

Rim-to-Rim Relay Races To Be Held In Area Saturday, April 25

Terry Sheldon, a friend of O. C. and Faye Rampley, enjoys running as a hobby and release from his regular duties as Case Manager for Texas Rehabilitation Commission in Amarillo. He and his partner, Beacham Toler, will be participating in the relay activities that will be taking place near Silverton Saturday, April 25

Sheldon is 57 years old and has finished two 100-mile races in under 30 hours each. Last Thanksgiving he completed a 111-mile run in 24 hours. He competed in the 26.2-mile Fort Worth Cow Town Marathon in February 1998, and qualified for the Boston Marathon in 1999. He has lived in Texas since 1960 and came to Amarillo in 1992.

Toler, 70-year-old native of Amarillo, is U. S. record holder of the 24-hour track run. At the age of 68, he completed 112 miles in 24 hours. He started running when he retired at age 60, and has competed in several 100-mile cross country races. At age 68 he completed a 100-mle race in 23 1/2 hours. He won the Cow Town

Saturday's race is recognized by runners as being "the toughest two-person relay race in the world" and will start on the South Rim of Palo Duro Canyon on State Highway 207--the Silverton to Claude highway--at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, April 25.

There are four classifications of teams: open male, open female, open mixed and run & bike.

Two Person Relay: Each leg is nine miles. First runner will start on South Rim and run to the North Rim, touch off with his/ her team member who will then run back to the South Rim start/ finish line. The team member who is not running may "crew' his/her partner at any time "ala" Okie Relays, but not from a moving vehicle. Highway must be kept clear for through traffic. (If you want to park off the side of the road and watch, be sure and do so before the race gets under-

way.) The course is very beautiful, but also very tough. The south to north leg consists of two miles steep downhill, three miles rolling on the canyon floor, and four miles uphill (last two miles very steep). The north to south leg reverses this description.

Run & Bike Teams: The runner will start at the South Rim and biker will ride second leg from North Rim back to South Rim, continuing 5 1/2 miles past the start line making a U-turn at the cone and returning to the start/finish line. Bike leg is 20 miles total There will be three aid sta-





Today (April 23), experts from banks, credit counseling services and credit bureaus will join educators with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for a workshop and credit fair in Clarendon designed to give consumers some ideas on handling the family finances. They'll be there to assist people who struggle to pay the bills and may not have money left until the next paycheck. Which just about covers most of us. Did you know consumer debt is growing at twice the rate of wages across the nation?

East Texas Forest **Recovers From** El Nino Storms Pammy Millican

County Extension Agent

When an El Nino-fueled storm ripped through East Texas in February, it did a tremendous amount of damage to the timber industry. The total cost in damage and cleanup from the high winds added up to \$154-million.

Extension forester Lanny Dreesen says San Augustine, Sabine and Shelby counties bore the brunt of the storm. Estimates suggest 400 million board feet of timber was lost. That's enough to build 25,000 houses. Dreesen says landowners and the Forest Service have been scrambling to recover fallen trees and branches in hopes of salvaging some of the wood, but their two-month window of opportunity is closing. After that time the wood begins to decay and its value diminishes. Even worse than the loss is the potential fire hazard. Dead wood burns easily after it has laid around the forest from winter into summer.

Yet another reason to remove the fallen timber is that county governments can benefit financially from harvesting in the national forest.

If it weren't for the last minute, nothing would get done.
