Feel Brunt of Drought leservoirs

Water levels in area reservoirs are down, but South Plains residents don't have to worry about them running dry this year, water authority managers predict.

If the drought continues into next year and beyond, however, those managers may have to start rationing to try to conserve the dwindling supply.

"The hot, dry weather creates a lot of evaporation and you all over there in Lubbock and your counterparts in Amarillo have been very, very thirsty lately," said John Williams, manager of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority that oversees Lake Meredith. This lake, located north of Amarillo, is more than 20 feet below its normal 110-foot level, while Mackenzie Reservoir, which is its own water authority, is 75 feet from its 150 foot maximum

To the south, the Colorado feet each year, he said. River Municipal Water Authority's reservoirs at Lake J. B. Thomas and Lake E. V. Spence each have dropped about 45 feet. The Owen Ivie Reservoir, however, is only three feet below its normal level.

John Grant, manager of the Colorado River Authority, said Ivie Reservoir has saved Snyder, Midland, Odessa, Big Spring and Stanton from facing severe rationing.

"We were very fortunate out here years ago when people of West Texas persevered and built the Ivie Reservoir," he said. "If we

water out of it in 1996 when we did, we'd virtually be out of service water for the people we serve now

That's because the other two reservoirs--Thomas and Spence-20 percent of their capacity, Grant said.

"It's been about six years since produce that runoff that goes into Lake Thomas or the Spence Reservoir," he said. "So we've been well below the average for some time now.

But Grant isn't ready to panic

In its reservoirs, the authority has a total of 600,000 acre-feet of water--an acre-foot is the amount of water needed to cover one acre to a depth of one foot--and member towns use only 65,000 acre-

Williams said that Lake Meredith also has plenty of water to sustain the needs of residents in the authority's member cities of Lubbock, Amarillo, Plainview, Borger, Pampa, Slaton, Tahoka, O'Donnell, Brownfield and Lamesa. Levelland.

There is no danger of the lake drying up, and we're not anticipating any rationing from the lake," he said. "Not unless the drought continues for a very, very long time."

Williams estimated it would take two to three years of severe

authority would begin rationing water; however, if people con-serve now, they most likely could prevent water cutbacks in the future. People in Amarillo are being asked to water their yards -both are operating at less than on odd or even days of the week, as determined by their address.

Members of the Mackenzie Authority, however, have been we've had a good hard rain to under water rationing from the reservoir since 1994, when the authority cut back water allotments by 60 percent to its member cities of Floydada, Silverton, Tulia and Lockney.

General manager Roy Garris said that the authority supplies about 50 percent of the water used in its member towns and that residents use the town wells for the rest of their water needs. And the drought, he added, is

only making the situation worse. We're losing ground every day

with this hot wind blowing, and of course the towns are using a lot more water in this weather, Garris said. "I think we'll make it through the summer, but it's going to be tough if we don't get some rain soon.

Silverton is now 4.52 inches below its normal rainfall, and the high temperatures and winds continue to sap the area of any moisture it has been lucky enough to receive.


Many places have had even less moisture than Silverton, but the need for rainfall is becoming very critical for area crops and rain is needed RIGHT NOW!

Ice Cream Social **Planned July 24**



PCG News from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

When most people talk about the cafe they mean that little place down the road where you can get a good hamburger.

can get a good hamburger. In Washington, D. C., CAFE stands for Corporate Average Fuel Economy and an ongoing effort to raise the fuel economy standards imposed on major automotive manufacturers.

This effort has once again reached the front burner with renewed Administration efforts to increase the CAFE standard from the currently frozen 20.7 miles per gallon (mpg) for light trucks to levels such as 28 mpg and even 34 mpg.

The end result according to the Coalition for Vehicle Choice (CVC) is pressure on manufacturers to move toward less powerful engines and smaller vehicles in order to meet the higher standard. This pressure is in direct conflict with the general public's demand for increased utility and more powerful engines.

Consumers who would like to see the continued availability of full-size, more powerful light trucks can do something about it. Legislation introduced in the House of Representatives (H. R. 880) and the Senate (S.286) would continue the current "freeze" in CAFE standards beyond September 1998 when the current "freeze" expires. Anyone interested in joining this effort is encouraged to contact their congressional representatives and encourage them to support these two measures.

Gathering support for some very important agriculture trade issues is the good news out of Washington this week.

Recently, House Speaker Newt Gingrich appeared with several farm state Representatives to voice the importance of renewed efforts to approve fast-track negotiating authority for President Clinton, funding for the International Monetary Fund and to continuing Most Favored Nation status for China.

These issues are of particular importance to cotton since many of them impact either directly on U. S. cotton's ability to remain a key player in the world cotton export market.

In other news from Washington, Cotton Council International received word that its allocation from the 1997-98 Market Access Program would be increased for the third year in a row to \$9.6 million, roughly ten percent of the \$90 million available for the MAP Program.

CCI uses the money to increase export markets for U. S. cotton through advertising, meetings with cotton spinners and sponsorship of tours designed to inrease the knowledge of potential customers about the U. S. cotton industry and the high quality cotton produced in this country.

Boll weevil trap catches are way, way down. The hot, dry conditions of 1998's summer are wreacking more havoc on boll weevil populations than any of the past several winters.

In Dawson County, where trap counts soared a couple of weeks ago following appreciable rainfall, not a single weevil was caught this week. Just one solitary weevil was found in Terry County where producers had been making overwintered weevil treatments just a week ago. However, several IPM Exten-

However, several IPM Extension Agents are warning cotton producers to remain watchful for boll weevils colonizing their fields.

Phillip Kidd, Terry-Yoakum EA/IPM, says, "You must be persistent for overwintering tactics to be effective. Do not give back ground you have already taken."

Ron Graves, Crosby-Floyd EA/ IPM, says, "For the most part, boll weevil activity has ceased. This year could have been a good year to kick them while they are down. Let's just hope they stay down."




