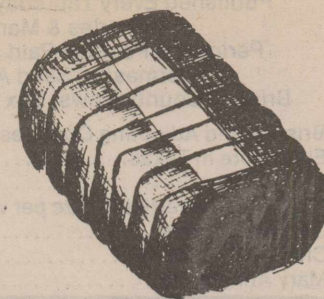

Don is the son of Perry and Estelle Thomas of Silverton. He was in the class that graduated from Silverton High School just a few days after the killer tornado hit Silverton on May 15, 1957. Don didn't go with his class on their senior trip, but chose to stay home and help with the cleanup activities that were necessary along the path of death and destruction.

Don, my oldest grandson, Brandon, pointed out to me about the weather vane several months ago, but as far as I know, you and he are the only ones to notice this. The artwork came out of one of the clipart books, and of course, has been used for many years.

If you had ventured out to Caprock Canyons State Park this past week, you might have noticed several people hiking off into the back country with complete disregard for the blazing sun above their heads. While you might have thought they were just a bit crazy, the truth is they were actually professional archeologists searching for arrowheads, hearths, historic foundations, and other interesting clues, as part of the effort to understand Texas' past.

Archeological Survey Team Working at State Park Sites

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Archeological Survey Team has been working at Caprock Canyons State Park to locate and protect the valuable cultural resources found there. "Our job is to go out to a park and locate Native American and historic artifacts, campsites, and structures," says survey team leader Margaret Howard. "We then report our findings to the park manager so that he or she can plan the roads and other park facilities without disturbing any important archeological or historical sites. It's a way of making sure that no one accidentally places a picnic table on top of an Indian encampment or homestead that could give us valuable insight into Texas' history."

In order to do this, the team first walks over a section of the park looking for artifacts on the ground and for areas that might have something beneath the surface. After marking the likely areas, the team then comes back and digs test holes down to about three feet. The team members

screen the dirt and the artifacts that were in the ground are caught in the screen. Using this method, even buried archeological or historical sites can be located and their importance determined.

Based out of Austin, the team has been impressed with the variety of archeological materials that they have discovered in Caprock Canyons State Park. "There is a long history of use of the park and this general area," said Howard, who also pointed out that all cultural resources found in state parks are protected by state laws, and that disturbing them without the proper permit can result in fines and even imprisonment.

This does not mean, however, that people can not get involved in archeology and the discovery of Texas' heritage. By calling the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Archeology Laboratory at (512) 389-4382 and asking for their information packet, you can find out about archeological and historical groups statewide, and how you

Local Students Attend San Angelo Seminar

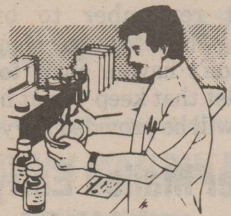

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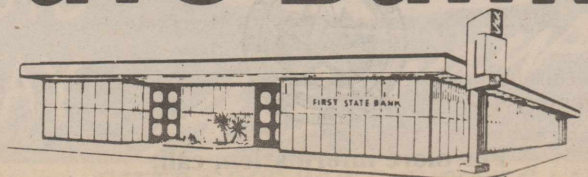
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Kitchens-Davis Vows Exchanged in Abilene June 1

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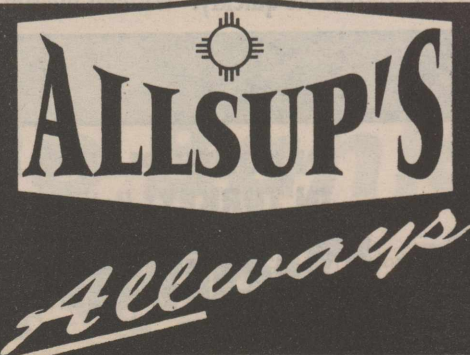

Mysterious Bug On Mesquite Trees

I have had several questions about the insects that seem to be thriving on mesquite trees in the area this year. Recently, I received a message from Pat Morrison, Extension Entomologist in Lubbock, about the insect.

They are similar in size and shape to a squash bug. They have been identified as *Ozena obtuse* Uhler—an insect which is in the squash bug family but which has no common name.

This insect occurs from South Texas up though the Panhandle. It prefers mesquite and other leguminous woody ornamental but apparently will feed on a few other trees as well. Because of the large numbers being reported, there could be injuries to some ornamental plants as well as the mesquite, and could require

treatment. It could easily be killed around the home with something like Sevin or Dursban. Be careful with Dursban, however; it is not labeled for garden use.

While a few of these insects have been seen in row crops, they should be just passing through and pose no threat. It is suspected that the insect will be completely gone in a week or two. This particular insect has not been seen abundantly in this area for 20 years, and probably will not be seen again for 20 more.

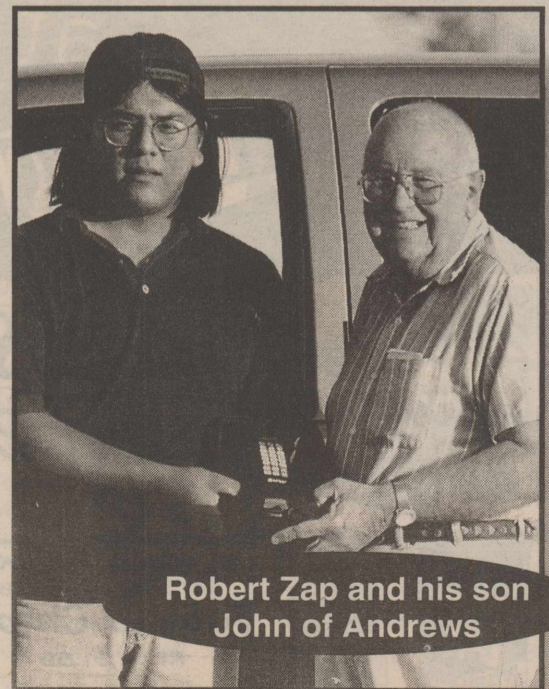

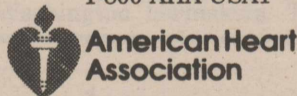

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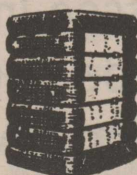
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
