

This story which was printed in the Paducah Post issue of Feb ruary 8, will give most people the "heebie-jeebies", but it will bring Delwin Brooks some cold, hard cash

Brooks and his farmhands cleaned out a hay barn about a mile and a half from Paducah Tuesday, February 11, and under the hay they found 71 live rattlesnakes, two dead ones, and five big bullsnakes.

The men used a snake-catcher to gather up the snakes and put them in an old freezer, along with some hay, and Brooks said he will sell the live rattlesnakes to a snake-buyer at Newcastle in a few days. He said the more-than-75 pounds of rattlers will bring around \$300.

The bullsnakes were turned loose. Brooks said they saw only one rat in the barn.





High Plains Weevil Eradication Recall Attempt Has Failed

tion committee announced last week that the High Plains Weevil Recall Organization's petition to recall the current boll weevil eradication program had failed.

The verification committee; headed by Taylor County Judge Lee Hamilton and including representatives from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Department of Agriculture, and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation, began the petition verification process on February 20. Observers from the petitioning party and the Plains Cotton Growers were present during the verification process

During the opening remarks, Judge Hamilton asked High Plains Weevil Recall President Tommy Applewhite how the re-



After an exhausting petition call'organization had arrived at verification process, the verifica- the total number of 9526 petithe total number of 9526 petitions. According to Judge Hamilton, Mr. Applewhite said that approximately seven members of the recall effort had personally counted the petitions at the same time, in the same room and that the number was indeed accurate

"Mr. Applewhite assured me that he was very confident of the number," said Judge Hamilton. explained to Mr. Applewhite that we would start from 9526 and count backward from there. He said he was comfortable with that."

Because both the verification committee and Applewhite were aware of the possibility of dupli-cate petitions, Judge Hamilton recommended that the first step in verifying the petition was to determine which petitions were indeed duplicates, and then remove them.

After removing 1196 verified duplicate petitions, the committee found that the petition fell short of the number needed to meet the 40 percent required by law.

A daughter, Barbara Jo, also preceded her mother in death.






