Rendering property is a method through which a property owner reports or lists the taxable property he owned or managed on January 1, 1984. It is also the means by which a taxpayer is allowed to record his opinion of his property's value.

The Texas Property Tax Code is specific in listing property which must be rendered to the chief appraiser for taxation.

A taxpayer must render all taxable personal property used for the production of income if, on January 1 of the tax year, he owns the property or manages and controls it. Examples include business vehicles, office furniture and fixtures, and inventories.

Tax law also requires banks located in Texas to file a statement listing assets and liabilities.

The chief appraiser may also require a person to render any other taxable property that he owns or manages and controls on January 1. The chief appraiser will deliver written notice that a rendition statement is required and attach the appropriate

Even when not required, any property owner may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. According to Ms. Green, rendition statements are filed with the chief appraiin which the property is



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

Dormant oil sprays should be put on at this time of year to control scale insects on fruit and nut

Scale insects such as the San Jose scale or white peach can kill your trees. Dormant oil can be pur-

chased at many different stores where garden supplies are sold. Be sure to follow all label directions and apply the mixture when the temperature is between 40-70 degrees F. Do not apply if the tree has budded out. Dormant oil is applied when the tree is dormant. Spraying flowers and leaves could cause leaf burn and flower drop. Scale insects are difficult for most people to detect,

so dormant oil should be applied once each year. Sooner or later your tree will probably be attacked

by scale insects, so be ready by guarding against them with an application of dormant oil.



PROVE YOUR LOSS

You can help substantiate losses of personal property due to fire, theft, or other casualties by the use of a few simple techniques.

Most of us realize it's a good idea to have a listing of our personal property. Such an inventory should list the property, a description, and approximate market value. If possible, verify the date and cost of acquisition.

While this is a good idea, few of us actually get around to making the inventory. If you don't take the time to prepare an inventory, consider at least spending a few minutes photographing your property (especially that which is the most valuable...the stuff that you'd really hate to lose by fire, theft, or other casualty).

Take a few good photographs of your sterling silverware, gun collection, coins, stamps, jewelry, and other valuables. And, while you're at it, shoot all the rooms in your house; don't forget your clothes closets.

Today, almost everyone owns or has access to a tape recorder. So when you get your pictures back, take a few minutes and dictate onto a cassette the description and value of the property that's shown in the photos. Then put both the pictures and the cassette in a safe deposit box at your bank, so they won't be lost in the casualty. If you have a fire, theft, or other casualty, these items will be most helpful in making and proving your insurance claim and/or your loss for income tax purposes.

Consider using this same photo and cassette technique for your business assets. It would be desirable to repeat this process every couple of years for both your business location and your personal residence.

Ask your insurance agent to include a "replacement cost" clause in your homeowner's policy. This will provide, at minimal cost, loss replacements at the current value rather than the old depreciated value.
