Seven County Gins Back Ginning, 1,172 Last Week, 21,165 Total

Fisher County Gins have resumed back to normal production after the recent bad weather. According to the seven gin managers the Fisher County Gins are 91% finished. 1,172 bales were ginned from Dec. 27 thru Jan. 3 which brings the total bales ginned in Fisher County to 21,165 this figure is only 2,178 off the projected season's total of 23,343.

The Rotan Gin, remained in first place as far as total bales ginned. They ginned 93 bales for the week which brought their total to 7,548. Second Place belongs to Terry Gin with a total of 3,760 bales. They ginned 573 which is

ginned from Dec. 27 thru Jan. 3. The Hobbs gin moves

from second to third place with a total of 3,575 bales ginned. They ginned 127 bales and only need 73 bales from reaching their projected season's total of 3,648. Farmers Union Coop Gin holds down fourth with a total of 2220 bales. They showed no production as far as bales ginned for the past week. Fifth place belongs to Farmers Gin of Rotan after ginning 27 bales and bringing their total to 1,810 bales ginned. Longworth is in sixth place with 322 bales for the week and

Kevin Copeland Suffers Lost Thumb In Farm Shredder Mishap

Kevin Copeland, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Copeland of Rotan, lost a thumb in a farm accident last Monday afternoon, but doctors are hopeful that an eight hour operation to surgically graft the thumb back to his hand will be success-

Copeland had been having trouble with a clutch on his cotton shredder and had gone back to the barn at his home 2 miles west of Rotan for repairs. After shutting off the tractor, Copeland attempted to grab the still rotating PTO (power take off) shaft which lies between the tractor and the shredder. His glove apparently caught a rough spot on the

PTO shaft which resulted in his thumb being torn

The injured Copeland immediately ran to the house where his mother, Janice Copeland wrapped his hand in a towel. Mrs. Copeland loaded Kevin into a vehicle, went by the barn and got the glove which still had the thumb in it, and drove to the Fisher County Hospital emergency room.

Dr. Maurice Callan was on duty at the hospital. He examined the wound, dressed the hand, packed the thumb in ice and sent Copeland to Hendricks Hospital in Abilene.

He was in surgery from 8:00 p.m. Monday night, January 2nd until 4:00 a.m., Tuesday morning.

The operating doctors informed family members at 11:30 p.m., Monday night that circulation through the thumb had been restored. Copeland suffered damage to the middle of his hand and up 8 inches of his arm from pulled tendons and blood vessels.

Doctors indicated that it would take 4 to 5 days before they will know if the surgery was completely successful. If the surgery was a success, they plan further surgery to restore mobility in his thumb.

Copeland is a 1983 graduate of Rotan High School and is currently enrolled as a freshman at Angelo State University. He remains in room 4711 at Hendrick Hospital in Abi-


Last night a miracle occurred. It happened on the night Johnny got a guitar and all of us joined in a family sing along.

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Out-Of-pocket expenditures which are not reimbursed that are made on behalf of charitable institutions are deductible. Such deductible expenditures could include transportation, travel, uniforms, telephone expenses, supplies, or equipment purchased for charitable purpo-

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You are permitted to take actual automobile expenditures, excluding depreciation and insurance, or as an alternate, you may use a standard 9 cents per mile for all charitable automobile mileage.

You are permitted a deduction for out-of-pocket charitable contribution expenditures only on behalf of qualified recipients. Your expenditure must be made on behalf of a governmental unit, or an entity organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, educational, national or international amateur sports competition, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals.

You are not entitled to a deduction on your income tax return for the "value of services" rendered to charitable institutions. If you spend a day working at a charitable activity and forgo \$100 of earnings, you are not allowed a deduction for lost earnings.

You are not permitted a deduction for the donation of blood nor for donations of raised livestock or produce.

Donations of large amounts of property or money should be done with the assistance of your financial and tax

Dramatic Change In DWI Laws

On January 1, the bills approved during the legislative session last spring became law, and for most Texans, the dramatic change is in the DWI laws.

The crackdown on drunk drivers was among the most emotional of legislative issues, and proponents of DWI reform got almost everything they wanted out of the Legisla-

Although lawmakers resisted passing the "Open Containers. Bill," which would make it illegal for anyone in the vehicle to have an open beer can or such, the following changes were approved, effective Jan. 1, 1984:

-Mandatory jail time for repeat offenders: first offenders may still get probation, but a second offense within 10 years requires a minimum of 72 hours in jail, and a third offense carries a 10-day jail minimum.

-All convictions are final: all convictions will become part of the defendant's record, and not erased after probation is completed, as in the past.

-Felony conviction: A third offense can be filed as a felony, with a maximum jail sentence of five years and a fine from \$500 to \$5,000.

-Increased penalties: fines of first offenders will range from \$100 to \$2,000 compared to the old range of \$50 to \$500.

Videotaping Suspects -Videotaping DWI suspects: counties with at least 25,000 population are required to buy videotaping equipment to record the actions of DWI suspects, as they are booked into jail, for use in court.

-Refusing breath tests: any suspect who refuses to take a breath test faces a 90-day automatic license suspension, even if later acquitted.

-Mandatory specimentaking: officers are required to take a specimen of the DWI suspect's blood, breath or urine in alcohol-related traffic accidents where a person has died or likely will die.

-Penalty for lending car: any person who knowingly lends a motor vehicle to a person whose license has been suspended for a DWI related offense.

-Forfeiture of vehicle: a county may seize and sell the vehicle upon conviction of a fourth DWI offense.

Senate Redistricting

The long, drawn-out struggle to redraw and approve new voting boundaries for Texas senatorial districts came to a close last week when a threejudge federal panel approved the plan passed by the Legislature last spring.

The plan is final until lawmakers must redistrict again in 1990.

Republicans and Mexican-American groups had opposed the plan, but instead have decided to concentrate efforts on the still-pending Texas House and Congressional plans.

Mobil Settlement State officials were striving last week to reconstruct the \$500 million settlement of their lawsuit against Mobil Oil which was killed by the last minute intervention of the Exxon Corp.

The state seeks to find a third party to buy mineral rights on the disputed oil lease land. An anonymous

third party had agreed to do that in the original settlement, but allegedly backed out when Exxon's delay destroyed the endof-the-year tax advant-

Senate Race

Two candidates for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by John Tower nailed another plank on their campaign platforms last week.

Democrate Bob Krueger, a former congressman and ambassador to Mexico. called for full parity for farmers and ranchers.

He also called for farmers to be paid money for set-aside lands, and not paid for stored grain, as they are now.

He also urged the U.S. to buy and stockpile Mexican oil to bolster the border economy.

Republican Congressman Ron Paul of Houston, a medical doctor, advocated a return to the free-market system, including doing away with food stamps and welfare programs for the poor as well as eliminating





Gov. Mark White Reflects Back On 1983



Payment-In-Kind Program

Last summer when West Texas ranchers came to me asking for help surviving their area's worst drought in decades, they did not ask for a handout.

What they wanted was to buy damaged, surplus government-owned grain, at reasonably reduced prices, so that they could save what remained of their livestock from starva-

The compelling reasonin favor of this strategy was that the damaged grain, much of which had been stored in Texas, was not of good enough quality to use for export or the Payment-In-Kind program. It was not good for much except livestock feed.

This damaged grain was stored in grain elevators at an enormous cost to taxpayers. U.S. Department of Agriculture records in June showed 83 million bushels of damaged grain was running up an annual bill of \$48 million in storage and interest charges.

Agriculture Secretary John Block had it within his descretion to release this grain to these ranchers, yet he repeatedly refused to help.

At one point the depart-ment did offer improved terms for Farmers Home Administration loans. But our drought-stricken ranchers and farmers didn't really need another note at the bank. They needed something a cow could

For more than six mon-

ths, ranchers and farmers were forced to play an agonizing waiting game because of the department's obstinance. Congress had to pass legislation forcing release of the grain. The legislation, which I introduced in the Senate, was finally signed

into law on Nov. 29, 1983. Shortly thereafter, a USDA spokesman admitted publicly that the grain could have been released four months earlier, and without legislation.

So our ranchers paid the price. Some went out of business. Many had to cut back herds they had spent years developing.

In the 27 Texas counties designated as drought disaster areas last year, statistics for January 1983 showed 755,000 cattle and 1.2 million sheep and

goats. Texas A&M University estimates there are now 300,000 cattle and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association estimates there are only


300,000 sheep and goats. This was a tragic price to have paid so needlessly. Had the Secretary acted to provide drought relief last summer, this emergency aid would have been

far more timely and more


