Sleigh Bells Ring Monday In Olton Amid Parade, Music, Treats for Kids

Santa Claus is coming to town—and he won't be riding a helicopter or an airplane. He'll glide in on an old-fashioned sleigh.

Santa will lead the Christmas parade next Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock followed by a number of "music" floats, including the Mustang Band, a fire truck, and other floats. The itinerary calls for floats to assemble north of the school band hall. They will march downtown and come to a stop at the east side of the hospital.

Supt. Noel Johnson states that grades one, two and three will dismiss from classes to view the parade and participate in activities. They will be supervised by their teachers, and will return to school in time to leave on the school busses at 3:50 as usual.

Grades 4 through 12 will dismiss at the regular time.

Rev. Russell McAnally, program chairman, invites all churches and clubs to enter a float; the only requirement being that there are "singing persons" riding the float. Each entry will then present one song to a reviewing stand on the square, after which Duward Price will lead all groups in Carol singing.

Santa will personally help distribute treats to children at the end of the music program. Assignments will then be made to each float for serenading shut-ins in Olton.

By noon Wednesday, floats had been entered by the Cumberland Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist, Mexican Baptist, and Nazarene Churches and Bohner School.

V. L. Smith, parade marshal, explains that contributions are being accepted for the bags of treats to be given away. Donations may be mailed to The Enterprise, or may be left at Cash Way, Botkin, Galloway, Gray or Sherman groceries.

Finish UF Drive Next Tuesday

Reports from Olton's United Fund drive staged Tuesday were incomplete after a number of solicitors "detoured" from their contacts to assist other Olton firemen at Farmers Gin.

However, J. W. "Jay" Brown Wednesday stated that "it was looking good."

Efforts in the rural area outlying Olton will be concentrated next Tuesday, and the complete Olton campaign is scheduled to wind up by Wednesday morning.

The United Fund is a "contribute-once-for-four-groups" method, endorsed by the Girl Scouts, Red Cross, Boy Scouts and Salvation Army. Donations are accepted in cash, or in pledges, and even allow for monthly installments during the year 1958.

Olton's goal, assigned through the Lamb County set-up, is \$4200. Workers will begin Tuesday following a kick-off breakfast.

\$8,000 Fire Hits Gin Tuesday

Fire which broke out in a raging sand storm did an estimated \$8,000 in damage at Farmers Gin Tuesday morning.

Olton volunteer firemen were credited with keeping the fire from spreading over the entire plant after it gutted the gin's seed house.

The seed house contained about 25 tons of seed, according to Laus Hair who operates the gin along with C. S. "Shorty" Silcott.

Olton firemen have battled three gin fires to date this season. "I don't think we've lost 1,000 pounds of seed cotton," declared Chief Tom Smith.

The fire at Farmers Gin Tuesday spread to some 25 bales of cotton. Firemen and volunteer workers quickly brought the cotton fires under control.

Firemen stood by until 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The fire had started about 9:30 o'clock in the morning.

Plainview firemen sped to Olton with a fire truck after a rumor there said the entire downtown section of Olton was ablaze. Operating the Plainview truck were Arvil Hawkins and Billy Sanders.

DON KIDD SHOT IN ACCIDENT

Don Kidd, 17 years old, Olton High School student, was shot accidentally early Wednesday afternoon at the Kidd home 3 1/2 miles west of Hart.

The .22 caliber pellet entered the youth's body on the right side and made exit through the right back after striking a rib.

Relatives credited deflection of the bullet by the rib with saving Don's life. "It just missed his liver by an eighth of an inch," declared the boy's father, George.

The accident occurred about 1 o'clock. Don was getting his coat from a closet at his home when the .22 caliber gun fell and discharged.

The boy is being treated at Olton Memorial Hospital. Attendants described his condition as good early Thursday.

HIGHWAY 70 MIGHT BY-PASS OLTON, DEPARTMENT WARNS

Chamber of Commerce members have pledged \$7,608 in financial support annually—only \$792 short of the \$8,400 set at the outset of the campaign to reorganize.

This announcement came this week from Chamber President Don Williams following a regular meeting of the organization's board of directors.

Mr. Williams said the Chamber is slated to go into active operation January 1.

He said four applications for the post of full-time manager of the Chamber already have been received and are being studied by the screening committee appointed for that purpose. On that committee are Bill Kelley, Major James and Bob Duncan.

Mr. Williams said several people have announced intention to join the Chamber at a later date and prospects are good for going over the top by mid-January.

Plans already are being made for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet to be staged the latter part of next month.

Ralph Glover, head of the highway committee, said a study of the possibility of obtaining right of way for widening of Highway 70 through Olton already is being made.

He said the highway department has already indicated that when the state is ready to widen the highway it will simply by-pass Olton with 70 if the right of way is not forthcoming.

In the meantime, Mr. Williams pointed out that the Chamber will be in an organizational period until January 1.

"A lot of people have wondered why we have not been actively participating in such projects as the Christmas program this year," Mr. Williams declared. "The answer simply is that we have not yet become active and will not until January 1. When we do become active, then we certainly will take the lead in such projects."

Hart Bank To Open Saturday

Farmers State Bank at Hart will officially open for business Saturday when it will be presented the charter it was granted September 5.

The bank is set up for \$75,000 capital, \$25,000 surplus and \$25,000 undivided profits.

Delegates from Olton to the two-day state confab were Mr. and Mrs. Bodkin, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Nafzger and H. G. Walker. Royce Bodkin, OHS student, reported on junior Farmers Union activities throughout Texas with special emphasis on the educational values of the program.

During the two-day meeting, delegates heard Senators Ralph Yarborough and Lyndon Johnson discuss farm and international problems; elected new officers, voted on a six-point program for improving farm income and met in committees which studied farm problems.

At the Saturday session delegates adopted a six-point program for the preservation of the family farm, including:

1. Stronger bargaining power for farmers.
2. Farm income improvement through legislation.
3. A parity income plan for cotton, wheat, forage crops, dairy products, and beef cattle which would assure farmers a fair return for labor and investment.
4. Continued strong support of the REA.
5. An expanded national economy and opposition of the "tight money" policy.
6. A recommendation for "immediate dismissal of the present Secretary of Agriculture and his replacement with a competent and friendly Secretary."

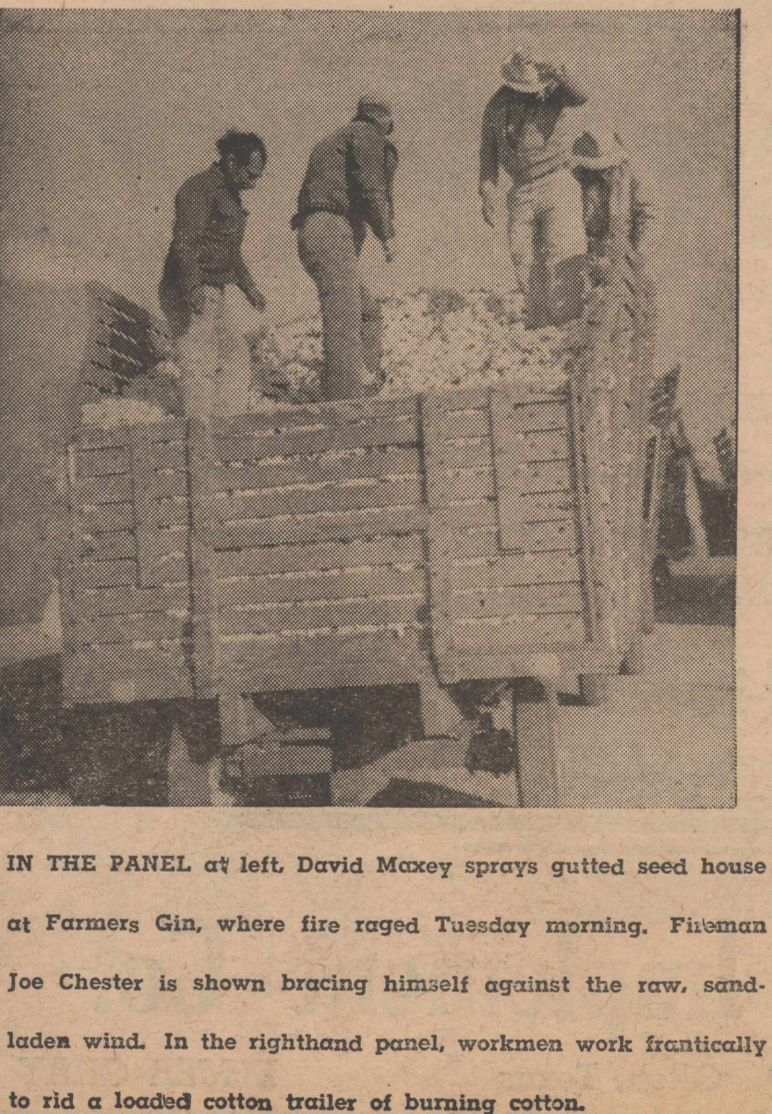
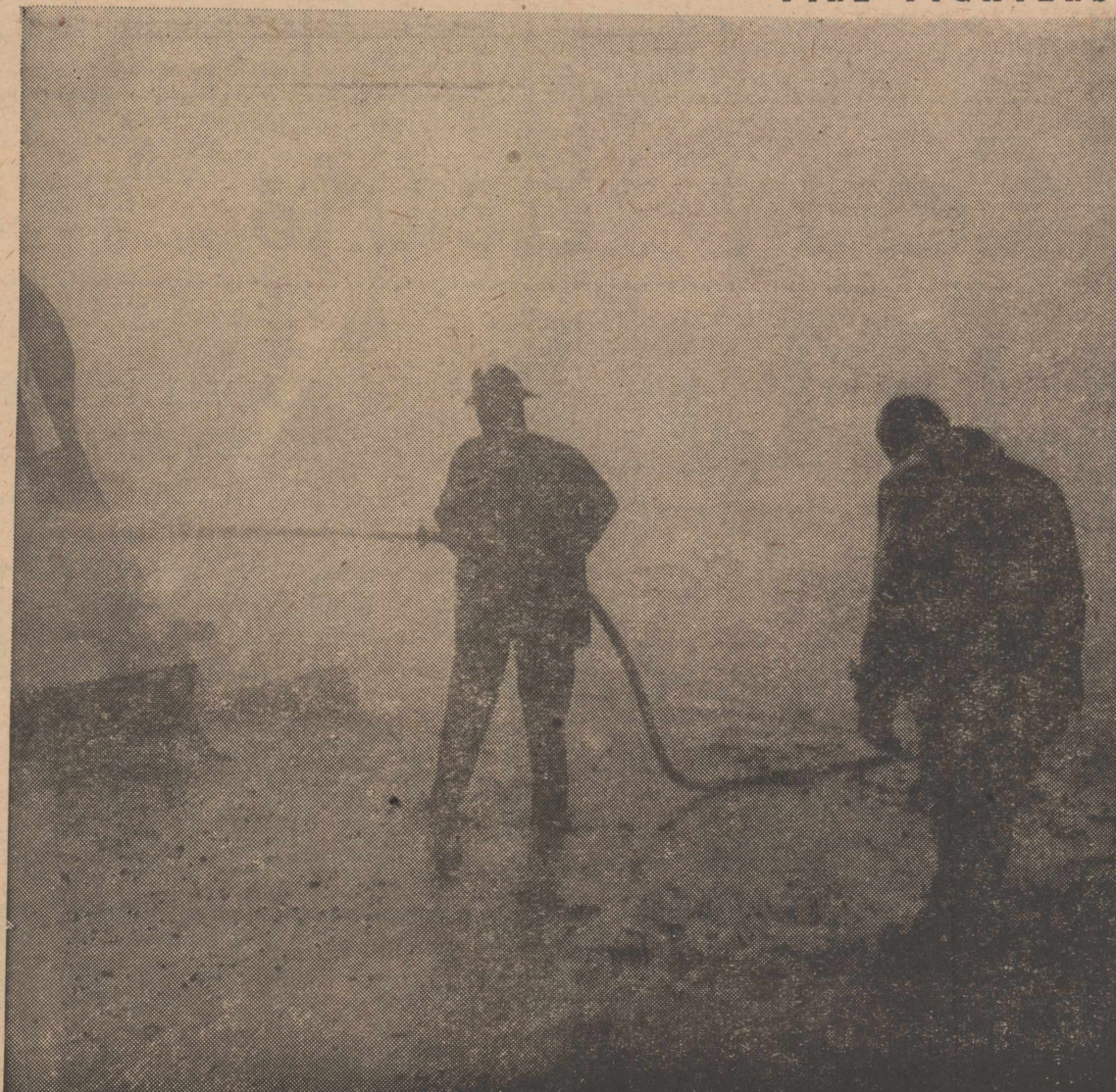
Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in Monroe. Mr. and Mrs. Traylor attended the funeral.

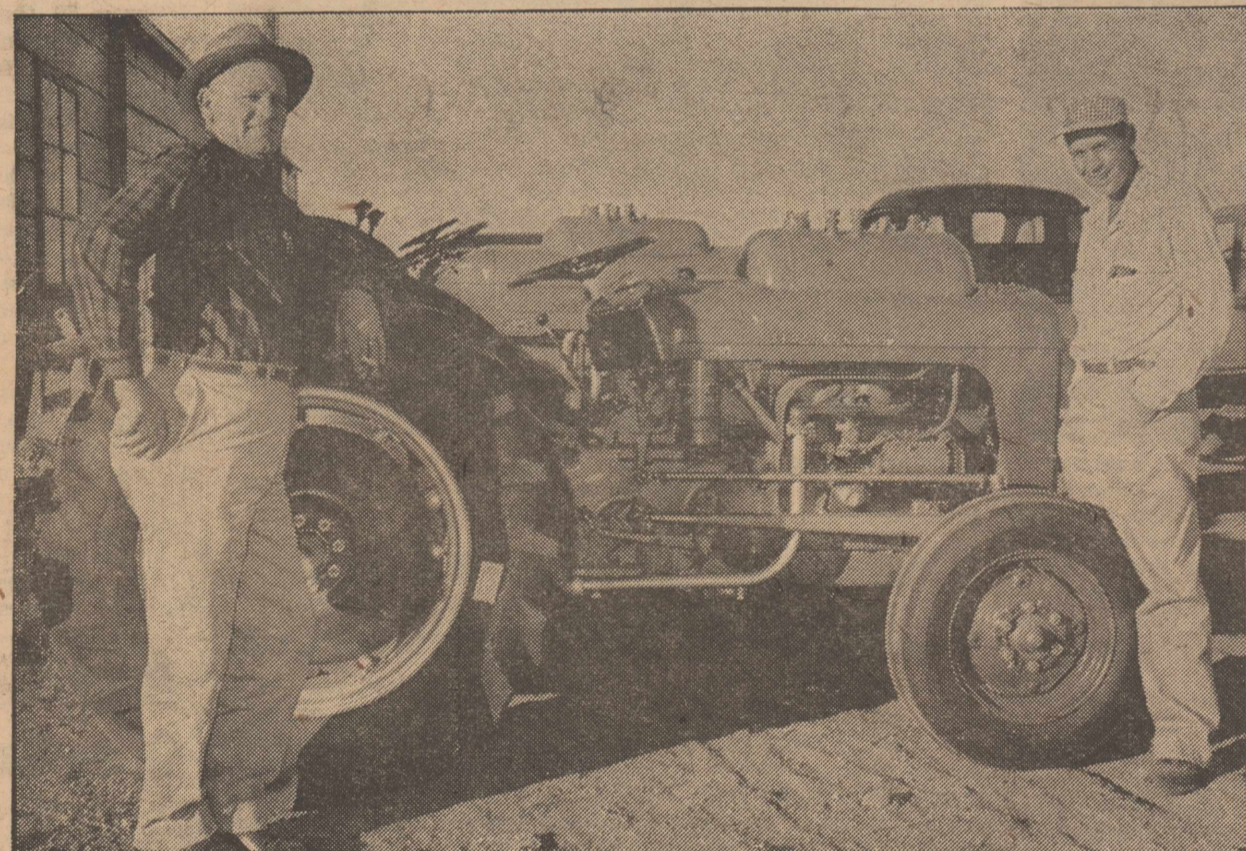

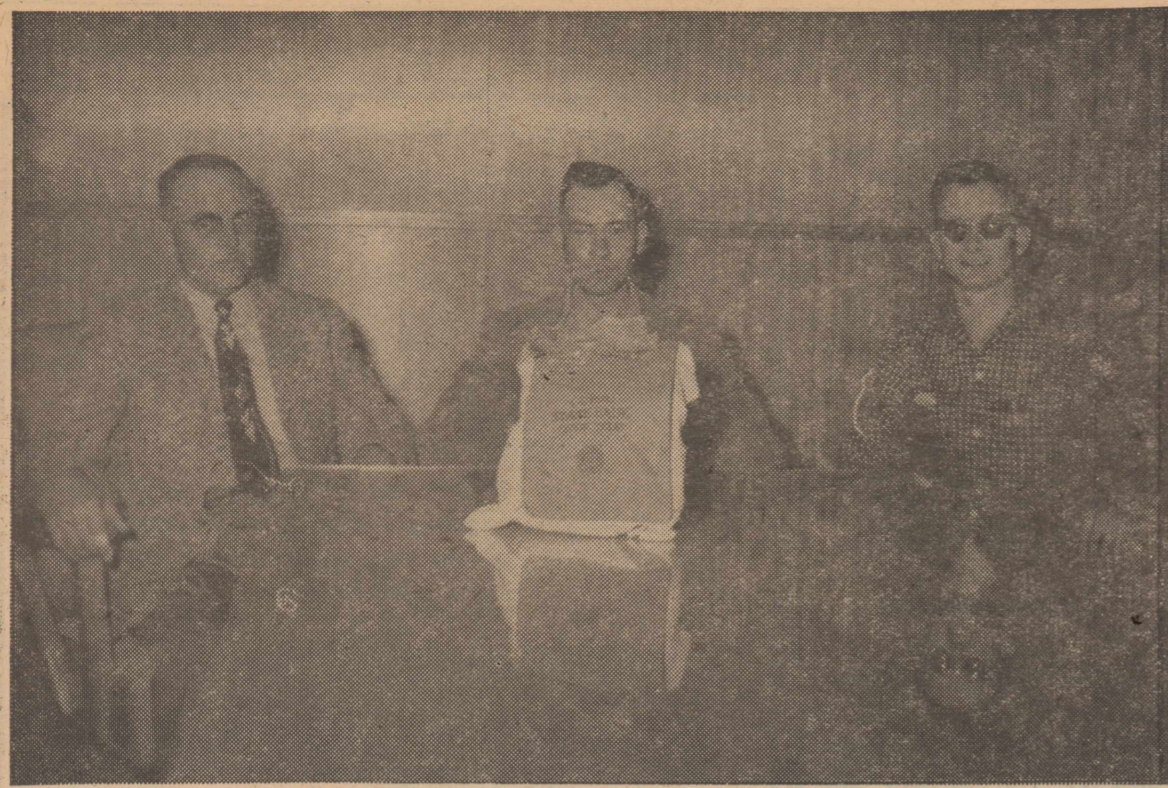

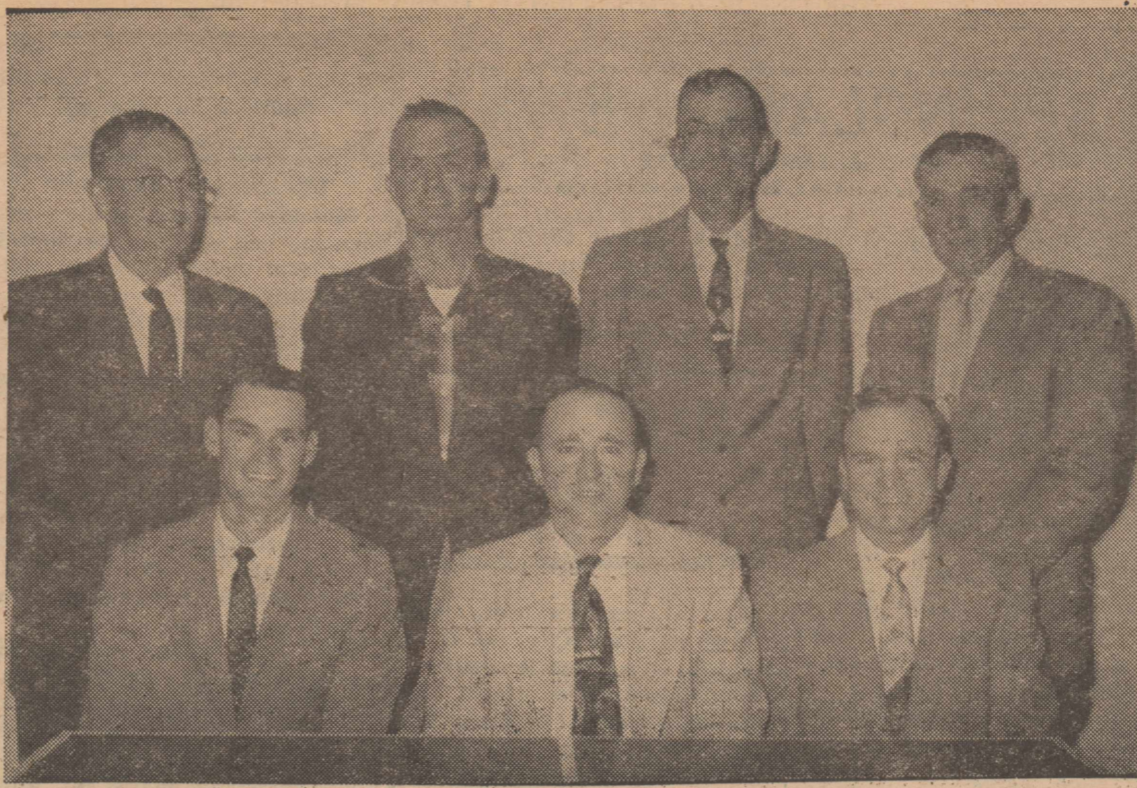

HOLT REPEATS MAIL ADVICE

"The time has passed to talk

about mailing early for Christmas," Postmaster I. B. Holt said yesterday, but he added that "our local patrons still can help us avoid a last-minute pile-up of Christmas mail by sending

the rest of their packages and cards now."

The postmaster said the mail volume this year, no doubt, will break last year's all-time Christmas record. He expects to keep local mail moving without serious difficulty, but explained that many large transportation terminals will be swamped with mail that will exceed their physical capacity in the last days before Christmas.

To avoid any such congestion, he urged that all out-of-town mail be placed in the post office this week-end so that it will be assured of delivery next week—the last week before Christmas.

Books on Parade

by mardema ogletree

The Year Without A Santa Claus by Phyllis Mc Ginley, Lippincott, \$3.00.

This is truly the year for Phyllis McGinley's new book for children, "The Year Without A Santa Claus" with delightful illustrations by Kurt Werth.

It seems that Santa Claus decided to take a holiday; he was just "worn-out." By means of cleverly written verse Phyllis McGinley describes the resulting chaos in the world of children.

But along comes our hero, one Ignatius Thistlewhite, a boy from Texas who saves the day.

His startling plan to send presents to poor tired Santa completely captures the whole spirit of Christmas. Phyllis McGinley likes to think her book has deep philosophical undertones and will delight older children as well as youngsters.

Incidentally, plans are underway to dramatize the story on television about Christmas time with a big name star in the role of Santa.

The Reluctant Empire, George Fuermann, Doubleday, \$4.00

This book is an unusual factual treatment of Texas—Urban Texas, Rural Texas, and Mythical Texas.

And by treatment I mean just that. The book tells what ails us and spares no one in diagnosing some of our problems—political, economic, and moral.

The author, George Fuermann, a staff member of the Houston Post, calls his book, the mind of Texas today.

And if I know people and their reactions, I fear Mr. Fuermann will not be held very deep in the heart of some of his fellow Texans who read the book. (Our part of the State comes into the limelight on several issues—including the firing of the Tech professors.)

For his book is amazingly frank. But if you are truly mature in your thinking, you'll enjoy the book and gain perspective from an unbiased reading of it. Mr. Fuermann has been influenced in his style of writing by our grand old man of letters, Frank Dobie.

And I was especially delighted with the chapter on our cultural IQ, entitled "What Rogues and Peasant Slaves." You probably won't like part of it, but you'll have to admit it is true.

Fuermann reminds us that it was one of our first colonists, Stephen F. Austin, who said that "The cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy." Fuermann says that the cultivated mind atrophied in the heat of growing materialism. A note of hope (culturally speaking) for urban Texas is introduced, however.

Our author's method of extinguishing the myths about Texas seems to me about as effective as throwing fat in the fire to put it out.

But it is a lot of fun to read, and who cares whether the fire is put out as long as you can get as many heartwarming laughs as I did in the chapter on The Texas Neurosis.

And may I share with you this poem from the book.

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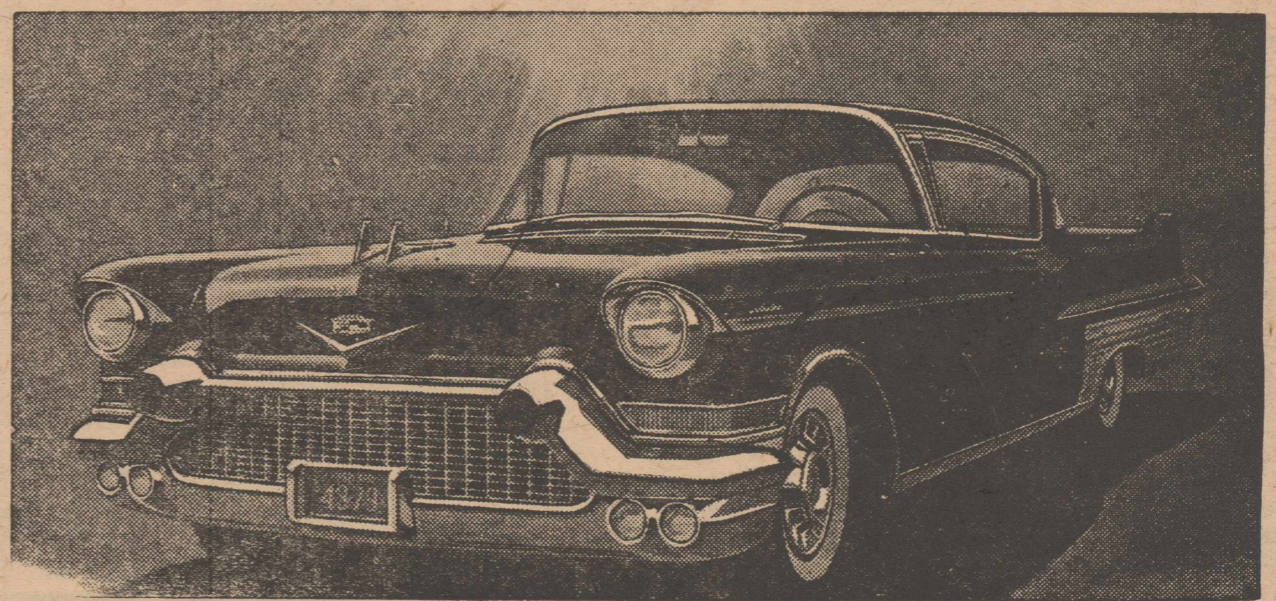
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


