
After discussing the needs of the depart-

BUSINESSPERSON OR SHOPKEEPER (Which Are You?)

It seems that the operators of small businesses can be divided into two main classes, businesspeople and shopkeepers.

Businesspeople analyze, compare, budget, project. and review information to try to be the best in their business community and to make the most profit on their invested time and money.

Shopkeepers, on the other hand, open their doors at 8:00 and close at 6:00 day after day all year long. They show up at their accountant's office in April of the following year and ask, "What's left over for me?" or, "Did I make any money?"

Do you suppose that 20% of the businesses do 80% of the volume and the other 80% of the businesses get the remaining 20%? It's impossible to run a business properly without a record system designed for your specific needs. To be in the top 20%, you must have adequate financial information to make proper decisions.

Whether your business is large or small, it needs management information. Such information will help you to control costs, manage inventory, assess equipment purchase needs, do tax planning, etc. If the business is small, your system will be simple and the cost to install and maintain it should be minimal in relation to the benefits. 





Is Mark White deliberately avoiding a debate with his primary opponents, and is that strategy helping or hurting him?

Only the Governor and his campaign advisors know for sure, and probably they are the only ones who think the strategy, if it is that, is working.

Last week the League of Women Voters gave up efforts to arrange a debate among Democratic candidates for governor because Mark White, the lone holdout, won't agree on a date.

The League has arranged a similar debate for Republican candidates with little apparent trouble, and that's one reason why many of the Texas Democratic faithful are hopping mad.

White's sidestep means the Republican debate will get some millions of dollars in free television time while the Democrats get none. And don't kid yourself, the word all over the Capitol is that White is ducking.

EXCUSES, EXCUSES

Only two weeks ago, White was confronted by challenger Andy Briscoe, who had to show up at one of White's own press conferences to get an answer out of him. White said he would debate March 20.

But as of last week, those arrangements couldn't be worked out with PBS, and the League, with time drawing short, announced it was giving up. Could it be the old

political dodge of just stalling for time on White's part?

VOTERS CHEATED

White's advisors are publicly saying he is try-

Some old roses are drought resistant and can exist on rainfall in much of Texas, but most modern roses need watering to develop more attractive plants and blooms. Avoid watering foliage to prevent diseases. Deep watering a weekly intervals is far superior to frequent light sprinkl-

ing. Mulches can help conserve water while moderating soil temperatures during hot weather. Mixing mulches with wellrotted cow manure during the winter can add both organic materials and nutrients to the soil. Disease and pest re-

sistance can vary with varieties, but roses planted in sunny areas with good air circulation have the least problems. Insecticides can control most pests, and fungicides are effective against blackspot and powdery mildew, the two main diseases attacking roses.

Traditional heavy pruning may be ap-

propriate for Hybrid Tea roses, but most old roses require less severe methods. Remove weak or dead canes anytime during the year, and do general thinning in February or early March. Shaping plants and cutting back strong canes one-fourth to onethird their length will produce more attractive plants. Prune climbers and one-time bloomers only after they flower in the spring.

Improper cutting of blooms can injure roses. It is best to cut few, if any, flowers during the first blooming season. Use sharp tools and leave at least two leaves between the cut and the main stem. Late afternoon is the best time to cut roses. After blooms have been cut, immediately

plunge the stems into warm water (about 100 degrees F.) then recut them an inch or so from the base. Flower preservatives can double the useful life of roses and many other cut flowers (7-Up mixed equally with water is an effec-




