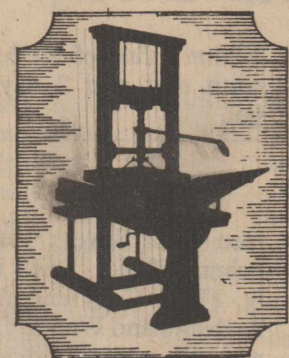

New Classes Have Been Added To 40th Annual Fisher County Fair

Time is fast approaching for the 40th Annual Fisher County Livestock Show, Fair and Rodeo to be on the Fair Grounds in Roby August 29-31, according to Alice Ballenger County Extension Agent.

In previous news articles we have discussed several individual divisions of the fair. Some of these have

been successful for a few years, while others are comparatively new for our fair.

Some new classes have been added that have not been in this fair. In clothing the two new classes added include Blooming Vests and Quilted Vests. Both are very popular now and several

should have entries in these new classes.

The Puff Paint is a division added. Classes in it include clothing, shoes, ornaments and quilts. In novelties, tin punch, an early day art that has returned to the arts and crafts of today.

Remember that all entries should be brought to the Fair Building on Wednesday, August 28, between the times of 9:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. The exceptions to this is baked foods and fresh vegetables and fruit.

Judging is to begin at 9:00 a.m. Thursday August 29 and should be completed by noon. No one will be allowed to view exhibits until judging is completed.

Exhibits will be open to the public on Thursday, Friday and until 3:00 p.m. Saturday, August 31. At

this time all exhibits should be removed from the building.

available. Anyone interested should call Tempie West to reserve space for their booth.

Two New Events Added To Annual County Rodeo Event

The Fisher County Fair and Rodeo will be featuring two events for the Fisher County Residents. The events are the Team Branding which will be featured nightly and team Roping on Saturday.

The Team branding rules are as follows. A herd of steers will be located at the end of the arena, each steer will be numbered, and team member roping must rope steer he has drawn. There will be a two minute time limit on the roping end. After the steer has been roped and dragged to the fire, the two muggers will throw the steer. The member doing the branding cannot leave the fire until the steer is flat on his side. After the steer is branded time will be called.

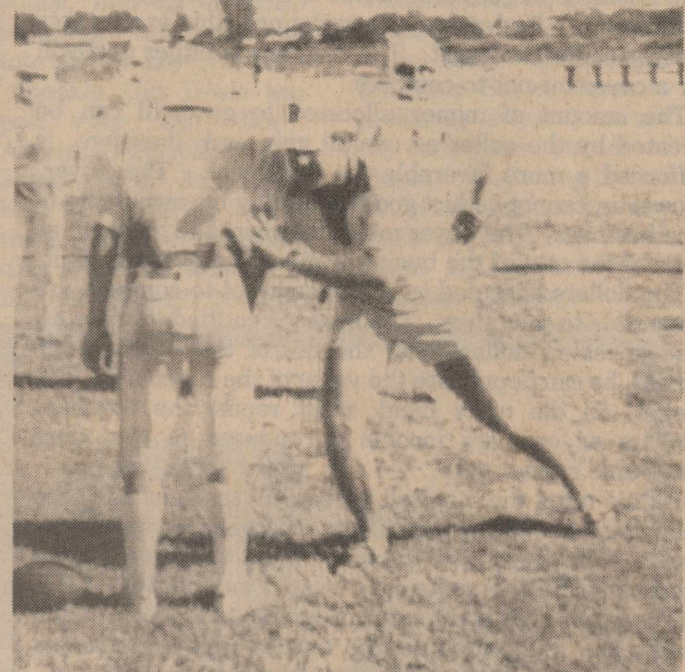
Wetsel Locker Plant Will Close Doors

Rotan School Board To Hike 1985 Tax Rate

Rotan School Board members voted to set the 1985 tax rate at .86 cents per \$100 valuation and by doing so anticipate spending approximately

\$78,850.00 more in expenses than is taken in during the 1985-86 school year.

The maximum effective tax rate for 1985 figured .84 cents per \$100 valuation. School board members could, by a vote of board, increase the tax rate as long as the rate did not exceed 3% of the .84 cents maximum effective rate.

Total estimated revenues are \$1,878,473 while estimated expenses are \$1,956,323 leaving a projected deficit of \$78,850.00. The deficit of \$78,850.00 is primarily caused by a projected cost of \$130,000 for a new track field in the budget.

The board will make up the \$78,850.00 deficit by using some of the surplus funds which amount to approximately \$500,000.

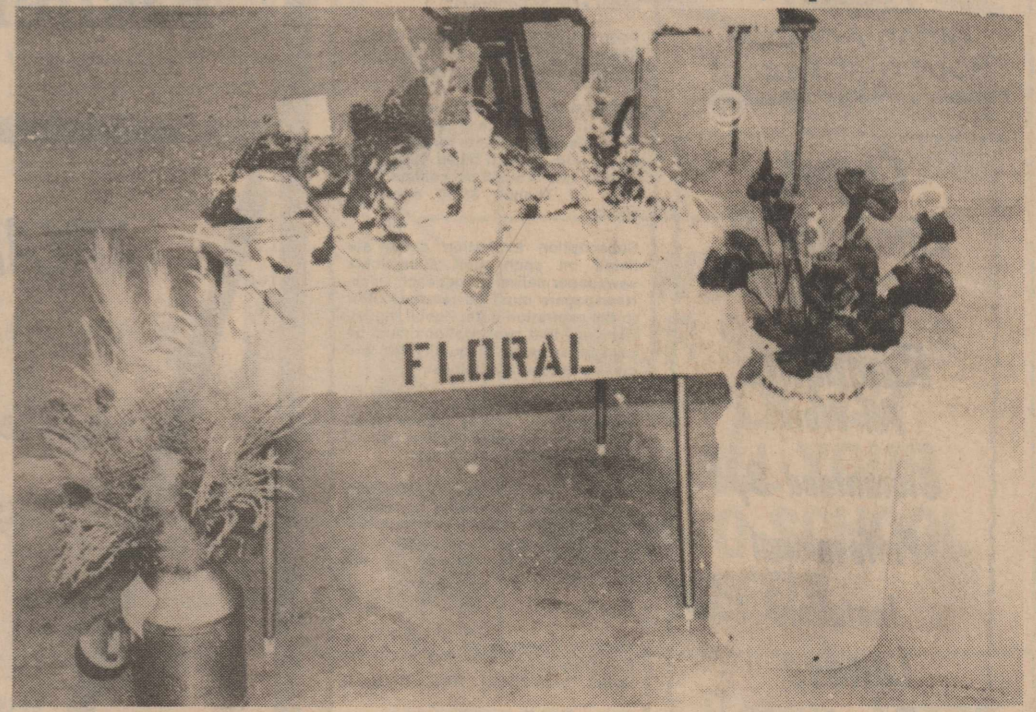

Tax Planning By Gerald Rodgers CPA



BUSINESS BUY/SELL AGREEMENTS

The price paid for a going business will often exceed the fair market value of the tangible assets.

In business jargon, this excess is usually referred to as "blue sky." Under the tax regulations, this excess gets very specific treatment. The blue sky is either goodwill or a covenant-not-to-compete.

The amount of money allocated to goodwill can be treated by the seller as capital gain and, therefore, is afforded a more favorable tax treatment. The buyer, however, cannot deduct goodwill during his ownership of the business. The buyer must treat the goodwill as part of the cost of the business should he ever re-sell it.

The dollars allocated to a covenant-not-to-compete are favorable to the buyer. The buyer is entitled to write off the allocated dollars over the life of the covenant (in effect, he can depreciate the value of the covenant). The seller, on the other hand, must report the covenant dollars as ordinary income as opposed to the more favorable capital gain.

All too often the buy/sell agreement is silent as to the allocation between goodwill and a covenant-not-to-compete. The buyer will probably treat the blue sky as covenant and the seller will treat it as goodwill. This inconsistent treatment is unacceptable to the IRS. Upon audit, the IRS will adjust the tax returns for consistent treatment and assess back taxes and interest.

It is in the best interests of both the buyer and seller to have the allocation for goodwill or covenant spelled out in the contract. It is always unpleasant to have an IRS audit adjustment on a prior year return.

The tax consequences of the blue sky allocation can be significant. To get the best tax advantage, consult your accountant early in the sale negotiations.

search of a run-away female juvenile. When the four were asked by officers about the run-away, they stated that she was not there. The following morning the run-away was picked up and evidence showed that she has been at the Loving residence at the time the officers were questioning the four.

With the return of the juvenile, the matter was settled in county court issuing Lewis Loving and

County Bug Scoop

Some fields in the area have all size worms, others have large worms, while other fields are clean.

There seem to be a good number of beneficials in fields also. Some spraying for worms is being done in the county, but make sure that any decision to spray is backed up by the worm numbers in your own field. Don't rely on your neighbors, your field may not be exactly the same.

For the most part, I'm seeing large worms. These guys are harder to

kill and they've already done their damage. We need to be ready for the second big egg lay around the 28th of August. We should then begin to see small worms the first 3 or 4 days of September. Watch fields closely and catch those worms while they're small!!

Funeral Services Held For Lottie Schick

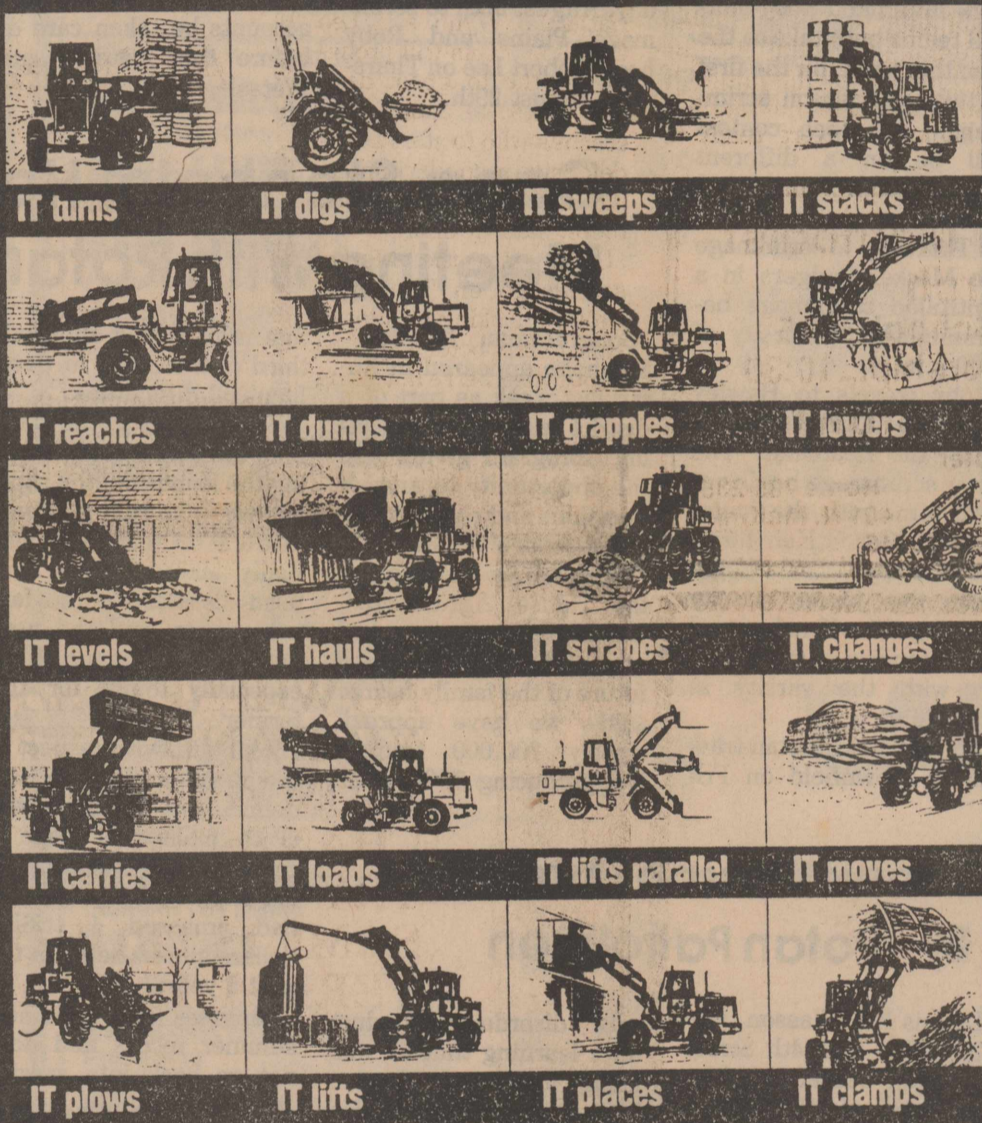

State Capital Highlights

Sometime this fall, a new select committee will begin to consider reforms for the state's higher education system—just like the panel of a year ago which came up with "no pass, no play" and other public school reforms.

The Legislature took those proposed reforms and made many of them law in a controversial special session which produced the state's largest tax legislation.

While educators are wondering whether their pet issues will even make it out of committee, some legislators are more concerned with the price tag.

Will the higher education reforms necessitate another tax bill? Or could they actually result in getting rid of some moneywasters? Can higher education become more efficient?

The members haven't been named yet by the governor, the Lt. governor and the speaker, who together will pick the bulk of the membership.

Money, Quality

The battle to draw the agenda may include some of the following issues:

- Should college admissions standards be made more difficult across board?
- Should some institutions be closed down or merged with other schools?
- Should colleges go back to holding classes on Saturdays and include more evening classes?
- Should students be required to pass exit exams, similar to the exam which graduating high school seniors will be taking this year.

Tough Politics
If you enjoy watching complicated politics, you'll love the careers-on-the-line decisions that promise to plague lawmakers in this drama.

Many a seasoned politico will tell you that local school politics are the toughest around, mainly because emotions are stronger when you're dealing with children and their futures.

Earlier he was busy straightening out a new child abuse reporting law that conflicts with church doctrines.

Texas Republican secretary Holly Decherd will serve as vice chairman of U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler's statewide steering committee. Loeffler says he will announce for governor officially by Labor Day.

Gov. Mark White urged the State Bar of Texas to prosecute lawyers, including some from outside of Texas, for soliciting clients in connection with the crash of Delta Air Lines Flight 191 at the D/FW International Airport.

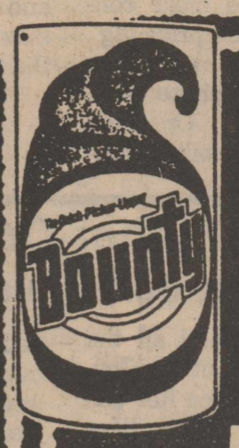

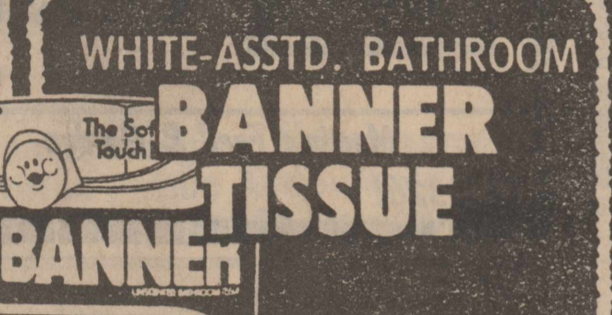
