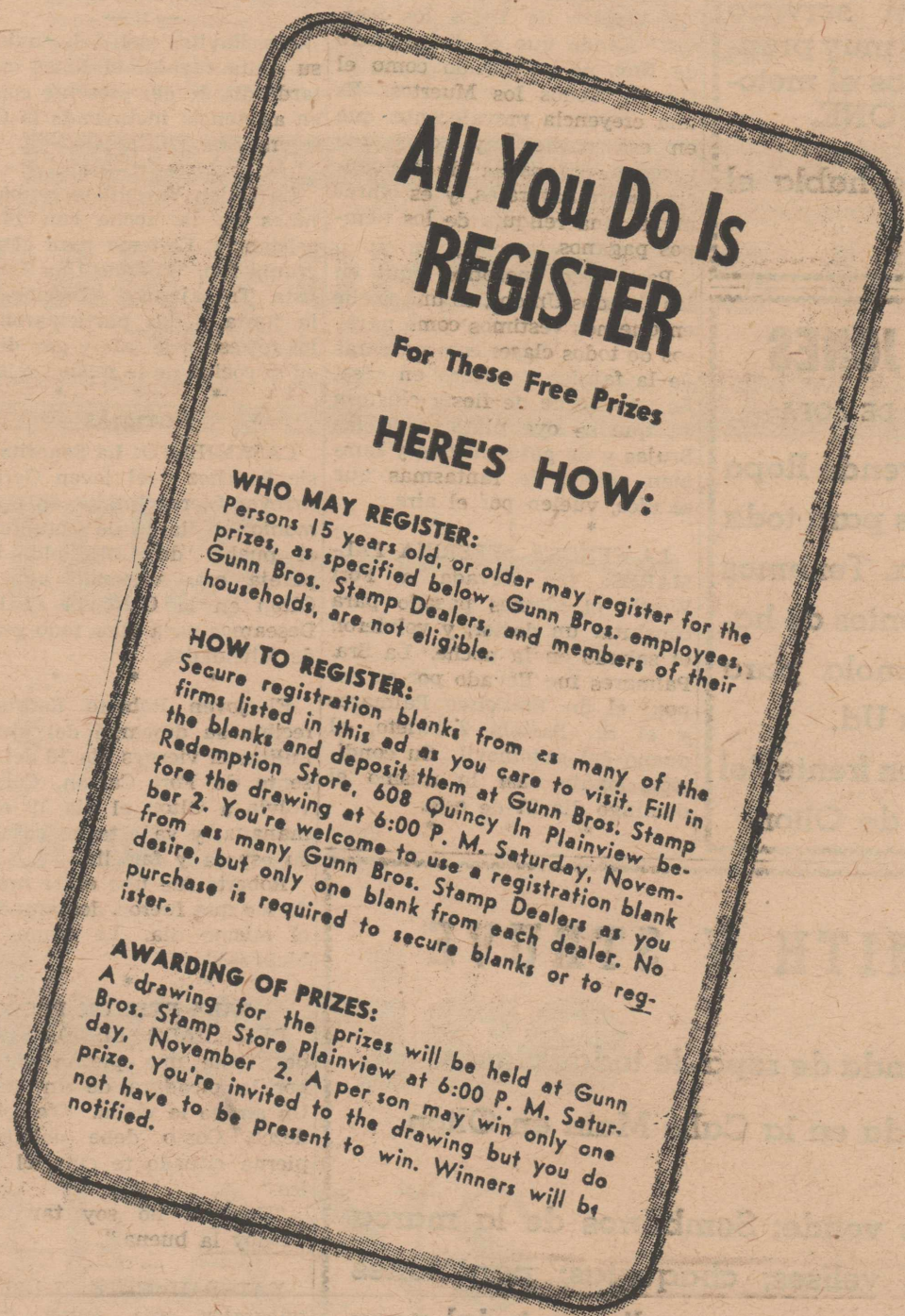

from a good home to become the most fabulous killer of the turbulent Reconstruction days? What about killing for self-defense? And when does a man fighting for what he believes to be right cease to be a hero and become a gunman?

In the foreword to the book Mr. Nurdyke says, "This book is not intended to vindicate or accuse, to defend or condemn any person, family, or group, but simply to tell the story of a high-mettled human being who lived, loved, and killed during the most turbulent era of the wild Texas frontier."

The story opens on a scene of quiet pastoral beauty near Smiley, Texas one September afternoon in 1871. The beauty of the setting contrasts with the ugliness of the next scene—a clash between John Wesley Hardin, a good-looking eighteen year old boy and an armed posse. And this sets the mood of the book.

For John Wesley Hardin has a good background. He is from a good pioneer family. His father was a devout Methodist preacher in the Dallas area. His very name contrasts with his character.

He was an alert, bright child with a desire to excel, but there was a certain stubbornness, a disdain for restraint ever present.

When Wes Hardin was fifteen, he killed in self-defense his first man, a negro. There were repercussions, and by the time he was eighteen, he had killed twenty-seven men.

The story moves at a swift pace taking you with Wes Hardin up the old Chisholm trail to Abilene. There are encounters with bad men, Indians, and a clash between Hardin and Wild Bill Hickock in Abilene.

Wes Hardin falls in love and marries a girl named Jane Bowen. Theirs is a tender love story edged in tragedy. Always they are haunted and hunted because of the past.

Finally Wes is captured in Alabama and brought back to Texas where he serves a fifteen year prison sentence.

But more heartbreak is in the cards for Wes Hardin near the end of his prison sentence and ever afterward.

Hart's Longhorns won their second district ball game last Friday night by a narrow margin of 7 to 6 from the fighting Whitharral Panthers.

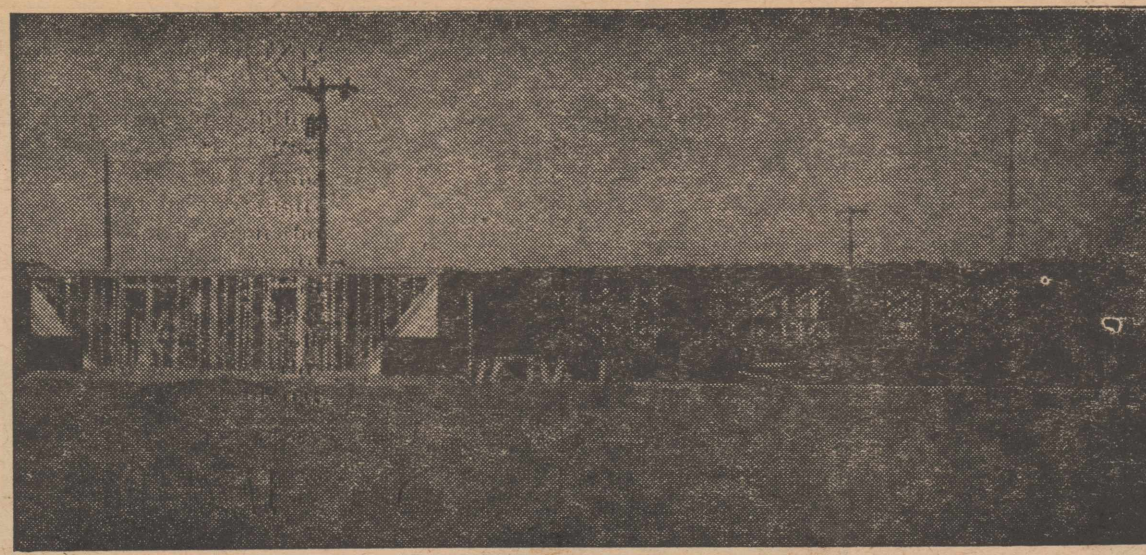

In 21 years, Tyson's football teams at Waco won 167 games, lost 30 and tied 9. They scored 6,883 points to 843 for their oppo-

nents. The master of precision, Tyson invented the spin play in 1927. He was the first of only three Texas high school coaches to win three state football championships straight.

He turned down several college jobs at the height of his career: Baylor, Texas Christian, Texas A & M, Rice, Texas Tech.

But in March, 1942, Tyson was fired.

He had only given 21 years to Waco High; had only sacrificed personally and financially to stay with the school he loved; had only produced three state winners and countless champ athletes; had only instilled devotion and a sense of fair play in the hearts of hundreds of school boys; had only led them to victories few schools ever realize.

And more.
