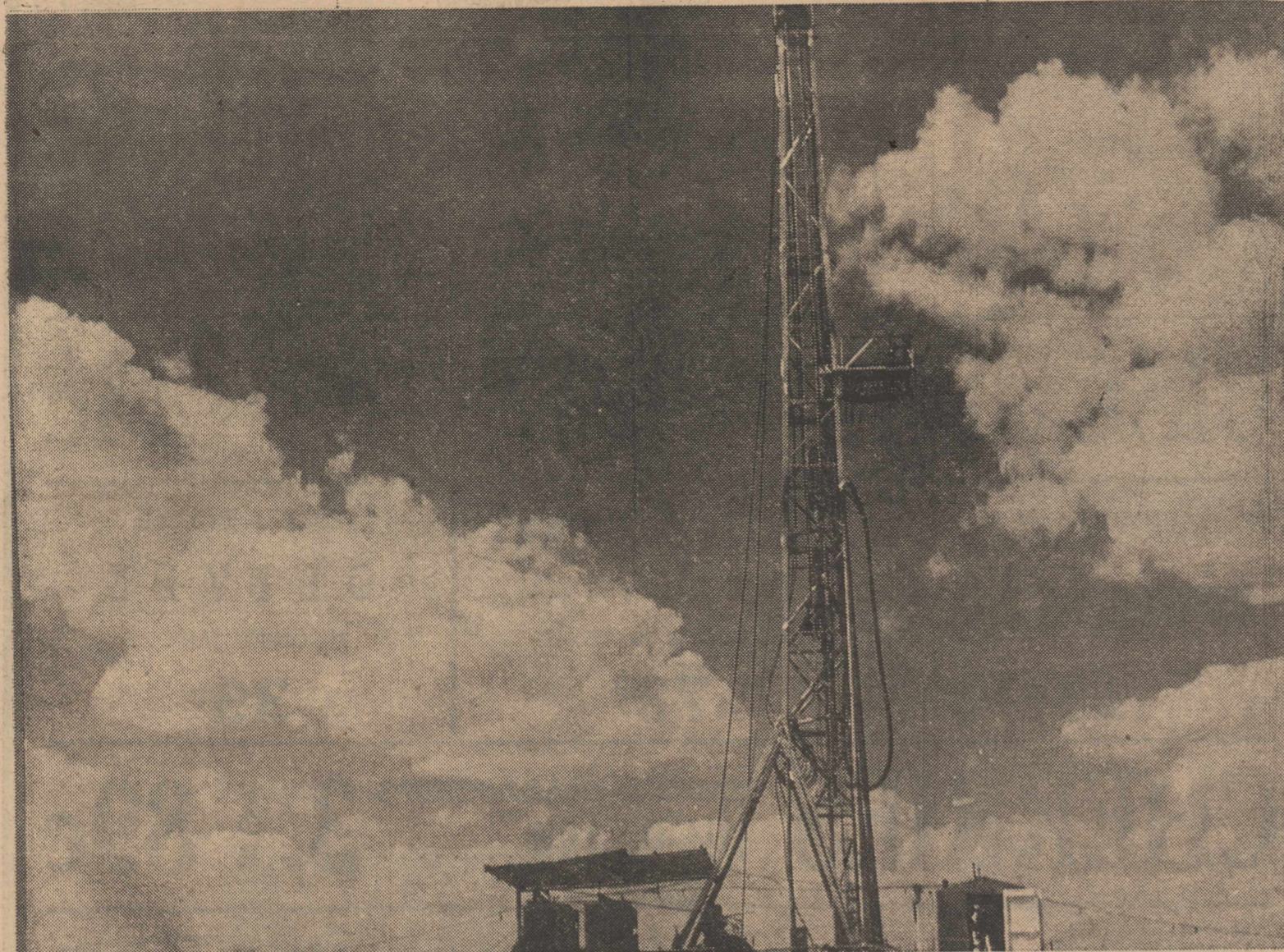

Full Scale Report On Tap From Advisory Committee

Five Groups To Study Varied School Requirements Here Tomorrow Nite

Olton school board Friday night will hear a full-scale report from a 25-person advisory committee organized in May to study school needs.

Five sub-committees have been working quietly on the project. This will be the first full-scale report of the committee as a whole.

The report will be given at 8:15 o'clock before a special session of the board of trustees.

Much has happened since the organizational meeting of the advisory committee in May. An event which greatly affected the school system was the death by heart attack of School Supt. Carl Macon. Mr. Macon died only a few days after that organizational meeting.

Noel Johnson of Abernathy was chosen by the school board to fill the post of school superintendent.

Since it was organized the group has held one general meeting and a number of group meetings.

Assigned task of the committee was to study the current problems and future needs of the school community.

Heading the group is Mrs. H. B. Carson who was chosen by vote to hold the office of general chairman. Mrs. R. V. Allcorn was named secretary.

Serving on the Curriculum committee are Mrs. Robert Duncan, chairman, Mrs. R. V. Allcorn, Mrs. Vernon Bostick, Mrs. Wayne Hair, and Mrs. Calvin Graham. The Building and Facilities committee is composed of Joe Miller, chairman, Winston Blevy, Mrs. Earl McClain, Mrs. Tom Witten and Mrs. Merrill Brigrance.

Enrollment committee consists of Mrs. Paul Burrus, chairman, Mrs. L. B. Cowart, Mrs. Glen Exter, Mrs. L. A. Smith, and Mrs. H. B. Carson. On the committee to study Projected Needs are Ed Thompson, chairman, Hob Thomas, Joe Hysinger, Blanton Martin and Howard Hall.

Financial Resources was to be investigated by Elmer McGill, chairman, Cleo Smith, Tom Smith, Lynn Fite and John Moses.

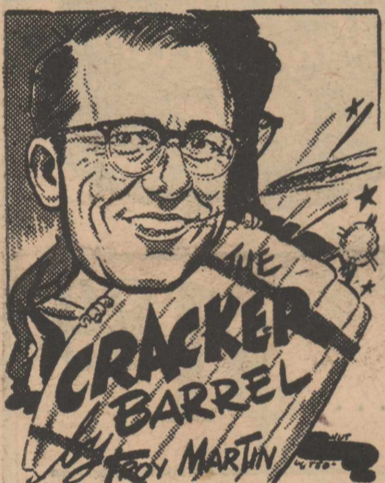
the protection of a jury. The judge may not like your political leanings and you might even be denied the right to have an attorney. IT'S A LOT LATER THAN YOU THINK!

We're not laying all our troubles at the door of the GOP and Eisenhower. The trend toward our loss of freedom started 25 years ago under a Democratic President.

We can't pass on without having something to say about the mess at Texas Tech. The Shivers regime is still with us. The man in the vortex of the trouble apparently is J. Evetts Haley, a Shivers appointee to the Tech board of directors.

Trouble seems to gravitate to Mr. Haley. His tenure since appointment, according to Lubbock sources, has been marked with strife at the South Plains educational institution. The latest trouble came with the dismissal of three Tech professors.


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News of Interest To Women

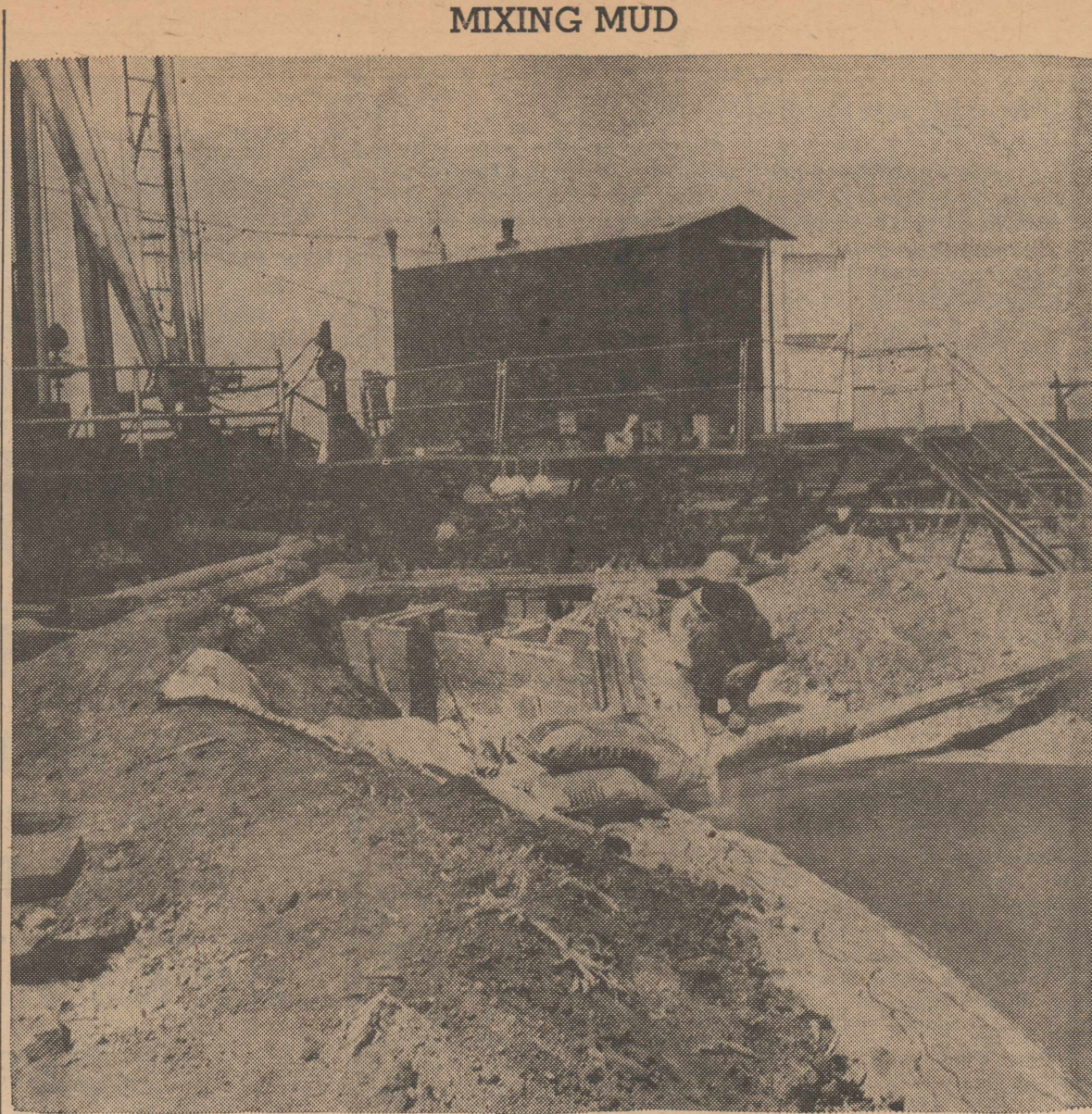

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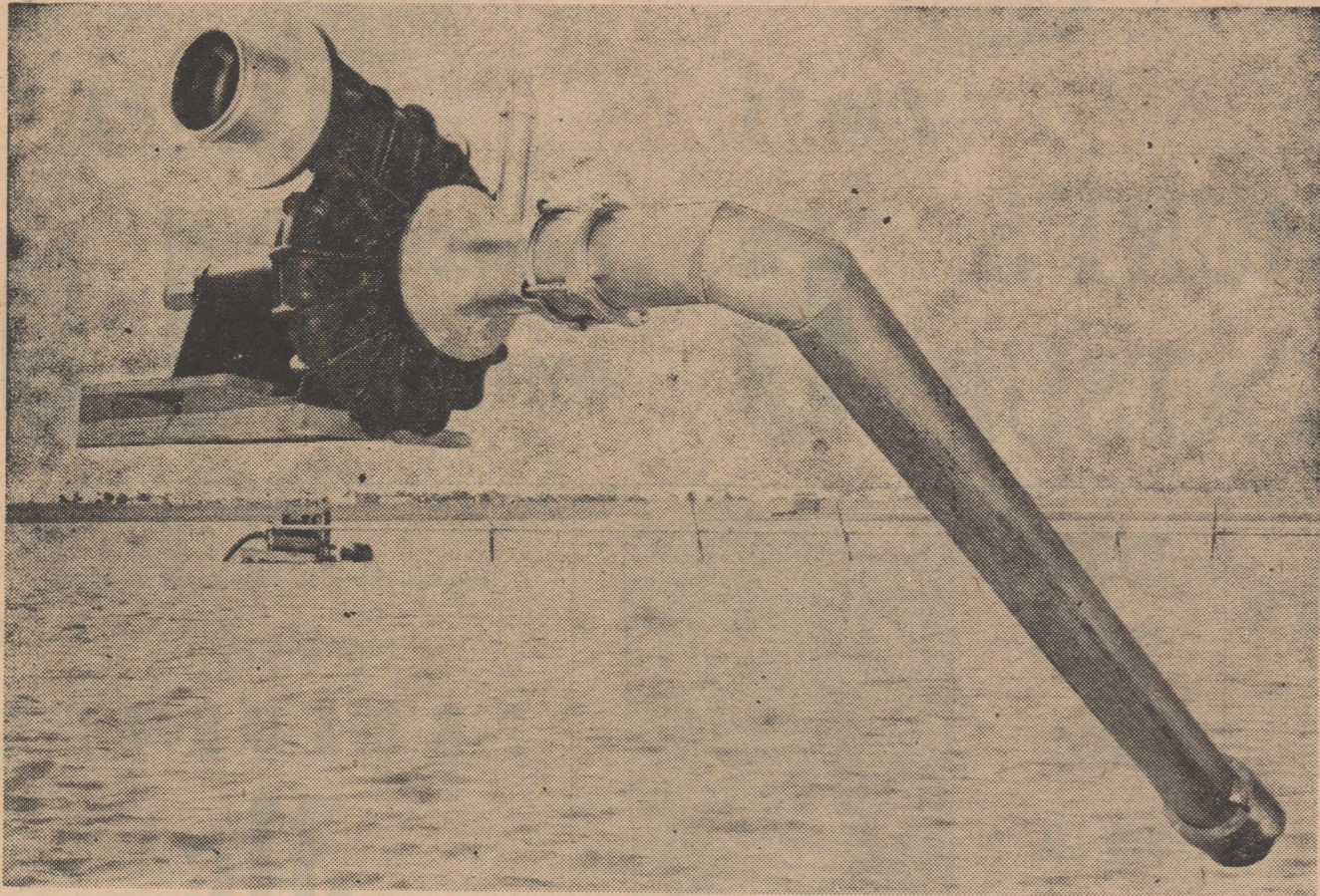


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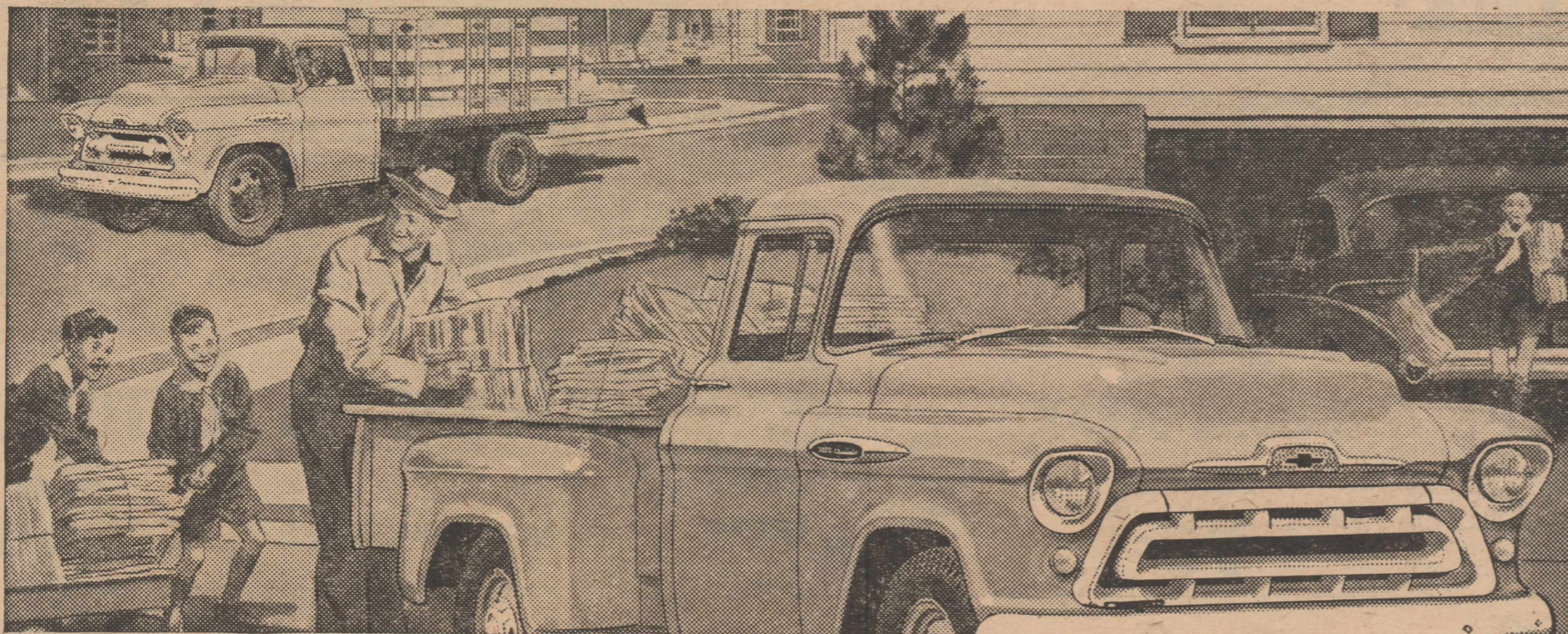
