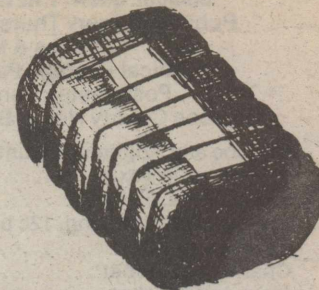

Briscoe Stock Show To Be Held In Quitaque January 23-25

The 1997 Briscoe County Livestock Show will be held at the Vance Price Memorial Barn at the Valley School January 23-25, 1997. Activities will begin on January 23 with weigh-in of steers and sheep from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. Beef and Dairy Heifers also will check in during this time period, according to County Extension Agent Rebel L. Royall.

The Cattle and Sheep Shows will begin at 7:00 p.m. Sam Jackson, Ph.D., professor at Texas Tech University, will do the judging in these shows. Schedule for the night will be Beef Heifers, Dairy Heifers, Sheep and Steers.

No shows will be held on Friday, January 24, due to basketball games; however, swine weigh-in will be from 12:00 - 6:00 p.m.

Saturday, January 25, will kick off bright and early with the Swine Show at 8:30 a.m. Danny Preston, swine producer from Tahoka, will be the swine judge. Jeff McGinnis, agricultural sciences teacher from Hart, will judge swine showmanship. This will be followed by the Pee Wee Showmanship division. At 5:00

p.m. there will be a Buyers' Basket Supper which will be followed by the Premium Auction and the Awards Program.

All 4-H members who are going to show in the County Livestock Show need to turn in their entries to the County Extension Office by January 17, 1997. FFA members need to contact their school's agricultural science teacher to determine when their entries are due. Entry fees are \$10.00 for swine and sheep, and \$12.50 for cattle.

All county citizens are encouraged to get out and attend the Livestock Show. The county youth need your encouragement and support.

Beware of Messages Left

Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. subscribers are being warned to be wary of phone messages left on their answering machines. A caller may leave a message asking the person to call a number beginning with the area code 809 to receive information about a family member who has been ill. They may also say someone has been arrested, died or you have won a prize.

If you make the call, the phone may be answered by someone who claims to speak broken English. The idea is to keep you on the line to build up charges. Other times your call will be answered by a long recorded message. The bottom line is that your telephone bill will have an incredible charge, often more than \$100.

Dishonest people in the Caribbean are using the 809 numbers as "pay-per-calls" to get around United States regulations and 900 blocking. If you are asked to return a call to a number with 809, huge charges may result.

The Briscoe County News Valentine Page is scheduled for Thursday, February 13. Deadline for the publication is Monday, February 9.

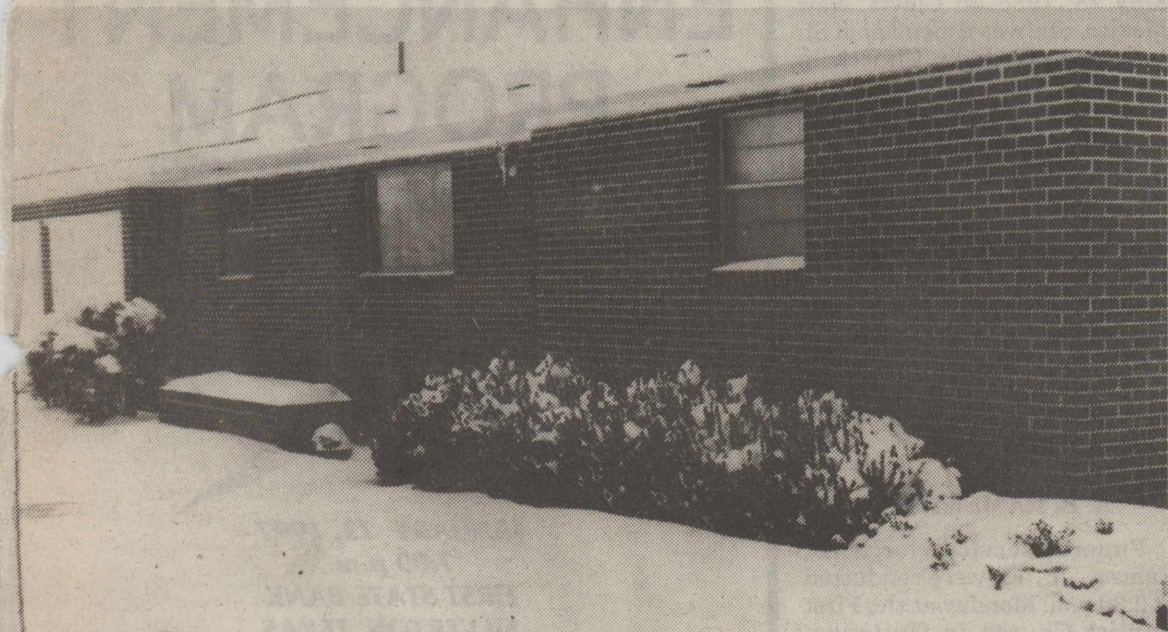
All grandparents need to do is bring the picture or pictures they wish to be printed in the newspaper to the News office. The charge will be \$8.50 per picture.

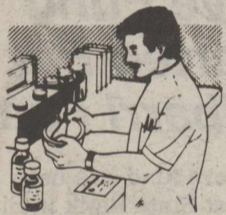

Mass for Gloria Ulibarri, 28, of Amarillo, was celebrated at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday at Our Lady of Loreto Catholic Church in Silverton with the Rev. Ed Graff, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery with arrangements made by Myers-Long Funeral Directors.

Mrs. Ulibarri was killed at 12:31 a.m. Saturday in Amarillo when the 1988 Chevrolet Blazer driven by her husband slammed into a traffic-light pole, according to an Amarillo Police Department accident report.

Mrs. Ulibarri died at the scene of the accident. The vehicle was northbound on South Washington Street at West 46th Avenue when it left the roadway and struck the pole, according to the report.

Ramon Ulibarri was listed in serious condition at Northwest Texas Hospital Saturday afternoon, a hospital spokesman said.

Both occupants were wearing seat belts, according to the report.

Mrs. Ulibarri was born in Tulia March 1, 1968. She was graduated from Silverton High School with the Class of 1986 and married Ramon J. Ulibarri on May 28, 1988, in Clovis, New Mexico. She was a member of St. Lawrence Catholic Church in Amarillo.

She was preceded in death by a brother, Peter Segura.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Christopher Peter and Herbert Joseph, both of the home; her parents, Alex and Lydia Segura of Silverton; three brothers, John Segura and Santos Segura, both of Amarillo, and Paul Segura of Silverton; and two sisters, Judy DeLeon of Silverton and Rosalinda Segura of Amarillo.

Hunters Lament Lack of Birds

"There just aren't as many pheasants as there used to be. This is a common complaint heard throughout the Plains.

The decline of the pheasant population is due to several factors. CRP brought about a decrease in the predator population by providing a safe haven for predators such as coyotes, and skunks. The CRP program also reduced the amount of irrigated grain crops such as wheat and corn. These crops are essential for providing a year-round food supply.

Since most of the CRP contracts will expire in 1997, now is an excellent time to start planning on ways to improve pheasant habitat.

Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District, along with Natural Resources Conservation Service and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will sponsor a meeting to discuss ways of improving the pheasant population for the South Plains.

The meeting will be held at First State Bank in Silverton Thursday, January 23, at 7:00 p.m.

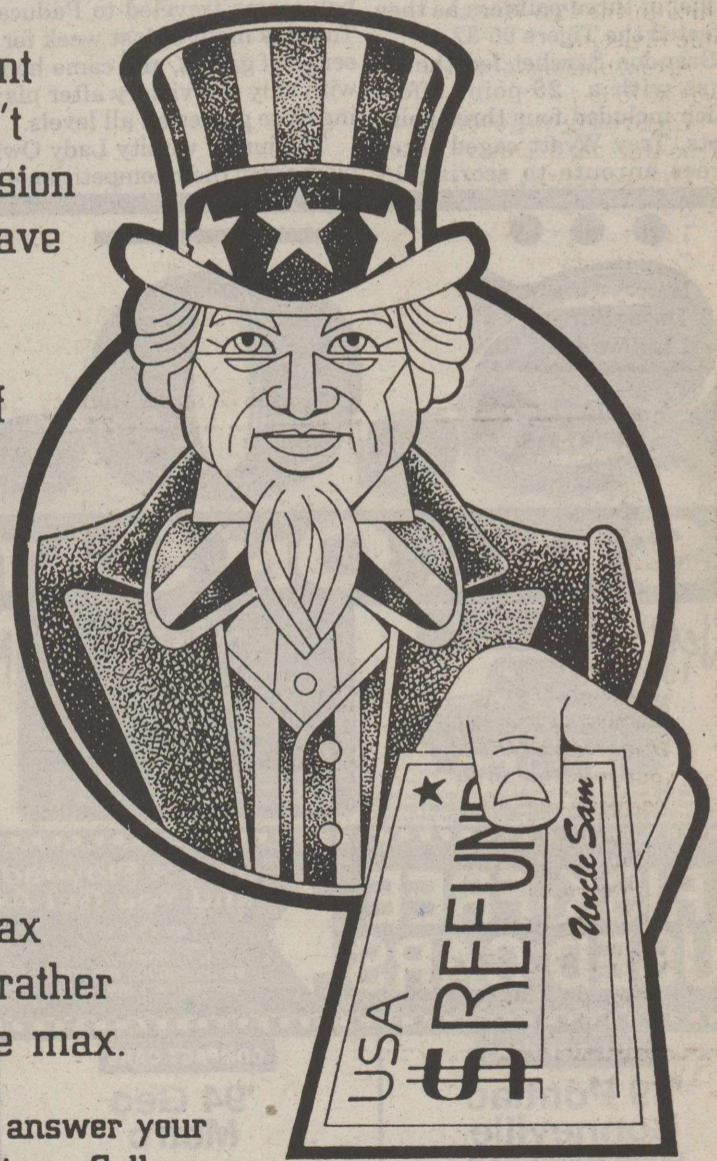

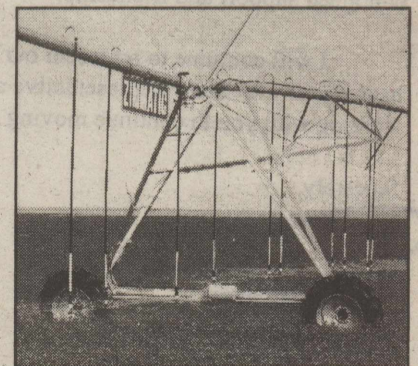

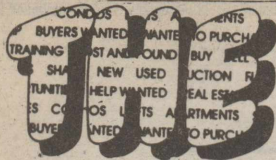
