

Mid-Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. subscribers are being warned to be wary of phone messages left on their answering machines. A caller may leave a message asking the person to call a number beginning with the area code 809 to receive information about a family member who has been ill. They may also say someone has been arrested, died or you have won a prize.

If you make the call, the phone may be answered by someone who claims to speak broken English. The idea is to keep you on the line to build up charges. Other times your call will be answered by a long recorded message. The bottom line is that your telephone bill will have an incredible charge, often more than

Dishonest people in the Caribbean are using the 809 numbers as "pay-per-calls" to get around United States regulations and 900 blocking. If you are asked to return a call to a number with 809, huge charges may



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
