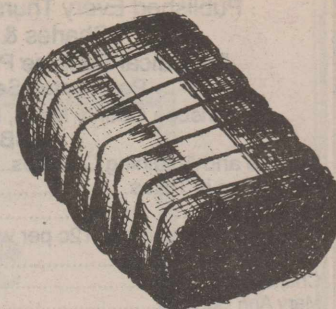
We will be setting a day and time to ride once a week. We will discuss the information the youth and parents need to know before the first riding practice.

Caution Urged For Residents When Weather is Threatening

Spring is upon us once again, and so is the potential for violent weather, says Max Whitworth, Briscoe County Sheriff. This weather can come in the form of thunderstorms, lightning, flooding, wind and tornadoes. The months of April, May and June are the predominant months for severe weather.

"This is a reminder for all citizens of Briscoe County. It is time to think about severe weather and prepare for it. It is only through planning that we can be prepared," Whitworth said, "to deal with the weather and know what to do."

Below are the types of warnings that may be issued by the National Weather Service.

Thunderstorm Watch - Potential for Thunderstorms to occur.

Thunderstorm Warning - Severe thunderstorms are occurring. It is possible for a tornado to develop from a thunderstorm.

Tornado Watch --Potential for severe thunderstorms with the possibility of tornadoes developing.

Tornado Warning--A tornado has been detected. **Take shelter immediately.**

TORNADO SAFETY TIPS
HOMES: Take cover in the center of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom.

SHOPPING CENTERS: Go to the interior room and halls on the lowest floor.

OFFICE BUILDINGS: Go to the interior hallway or the lowest floor, or to a designated shelter area.

SCHOOLS: Every school has a prepared plan. Follow the plan to the hallway or to a designated shelter.

AUTOMOBILES: Leave your car and seek shelter in a nearby building. If there are not any buildings, lie flat in a ditch or ravine.

Never attempt to outrun a tornado in your car.

Mobile Homes are vulnerable and should be evacuated.

The best shelter is in a basement or cellar, or any structure underground.

Please make sure that you have some type of plan in case of severe weather. Rehearse and make sure that every member of the family knows what to do when severe weather occurs.

Incumbents Are Re-elected in Low Voter Turnout

The three incumbents were re-elected to their seats on the board of trustees of the Silverton Independent School District in Saturday's election.

Zane Mayfield received 119 votes; Rance Young polled 114, and Bill Strange garnered 104 votes. Their challenger, Norma Garcia, polled 33 votes.

There was no election held by the City of Silverton because no candidates signed up for places on the ballot except the incumbents, Dwain Henderson, F. E. Hutsell and Charles Sarchet, who will be re-appointed to the City Council.

Passage of Bill Impacts Water Management in Briscoe County

Residents of Briscoe County need to be aware that an act passed during the 75th Texas Legislative session (Senate Bill 1) requires the water management plans be developed for every county in the state before September 1, 2000, and that the plans be updated every five years thereafter.

The plan must include an evaluation of the current water reserves (groundwater and surface water) in each county, the historic and projected water use by each town or city in the county, livestock water use, mining water use, irrigated agriculture use, steam and electric power generator water use, manufacturing water use, and rural water use within the county.

Comparing water use to water reserves, a determination has to be made as to whether or not the water supplies will be adequate to meet the short-term (0-30 years) needs and the long-term needs (30-50 years). If the water reserves will not meet future needs, water management strategies must be developed to determine how future water needs will be met or, in the alternative, what economic and social effect will occur as a result of not meeting these needs.

Towns and cities also are required to develop drought management plans. Failure to comply with the provisions of Senate Bill 1 will result in the loss of low interest loans and grants for water supply development by non-participating entities.

If the work is not done at the local level, the Texas Water Development Board will make its own evaluation for non-participating entities, which will include recommendations to the legislature as to what needs to be done by non-participating entities to meet their long-term water needs.

The legislature concluded that water planning could best be accomplished on a regional level. They, therefore, directed the TWDB to divide the state into regional planning areas. Briscoe County was placed into Region "O", which also includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Parmer, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum counties.

The legislature also concluded that the responsibility for direct-

The Rising Cost Of Raising Children

One-hundred and 50-thousand dollars. That's a lot of money to raise a child to the age of 18. Compare that to 25-thousand for a child born in 1960.

Extension family economics specialist Dr. Lynn White says it's not as big an increase as it sounds. She says it is about the same increase as other costs of living.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture figures a middle income, two-parent family with two children spends eight-or-nine -thousand dollars a year to raise each child.

Housing is the biggest expense, followed by food and child care. The USDA figures show child-rearing costs are highest in cities in the West, Northeast and South. They're lowest in Mid-western cities. But that does not take college into account. It will cost more than 125-thousand dollars for a baby today to go to a public college--270-thousand to go to a private school.

White says much of that cost can be defrayed by scholarships or handled through loans. She also thinks it can be good for students to work their way through

college. She says research shows students who help pay for their education typically spend less money because they have less time to spend it. They also are more frugal when it is their money being spent.

White suggests parents look into programs such as the Texas Tomorrow Fund which allows you to pay for your child's tuition at today's prices even though they may not enter college for another 18 years.

Attention Guys: Uncle Sam needs you!

Or... you might need him! If you're a guy about to turn 18 or are already 18, the best way to stay on Uncle Sam's good side is to register with Selective Service.

It's a federal law to register within 30 days of your 18th birthday. You also need to register to be eligible for certain benefits, such as federal student aid, job training, and most federal employment. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison, or both.

You can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by

registering at any local post office or on the Internet, <http://www.sss.gov>. There also may be a Selective Service Registrar at your school, so you can ask at the Principal's office.

Selective Service accepts late registrations before age 26, but the longer you wait, the longer you're breaking the law.

After you register, you will receive an acknowledgment of your registration from Selective Service within 90 days. It will have your Selective Service Number on it, so keep it in a safe place where you can find it when you need it. If you lose your acknowledgement, you can contact the Registration Information Office at 888-655-1825, toll-free.

Over 13 million men age 18 through 25 are currently registered with Selective Service. Remember, registration was reinstated in 1980. Selective Service has been registering 18-year-old men for 18 years. So, if you turn 18 in 1998--it's your turn!

ing the planning effort needed to be placed with leaders in the region with varied water interests. They identified 11 water interest groups which must be represented by the initial coordinating committee. The TWDB then solicited recommendations from residents in the region as to whom they would like to represent them in the planning effort for each interest group. The 17 individuals appointed to the initial coordinating body of Region "O" by the TWDB to represent the eleven water use interest groups are Dr. Lloyd Urban of Lubbock, public sector; Judge Dallas Brewer of Plains, county governments; Bruce Blalack of Lubbock, Ches Carthel of Plainview and Mayor Bob Josseland of Hereford, municipalities; Steve Perry of Lubbock, industries; Dr. John Abernathy of Lubbock, S. M. True, jr., of Plainview, Johnny Anzaldua of Lamesa and Delaine Baucum of Seminole, agriculture; Jim Steiert of Hereford, environmental issues; Don McElroy of Muleshoe, small businesses; Bill Harbn of Floydada, electric generating utilities; John Garland of Waco, river authorities; A Wayne Wyatt of Lubbock and Kent Satterwhite of Sandord, water districts; and Henry Rieff of Cotton Center, water utilities.

The legislation appropriated funds to help pay for the planning effort by creating a method for obtaining matching grants (75% state, 25% local).

The Region "O" planning group has met twice. Their first act was to appoint three additional people to the planning group. Jerry Webster of Tahoka was appointed to represent municipalities. Harold "Bo" Brown of Lubbock is to represent agricultural interests. Lee Arrington of Brownfield will represent underground water conservation districts.

They have adopted a set of by-laws, adopted a new name, which is the Llano Estacado Planning Group, elected officers, and be-

gun the planning process. The officers are A. Wayne Wyatt, chairman; Lee Arrington, vice-chairman, and Ches Carthel, secretary.

Public meetings will be conducted to receive comments as to what should be included in the long-term water management plan, especially as to what scenarios should be considered if the current water supplies do not appear adequate to meet long-term needs.

Beef Conference To Begin May 23 At Amarillo Center

The Panhandle Beef Conference will be held May 12, 1998 at the Amarillo Civic Center. This year's program will highlight forage management, performance evaluation of cattle, and outlooks for weather and markets.

Cool-season perennial forage production for cattle grazing is a topic of great interest in the High Plains. Dr. Vivian Allen, Texas Tech University, will recap her research and experiences with cool-season forages in the South Plains area. Dr. Larry Redmon, Oklahoma State University, has planted and observed various cool-season forages in western Oklahoma. The combined observations of these experts will provide some insight for cool-season forage selection and management in the south and north Plains area of the Panhandle.

Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will report on the 1997-98 Ranch-to-Rail North program. Cattle from over 100 ranches in six states are enrolled in this year's program. Selecting breeding stock to sustain cow productivity but improve growth and carcass traits will be discussed by David Lust of West Texas A&M University. Trait selection and EPDs are among the tools that will be discussed.

Feedyard performance, carcass traits, cattle value and close-outs can be affected by implant programs. Dr. John Hutcheson, Horchst-Roussel Vet, will address the economics of implants strategies in pasture and feedlot cattle.

Will El Nino continue for a while or subside? Ed Andrade, lead forecaster for the National Weather Service in Amarillo, will discuss trends in the weather for the Plains region. The program will close with Jim Sartwelle of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service giving the outlook for

grain and cattle markets in 1998.

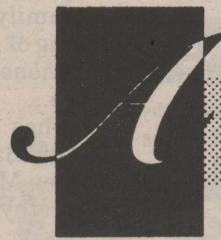
