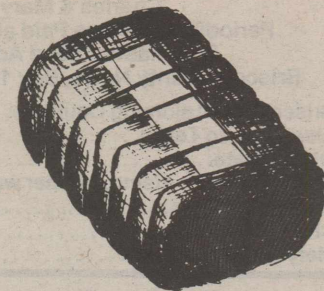
New Corn Delivered

Furadan 4F Cleared For Aphid Control

The use of Furadan 4F for aphid control in cotton was requested and approved for use in Briscoe, Donley, Collingsworth and Deaf Smith counties on Thursday, August 8, 1996.

Up to eight fluid ounces per acre may be used per application. A maximum of two applications is allowed. Some restrictions also apply to the use of this product. The following is extremely important:

1. Mandatory posting of the field for 14 days. This is not a WPS requirement—it is an EPA requirement for Furadan 4F.

2. No re-entry for any reason during the first 48 hours following an application. After the first 48 hours a worker must wear protective clothing if prolonged intimate contact is expected for the remainder of the 14-day posting period. This protective clothing includes rubber gloves. (Consultants and scouts fall into this category.)

3. Application must be made with a closed delivery system. Furadan from 2½ gallon containers cannot be used.

4. Applicators and those who are responsible for the field must have in their possession a label and a copy of the Section 18 for Furadan 4F.

Please follow these guidelines. Furadan is a very dangerous

substance, that has been earmarked by the EPA. If it is not properly used, we could lose the use of it forever in cotton. Above all, be careful with the chemical. Do not ask your workers or consultant to look at the cotton during the 14-day posting period. Change water and get out of the field. Don't put your worker or yourself in a possible exposure situation. A life is worth more than what you will get out of the work being done in the 14-day period.

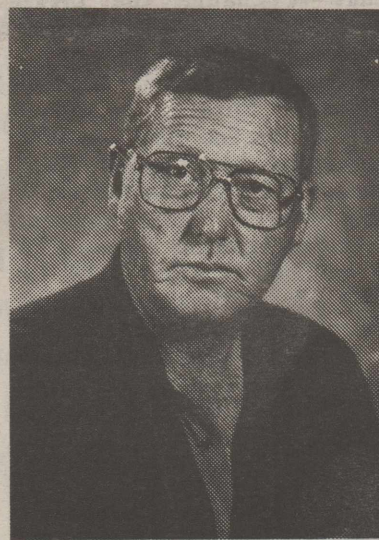

School in National Lunch/Breakfast Program This Year

The Silverton School serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 35c. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school. An application cannot be approved that is not complete.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 22, 1996

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing Sheryl Weaver, Principal, Box 608, Silverton, TX 79257, or calling 823-2476.

REPORTING CHANGES

If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

CONFIDENTIALITY

School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. Free and reduced-price eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health, or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation purposes.

REAPPLICATION

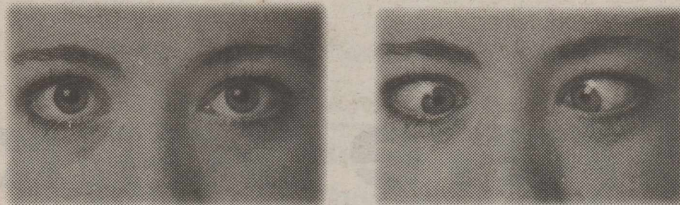
You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

HANDICAPPED

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the

LEGAL NOTICE

Federal Law Requires Asbestos Inspection

A federal law called the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) now requires the Silverton School to conduct inspections to determine if asbestos is present in any buildings. If asbestos is found, it is evaluated by a specially-trained, certified individual to determine if it poses a hazard. If a hazard does exist, the school must plan specific actions to eliminate the hazard. Procedures also must be adopted to insure that the condition of nonhazardous asbestos does not change in any way which would create a hazard.

The Silverton School has conducted an asbestos inspection, and is able to tell you that asbestos was found in the following buildings: Silverton Elementary, Silverton Cafeteria and Home Economics and Silverton Junior High. The form and condition of this asbestos indicate that it is not hazardous, but special operations and maintenance procedures will be used to insure this remains true. Periodic surveillance and reinspection by certified personnel will be used to verify that the material remains nonhazardous. Asbestos with some hazard potential was found in the following buildings: Silverton High School and Silverton Gymnasium. The district had adopted a specific plan and timetable for implementation to eliminate any possible hazard.

The inspection information and the plan for dealing with any potential hazard that may exist are all detailed in the asbestos management plan prepared by the Texas Association of School Boards. This document is available for your inspection at Silverton ISD, Office of the Superintendent of Schools, Silverton, Texas. If you have questions about the plan, you may contact: Superintendent, Silverton ISD.

The introduction to the management plan provides a good overview of asbestos and the circumstances under which it can be a hazard. It is hoped you will take time to read it so you will better understand some of the procedures you may see in use in district buildings. The regulations governing asbestos are very stringent. The school is required to use some of these procedures to reduce to an absolute minimum even the remotest possibility of asbestos contamination. Such procedures, however, together with the management plan, are evidence that the district intends to fully comply with all federal and state asbestos requirements and that your school board and administrators have no greater priority than the health and welfare of the students and staff members entrusted to their care.

Agricultural producers in the High Plains have had their hands full this season. First it's been the drought and now in the northern Panhandle counties—some crops are being harvested late, if at all due to wet fields.

"Moisture or the lack of it is still the most important factor determining success or failure in production," said Dr. Bob Robinson, Panhandle and South Plains Extension District Director.

Organizers of the Texas Panhandle Ag Day on August 22

are hoping to present the pros and cons of this season's production and offer some perspectives for the future.

The occasion will have scientists, specialists and consultants with Texas A&M's Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service with USDA-Agricultural Research Service.

Ag day registration begins at 8:30 a.m. at the Conservation and Production Research Laboratory, less than a mile west of Bushland. Education and industry exhibits will be open before and during the program. Coffee and donuts will be courtesy of CIBA Crop Protection.

Bus tours will start by 9:15 a.m. where participants will see research results and demonstrations highlighting sorghum, corn, forages and

alternate summer crops for the dryland and irrigated operation. More than 20 speakers will address a full range of topics important to Panhandle producers.

Four stops and scientists featured include dryland forages and alternative summer crops with USDA scientist, Paul Unger.
