Carriker Files For Second Term As House Member

(Roby) Seventy-eighth District State Representative Steven A. Carriker announced this week that he has filed with the Democratic Party for election to a second term in the Texas House.

Carriker, a Fisher County farmer and livestock producer, is currently serving on the House County Affairs Committee, the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee, and is one of only two Freshmen members elected to serve on the Executive Committee for County Affairs and is Chairman of the sub-committee studying Dryland Crops and Water Efficient Farming.

In his first term, Carriker passed a number of pieces of enabling legislation for local governments, including the establishment of several juvenile boards and also the creation of authority for the City-County Auditorium project in Nolan County. He was successful in expanding authority for transporting agricultural equipment on public roads and won a hard-fought battle to keep highways open to use by tractors and other farm machinery. Along those same lines he "bested the vets" as one newspaper put it, in preserving authority for hardship licensing of drivers, sometimes an unavoidable necessity for families in rural areas. Other successful legislation included an agricultural bond program, volunteer fire department funding, and numerous other pieces of legislation he either sponsored or cosponsored.

At the top of the legislative list, however, is Carriker's "Proposition Zero" package. This effort to provide more equitable funding for public schools and relieve part of the tax burden on homes has been widely hailed as "the fairest system" and has received editorial endorsements from major state newspapers. It is likely to be considered in a special session later this year.

Press from around the state has recognized Carriker as an outstanding new lawmaker. One magazine singled him out saying "Carriker holds great promise for the future" and he "understands the big picture". A United Press International story said Carriker "has already made a few political moves worthy of a veteran" and went on to say that as a legislative newcomer he appeared quite confi-

Carriker is a 1973 grad-

uate of the University of Texas and he and his wife Kathy and their two children live on the family farm outside of Roby, near the center of the sprawling district he represents. The district stretches from above the caprock near Lubbock down through the Rolling Plains to surround Abilene, then north nearly to the Red River. Counties include Cottle, Fisher, Garza, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lynn, Nolan, Scurry, Stonewall, and part of Taylor.

They enjoy being together. Strong families don't just happen to have more time to spend together; they look at "activity over-


load" and intentionally cut

Why do strong families communicate well? Maybe it's because they are committed to promoting the happiness of each other through actively helping and sharing in the concerns of other family mem-



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

Mr. Aubrey L. Bullard, Executive Director of the Texas Veterans Affairs Commission, has announced that the Commission is now ready to accept Requests for Certification

from participating lenders.

Under the provisions of the Program, the Veterans Affairs Commission will determine the veteran's eligibility to participate in this program based upon the veteran's residence, length of active duty service and honorable discharge.

Mr. Bullard advised that his Austin staff has been increased to handle the expected large number of applicants and that all efforts for expeditious handling of the requests for certifications have been made.

Mr. Bullard further stated that veterans wishing to participate in this program must first have a contract for the purchase of a home and qualify for a loan with a participating lender, which in turn will submit the Request for Certification to the Veterans Affairs Commission. Mr.

Bullard indicated that a complete listing of participating lenders should be available during the middle part of January 1984.

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





Delay any pruning of damaged wood until late February or early March. Buds should be swelling and showing signs of growth by then, making it easier to distinguish dam-

aged tissue. Fertilize any freeze-damaged trees and shrubs late in February or early March to help promote new growth and healing of damaged tissue. Broadcast a high nitrogen-type fertilizer beneath the branch spread of the plant and 3 to 6 feet beyond. Apply at the rate of 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet and water in thorou-

It is essential to provide adequate moisture to colddamaged plants to prevent moisture stress. So supp-

lemental irrigation will be needed during any dry period throughout the spring and summer.

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

BACKUP WITHHOLDING (New Form W-9)

You may have thought the issue of withholding on interest and dividends died when the 10% withholding provision was repealed in 1983. However, at the time that provision was repealed, a new provision called "backup withholding" was instituted,

Any individual who does not provide his correct social security number to a payor of interest, dividends, and "other reportable payments" may be subject to a \$50 penalty and to backup withholding starting January 1, 1984. Backup withholding will also be required for individuals whom the IRS identifies as having underreported interest and dividend income.

Backup withholding will be done by the payor of such medical facilities. income at the rate of 20%. It applies not only to interest and dividends but also to other payments such as rent, royalties, commissions, non-employee compensation, and other reportable payments.

You will be receiving identification number verification requests (Form W-9) from such payors. These requests should be read carefully and the instructions followed, or you may find yourself subject to backup withholding and a \$50 penalty.

Backup withholding is not an additional tax. Rather, the tax liability of persons subject to backup withholding will be reduced by the amount of the tax withheld. If withholding results in an overpayment of taxes, a refund may be obtained.

Payors who must withhold the tax are to report and deposit it in the same way that they handle withheld payroll taxes.

In general, only those payments that are considered "reportable payments" are subject to the backup withholding rules; that is, annual interest and dividend payments of less than \$10 or other payments of less than \$600 are not subject to these rules.
