The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met last Monday night and reviewed the hospital employee Blue Cross-Blue Shield insurance coverage and discussed indigent care at the local facility.

In the insurance portion of the meeting, board members agreed to accept a 19% rate increase over the previous year premiums. New rates for employees will rise from the current \$60.67 for em-

Carriker Introduces Legislation In Austin

State Representative Steve Carriker, D-Roby, has introduced legislation

Carriker believes the "potential for abuse" arises because state agencies receive their budgets from the Legislature and therefore may be extraordinarily sensitive to the wishes of individual legislators.

If signed into law, Carriker's bill would provide for a Class A misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,000.00 and/or a jail term not to exceed one year, or both.

Rotan Police To Enforce **New Child Safety Rules**

officers are going to begin enforcing a new law recently by the Texas Legislature pertaining to leaving young children unattended in vehicles and securing infants in car seats while the vehicle is in motion.

Rotan Police Chief H.W. Grady, indicated that according to the new law "A person commits an offense if he intentionally or knowingly leaves a child in a motor vehicle for longer than five mintues, knowing that the child is (a) younger than seven years of age and (b) not attended by an individual in the vehicle who is 14 years old

Grady also indicated that Rotan Police Department officers will begin enforcing the child passenger safety seat system. "A person commits an offense if the person is (a) a resident of Texas (b) transports a child younger than 2 years of age by operating a passenger car or light truck on a road, street or highway (c) does not keep the child secured during the operation of the vehicle in a child passenger safety seat system

Seat Belts

I'm just a little bit confused. There was a fire, that apparently started in the lavatory, of a major airline several months ago. As a result of this fire the airline industry is beginning to move in the safety direction. I noticed an article in a recent publication where Pan American Airways is in the process of installing smoke detectors in its entire fleet of 119 jet transports. Pan Am is the first carrier to have fleet-wide installation of the

This is probably called responsibility in the front offices of air line industry executives.

I have also noticed in recent weeks where the state of New York is now making it mandatory, imposing a stiff fine, for persons stopped by State Troopers on New York Highways not wearing seat belts.

This again shows a degree of responsibility by New York state legislators in imposing the new seat belt

Recently we have read a lot and viewed a lot concerning new requirements that parents of small babies use the 'car seats' for small infants. They have been plugging the seats as "safer than a mother's arms". Another act of responsibility.

Now to the point. If everyone is so concerned with my safety [a] in rest rooms of aircraft; [b] for my children's safety in cars [c] for my own personal safety in an automobile travelling down an interstate highway in New York state then why aren't they as equally concerned about my children's safety in a school bus.

It has always seemed a little distressing that school buses are not required by law to have seat belts-let alone use the belts. In Fisher County we are a little closer to the school bus accident problem than a lot of other school districts. I wonder if any lives would have been saved the afternoon of the McCaulley School bus wreck had seat belts been installed and were being used? I wonder what could have happened to the children on the Rotan bus several weeks ago involved in a wreck. Fortunately, no one was injured seriously, but what could have happened.

Why don't we have mandatory requirements that all school buses have seat belts. Several years ago I was told that it was money. The belts would increase the cost of the bus-what about the cost of the belts measured against the worth of a child's life.

If New York can make it mandatory to wear seat belts in cars, why can't Texas make it mandatory that belts at least be installed in school buses in operation in Texas. We'll work on making the kids wear them after we get them in the buses.

NEW RULES FOR 1985

January 1 is the starting point for the requirement that adequate "contemporaneous records" must be kept to substantiate deductions taken for business usage of computers, airplanes, automobiles, trucks, boats, and other such property. Contemporaneous records are those that are kept at the time the equipment usage occurs rather than being summarized or estimated at a

Taxpavers who do not have such logs or diaries giving specific data to support the tax benefits they claim will be denied the credits or deductions and may even be subject to penalties for negligence. Those who are affected by this change should begin their recordkeeping immediately; any delay could mean lost benefits.

The IRS says that individuals must charge a minimum interest rate on contracts, or the IRS will assign ("impute") an even higher interest rate. The government's concern over interest rates used in sales contracts stems from the fact that interest income is fully taxed while the principal portion of a contract is often preferentially taxed as long term capital gains. Sellers, therefore, are inclined to accept a lower interest rate in order to get a higher selling price.

A new law applies temporary "imputed" interest rates to sales effective January 1 through June 30, 1985. A seller must charge at least 9% interest when the borrowed amounts are \$2,000,000 or less or a 10% rate will be imputed (except for sales of new personal property). When borrowed amounts exceed \$2,000,000, a blended rate is used to determine whether additional interest will be imputed. This blended rate involves a weighted average of 9% on the first \$2,000,000 and 110% of the "applicable federal rate" on amounts over \$2,000,000. The law states some exceptions to the general rules.

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



The quality of cotton classed during the past week was slightly lower than that of the previous week for several quality factors. Grades have been 31 percent white and 66 percent light-spotted this season. Less than three precent has graded as spotted in spite of an unusually high amount of rain fall during the harvest season. Grade 42 accounted for 35 percent of the samples classed this season. Twenty percent were grade 52, 14 percent were grade 51, and 13 percent were grade 41. About 32 percent of the total classing have been reduced in grade because of bark or grass content. About 76 percent have miked 35 to 49, and the average mike has been 37.4. Rotan. Scoring was paced by Cathy Conner with 12



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
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
