The UIL one-act play, "The Little Match Girl," will be presented for the public Thursday, March 6, at 7:00 p.m. in the Silverton School auditorium.



Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Credit Yield Increase to Eradication

In a report presented at the 1996 Beltwide Cotton Confer-ence, the Texas Boll Weevil possibility of eradication. Eradication Foundation reported that in the Southern Rolling Plains (SRP), the first of nine zones in Texas to participate in the boll weevil eradication program, cotton producers can significantly increase crop yield in the absence of the boll weevil.

Based on a survey conducted by the Foundation on 40 farms in the zone, dryland yield was higher by 21 percent and irrigated land by 42 percent compared to the previous five years excluding 1995.

"That's money in the pocket for farmers in this area," said Kenneth Gulley, SRP cotton farmer and Foundation board member. "I'm really impressed at the yield increase we've seen this year considering the below-average rainfall we had during the growing season. It's the most cotton lint I've ever produced."

The SRP began their eradication program in the fall of 1994 with a diapause program that was designed to reduce the number of weevils going into hibernation, to prevent them from returning in the spring. Since then, the zone has been instrumental in researching the proven effectiveness of Malathion ULV compared to alternative insecticides in relation to secondary pests. Now, in their third full year of eradication, Foundation officials expect to do a "wipe-up" and declare a "suppressed status" in the zone pending year-end weevil numbers.

"The growers made this pro-gram what it is," said Osama El-Lissy, Foundation program director. "They've been behind this program from the start.'

Foundation officials agree. From the inception of the program, assessment collections in the SRP have exceeded 98 percent

"That kind of grower dedication insures that the growers' fight with the boll weevil can be finished," said Frank Myers, executive director of the Foundation

"Unfortunately, this is not a game of wins and losses. This is a matter of survival for the cotton industry in Texas," said Woody Anderson, cotton grower and chairman of the Foundation.

In fact, in a study conducted by a task force of entomologists and economists from Texas Tech University, Texas A&M University Agriculture Program and regional crop consultants, results indicate that regional business sales could drop by \$500 million a year in the High Plains area if impending boll weevil populations are left unchecked.

About 12:30 a.m. one of the boys came running to my tent, calling, "Flute, Scott Garvin fell off a cliff." I jumped up so fast I broke the bottom out of my cot. About that time he said, "But he is not hurt." Then it started snowing and the dads came and rescued us about 4:30 in the morning."





The Warriors came on strong in the fourth quarter, and tied the game with 2:12 remaining to be played. The score was knotted at 62-62 with 1:06 remaining on the clock. Needless to say, Owl fans were biting their nails as time relentlessly marched off the clock.

Jay Arnold hit a free throw, to put the Owls a point ahead. Then, with 1.3 seconds remaining in the game, Brandon Sarchet was fouled. He stepped to the line and hit both shots to make the score 65-62. The Warriors did get off their desperation long hurl toward their goal, but it got nowhere near the basket, the buzzer sounded, and the Owls began a midcourt celebration that continued after they extended their hands to the Warriors, who are coached by Dwight Rice and Sam Browning, both of whom are well known to most of the Owls because they were at Silverton and Valley before going to Miami.



continuous Through determination in testing and development, a local father and son team have manufactured a solar powered pump that is a definite alternative to the wind mill powered source of providing water needs to livestock.

Roy Jeffrey Jr. and Jacen Jeffrey, co-owners of Solar Wind in Wellington, said, "A great effort went into making this project into a very viable option in the lifting of water for livestock at a more cost effective means.'

The new solar pump business has been in the making since 1994 bringing it's first refined product to the test in 1995. The Jeffrey men applied for the patent in 1995 and the product went on the market Jan. 1, 1996.

The family business was originally established as an Amarillo machine shop by Roy Jeffrey Jr. in 1958. Formally known as West Texas Engine, the shop moved to Wellington in 1966 where the family continued in the machine shop business until their initial development and beginning stages of solar powered pumps in 1994.

"Compared to the cost of a new windmill that could run in the neighborhood of \$6,000, our starting cost is \$1,880 with other units capable of lifting water from 300 ft. and can produce up to 4 G.P.M," explained the duo.

Some of the key features include a five year warranty on the solar pumps and control panels, with an added feature of a 10 year warranty on the solar panels. The pumps are portable, dependable and easy to install.

Wellington and Collingsworth County is just a fraction of the

depth of anticipated trade areas for the product. There are solar pumps up and running in Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, Texas, and New Mexico.

All of the manufacturing is done in Wellington with all American made parts. Each pump is tailored to fit whatever the buyer requests, whether it be the amount of water or the depth.

Petitions Delivered By Recall Group

cation Foundation, Inc. began the petition verification process on February 20 in response to the delivery of a petition by the High

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Plains recall effort to the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) on January 24, 1997.

According to referendum law, the Foundation must verify the petitions and, if the petition effort is successful, hold a recall referendum within 90 days of the petition delivery date to TDA.

Verification will be conducted by a non-partisan committee consisting of the Taylor County judge and representatives from TDA, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Foundation. A representative from both the High Plains recall effort and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. will be invited to observe the petition verification process.

"The verification process will take a considerable amount of time," said Frank Myers, Foundation executive director. "The verification committee has to determine voter eligibility and then verify that the signatures are genuine.'

Foundation officials are assuring growers in other zones that regardless of the outcome, the recall petition in the High Plains Zone does not effect them. In fact, eradication efforts are on schedule for Southern Rolling Plains, Rolling Plains Central and South Texas/Winter Garden Zones.

If the recall petition is successful, growers in the High Plains Zone will vote on the retention of an existing 33-year diapause program administered by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

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
