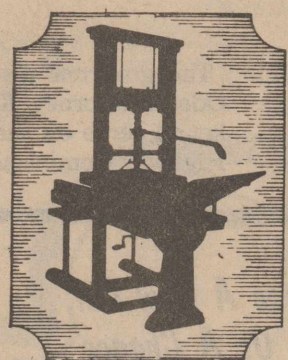

Quarterly Mixed Drink Tax Brings In \$426.45

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks totaling \$12.3 million to the 221 counties and 422 cities as their share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during the second quarter of 1985.

The Texas Legislature raised the tax from 10 to 12 percent in 1984. Bullock said the state collected \$51.3 million in mixed drink taxes for the second quarter at the increased rate, compared to \$40.9 collected during second quarter 1984 at the old 10 percent rate.

Texas cities and counties now each receive a 12.5 percent share of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed

He became manager of the Abilene National Farm Association in 1947 when the Abilene and Roby associations consolidated, he was named assistant manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Roby. He became manager in 1961, serving in that capacity until his retirement in 1973.

drinks in the state. Of the total \$51.3 million in state collections, counties received \$6.4 million, up from the \$6.1 million received second quarter in 1984. Cities received \$5.9 million compared to \$5.7 million collected during the same period last year. The state's general revenue fund received the balance.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's Office. The total Fisher County tax revenue amounted to \$426.45 with the county's 12.5 percent remittance amounting to \$53.31 and the City of Rotan's 12.5 percent remittance being \$53.31.

The South African confrontations are touching sympathetic hearts in the legislature, stirring some lawmakers to explore how Texas can accelerate freedom's course on the Dark Continent.

Some state agencies, those with pension funds to nurture, have invested state dollars in South African businesses for years.

Last week, Black Caucus chairman Paul Ragsdale, D-Dallas, called for state leaders to consider whether those investments are safe in the situation of strife.

Should the white-rule government fall and revolt, these investments might not be recoverable, much less profitable, Ragsdale contends.

Black lawmakers urge the governor to call a special meeting of public funds' managers to evaluate the safety of their portfolios.

Texas Dollars Safe? Ragsdale maneuver is obvious: only a few days earlier, House Speaker Gib Lewis nixed the idea of divestiture of South African investments and so Ragsdale is going over Lewis' head to the governor.

With an election year approaching fast, the governor cannot afford to alienate blacks and a good many white voters, too.

But Ragsdale is smarter than the obvious political ploy would suggest. In the often cold-minded world of politics, the bottom line in many conservative minds is the security of the Texas tax dollars.

Skillfully, Ragsdale is appealing to conservatives on the pocketbook issue.

And, playing the game by their rules, he has raised a real issue. It's his way of also appealing to pragmatists who are unmoved by the more obvious issue of man's inhumanity to man.

Delicate Budget Nor is it a false cry of woe: a national report released last week indicates that falling oil prices and a weakening national economy threaten the delicate budget.

In plain English, further economic setbacks leave Texas with little budget maneuverability unless taxes are raised, or services severely cut.

If the average price of oil falls more than \$2 a barrel in the next two years, a special session to raise taxes will likely be called, according to Lt. Governor Bill Hobby.

Hobby, by the way, drew his first official '86 challenge last week. David Young, twice a candidate for statewide office, announced that he will run against Hobby as a democrat next year.

Like other states, Texas has budgeted cautiously because the uncertainty of federal spending cuts, aide to the states, tax cuts and fears of a new recession.

Appointments Two former state representatives are being appointed to government positions.

The president nominated

Bob Maloney of Dallas, now a Texas Appeals Court judge, to a federal district court judgeship.

The governor has named Lynn Nabers to head the Texas Sesquicentennial Commission for \$1 a year.

The governor also picked Odessa attorney Ray Stoker to serve on the Texas Highway Commission.

TAX-WISE LOANS

It's not unusual for individuals to lend money to family members, friends, and to their own businesses. It's also not uncommon for some of these loans to end up as uncollectible bad debts.

The IRS is very suspicious of loans to family, friends and one's own business and will try to force you to prove certain things if you try to deduct such loans as bad debts. The IRS will expect you to prove that you did indeed make a loan and that the money was not a gift to a family member or friend or a capital contribution to your company. The IRS will look for evidence that the bad debt that you want to deduct is in fact uncollectible. Finally, if you try to treat the loan as a business loan with its more favorable tax treatment rather than as a personal loan with less favorable treatment, the IRS will expect proof that the loan was business related.

Do the necessary paperwork at the time you make a loan, business or personal, to assure yourself of the best deduction should the loan turn into a bad debt. Draw up a note for the loan, stating the interest rate, schedule for repayment, and the collateral that secures the loan. If the loan becomes uncollectible, be certain your collection attempts are formally documented. Keep copies of letters sent to the debtor and a record of other collection attempts that you make.

If the loan is a business one, have that fact documented in the loan agreement or in business records or corporate minutes. A business bad debt can be deducted when it becomes partially worthless or completely worthless and it gives you an ordinary loss that offsets taxable income dollar for dollar. A personal debt can only be deducted when it is totally worthless and is treated as a short term capital loss which means it will first offset capital gains and then can offset ordinary income to the extent of only \$3,000 per year.

"Radiance" will also be at the Calvary Baptist Church, 801 N. McKinley in Rotan on Sunday morning and will be singing for the entire service.

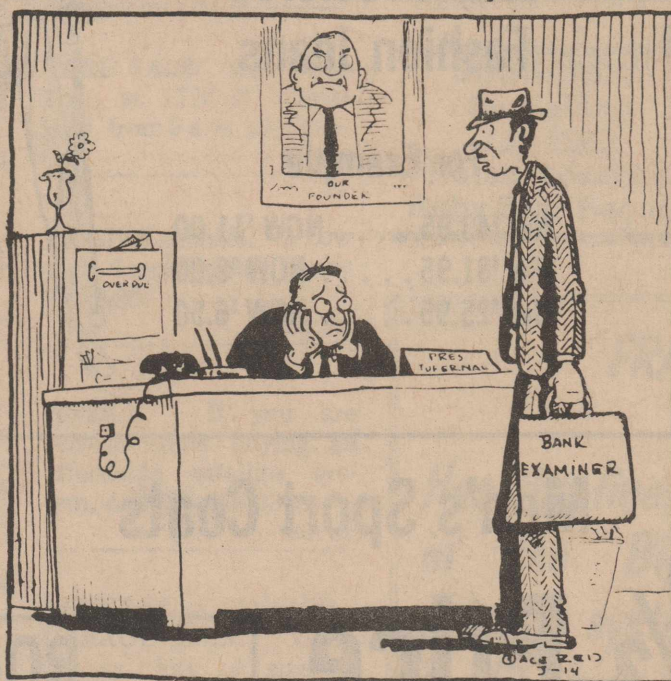

Book Committee Needs County Family Stories

The Book Committee of the Fisher County Historical Commission needs your help. Fisher County Families is to be the county Sesquicentennial project, and it is being compiled at the request of many residents of the county. We plan to include all of the families who have lived in the

county during its history. We are receiving many stories of the early settlers, but Fisher County history did not end with them. We need the histories of families who lived here in more recent times as well as those living here today. In a sense these later stories are even more important than the earlier

ones because many of them have been included in earlier books. We need a five-hundred word story about every family living here now or earlier. There will be no advertising in the book, and no extra space will be sold to any family. There is no charge for entering a family story, nor is there an obligation to buy a book. The book will be financed solely through sales. Our purpose is to compile an authentic history in which

every family who has ever lived in the county has an equal opportunity to record its story. We want stories of each family in each generation. Remember today's history is as important and as interesting as that of earlier years, and it should be recorded for future generations. It is impossible to get the story of every family, but with your help we can get those living here now.

JOHN CARROLL GRAY FAMILY--EIGHTY YEARS IN ROTAN

The Gray's have been in business in Rotan continuously since before the town was established. It all began with Gray Lumber Company. The Grays served the lumber needs of the Rotan area until 1940 when Robert Gray went into the wholesale petroleum business which became the present Gray Fuel and Chemical, Inc.

Gray Lumber was started by John Carroll Gray, a pioneer East Texas merchant and lumberman from Bosque County. The family arrived in Rotan in late 1905 via a flat car on the newly laid track of the Texas Central Railroad. There were three sons: Chester, Jack and Robert; and two daughters: Eva, who married Dono Day; and Ola, who married Mack Farrell. J.C. Gray died in 1940 and the lumber business was sold to H.L. Davis and M.D. Ivey.

Robert Ray Gray, who had been associated with his father in the lumber business, was appointed agent for Magnolia Petroleum Company. He was a member of Rotan's first band and helped to organize the present Volunteer

Fire Department. He married Mamie Lois Reese from Denton, Texas, in 1923. She received her degree from North Texas State University and taught in Rotan four years.

Robert Gray died in 1949, and "Mim" Gray was appointed consignee for Mobil Oil Corporation. She had managed the business since 1943 when her husband became ill, and was the first woman Mobil had assigned to such a position. She received the first Outstanding Citizen award presented by the Chamber of Commerce in 1958, and served on the City Council for six years.

The Robert Grays had two children: John Carroll named for his grandfather and Gloria Jane. John graduated from high school in 1952. He was president of his senior class and played center for the Yellowhammer football team. He learned to fly with the Flying Farmers at the Whitefield Airport and has been flying ever since. After completing college and military service, he returned to Rotan and took over the family business as Mobil Oil Company consignee. At the same time added propane and agricultural chemicals to his business. Jane Gray married William Levens of Roby and they lived in Austin until the time of his death. Their four sons and their families still live in the Austin area.

John married Barbara Sharp of Spur in 1960. They have three children: Kim, Robert and Desiree. Kim and his wife, Bonnie and son Jonathon live in Dallas where he is in management for the Gold Division of National Gypsum. Robert, who inherited his father's love of flying, is a licensed pilot and instructor, and is attending college in central

Texas at Killeen. He is pursuing a career in aviation. Desiree graduated from high school in 1985, with numerous scholarships, achievements and awards. She was also chosen as Texas State Lions Club Queen. She will go to Japan in July of 1985 as an exchange student for International Lions. Desiree has chosen Texas Tech for her first college year.

Perhaps when the next history is written, there will be another generation of Grays helping to make Fisher County history.

ORDINANCE NO. 140

An ordinance amending in part sections No. 2 and sections No. 3 of Ordinance No. 138 of the City of Rotan, Texas, providing for charges for the collection and removal of garbage, trash, and rubbish, from homes, buildings and premises used for business and residential purposes; and providing for an effective date:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas:

SECTION 1: AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 138

A. Section No. 2 providing charges for the removal and collection of Garbage, trash, and rubbish at residential dwellings is hereby repealed.

B. Section No. 3 providing charges for the removal and collection of garbage, trash and rubbish at commercial and business establishments is hereby repealed.

shall be \$6.00 per month plus 50% of \$6.00 times the number of family units.

The basis of the above service charge is the collection and removal of the normal accumulation of all garbage of each family unit once each week.

SECTION 3. CHARGES FOR COMMERCIAL, BUSINESS, AND HOUSING PROJECTS SERVICE

The charge for the collection and removal of garbage, trash, and rubbish from houses, building and premises used for commercial and business purposes shall be based upon the container size, number of collections each week and upon the volume of such trash, garbage, and rubbish removed. A fair and reasonable charge shall be made for such commercial and business service, but in no event shall such charges be less than:

- (1) \$6.50 per month for building housing a single business unit or office.
 - (2) \$6.50 per month plus 50% of \$6.50 times the number of business units or offices for multi-business or office building.
 - (3) \$6.00 per month for each family unit in housing projects.
 - (4) Other commercial and business collections to be assessed according to the amount of garbage, trash, and rubbish, the frequency of collections necessary, and time required for the collections.
- SECTION 4: This Ordinance shall become effective immediately and applied to the first billing following passage on First Reading.

C. And, that Section No. 2 and No. 3 of Ordinance No. 138 of the City of Rotan, Texas, shall hereafter provide the following charges for the removal and collection of garbage, trash, and rubbish, shall read as follows:

SECTION 2: CHARGES OF TRASH, GARBAGE, OR RUBBISH

The collections of removal of garbage, trash, and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for residential purposes shall be once each week. Fair and reasonable charges for this residential service shall be and are shown in terms of dollars and cents in a column for a calendar month as follows:

Single Family Residence.....\$6.00 per Mo.
2 Family Residence \$9.00 Per Mo.

For multiple family dwellings having more than two (2) family dwellings, the minimum charge

County "Bug" Scoop

By Paula Verden

Well folks, now is the time to start looking closely for bollworm eggs and larvae. After the moisture we received, the moths got busy laying eggs.

Fortunately there are a number of beneficials in the field, and these are helping keep the bollworm egg and larvae numbers down.

In Fisher County, the egg numbers range from 3 to 6 per 100 plants while bollworm larvae are ranging from 2 to 35 per 100 plants. The numbers aren't real uniform across the area, so be sure you know what is in YOUR field.

Fleahopper numbers

range from 3 to 24 per 100 plants. The high numbers were found in cotton that had a good square set, therefore they aren't hurting much.

A scouting program is available through Fisher-Jones Pest Management Association. For 2X1 planted cotton, the price for scouting service is \$2.25 per planted acre. If you are interested in participating in the program or if you just need to ask questions about bugs in your field, call me or come by the courthouse office, Room 109. Paula Verden, Extension Agent-Entomology (PM), phone 915-776-2706.

County Agent Report

By Richard Spencer

The back-to-the country movement does not necessarily mean an increase in production agriculture for Texas.

More than 70 percent of rural land purchases in Texas involve non-agricultural considerations. Other motivations are a desire to own land, live in the country, enjoy outdoor recreational activities and farm on a part-time basis.

Buyers generally are of two types. One is the wealthy buyer able to buy large tracts. The other is the average wage earner who prefers a rural setting. These commuters buy as much land as they can afford and use it to raise animals and a garden while keeping their jobs in the city.

Many of those wanting to migrate to the country are willing to pay more for the land than it is worth for agricultural purposes, putting significant upward pressure on land prices. This trend will probably continue and will influence farm size and use.

The increasing number of small-scale farms and ranches also requires many farm families to seek off-farm income to pay for the land. In 1980 about 61 percent of the total income to farm operations came

from off-farm sources.

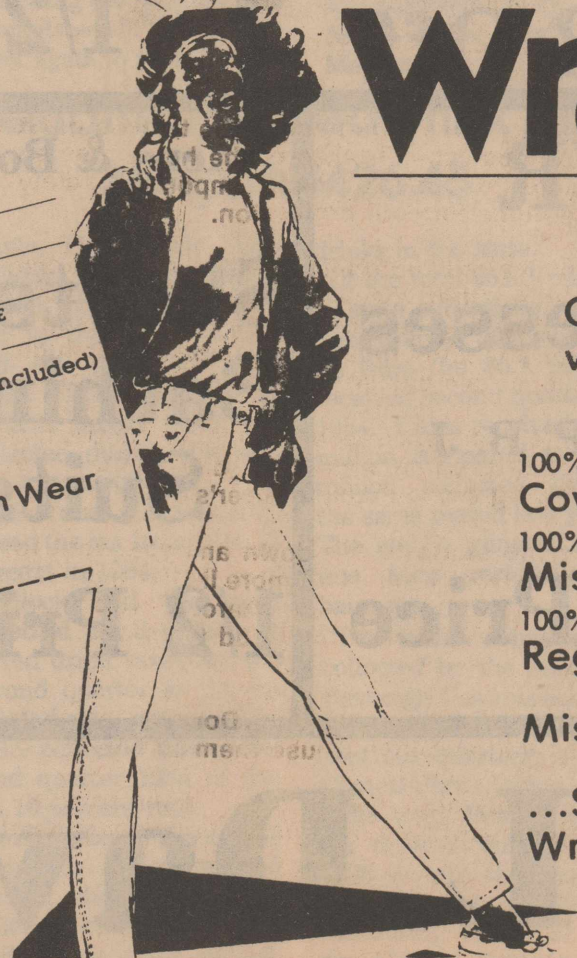
