OLTON LINEMEN SHINE

DALHART WOLVES COME FROM BEHIND TO WIN 18 TO 13; THWART MUSTANGS DISTRICT HOPE

Favored Dalhart's blinding speed pulled the heretofore hard luck Wolves from the brink of defeat to a last minute 18-13 district win over the rugged Olton Mustangs at Dalhart last Friday.

A sparse crowd, expecting bitter cold, sat in unbelievable shirt sleeve weather and watched the two well-matched eleven's battle to a scoreless stalemate at halftime.

Dalhart's great halfback—Gary Finch—capped a 50 yard drive early in the third period by scoring from ten yards out to put the Wolves ahead, 6-0. Fullback Larry Heller strengthened the hosts hold midway in the third canto when he blasted over from two yards away. Score: Dalhart 12, Olton 0.

The always scrappy Mustangs rebounded with a 40 yard march spearheaded by the fine running of Arno Hall, Royce Bodkin and Ronnie Dennis. Olton's versatile

Jack Straw punched over from the five to score. The conversion missed, leaving the locals trailing 6-12. Dalhart fumbled Bodkin's low, screaming kickoff and the Ponies set up shop at mid-field. Straw put the hard charging Olton back in business with a bull-like scoring smash from the 9 to knot the count 12-12. John Paul Jones rammed over on a fullback wedge play to give Olton a 13-12 advantage.

But eager Dalhart, hungry for their first conference win after a glittering non-conference record, roared back with furious never-say-die determination to spring the talented Finch loose on a touchdown pass from the

County May Expect 200,000-Acre Cotton Allotment For Next Year

WEST TEXAS GROWERS PROTEST STATE COMMITTEE APPORTIONS

Lamb County can expect a cut of about 1 1/2 per cent in its cotton allotment for the year of 1958.

This unofficial information came this week from highly reliable sources which said the Lamb County allotment should be at least 200,000 acres.

County ASC officials said Lamb County's allotment had already been received but was rescinded when a group of West Texas cotton growers protested the method used in allotting acreage.

In the meantime ASC officials in Littlefield are "sweating out" a new allotment for Lamb County.

"That means that quotas should be in the hands of the farmers by the first week in December," he said.

Lamb County's allotment this year was 203,358 acres as compared to about 190,000 the previous year.

PCG Favors History

Plains Cotton Growers has been most vehement in protesting the state ASC committee's methods of determining county allotments. PCG says that under the proposed plan the state committee would hold in reserve some 400,000 acres for apportionment to counties for increases in small allotments, hardship cases and other adjustments.

It is the size of the reserve which is under fire. PCG and other West Texas growers say it is too much and would be discriminatory against West Texas cotton producers.

West Texas producers favor allotments based on history.

Mahon Protests

Rep. George Mahon of the 19th District said this week he was "greatly disturbed" over a proposal to change the method of determining cotton allotments in Texas which is now pending before officials of the Department of Agriculture.

Mahon said in a statement from California, where he is currently on an emergency inspection tour of the nation's missile program in his capacity as Chairman of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, that he had been alerted to the proposal about two weeks ago.

"I appealed over the telephone to US Department of Agriculture officials in Washington, to eliminate the proposals which would be discriminatory toward West Texas cotton growers," Mahon said. "I have wired officials in Washington and Texas once again, urging that the whole matter be carefully reviewed and that the history basis of allotment be followed. This would give West Texas its equitable share of cotton acreage allotments to the state."

Mahon explained the history basis, if followed by the State ASC Committee, would be helpful to West Texas by reason of the fact many East Texas farmers have not been planting their cotton acreage allotments.

"I had asked Washington officials to hold the acreage reserve figure for the 1958 crop year to 2 per cent and under no circumstances to allow it to be more than 3 per cent," Mahon said. The pending proposal would provide for a reserve of about 7 per cent and would "freeze" each county's 1958 allotment at not less than 98 1/2 per cent of the 1957 allotment.

"I shall continue to keep in close touch with the situation," Mahon said, "and I will do everything in my power to prevent West Texas cotton farmers from being saddled with such an unfair distribution of allotments for the 1958 crop. I would like to urge West Texas farmers and farm organizations to continue to make their views known to USDA officials, and I would be pleased to have the benefit of their views and suggestions at any time," Mahon said.

One unofficial source said Lamb County's cotton allotment almost certainly will not be reduced as a result of the protest and might conceivably be increased.

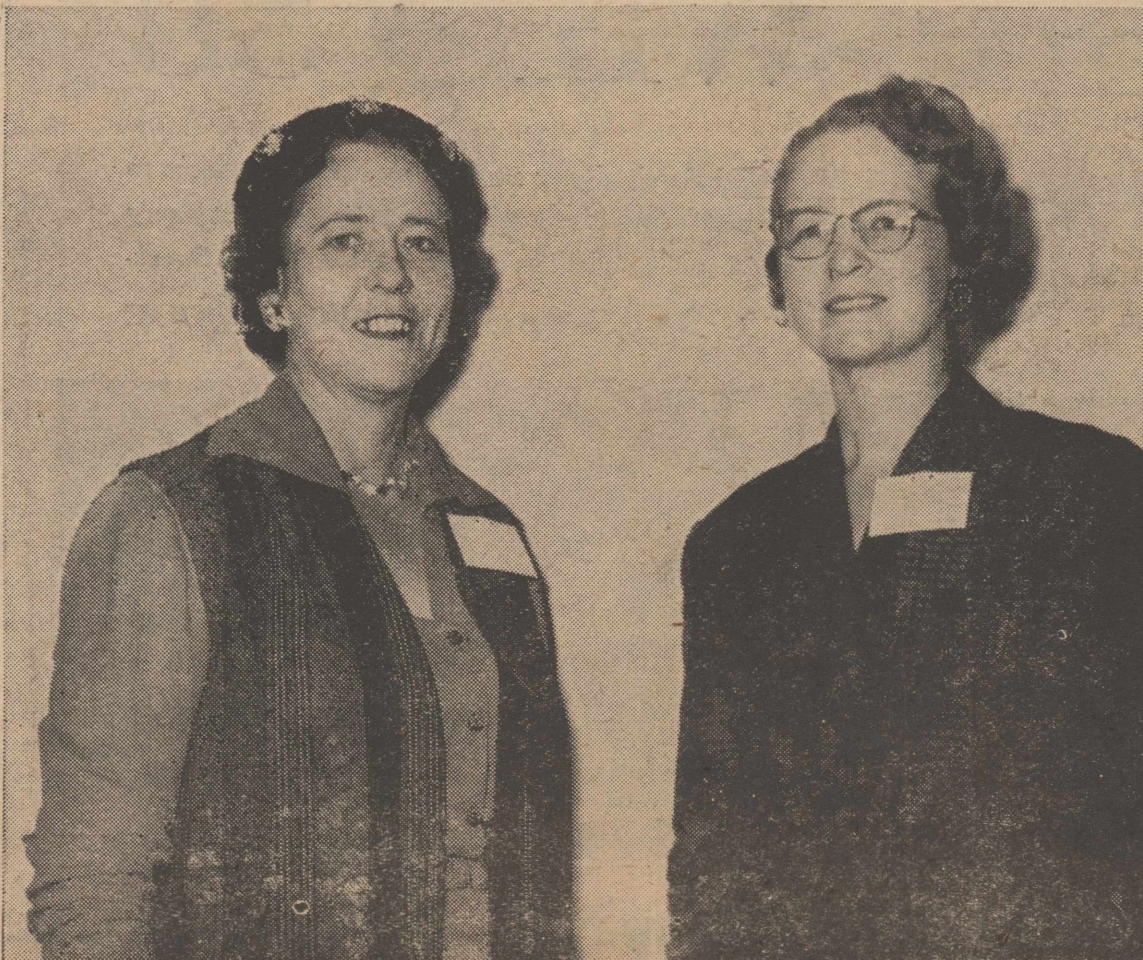

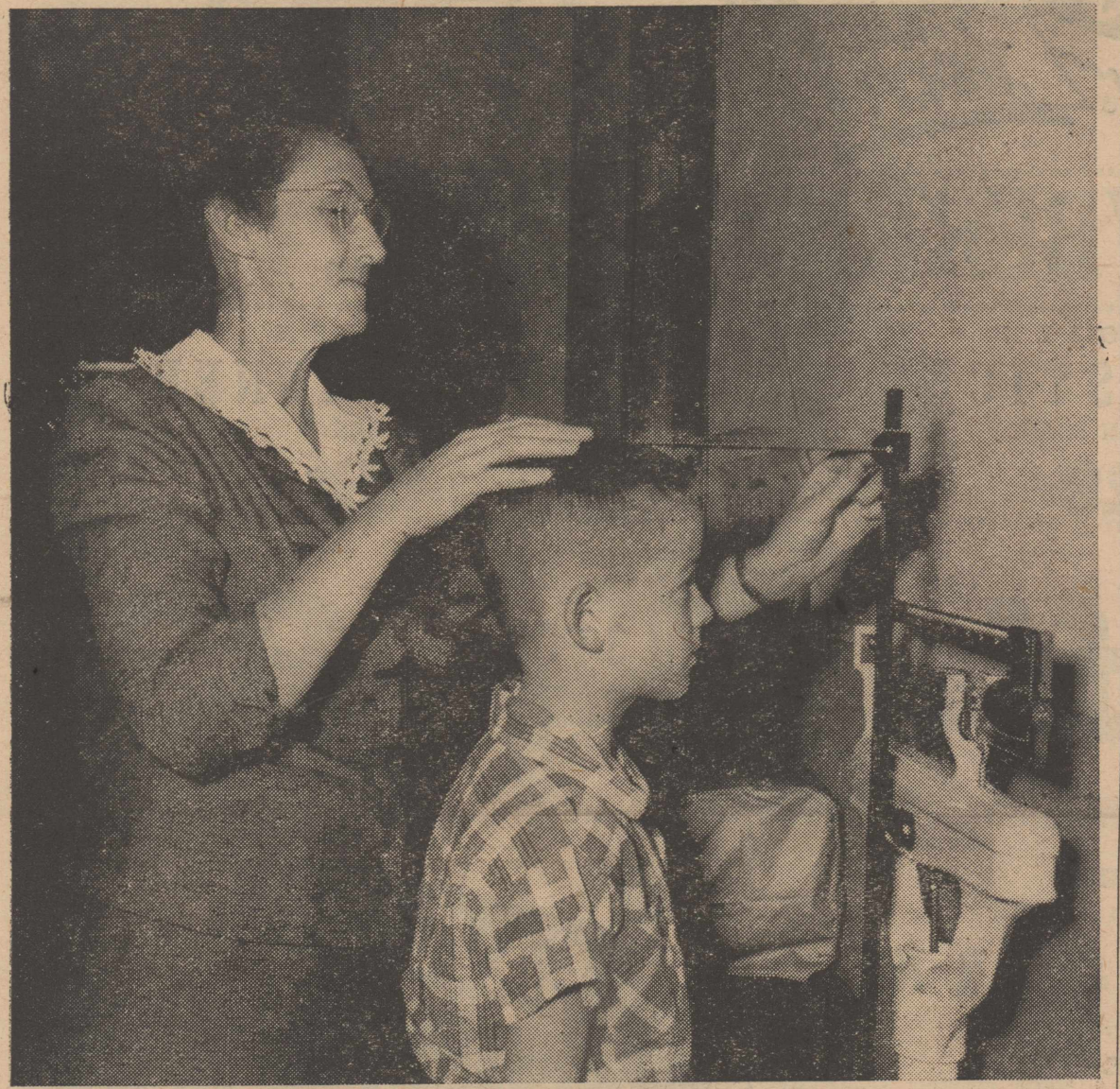

Colds, Minor Accidents, Dominate Symptoms of School Nurse Patients

"Colds and Fever" led the parade of symptoms of patients seen in the nursing office by School Nurse Miss Leta Bell during the month of October. "Minor Accidents" followed a close second.

Of the 240 pupils seen, Miss Bell chalked up an even half, 120, to colds and fevers. Splinters, toothaches, minor cuts, abrasions, sprains, minor burns, etc., accounted for 117. She sent home 45 pupils on account of illness.

In addition to these "emergencies," Miss Bell weighed and measured 390 students, gave dental inspections to 432, and made 20 home contacts.

These figures do not include the 96 pupils she received from Bohner Chapel School.

She is still in the process of completing the health records for the entire enrollment.

A national marketing quota of 11,920,290 bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross weight) and a national acreage allotment of 17,391,304 acres for the 1958 crop of upland cotton were proclaimed October 11, 1957, by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

In accordance with Section 302 of the Agricultural Act of 1956, the national acreage allotment for 1958 is the same as for the 1956 crop (as was the case also for the 1957 crop), and the national marketing quota has been set at the number of bales required to provide an acreage allotment of this size.

The Secretary also announced that a referendum on upland cotton marketing quotas will be held on Dec. 10, 1957. At least two-thirds of the upland cotton farmers voting in the referendum must approve marketing quotas if they are to be effective. A referendum on marketing quotas for the 1958 crop of extra long staple cotton will be held on the same date.

A national marketing quota and a national acreage allotment for upland cotton must be proclaimed for the following year if the Secretary finds that the total supply of upland cotton for the current marketing year exceeds the normal supply. The deadline for the proclamation is October 15.

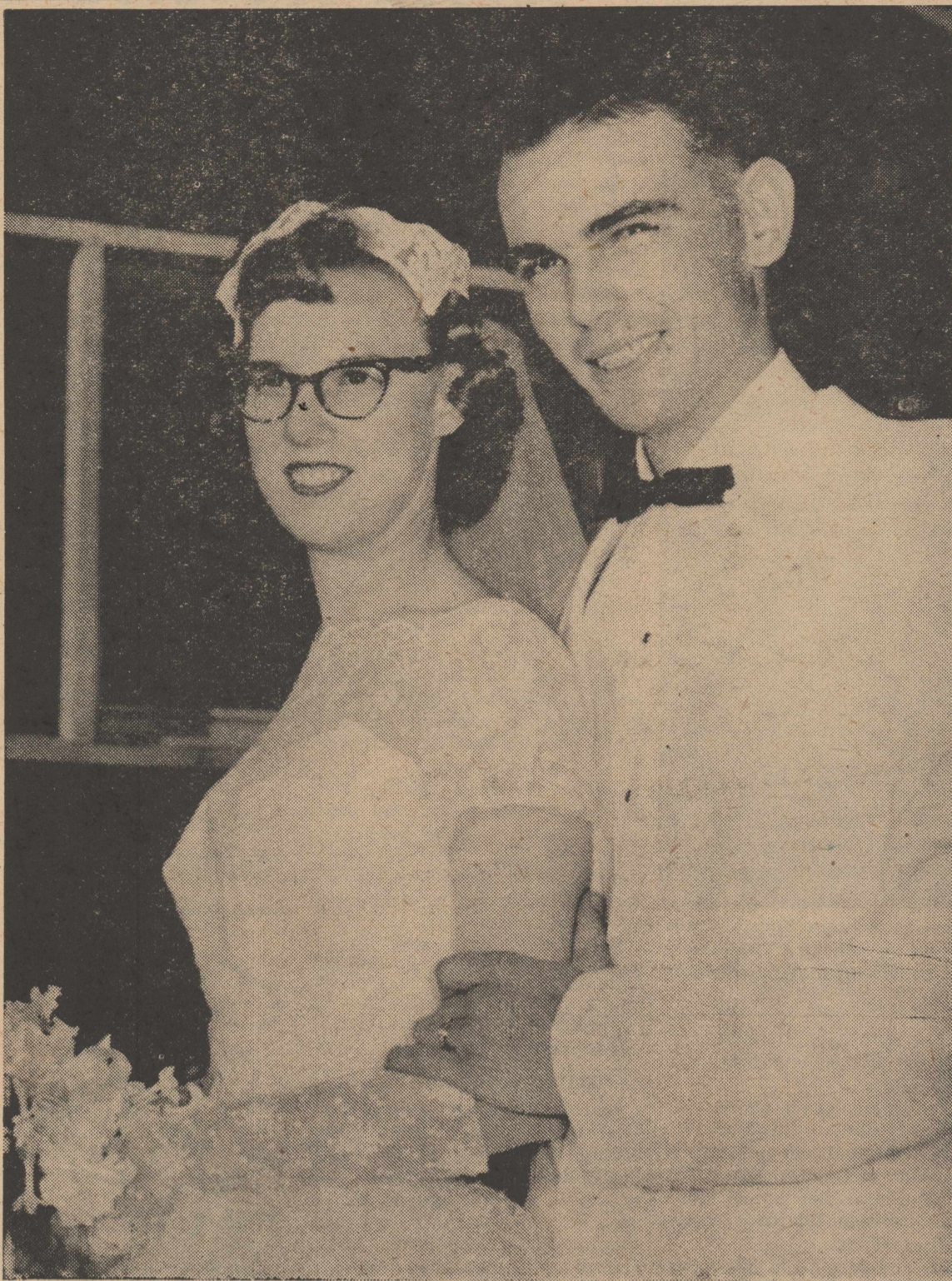

Ballot Light In Amendment Vote Tuesday

Olton voters approved all but one of three proposed state constitution amendments in light voting Tuesday.

Only 56 persons turned out in one of the lightest votes here in recent years. G. T. Sides was election judge.

Olton voted 27 for and 28 against a proposed amendment dealing with pensions for officers of the state government. It was the only amendment frowned upon by Olton voters.

The vote was 52 for and 3 against the amendment designed to make cost of living increases in pensions for the aged, the blind and dependent children. It would increase the maximum per person state payment for old-age assistance from \$20 to \$25 a month, with a provision that no payment in excess of \$21 be made without federal matching money.

Olton voted 37 for and 16 against the amendment to set up machinery for a \$200 million state water bond program.

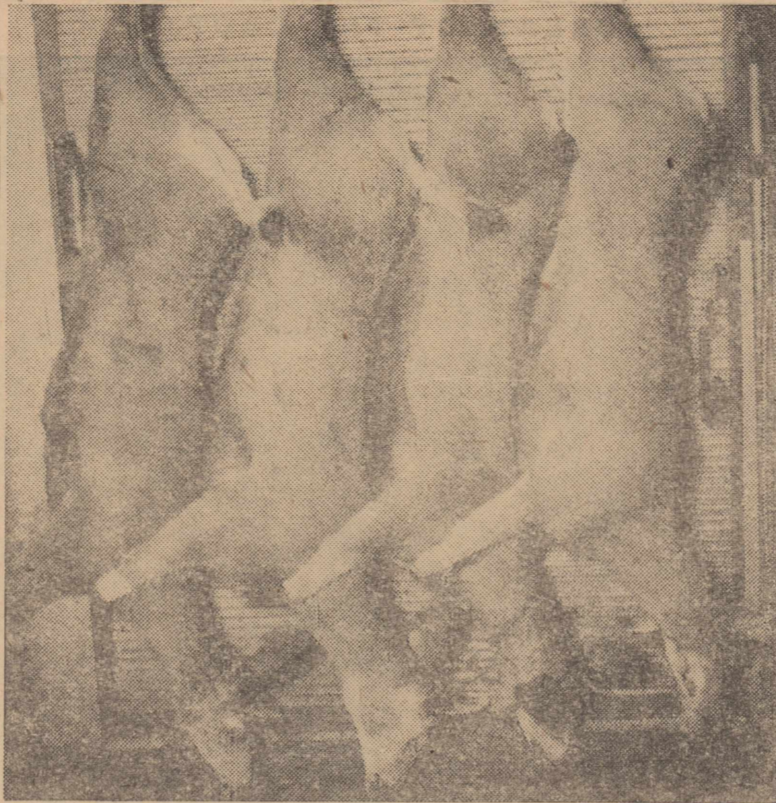

Research Data Data on the results of the research program will be sent to all investors in the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, Tex. Dr. Tom Longnecker, head of the station stated.

Since the Field Day in September, many inquiries have been received by members of the Regional Council and the Station staff regarding the availability of the results of the first year's research program.

All professional workers including county agents, soil con-

servations districts, vocational agricultural teachers, Texas Tech and Texas A & M Experiment Stations will also receive results. Research results will be released through the newspapers in the High Plains area.

Due to the fall rains, harvest has been delayed here as it has throughout the Plains area. Preparation of research data for release will take considerable time following the late harvest. The results will therefore probably not be available until early in 1958.

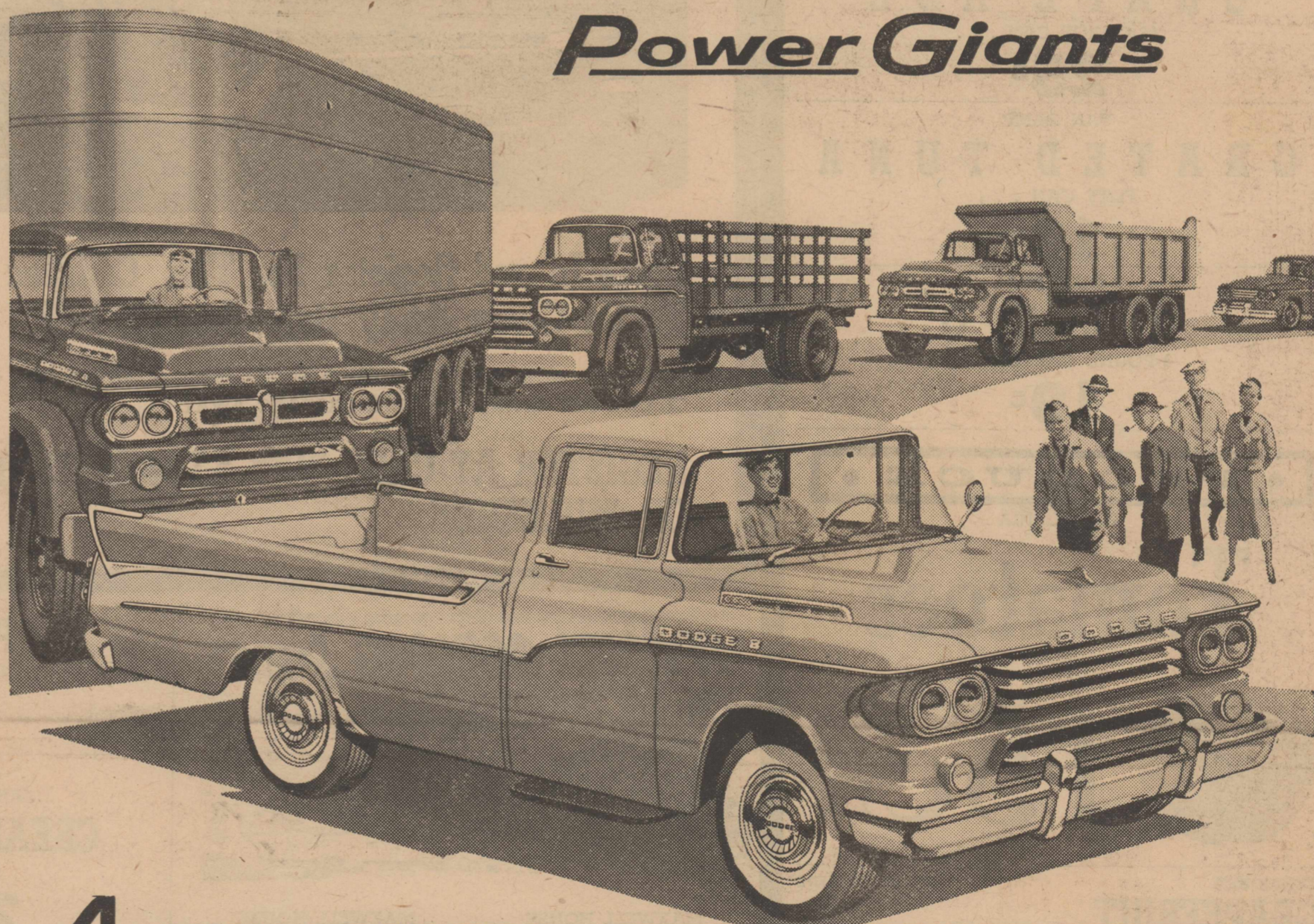

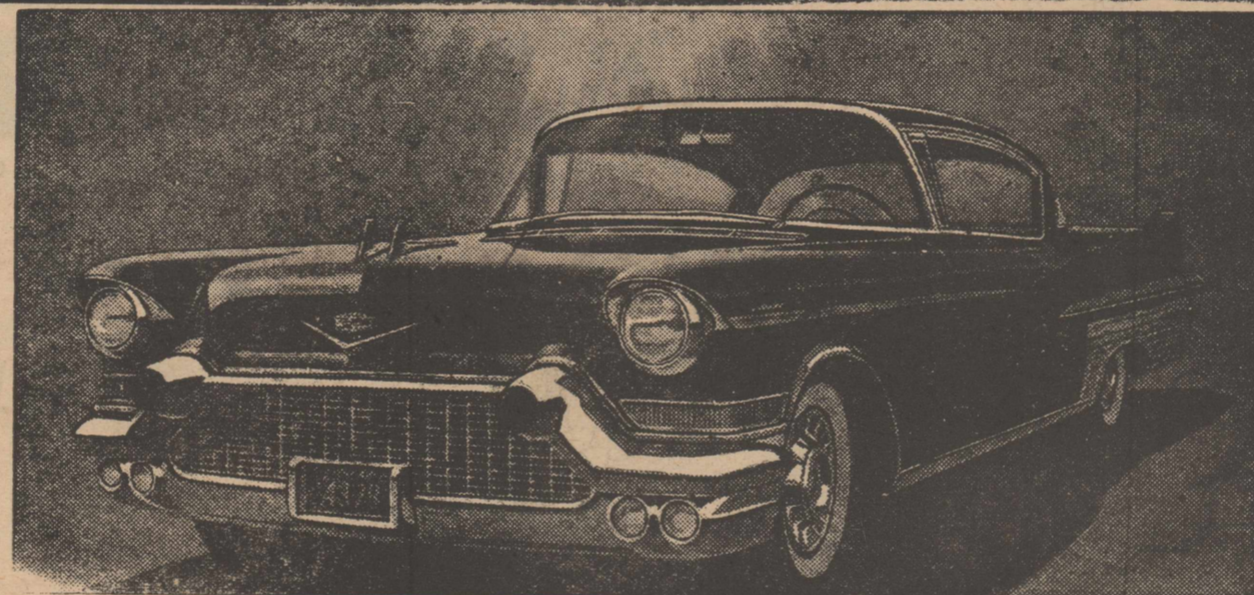
