## Calvary Issues Call In View Placement

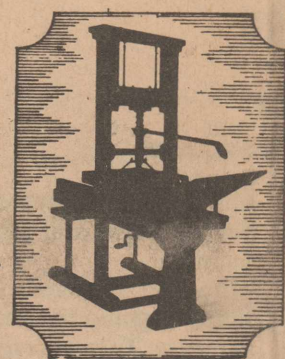

# Dr. Wayne Viehweg Signs As New Doctor, To Move In Feb.

Dr. Wayne R. Viehweg has executed the signed contract with the Fisher County Hospital Board and should begin his new local medical practice at the Fisher County Doctor's Clinic "sometime in the latter part of February", according to Fisher County

Hospital Administrator Paul Harper. Dr. Viehweg visited in Fisher County last week, looked at local housing options, executed the contract and indicated to Harper that he will be moving from Oregon to Fisher County on February 15th.

Under the terms of the contract with the board, Dr. Viehweg will receive \$8,333.34 per month with all "gross cash income" from his medical practice going to the Fisher County Hospital District. The hospital board further agreed to furnish the new doctor with office space, furniture, supplies, utilities, medical equipment along with one LVN and one office person at the Fisher County Doctor's Clinic. The hospital board will pay his malpractice insurance, up to \$15,000 in moving expenses; pay his

hospitalization insurance, give him two weeks paid vacation and two weeks educational leave annually.

All revenue generated by the new doctor's practice will go to the Fisher County Hospital.

## Three Spots Open On Roby School Board

A total of three spots are up for election in the 1986 Roby School Board election set for Saturday, April 5th, according to Superintendent Jimmie Laurie.

The spots currently being held by June Wright, Gayle Morgeson and Scott Feagan, filling the unexpired term of Richard

Gaona, all expire in 1986. Mary Jo Pope, school secretary, indicated last Tuesday morning that "no one has filed for any spots". The deadline for filing is Wednesday, March 5th.

Other Roby School Board members are: Mike Terry and Judy Mauldin with terms expiring in 1987 and Ronald Henry and Calvin Elkins with terms expiring in 1988. The election will be on April 5th.

## C. E. Atwell Files For Rotan Council

Rotan City Councilman C.E. Charles Atwell became the first of three incumbents to re-file for a post on the Rotan City Council, according to Rotan City Secretary Kenneth Vann.

The two other spots being held by incumbents and up for re-election in 1986 are currently held by E.H. Hooper Shelton and Gary Dickson. Neither Shelton or Dickson have filed for re-election.

The deadline for filing is February 19th. The election is scheduled for Saturday, April 5th.

Other members of the Rotan City Council include: Mayor Jerry Marshall, Phil Springer and Jim McCright.

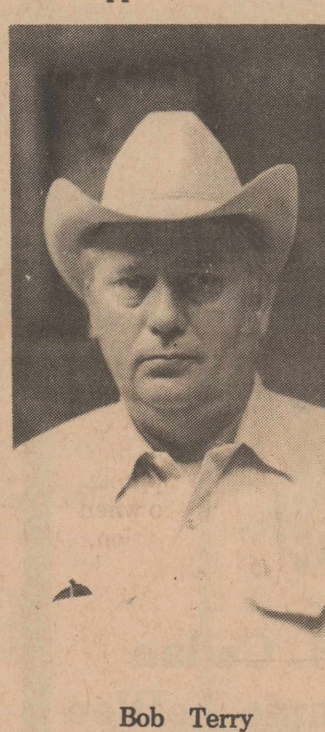
The Terry's are members of the First Baptist Church in Roby. Bob Terry has been involved in the Art Flores River Ministry and is a member of the Gideon Bible Society.

Subscription rates remain the same for 1986. Cost of in-county subscriptions are \$11.00; this included Fisher and surrounding counties; Texas rate is \$13.00 and out of state-\$15.00.

In each of the instances I came away feeling that we were invading the privacy of the folks involved. It has already started with the latest incident. After watching the noon news for just 10 minutes on Tuesday, I shut it off after it was announced that the station was going to break-away for a live interview with one of the students of Astronaut McAuliffe. Good gracious - it wouldn't surprise me if they interviewed her hairdresser or a former boyfriend. I think the media goes too far in cases like these - I'm embarrassed.

ACTION PICKS UP: With the deadline for filing for one of the eight elective offices in Fisher County only a few days away - the pace is beginning to increase with the announcement this week of two running for the post currently being held by Commissioner Jimmie Wright. Freddy Williamson and Bob Terry both announced this week that they want his job. Wright wants his job back - 30 residents of Precinct 4 will have a choice of three candidates. Hang on though - there may be more before the deadline of Monday, February 3rd.

## Tax Planning By Gerald Rodgers CPA



### ESTIMATED INCOME TAXES (Know a little more tax)

The average person doesn't need to be a tax specialist. Accounts are here to serve that need; they will see that all the niceties are taken care of so that you pay the least amount of tax under the current law. Nevertheless, you will get more value from your accountant's services if you are better acquainted with general tax concepts.

Many taxpayers are paying unnecessary penalties for underestimating their income taxes. Most people who work for a salary have an adequate amount of taxes paid in through withholding to eliminate "underestimating penalties". Those taxpayers with income not subject to withholding such as rents, royalties, dividends, interest or self-employment business income may need to pay quarterly estimated taxes.

In general, you will not be subject to an underestimating penalty if you have paid in 80% of your taxes due on your current tax return. It's difficult to determine 80% of your tax liability when you don't know your annual income until the year is completed. Therefore, many taxpayers use a second allowable computation for avoiding penalties; this is 100% of the prior year's tax liability. If you pay 100% of last year's tax liability, you will not be penalized for underestimating even if your current year tax liability is larger than that amount.

If you file your tax return and pay the remaining taxes due by January 31, 1986, you are not required to make your fourth quarter estimate which otherwise is due January 15, 1986.

If you receive a penalty notice for underestimating your taxes, do not pay it without a close review. There are three computations available to all taxpayers which may avoid a penalty for underestimating.

Other scores in the game were contributed by Eddie Onofre with seven, Darry Thomson and Jerry Carreon with six points each and Heath Dickson with two.

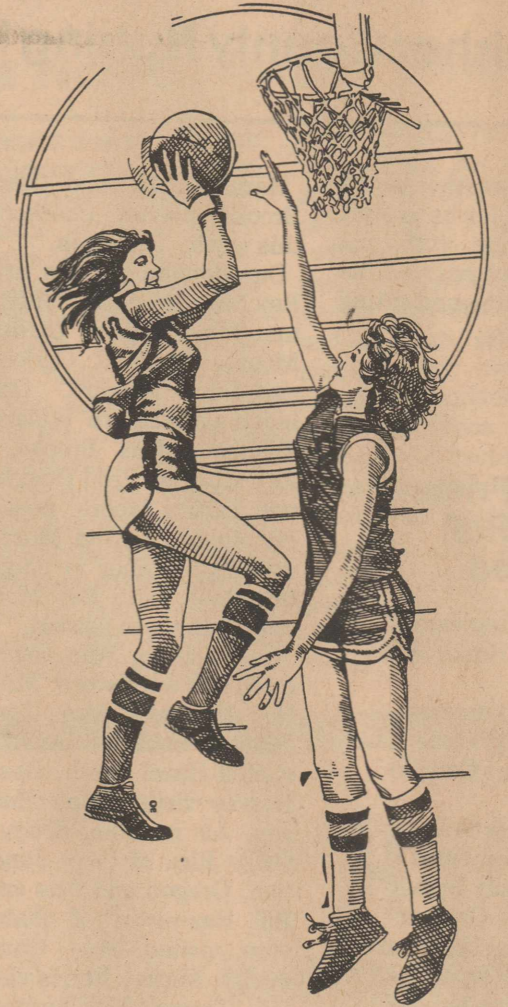


