The party is a fun night filled with varying activities which offer the students opportunities to earn "money" for prizes which are auctioned through the night. There are casino games and other challenges constantly going on

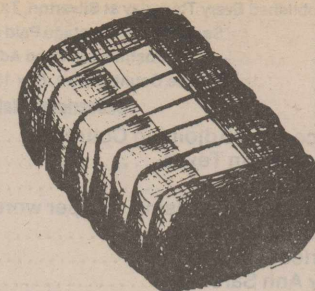

## Cotton Producers Are Concerned With Recall Petitions

Local cotton producers are very concerned about recent activities aimed at eliminating the High Plains Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program.

They say it is vital that cotton producers get all the facts about the High Plains program before they sign any petition to do away with the program.

Cotton producers voted overwhelmingly last spring to step up their thirty-year battle against the boll weevil. They recognized that without some sort of coordinated area-wide response, the boll weevil would be left unchecked.

By preparing now, through the intensive diapause control strategy, High Plains cotton producers have a golden opportunity to rid this area of the boll weevil once and for all.

## Telephone Company Change-Over is Near

Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. has entered into an agreement with GTE to purchase the telephone service in the City of Silverton, and this transaction is to be completed on Friday, May 31, 1996.

Mid-Plains has been working hard to get new equipment installed in order to make the Silverton service the very best it can be. There is a new building in Silverton, a new remote digital switch, and fiber optic cable that goes from Silverton to the host switch in Kress. This equipment should be working and serving you within a few days after the change-over on May 31.

You will not receive a billing from Mid-Plains until the June bills are mailed on or about July 1, 1996. Currently you are being billed by GTE on cycles that vary from one individual or business to another. Mid-Plains will have only one billing cycle each month, and normally bills are mailed on the first day of each month unless it is a holiday or weekend.

The first billing will involve larger-than-normal toll amounts because the first billing may involve several weeks for some customers. Billing amounts owed to GTE may be difficult to reconcile. It would be better and easier if any balances owed to GTE were paid to GTE before the May 31 closing date. Any payments made after May 31 will need to be made to Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

With the start of program sign-up only 10 days away, High Plains cotton producers are still "in the dark" about many of the new program's provisions.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG), the race to complete regulations by May 20 is keeping USDA employees very busy indeed.

"Basically we have just been receiving bits and pieces of information about the new program," explains PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Fortunately the sign-up period lasts until July 12, giving producers plenty of time to make their decisions."

Johnson notes that none of the information received to date can be considered set in stone. USDA will publish the new regulations in the Federal Register when they are finalized.

He adds, "Until then we just have to do the best we can and answer producer questions with the most up-to-date information we have."

One of the biggest questions being asked by producers is how 1996 payments will be calculated for contract commodities.

A partial run-down of the information received to date, including the latest estimates for upland cotton payment rates are:

Sign-up: May 20-July 12, 1996  
 Advance Payments: 50% of estimated commodity payment rate

1996 Upland Cotton Loan Rate: 51.92c

Cool season grasses should be treated at two-month intervals from September to May.

The best time to apply fertilizer is the first dry day after a rain because the soil is moist, but the leaves of the grass are not wet. However, do not wait for a rain if your lawn needs fertilizer. Spread the fertilizer evenly; then brush the grass with the back of a garden rake to shift the fertilizer off the leaves and down into the soil. It is important to wash the leaves because if it is left to dry there, it could burn them.

Water infrequently and deeply to a depth of 4-6 inches. You should adjust your watering to the needs of your plants and soil, but a good general rule is to water every five to six days in hot weather, less frequently in cooler weather. Infrequent watering lets plants develop deep roots that are disease-resistant and drought- and freeze-tolerant.

Water early in the morning when possible. Evenings are not a good time to water because lawns and plants left wet overnight are more disease-prone.

Use sprinklers that send water close to the ground rather than high in the air. Big drops are better than fine mists.

Additional information will be published as it becomes available.

★ Scattered thunderstorms brought welcome relief for some areas of the High Plains. Unfortunately, in most cases, it still isn't enough to allow most of the area's dryland acreage to be planted quite yet.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, the fast-moving storms dropped only small quantities of rain in addition to some hail and gusty winds.

"Rain is rain," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Right now I don't know of anyone who would say the rain they received was bad, even if they did get a little hail along with it. Hopefully, we can continue to have favorable conditions and get more rain to fall before the end of May."

Johnson notes that cotton planted on the High Plains has the best chance of making maximum yields when established during the month of May.

**Six Flags Opens For Daily Operation**

Six Flags Over Texas is abuzz with activity as its 2,500 hosts and hostesses prepare for daily operation of the Arlington theme park. Beginning May 11, the park will be open daily for the its 35th-anniversary season.

Highlights for 1996 include a wild new ride, an expanded concert schedule, a new themed restaurant and the world's #1-rated roller coaster, the Texas Giant.

The Six Flags skyline is a bit different this summer, as construction continues on a giant 65-foot tall mountain, home to the coaster that dares the darkness. This new thrill ride, called Runaway Mountain, includes a specially-designed high-tech track featuring banked turns, high-speed horizontal spirals and a near 90-degree drop in the dark. Runaway Mountain, which opens late in May, is the first new roller coaster added to the park since the Texas Giant in 1990.

The mountain is shrouded in mystery as the legendary home of bountiful treasures left by pirate Jean Lafitte. The mountain's story will be told by an old trader and trapper Gator McGee, the namesake of a new restaurant adjacent to the ride site. McGee can be found in the restaurant as he shares tales of explorers who have disturbed the mountain's treasures.

The Music Mill amphitheater will feature a summer full of 22 concerts by top performers, including Sammy Kershaw, June 1; The Beach Boys, June 15; Petra and Whiteheart, June 22; and Goo Goo Dolls, July 12.

All summer long, the park will be celebrating the International Year of the Roller Coaster with favorites such as the Mine Train, the world's first tubular steel roller coaster; and the Texas Giant, the world's #1-ranked roller coaster.

Six Flags Over Texas has a slate of new shows, including a newly-updated "Hot Rockin' Country," which was rated the nation's top country western revue in 1995, as well as "A Bad Day at the Backlot," a new western stunt show, and the all-new "Crazy Horse Saloon Wild West Revue."

The park's daily operating schedule will continue through August 24, when weekend-only operation will resume for the fall.

Regular park admission is \$29.93 plus tax. Tickets for guests under 48 inches tall and senior citizens ages 55 and older are \$25.75. Season passes that are valid at all Six Flags theme parks (excluding water parks) also are available. Children ages two and under are admitted free.

Six Flags Over Texas opens for daily operation mere days before Texas' two other Six Flags theme parks: Six Flags Fiesta Texas in San Antonio, May 24; and Six Flags AstroWorld in Houston, May 18.

Six Flags Over Texas features 11 themed areas of Texas' past and present and, in its 35th year of operation, is proud of its distinction as America's original regional theme park.

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**Fertilization, Watering Important to Lawns**

This time of year folks always start thinking about their lawn. For the most part, we neglect our lawns all winter and then want them to look good during the spring and summer months. Proper fertilization during the early spring and on through the summer can help us have the lawn we dream of.

A number of commercial lawn fertilizers are available to the homeowner. Fertilizers provide nutrients to plants, helping to make vigorous healthy growth.

The principle fertilizing elements are nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. A fertilizer that contains all three of these elements is known as "complete fertilizer". In addition to these three elements, most

fertilizers also contain calcium, magnesium, boron, zinc and a number of other minor fertilizing elements called trace elements.

The best fertilizers are those that release plant nutrients slowly and evenly over a long period of time. These fertilizers are also the most expensive.

Fertilizers are labeled according to their chemical analysis, such as 8-8-8 or 10-10-10. These numbers, which are printed on the label, refer to the relative amounts of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium contained in the fertilizer: 8-8-8 contains, by weight, 8% nitrogen, 8% phosphorous and 8% potassium.

Most lawn grasses should be fertilized early in the growing season at the rate of 20 pounds of complete fertilizer per 1,000 square feet. Depending on the length of the growing season in your area and the type of grass you have, you will need to make one to three subsequent applications of nitrogen fertilizer at two-month intervals. In this part of the world, for warm-season grasses, which make their growth between spring and fall, a fertilizer application should have been made in March with another in June and another in August.

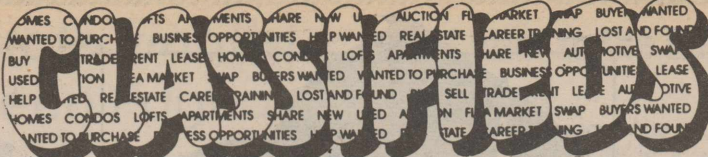
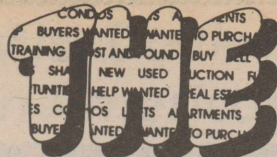
## AFTER GRADUATION, LET'S ENROLL IN THE SCHOOL OF LIFE
